Albert: ---
Following our comments last week about sprucing up the town and doing some repairs to the main streets we had a conversation with our Precinct 1 Commissioner - Frank Weigand - and he told us that he would go a little further than we did in the effort to clean up the town of Sanderson. He would remove the old cars parked on residential streets - he would remove the old signs if the people would tell him that they wanted them removed.

There has been some agreement with what we have been saying about improving the appearance of our town, but there is going to have to be more than just talk. We all have to talk and do. Our example might be what some one else is waiting on to put their own premises in order. If we can encourage anyone else in any way this is what it is going to take.

The encouragement of such a project by local clubs and organizations could go far toward assuring success, too!

Friday of last week we saw a young man walking eastward in our block and trying to thumb a ride in that direction. He was neat, clean, and not shoddy in appearance by any means. In a few minutes we saw him going the other way on the other side of the street.

We wondered about what was going on, and then we wondered if his actions were not like the actions of some more young people of our time who are busy going someplace, but they seem to not care which way!

If the experience of the older group could be combined with the energy of the younger group who could also lend their new ideas for constructive improvements to some fundamental facts of life and love, then we would agree that this would be a much better world probably.

But a selfish way of life at any age leads but to destruction. For there to be a great "I AM" there has to be a small "He barely is" and this won't work.

And right on the tail end of that statement comes a reminder that - to our knowledge - there has not been a single move on the part of anyone locally to try to do something for the thousands of people in Lubbock who suffered the tornado on May 11. Have we forgotten so quickly?

We think the story is worth repeating, so we're repeating it.

We say that there's nothing in the world that we wouldn't do to help someone, and we hear others say the same thing, and most of the time that's exactly what we do - nothing in the world to help someone.

Anyone who is wondering why transmissions and tires do not last on their cars can see why in front of the high school by the Baptist Church and in front of the Church of Christ.

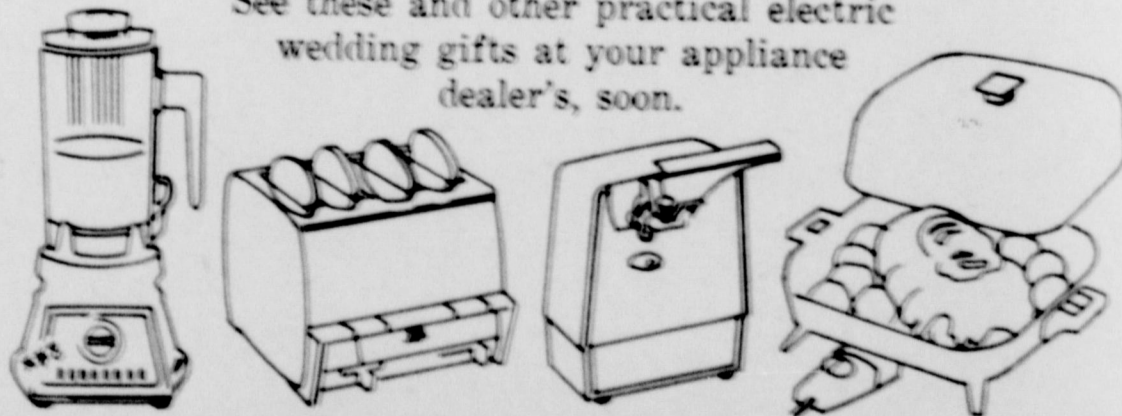

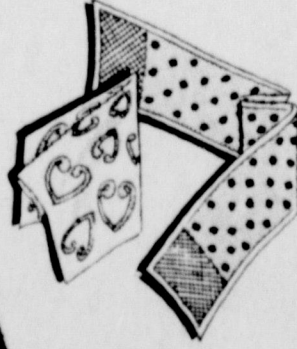
