We had written quite a bit about the allegations against former Texas Governor John Connally when he was confirmed as Secretary of the Treasury on Tuesday. Evidently the Senate was satisfied with his testimony before that group about the receiving of about \$75,000 a year during the time that he was governor of the state.

Probably a retraction is in order even for the thoughts we had after the story of his payments by the Sid Richardson Foundation came out. In light of the recent scandal of other Texans in high office and past officials of the state, another allegation seemed like it, too, should draw some comment.

What follows was a part of our original column, which we will not change, since it still holds true, regardless of any allegations against anyone.

It seems that the price on honesty has gotten a little too low, lately. Or is it the fact that honesty carries with it a label of "getting caught"?

It might be that all of these questions concerning Connally and those surrounding the stock transactions of some of our politicians on the state level will be answered satisfactorily to all concerned. But, again, they may not be answered satisfactorily. It would seem that any action that is now pending on any of the individuals implicated could be forestalled until the smoke was cleared at least.

Any time anyone wants to get in touch with their senator or representative about these matters, certainly should feel free to do so. They, too, are subject to the will of the people, but the will of the people must be known before they can be expected to follow it.

Census Figures For County Final

Congressman Richard C. White, a member of the House Census and Statistics Subcommittee, has received from the Bureau of the Census the final population figures for each county in his district. The final count shows the total population of the 16th Congressional District at 434,298 - an increase of 10% over the 1960 population of 429,050 for the 12 counties.

The final census figures for the 12 counties, as of April 1, 1970, are:

Bids Asked To Clear School Grounds

The Terrell County Independent School District is asking for bids to do certain clearing and dirt work for the school.

The purpose of the work, according to Supt. C. B. Card, is to provide additional play area for the students and to utilize the land that is now not used for anything.

Details of the work are found in the "Notice of Bid" published in other columns of this paper.

Included in the plans for the clearing of the lot south of the high school is the removal of the decorative fence on the west and south sides of the lot. Supt. Card stated that anyone interested in this fence may have it free of any charge by the school, but persons interested should contact him before beginning the work of the removal of the fence.

The cost of the dirt work included in the "Notice of Bids" is pledged by the bond issue of May 1967, which had a specific amount designated, according to information given by the school administration at that time, for landscaping, removal of old buildings, for play grounds, general renovation and improvement.
