LISTEN TO LUKE

We heard with interest the "threat" of impeachment proceeding against Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas in case Clement F. Haynsworth is not approved; the basis for the threat being that Douglas is accused of being guilty of a "deal" similar to that of which Haynsworth is said to be guilty.

This "double-dealing" should be stopped all the way down. We are said to be guilty of doing one thing while saying another - and this is true to a certain extent. We have standards we try to uphold while we are tearing them down ourselves.

If something is wrong for Justice-nominee Haynsworth, it is wrong for Justice Douglas and even the Supreme Court doesn't have the right to give permission for someone to break the law.

And however we try to justify it, we only compound our wrong, and the more people we involve in our wrong-doing, the greater the wrong.

We had a visit from an official from the telephone company last week and he told us that, besides the local exchange now being handled out of the Odessa office, that the trunk lines to Fort Stockton had been re-activated and that Sanderson now had outside access via telephone to both Odessa, and in case that link was broken, to Alpine.

We were glad to hear this, because we know that at times the lines have been broken between here and Alpine and we were completely out of touch for emergencies.

There has been also a noticeable improvement in the service by that utility since the move, and it was said to be due to the larger facility and number of operators in Odessa.

In case anyone is wondering about the wrecked automobile parked across the street from the high school on Hackberry, it was put there by Dudley Motors at the request of the students and the approval of the administration, according to reports given us.

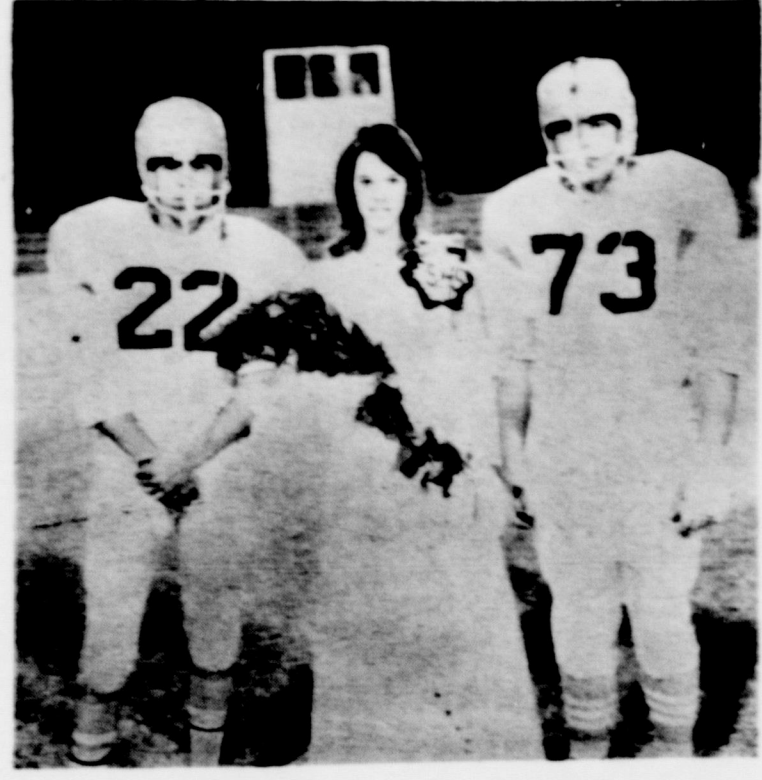
It's purpose, so we were told, was to serve as a "tension reliever" and to save tires and other items damaged on cars belonging to teachers and students.

School Board Buys Land Near Football Field

A special meeting of the Terrell County Independent School District's board of trustees was called last week for the purpose of considering the purchase of land adjacent to the football field.

The board authorized the purchase of all of the land belonging to the Joe Kerr Estate that was west and north of the field. It includes Lots 1 through 8 and 11 through 16 in Block A, and 3.84 acres north of Blocks A & E. The Kerr property included approximately that part of the enclosure on the west end of the football field, midway on the 5-yard line west to the fence west of the field and all north of the dump north of the field to the property line of Austin Nance.

Other action of the board at the recent regular meeting included the purchase of three heaters for the administration building.

Boosters Launch Field House Project

The Eagle Boosters Club has launched a project for the construction of a field house on the property at the football field. The project has the approval of the board of trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District, according to Supt. C. B. Card, and they will receive the building following its completion, for maintenance purposes.

Plans call for a building 30 x 70, tentatively of cinder tile, steel doors, with two dressing rooms and showers, toilet facilities, and office space for the coaches. According to Supt. Card one of the dressing rooms would be used by the varsity teams and the other by junior teams during the week in football and track season and when visiting teams come here to participate in those events, the junior high equipment would be moved into the varsity side so that the visitors would have a private dressing room, shower, etc.

