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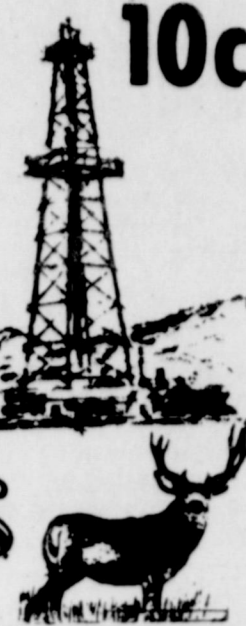
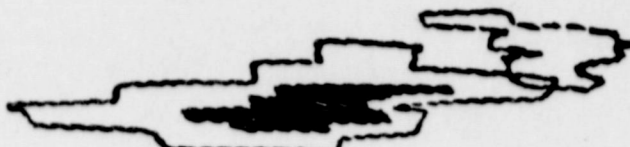

## LISTEN TO LUKE

Albert:---

If there is some kind of appropriate medal, it should be given to the handful of citizens who got out Saturday afternoon to do some weed cutting on Main Street. They worked in an area east of First St. cutting weeds and cleaning debris a few feet back of the curb. Friday was cold and misty, Saturday morning the cold continued and the precipitation a little heavier, ceasing in the afternoon, but the air and ground were very moist and cool temperature and moist discouraged - we hope most - the would-be weed cutters. The moisture that fell may have caused more weeds to grow than would have been chopped off anyway, and now there has to be a renewed effort on the part of everyone to insure that some of the weeds are cut away.

While one might think that the elements are working against cutting of weeds, there is the fact that the elements are working for the enrichment of the pasture lands where the moisture falls, and the rainfall come in such a way that the ground received the maximum benefit from the moisture. With the growth of weeds and accumulation of trash in the ditches the way they are their being stopped up to the degree in places by "shot" flumes in drives, the low-falling and deep-soaking has had no opportunity to use their power in run-off against those obstacles.

While we are totally in favor of any weed-and-trash-cleaning, we are in favor of the rainfall even more. We can't have weeds when the sun shines, we'll plan cleaning up during the rain and be thankful for it!

We notice another deterioration and we are sorry for it! In our area daily newspaper on Monday there was a story about an expression attributed to California's Governor Ronald Reagan which referred to the man's maternal ancestry and it spelled out. Time was given discretion demanded that at least the writer used SOB, or the other words that let the reader feel he knew what was said or alleged. We know well that the words are vulgar in themselves, other of those referred to above, but the vulgarity intended by the person making reference is of the lowest calibre. We know many other newspapers in printing the words and we wonder if this policy will permit their relaxation of propriety so that in the future they can use more easily the words as \*)\$, #&%, and %\$&#.

## Cong. White Gets Flood Control Plan

Congressman Richard C. White, 16th District Representative, was in Sanderson Tuesday morning. About 50 local residents and visitors were on hand for the occasion.

The highlight of the meeting was the plea to the representative for his full cooperation in assisting in the completion of the flood control project that has gotten to the stage where his actions have become very important.

He was presented with a final work plan program schedule by County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, the presentation is pictured above.

Great detail of the work plan for the project was presented to Cong. White by representatives of the Soil Conservation Service and there was an exchange of questions and answers by those most vitally concerned with the planning and completion.

It was pointed out that the greatest deterrent in failure to obtain funding for the project from this stage forward was the failure to produce the easements of the landowners and a lack of interest on the part of the sponsors - the commissioners' courts of Terrell, Pecos, and Brewster Counties, and the Soil and Water Conservation Districts involving the three counties in which the flood control project will be situated.

Congressman White touched on crime and violence as important legislation that was recently passed, and briefed the group on some other legislative issues. There was an expression of vital interest in improved mail service into Sanderson.

Officials here from out of town included: Billy C. Griffin of Pecos, area supervisor of the Soil Conservation Service; Harold Campbell, director of the Soil Conservation Service in Fort Stockton; Vernon E. Danielson, Trans-Pecos SEWCD board; C. C. Mitchell and Shelby Blaydes, commissioner and interim county judge of Pecos County respectfully.

## Sanderson Loses to Van Horn; To Host Iraan Braves Friday Night

The Sanderson Eagles lost their first district game to the Van Horn Eagles there Friday night of last week. The Van Horn team is the defending district championship squad. It is the first loss of the season for Sanderson who will host the Iraan Braves Friday night.

Sanderson was able to make only 5 first downs to 14 for the host Eagles who led in yards rushing by 240 to 87 and had 75 yards passing to 30 for Sanderson. Sanderson had four passes completed of 11 tries and Van Horn had four of eight passes completed. The four miscues of Van Horn passes

were interceptions by Sanderson, who also gained the ball once on a fumble by Van Horn.

Van Horn had two TDS in the first period, the first from the 2-yard line by Steve Heath who also scored the second TD of that period. Wally Abreo made the extra points after the touchdowns.

In the third period Tim Deaty made a 65-yard TD run, and the final score was in the last period by Coll Bramblett on a 10-yard run with Abreo kicking the extra point.

One Van Horn TD was called back for a penalty during the second period.

The Braves won their match against Clint last week 54-0 in a conference game and remain in contention for the district title as does Rankin who won over Socorro 21-0.

The Eagles played the game without their starting center, Brad Harrison, who became ill after the team's arrival in Van Horn and was returned to an Alpine hospital for an appendectomy. He was brought home on Wednesday.

