## LISTEN TO LUKE

We had many readers voice an agreement with what we said last week about the expenditure of tax money for additional facilities for seating and the press box at the football field while our streets were wasting away, trash hauling and disposal lagging, and drainage becoming a real problem for some people of Sanderson. We don't know how many more agreed, but we know that there has not been one voice of disagreement except the one printed on page two of this issue.

Some of the fault in increased taxes is the result of the legislature's action in the past few years. Some of it is not. The teachers' pay raise largely is the responsibility of the local school, as we understand it, and this accounts for a large part of the increase in local taxes this year. The budget for this year year is said to be the same with the exception of the amount needed for the teachers' pay raise.

It is also stated by Supt. Carroll B. Card that the classrooms in the local system are at the "in-between" stage - they are too large for only one teacher per grade and too small for two teachers. The average daily attendance, the minimum foundation, etc., etc., governing the number of teachers that the state supports, would permit a much lower number of teachers, but the administration and board feels that there is a need for the larger number of teachers so that there would not be 30 or 35 students per class in many instances - thus the local funds also support the salary of many of the teachers 100%.

In news items urging safe driving over the 4th holiday weekend, figures released show that while 40,000 Americans had lost their lives in Vietnam, during the same period 140,000 Americans have lost their lives on streets and highways of this country in traffic accidents.

What can we do to protest the terrific toll of lives and property from "peaceful" activity? The reduction of this loss can be even more in our own hands - and in the hands of law enforcement officers than is the reduction of lives from the Vietnamese war.

What are we going to do about it?

To us it's an interesting sight to see how people re-act nowadays to a local rain. Maybe it's just our mistake, but it seems that there is much more apprehension when there is even a cloud in the sky than there formerly was after a downpour.

Now, no one seems to want to want to let on there is any apprehension, but there is always a lot of interest in how the canyon is running during and after cloudy weather. And our actions are not different from most of the other people's probably.

## Traffic Safety Urged On Weekend

Austin--Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today cautioned motorists that traffic accidents during the Independence Day period from 6 p. m. Thursday, July 2, to midnight Sunday, July 5 may claim as many as 46 lives in Texas.

"I am urging all Texans to adopt the 'Drive Friendly' theme during this holiday and to avoid unsafe practices which contribute to accidents," Speir said.

The DPS director listed the chief factors contributing to traffic crashes as speed too fast for conditions, driving while drinking, and driving on the wrong side of the road, often as the result of fatigue.

In addition to Department of Public Safety efforts, trained truck and bus industry safety men will take to the roads to participate in a unique Holiday Road Patrol.

Some 45 to 50 road patrol cars manned by experienced members of the Texas Council of Safety Supervisors will be on the highways to aid motorists in trouble. The program is sponsored by the Texas Motor Transportation Association, a statewide organization representing the motor carrier industry.

## 'Unit Trains' Run Through Sanderson

Friday of last week marked the inaugural of the operation of "unit trains" by General Motors through Sanderson on transcontinental runs through Sanderson on the Southern Pacific Railroad.

The mass shipment of finished automobiles and assembly components originates in Chicago and are uninterrupted on their run to the West Coast. Several routes were tested prior to the initiation of the regularly-scheduled run. The trains stay together for the entire trip without switching cars in or out enroute. The cars are returned to Chicago empty from plants in Southern California and redistributed to the appropriate GM plants for re-loading, according to information received.

It is stated that the "unit train" concept gets auto parts to California nearly a full working day faster than the previous methods of shipment. Trial runs of the train averaged 48.5 miles per hour including all stops from East St. Louis to Los Angeles.

Mr. Gilbreath,

In regard to your editorial dated June 28, 1970, (which came out on June 25), I would like to express my sense of values.

I feel that the greatest asset that this community has is its young men and women. I feel that their education and athletic endeavors should be far above comparison with drainage ditches, street improvement, and trash disposal.

You mention maintenance of a new field house, (which has been donated by the Eagle Boosters), as an additional burden to the tax increase. This field house will take the place of the old field house behind the band hall, (which probably should be condemned), plus giving us additional facilities for physical education in our present dressing room at the gym. I can see no way that this will increase maintenance of our building facilities as this new field house will be used for both high school and junior high athletics.

In regard to maintenance of the track. Very little, if any, cost is necessary for the upkeep of a caliche track.

