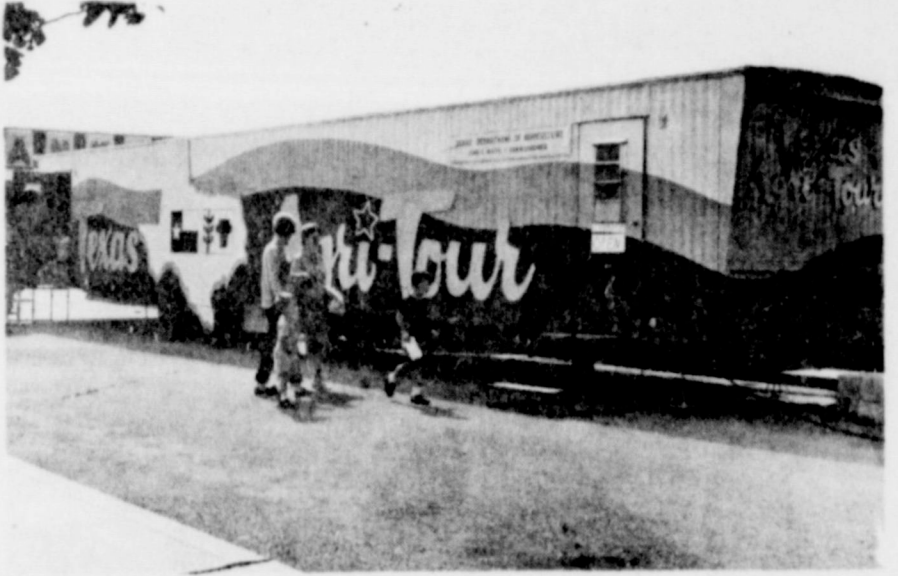
The fire seemed to be centered in the living room and was discovered by a neighbor when flames were seen coming out the top of the front door.

The Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department responded to the alarm.

The lightning reportedly caused much minor damage over town, blowing out light bulbs, some telephones burned, and a clock ruined by the discharge of electricity by nature. There were also many reports of sparks coming out of electrical outlets and some reports of balls of fire going between electrical outlets.

There was about an inch of rain that accompanied the storm.

About three inches of rain has been reported locally during the past week. There was a downpour early last week, followed by Saturday's rain, and early Monday morning there was another rain, accompanied by thunderstorms, but without the severity of lightning that was noted Saturday.