## Rubella Shots Due Thursday

Thursday, October 29, is the day for the free rubella - German measles - clinic in Terrell County.

The free immunization will be after 2:00 p. m. at the elementary school and will be conducted by a team from the State Health Department aided by Dr. A. N. Clanton, Terrell County Health Officer, and his assistants.

All children between ages 1-12 are urged to be brought or be present for the immunization which will be given by an almost-painless air gun rather than by syringe and needle, according to Dr. Clanton. And any child who is not able to be present on that day for any reason is asked to come by the office of Dr. Clanton at their convenience and the immunization will be given free of any charge.

Parents of pre-school children over one year of age who have not been contacted are asked to get in touch with Dr. Clanton's office so that a sufficient quantity of vaccine may be ordered.

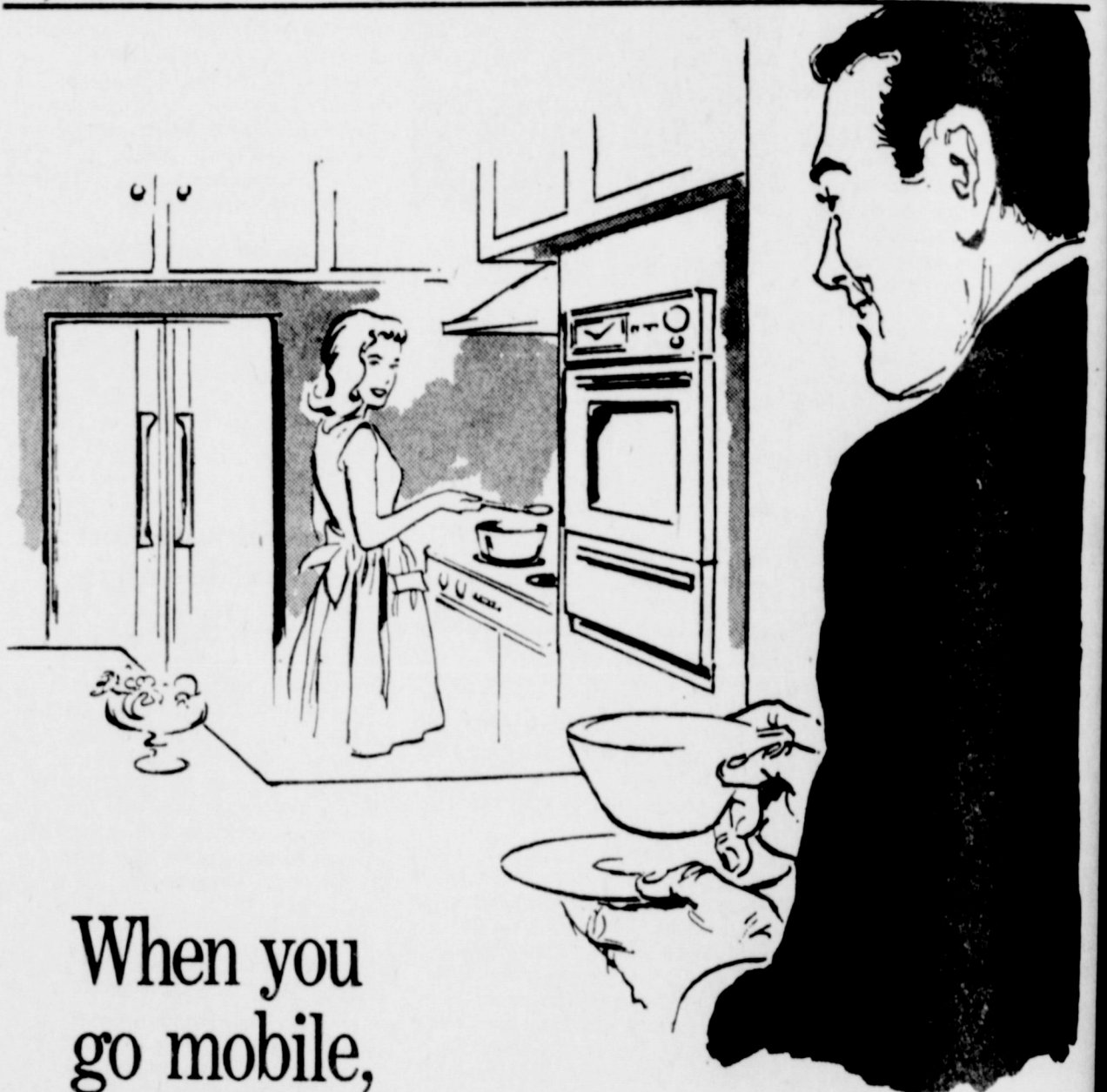
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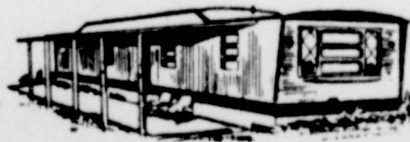
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**BAPTIST W.M.U. HAS ROYAL SERVICE PROGRAM**

**LAND BANK DIRECTORS NAMED AT ANNUAL MEET**

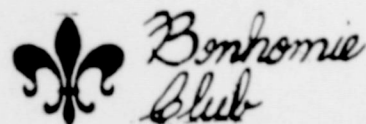