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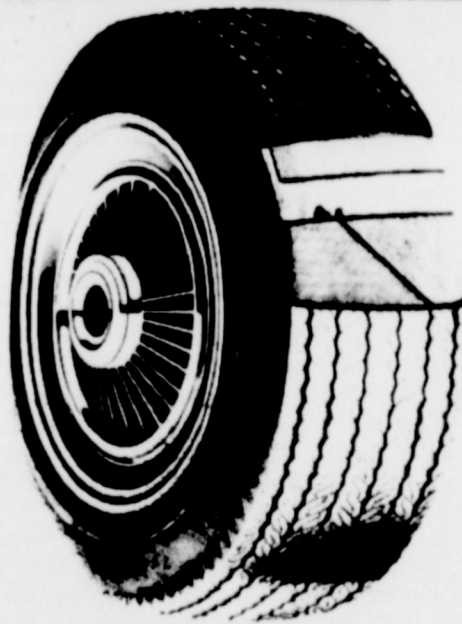

FUTURE ROCKETEERS? Hudson, Craig and Nelson Cooke and some of their rocket paraphernalia are pictured above. The youths purchase solid fuel engines and modify and experiment with various sizes rockets for speed and height. Their pad for launching is battery operated and lights signal all systems when everything is properly connected. At two demonstration launches Saturday afternoon, one of the rockets sped to about 2,000 feet faster than one could tell about it. A parachute or streamers guide the nosecone and missile down for recovery. The engines vary in burn time and a second explosion separates the nose from the missile to eject the streamer or parachute. Two-stage rockets have been launched but not recovered.

Bulletin boards in all schools will draw attention to Book Week.

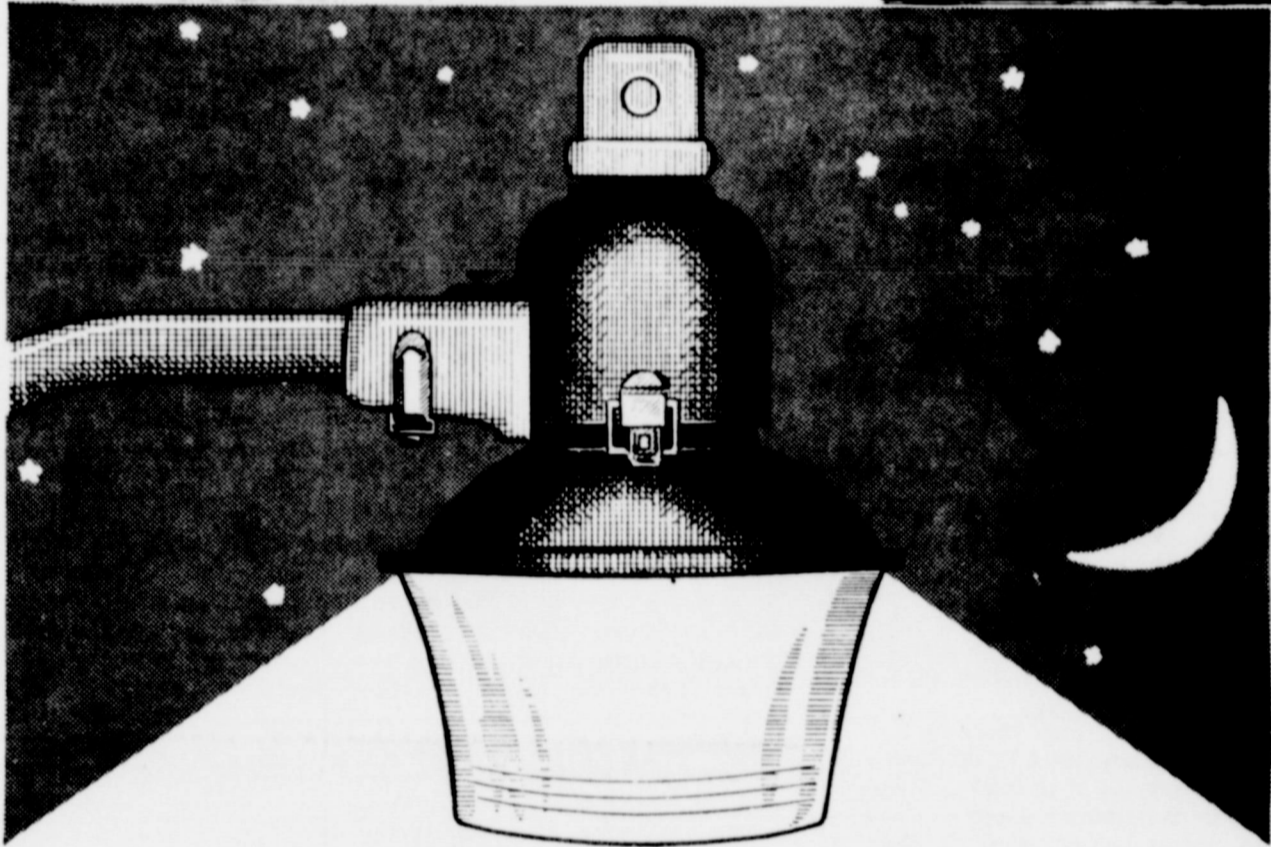
"Book Power" is the theme of National Book Week this year and it is at this time that all publishers place new children's books on the market.
