In news from Austin this week, the Building Commission of our state government approved - among other things - \$1.26 million revamping of the north approaches to the capitol; \$3 million parking facility for 320 cars; \$215,000 renovation of the old Highway building for use by the Parks and Wildlife Department when Highway Dept.'s new building is completed; \$200,000 facelifting of old Parks and Wildlife offices in virtually new John Reagan State Office Bldg. for use by the Welfare Dept. when PGW moves; \$25,000 for repairs to the Governor's mansion. Also look for an increase in the state's cost for schools to be almost \$400-million for the next two years. Plus an increase of \$300-odd million for welfare for the like period.

Sanderson and Terrell County have had their share of hot weather the past several days and there is likelihood that it will continue since this is only July. Some of the thermometers over town have been registering near the 100 mark - and we don't like to say on which side - since we are not going to try to gain fame as the hottest spot in the state on any given day!

There is a lot of work being done locally patching streets, fixing edges, cutting weeds, and collecting trash. The Sanderson Ministerial Alliance met in a regular monthly meeting Saturday of last week in the pastor's study of the Presbyterian Church.

One Killed In Accident Monday

One person was killed in a one-car accident about 8 miles east of Dryden Monday morning early. According to Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, the victim was an 84-year-old woman, grandmother of C. A. Rust III of Blanco who was driving the vehicle.

Rust was brought to Sanderson and later transferred to Fredericksburg with possible head and neck injuries.

Also in the car with Rust were his parents who were not seriously injured.

It was stated that the driver pulled out to pass a vehicle and another vehicle approaching was not seen at the time. Rust pulled off the road to avoid a head-on collision and the vehicle overturned.

The victim's body was taken to Ozona by the Lawrence Janes Funeral Home and later transferred to Blanco.

Texas Highway Patrolman Jack O'Donnell also investigated the accident and Troy Druse assisted with the ambulance duties.

New Chevrolet To Be Introduced

Chevrolet promised American auto buyers that its forthcoming Vega 2300 small car will maintain a continuity of styling for at least four years. "There will be no change for the sake of change," the company's general manager said.

The car will be introduced probably in September. The name denotes the cubic centimeter displacement of the overhead cam engine.

The Vega 2300 will come in four two-door models - a hatchback coupe, sedan, station wagon, and panel truck. One of its features will be a four-cylinder engine with diecast aluminum cylinder block and delivers what Chevrolet calls a maximum combination of low pollutant emission, fuel economy, and performance.

Contract Let For 3-Mile Road Job To Gas Plant Camp

The Border Road Construction Co. of Monahans has been awarded a contract for the grading, base, and surfacing on 3.0 miles of Ranch-to-Market 3166. The bid was \$69,560.21.

The road to be surfaced extends from the Dryden-Sheffield road east to the El Paso Natural Gas Camp.

Jack Valentine Jr. of McCamey is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 60 working days.
