Some of the things that have been happening recently caused some reflections along this line:  
There are few business men, ranchers, and/or home owners who will disagree that if you keep taking everything out and putting nothing into a business or home that it soon deteriorates so that repairs are very costly or useless. For the business or ranch or home to retain its worth or increase its worth, it is necessary to put something back into it. This is a common practice in the business world!

We think the same thing is true in a town also, and we are speaking of the town as a business community - and for once we are not necessarily talking about street repairs, cleaning up, etc., although those apply, also. We are talking about those who would use the town for all of its benefits and not put anything back into it.

If the only purchases that are made in Sanderson are those that have to be made in Sanderson, then it won't be long before businesses begin to close up or cut down.

So what? you say!  
So, every business that closes down in Sanderson causes a loss to the community in some way, and there is just so much of it that we can stand! One business closes and at least one family leaves. One business cuts down and at least one family is out of work. There is the loss of someone's neighbor and very good friend: there is the loss of one more supporter of our churches and schools, and another customer gone for several businesses. There is one more vacant house to deteriorate. There is one more loss of possibly a tax payer. There is possibly a loss of a student or students to cut down on the financing of teachers by the state, to decrease the number of students in a class, to cause less need of one of the rooms or buildings. This puts an additional burden on the taxpayers who remain here. Possibly there is one less honor student, one less avid extra-curricular worker, one less athlete; or one less Sunday school teacher.

There is one less pocket to dig into for all local drives for funds, there is at least one less face to greet, one less postal patron, one less utility user.

Every family that leaves Sanderson is a loss. Every business that closes is a loss.

Everything that does not help keep a local business in operation hurts the entire economy of the town. There is no business out of Terrell County that cares whether or not we have a school, churches, a county government, or anything else about our community, except they do want the customers from Sanderson to continue trading out of town - and particularly with their out-of-town business.

How much support should individual citizens give to Sanderson?

That is for the individual to answer!

White Asks For Inclusion of SP In Basic System

U. S. Representative Richard C. White has asked that the route from El Paso eastward to New Orleans be included in the recommendations for a basic national railroad passenger system.

White sent the requests to the U. S. Department of Transportation, the Texas Railroad Commission, and the Interstate Commerce Commission, the Sanderson Times was notified last week by White's Washington office.

The preliminary report on the basic national railroad passenger system issued Monday, Nov. 30, by the Department of Transportation listed El Paso as an intermediate point on the basic railroad network between Los Angeles and Chicago. However, the El Paso-Chicago portion of this route was not detailed except that it will be by way of Kansas City.

In his request to the three agencies, Congressman White pointed out that various hearings by the ICC have demonstrated that there is a substantial demand for railroad passenger service in the area east of El Paso - an area inadequately served by other means of transportation.


Monday's report was preliminary, with a 30-day period set aside for comments from state railroad commissions, the ICC, members of Congress and other interested parties.

On January 28, the secretary of Transportation will submit his recommendations for basic national railroad passenger system.
