ASPC Maps Plans For Wool Promotion

Every route is being explored by the American Sheep Producers Council to help give some relief to the current wool situation that finds itself woven into a general textile recession that reaches into many countries.

In a special session called by President Henry Hibbard of Helena, Mont., the Council's Executive and Wool Advisory Committees along with staff members met to study the present condition of wool and to intensify action in the area of promotion to help relieve the situation.

Robert Thurman of Tipp City, Ohio, chairman of the wool committee, said the world wool situation is in many cases in serious straits, with the United States being particularly hard hit in the textile industry. He cited three reasons for the stagnant condition of the wool market: 1) a general business recession, 2) the uncertainty of the fashion picture the past year and a switch to knits, and 3) the policy of the mills to avoid high inventory of goods at high interest rates.

A slight easing of the situation is expected within the next few months. The most critical area is the high inventory of wool in warehouses in the U. S.

The Council is launching immediately a trade promotion to encourage mills and manufactures to purchase wool from current stocks for the fall of 1972. Designers and clothing manufacturers will be buying shortly for the next year's fall market, working well in advance of actual fashion seasons. In addition, representatives of the executive and wool advisory committees, and a staff member will make calls on all the key mills that use wool.

Mrs. Walter H. (Kathleen) Grigsby is announcing her retirement from the teaching profession at the end of the current school year. She has been teaching for 27 years, 25 of which have been in Terrell County schools.

She began teaching in the Comstock system in 1932 and taught there for two years. She began teaching in Sanderson in 1945, teaching for four months until a teacher could be secured and became a regularly-employed teacher here in 1946. She taught grades 2, 4, 5, and 6 for 17 years and since 1963 she has taught social studies in the junior high school.

Mrs. Grigsby is president of the five-county chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, honorary organization of women teachers. She is past-president of the local TSTA unit; and in 1969 organized and is sponsor of the Junior Historians, an affiliate of the Texas State Historical Association. Among her honors are: Teacher of the Year from Terrell County in 1966-67; Who's Who of American Women, Who's Who of South and Southwest, Dictionary of International Biography, Community Leader of America, Personalities of the South, and 2,000 Women of Achievement.

Mr. Grigsby is a conductor for the Southern Pacific Railroad and the couple has a daughter, Mrs. F. B. Pyle Jr., who lives in Lubbock.

The girls' mile relay team is the third-best in the state-following finals in track and field events in Abilene last weekend. The team consists of Jackie Bob Riggs, Peggy Louwien, Sheryl Stewart, and Alice Goldwire.

Delma Montalvo, an 880-yard dash entry; Alice, who was entered in the 220-yard dash; and Mitzi Cash, discus entry, all failed to qualify in the preliminaries on Friday for the finals on Saturday.

Wayne Mitchell, coach of the girls' track team, stated that the Texas High School Girls' Track Association was organized in 1965 and that next year the events would all come under the sponsorship of the University Interscholastic League. He said that he considered this some sort of a record, since it took the UIL almost 20 years to recognize girls' basketball as a part of their competitive sponsorship. The first girls' state finals were held in Midway, near Waco, and since 1967 they have been at the ACC stadium in Abilene. Next year, as a part of the UIL, they will be in Austin.

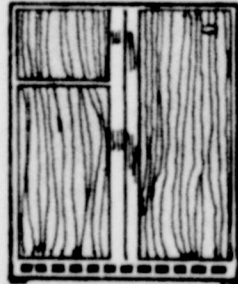
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Mrs. Thomas O. Murillo

We think you ought to know why we call this bi-weekly column, Grassroots.

Grassroots, because that's where we have always been strongest as problem-solvers. In the neighborhoods, in the towns, in the cities, Americans have always been able to meet a problem head-on. So it must be with drug abuse. So this column will include information about marijuana and all other drugs, in the form of basic data, designed for use where you are. As you use this information, remember that at the grassroots is where change in the pattern of drug use will happen.