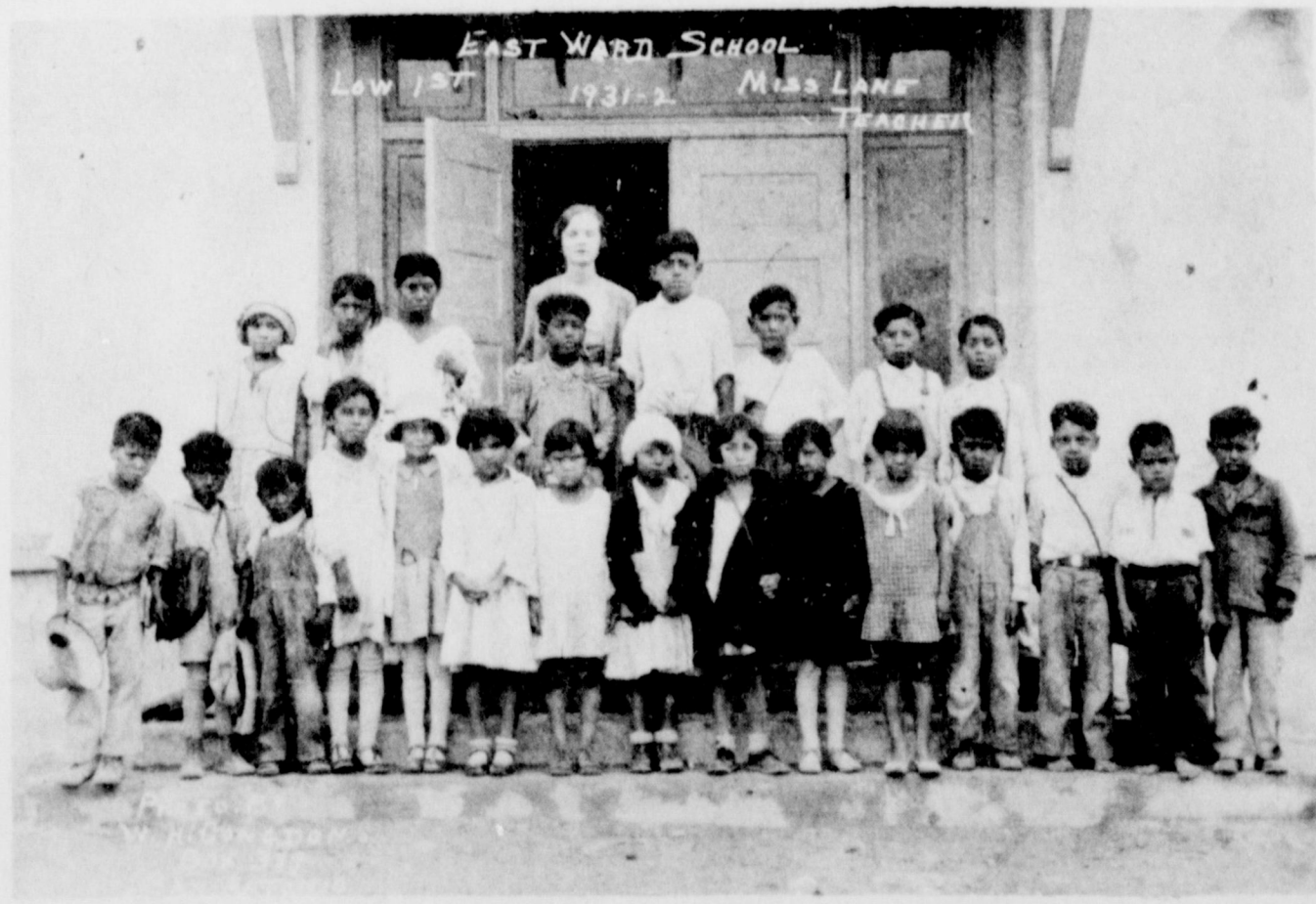

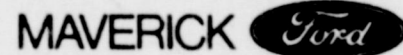

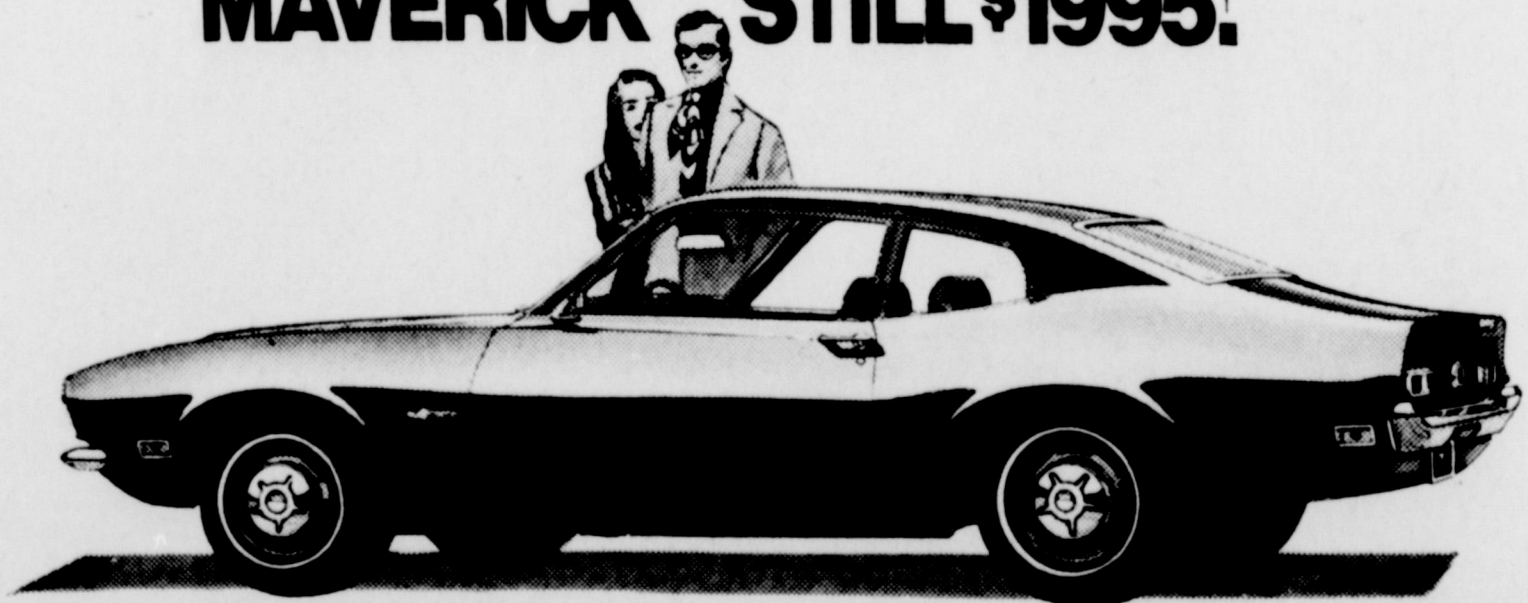

Lake Amistad Gets 4 Million Fish

Lake Amistad, a new reservoir on the Rio Grande near Del Rio, has been stocked with nearly 4 million fish since impoundment four years ago.

George Henderson, a fisheries biologist and project leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, told a group of Department biologists in the annual Wildlife Restoration Function Staff Meeting that the stocking program has put an estimated total of 3,903,700 fish of several species in the 31,000-acre lake.

Henderson said the stocking total included more than 3 million black bass and lesser quantities of other species.

He said recent net surveys in the lake showed the average weight of bass at two pounds. Catfish are averaging 1.3 pounds in size, Henderson said.

GENE THOMPSON CITED

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Gene Thompson, operations specialist for the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1, Sanderson.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

As well as being informed about the limitless abundance and high quality of Texas food and fibers, Texans also receive a brief historical and geographical description of the Lone Star State as they enter the van.

Through color slides, posters and word of mouth the story of Texas agriculture and the bold TAP (Texas Agricultural Products) promotional program is told.

Turkey, beef and natural fibers are subjects of slides which have been produced by the TDA.

In addition, recipes and literature on consumer hints are distributed to the visitors. Adding immeasurably to the

popularity and success enjoyed by the Agri-Tour operation are the knowledgeable TDA specialists, Mr. and Mrs. Jess Moreland and Mr. and Mrs. Buddy Rountree, who accompany the trailers to various stock shows, country fairs and shopping mills, among other stops.

