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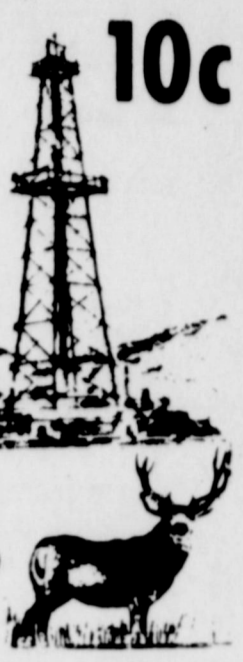

The junior football team finished their season last week in the football game with Marfa here. The local lads lost 22-0.

In their game the previous week Sanderson won 8-0 over Imperial in the 8th grade game with the TD by Floyd Watson from the 1 and a pass from Robert Kline to Jake Murrah furnished the 2 extra points. The score came in the final minute of the game.

Acting captains were Dale Harrell, Murrah, and Darrell Cooke.

Captains in the Marfa game were Kline, Bobby Spence, and Watson.

A 5th quarter was played in Imperial by the 7th graders and Kevin Phillips scored on a run around left end from six yards out for the 6-0 win for the local lads.

In a game between Sanderson reserves of the high school team and Imperial, there was a 0-0 tie. Kendrick Harrell and Bob Murrah were the captains.

The junior high boys had a season record of 2 wins and 4 losses under coaches Norman Gladson and Lawrence Barber.

Sanderson's predominately sophomore team lacked the experience to be effective against the Braves' rushing defense and were unable to put together a passing or rushing offense sufficient to score their potential.

The Eagles' scores were in the second and final periods and Olivas scored both on running plays, the first for 15 yards and the second for six yards.

Iraan scored in the first, second, and third periods, all on running plays.

Mike Scallorn was the outstanding offensive back for the Braves, scoring three of their TDs and running one PAT over for two points. Randy Burnam did the honors on their third TD and Kenneth Smith kicked two extra points.

Sanderson had some hard luck on passes almost-completed and extreme difficulty from rushers preventing passes to wide-open receivers.

Mark Crosby was out of the line-up with a bad knee and Nelson Cooke has a broken bone in his hand and was unable to play.

Sanderson will go to Clint this week and will host Socorro next week for their final home game of the season.

Body Found of Missing Man

The body of H. A. Stauffer, missing since July 26, was found Sunday morning by Philip Eggleston as he was feeding his horses.

Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg told The Times that the body was against the fence in the right-of-way less than 50 yards from where the car was abandoned and found on US 285 about 2 miles north of Sanderson.

Hogg reported that the Lawrence Jones Funeral Home of Ozona was called to come after the body and it was taken to that city and it was understood that it would be taken to San Antonio for burial.

A state-wide search for the man was initiated after pictures were obtained and search over the area around the place where the car was found failed to locate the body. Local searches were by officers on foot and by helicopter.

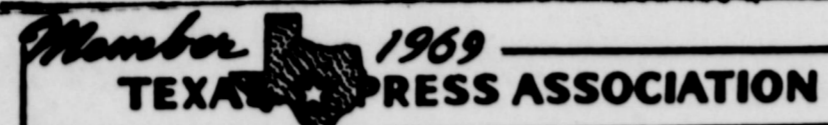

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New System To Speed Up Sale Of License Plates

A new system for the issuance of vehicle registration plates is being initiated in Texas. Under the new system, according to a news release from Mrs. A. J. Hahn, local deputy tax assessor-collector, it will not be necessary for the tax office to type license receipts for those persons having "license plate renewal applications". This will greatly reduce the time required to register an automobile, according to Mrs. Hahn, who said that the time has been estimated at 20 seconds if you have your check written before you come to the office.

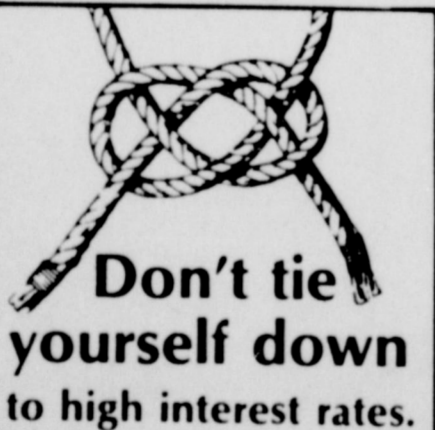
The Texas Highway Department Motor Vehicle Division will mail during the last week in December of this year a "License Plate Renewal Application" to the vehicle owners in the state. The application is a verification of the latest registration and title information and this will be presented when seeking registration plates.

Under a new law, enacted by the 61st legislature, the owner may, for an extra fee of \$1, during February only, obtain his 1970 license plates by mail.

It is most important for each vehicle owner to keep his "License Plate Renewal Application" where it will be readily available for use during February and March next year. Persons not having their application will, as in the past, be required to present their certificate of title and current license receipt, Mrs. Hahn said.

Press Nichols Services Today

Press Nichols, 83, died on Wednesday in an Alpine Hospital after a long illness.

Services were Wednesday in the Geeslin Funeral Home Chapel with burial in the Alpine Cemetery.

Mr. Nichols was born Nov. 14, 1885 in Whitesboro. He retired in 1960 as manager of Big Bend Wool and Mohair Co. He was a resident of Sanderson from 1943 to 1945 and of Alpine from 1945 until his death. For 30 years he was associated with Clyde-McClory Steamship Lines operating between Galveston and New York City. He was married to Louise Roberts in 1916 in San Antonio.

Survivors include his wife, a brother, John T. Nichols of Oklahoma City, Okla. and a sister, Mrs. May Wilson of Los Angeles, Calif.

Mr. and Mrs. T. W. McKenzie returned home Tuesday after a two weeks' vacation trip visiting relatives in Alabama and Louisiana.

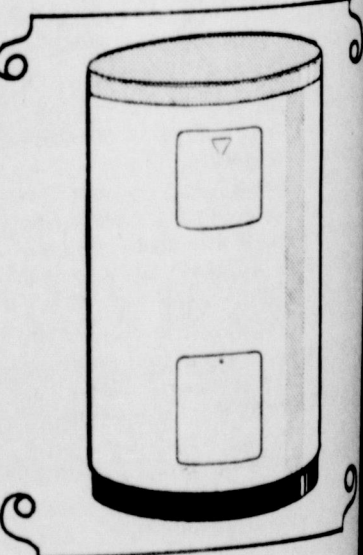