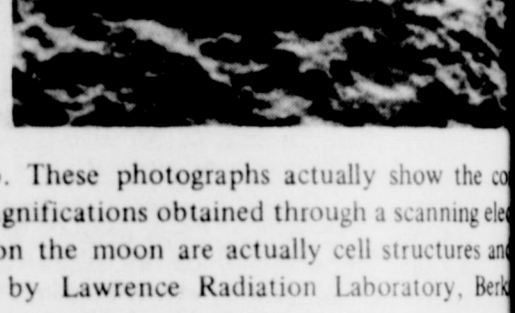
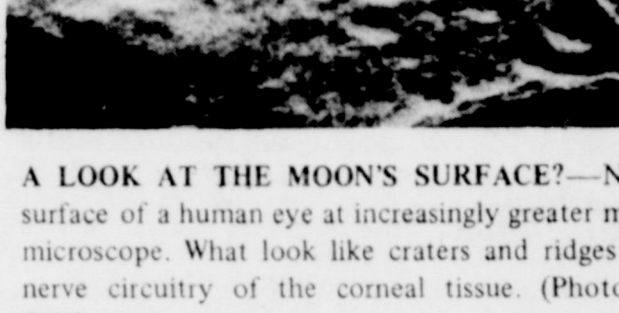
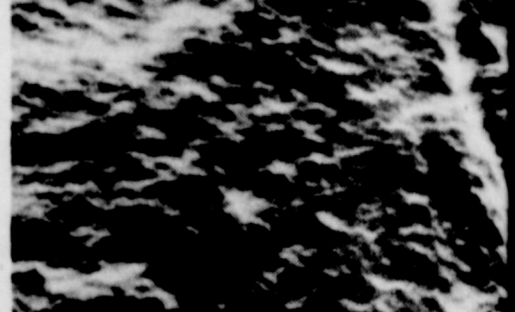
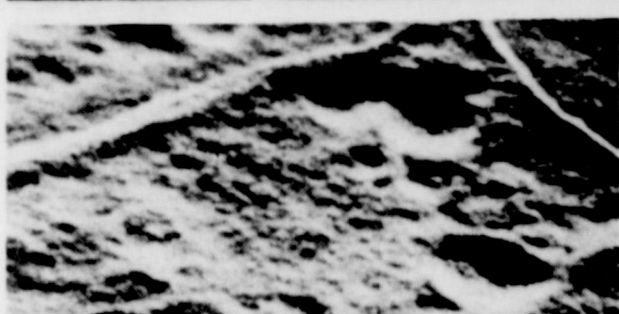
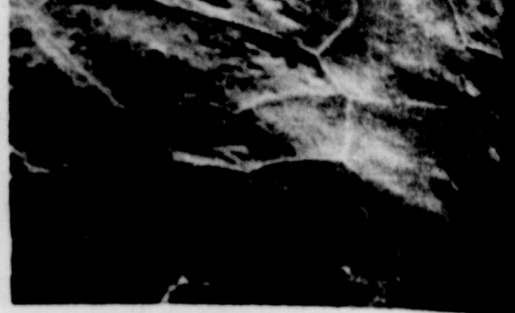
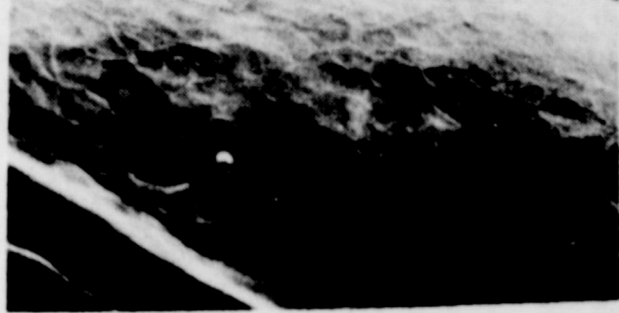
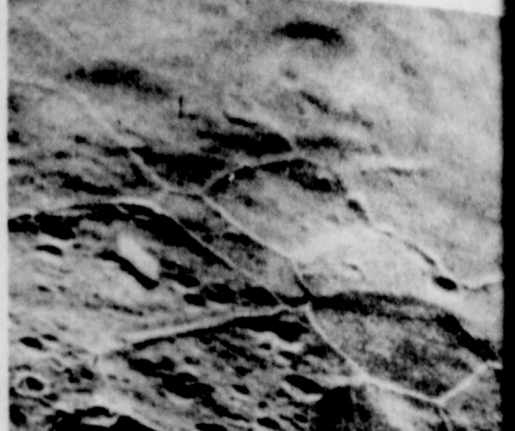
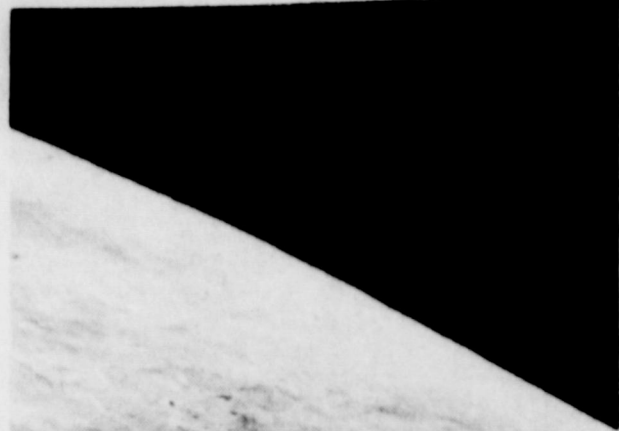
ADALBERTO COBOS IN PLANE CRASH

A New 'Look' into an Eye

Strange as it may sound, man could "see" a close-up of the moon's surface, but was unable to "see" the surface of the human eye. Now, however, new light on the human eye, specifically the cells forming the outer surface of the cornea, is coming from an instrument of the atomic age—the scanning electron microscope.