As to the building of new bleachers at the football field, my understanding is that this is from appropriated bond money and therefore has no affect on a tax increase. If you compare Sanderson with the other schools in our district - all the schools with the exception of Sanderson have adequate seating and dressing facilities at their football field. All the schools have cinder or asphalt tracks except Sanderson and Van Horn. I personally feel that the quality of our students is equal or superior to that of other schools in our district, so why should anyone object to their having equal facilities.

The people of this community should be commended for maintaining the type school they have on the low tax rate they have.

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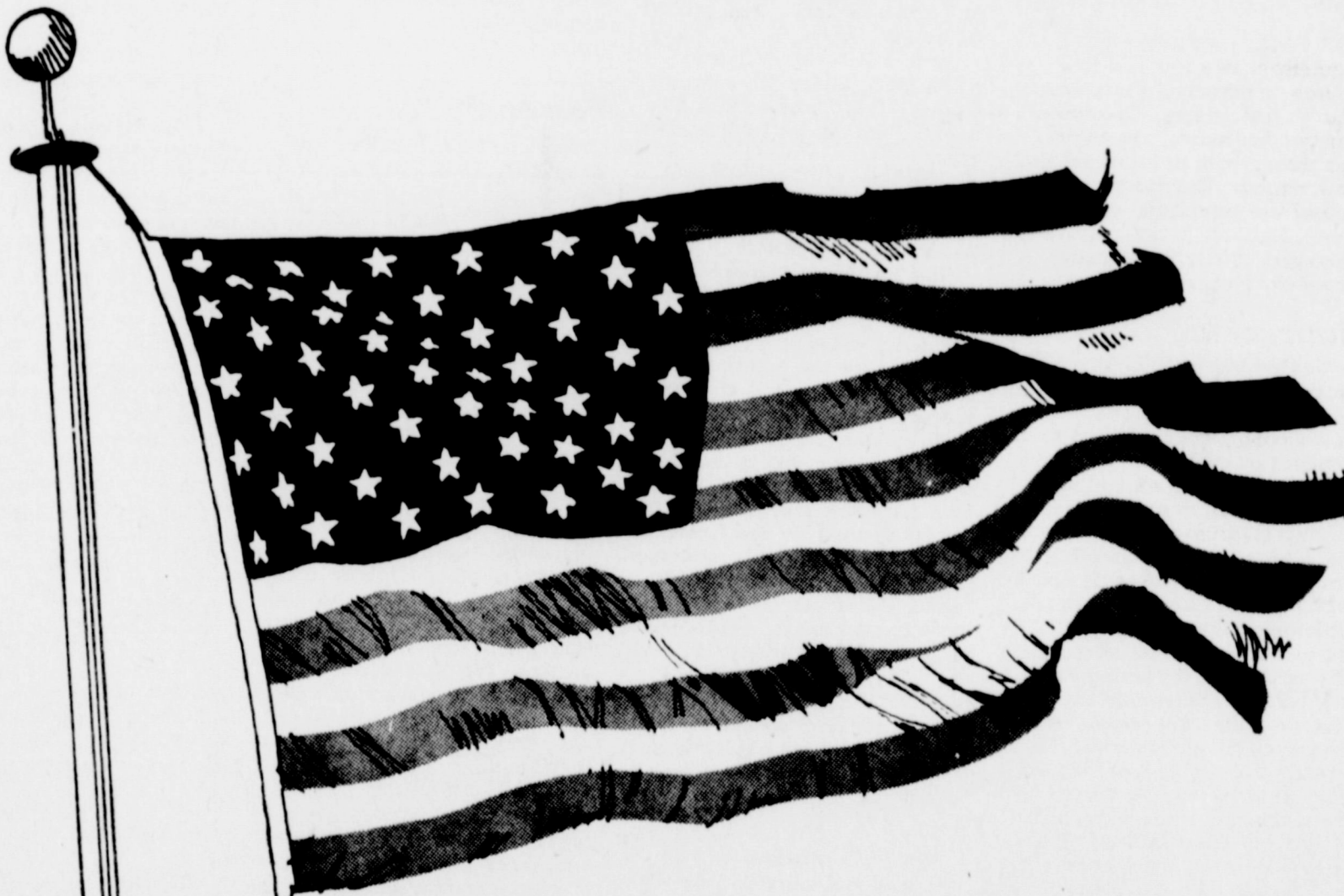