The vans feature a great amount of TAP literature. This ambitious program, initiated by Commissioner White in November, 1968, has as its goal to increase Texans' awareness of the richness of our state in food and fibers. And to emphasize the fact that it benefits all Texans to buy home grown products.

The Agri-Tour, which began in 1967, remained in the vicinity of San Antonio for the duration of HemisFair in 1968. Thus, it was easily accessible to fair visitors. So it has spread the word of Texas agriculture not only state-wide but all throughout the Americas.

Outdoor Season Brings Warning To Avoid Snakes

The best method of dealing with snakebite is to avoid it, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. When spring comes in, snakes come out, and an ounce of prevention may save the outdoorsman from serious trouble.

Campers, hikers, fishermen, birders, outdoor photographers, flower enthusiasts and summer rabbit hunters invade snake territory when they go afield, and a watchful eye and a pair of boots are good protection from snakebite.

Region I Director Henry Burkett said a snakebite kit may be the lowest priced form of protection an outdoorsman

can have, and if a trip afield is at night, a good flashlight may help avoid the hungry rattler out searching for food.

First aid is an important part of helping the victim, but not so much that a physician will have to undo damage before he can begin medical treatment.

While the fatality incidence for snakebite is extremely low, a bite may have serious side effects if not properly treated.

Thorough familiarity with first aid is as important as the snakebite kit itself and may save a victim needless medical treatment.