Before the development of the scanning electron microscope (which, unlike a conventional microscope, is able to scan an entire object; magnify its image 30,000 times, and record what it scans), details of the structure of the cornea were worked out in a painstaking process. The early process involved examining tiny sections of the eye's

surface and then putting the pieces together in a jigsaw-puzzle fashion.

Now, through the first photographs of the whole cornea, recorded with a scanning electron microscope, researchers at the Atomic Energy Commission's Lawrence Radiation Laboratory, Berkeley, California, are able to "see" the big picture of the eye's surface.

In the unique photographs, which look remarkably like photos of a lunar approach, the outermost cells of the cornea appear the craters and ridges of a moon scene.

In time, the new view of the circuitry of the eye's biology may assist researchers in diagnosing diseases of the eye.

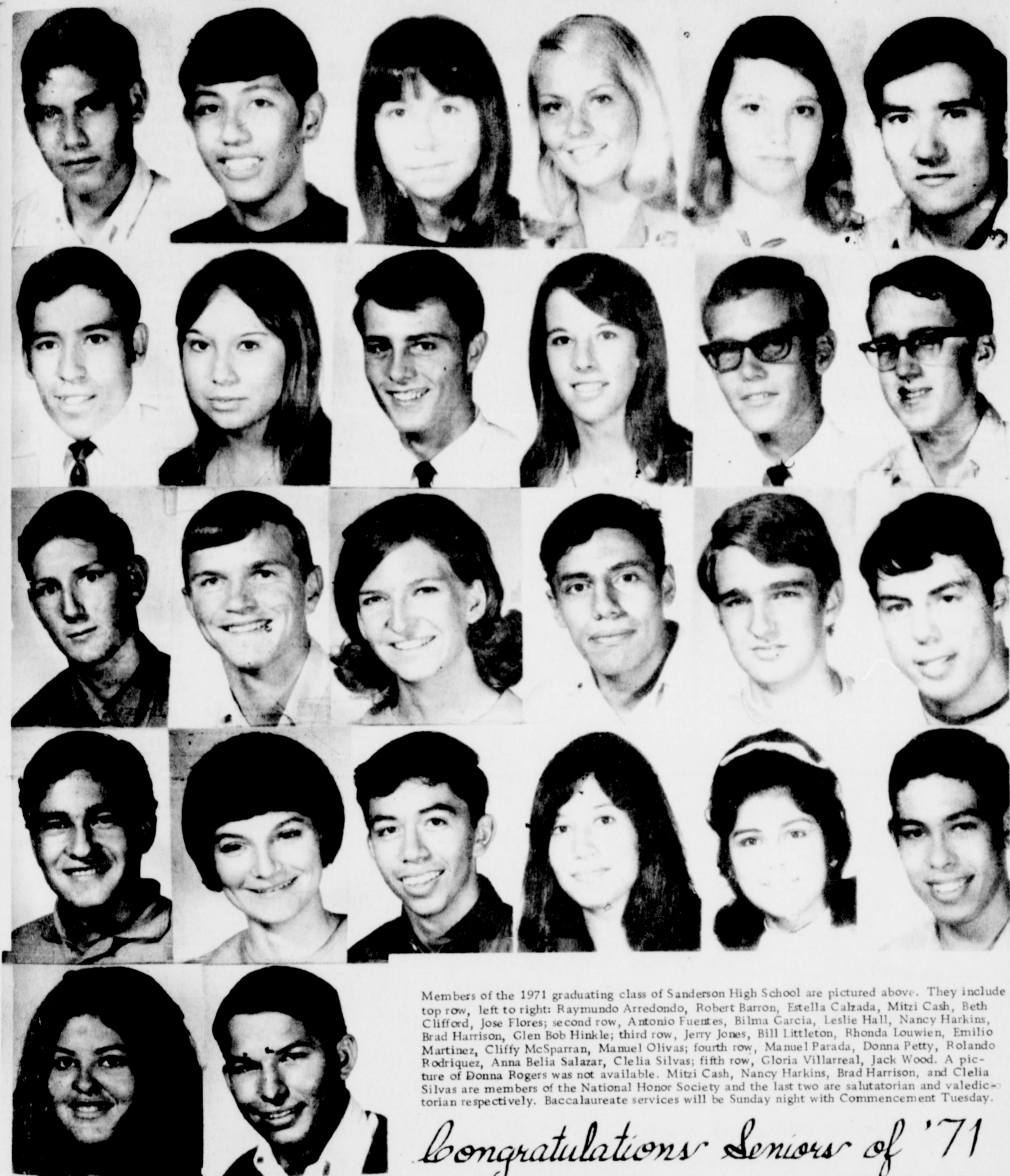

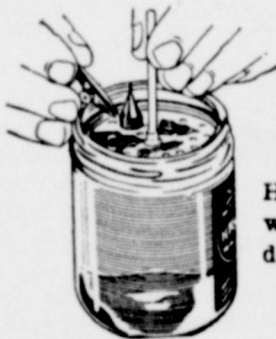
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
