Sanderson is without a doctor again. If anyone knows of some way that the situation might be relieved, their knowledge would be welcomed.

We had occasion to talk to a "big city" doctor last weekend and he suggested a helicopter to take patients to the doctor or vice-versa.

For emergencies, we can see some advantages of this type of transportation. But helicopters are not flown by just anybody, and a stand-by helicopter pilot, plus a reserve "just in case" is about as difficult to visualize as a doctor, or maybe more so!

There is just no easy answer to our problem, so any suggestions will be welcomed and investigated.

The rains have continued in this area and their benefits are beginning to show in the greenness of things around town and the height of the wet grass and weeds in our yard. The rains have many benefits, but the mosquito problem is expected to increase soon, and there are some wary eyes watching for the outbreak of screwworms.

And always wary eyes are watching for a rise in Sanderson Canyon.

We went through the greatest deluge of rainfall we have ever seen last Friday in the region of the Steve Stumberg ranch, and had we been able to see where we were going, probably we would not have gone. We called back home to warn of the probable rise, but word had already been relayed in and the alert was on. We are grateful that the water was contained by the creek bed.

Our thanks to those who agreed with us on the beer can scattering and took the trouble to say so.

When we came to town Friday morning at about 7:00, we were greeted by the gruesome sight of several dead jackrabbits strewn on Oak St. from First St. west toward Persimmon. We thought there were 11, but another person counted 14. If some person who knows for sure would give us the correct number, we would be glad to publish it. We like to be accurate when we can.

We couldn't figure out what prompted the rabbits to parade down Oak St. and why they didn't watch for traffic better.

Texas Highway Department crews came down to clean up the mess early.

Then when we came home Sunday afternoon late we saw several jackrabbit carcasses on the bridge over Three-Mile just west of town. We surmised that the rabbits get up on the bridge to escape the water and were killed by passing vehicles. We were not able to get an accurate count, as there was one pile of several carcasses, but probably close to 10 dead animals on the bridge.

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The picture above was taken of Sanderson Canyon at the 5th Street Bridge early Monday morning and shows results of the flow earlier when the bank was cut at about the level of the street crossing when the creek flowed Saturday night. The flow had ceased by noon on Monday.

More Rain Falls During Past Days

One-half inch of rain fell here Sunday morning, following rains almost every day last week, and Sanderson Canyon ran bank-full last Friday night and again Monday morning.

A deluge of rain fell west and north of Sanderson Friday afternoon causing the canyon to run Friday night. There were two crests to the runoff that night, according to reports, the first at about 6:00 p. m. and another about midnight, but the water was all contained within the canyon.

Heavy rains fell to the west and north of Sanderson again Sunday afternoon and night, causing the Canyon to run again starting at about 7:00 a. m. Monday, but without the volume of the run-off Friday night.

Heavy clouds prevailed again on Monday with rain expected to continue this week.

The rainfall of last weekend was considered to be more widespread than of previous days earlier last week.

Fast Turbo Train To Go Through Saturday P.M.

Amtrak's high-speed Turbo-Train will be in Sanderson Saturday, August 21, according to information received last weekend.

The train will come here from Del Rio and will arrive at 2:05 p. m. and depart at 2:20 p. m. Other stops will be made at Alpine and El Paso in the westward journey of the train.

The month-long Turbo-Train tour, covering 12,000 miles and 31 states, is intended in part to survey public opinion on improved passenger trains. The public will be invited to inspect the train and ride between route points, according to the information received.

John A. Volpe, Transportation Secretary, said the tour will provide the Transportation Department with a unique test of the durability and ride qualities of the equipment. The trip started in Providence, Rhode Island, and is making a clock-wise swing around the nation.

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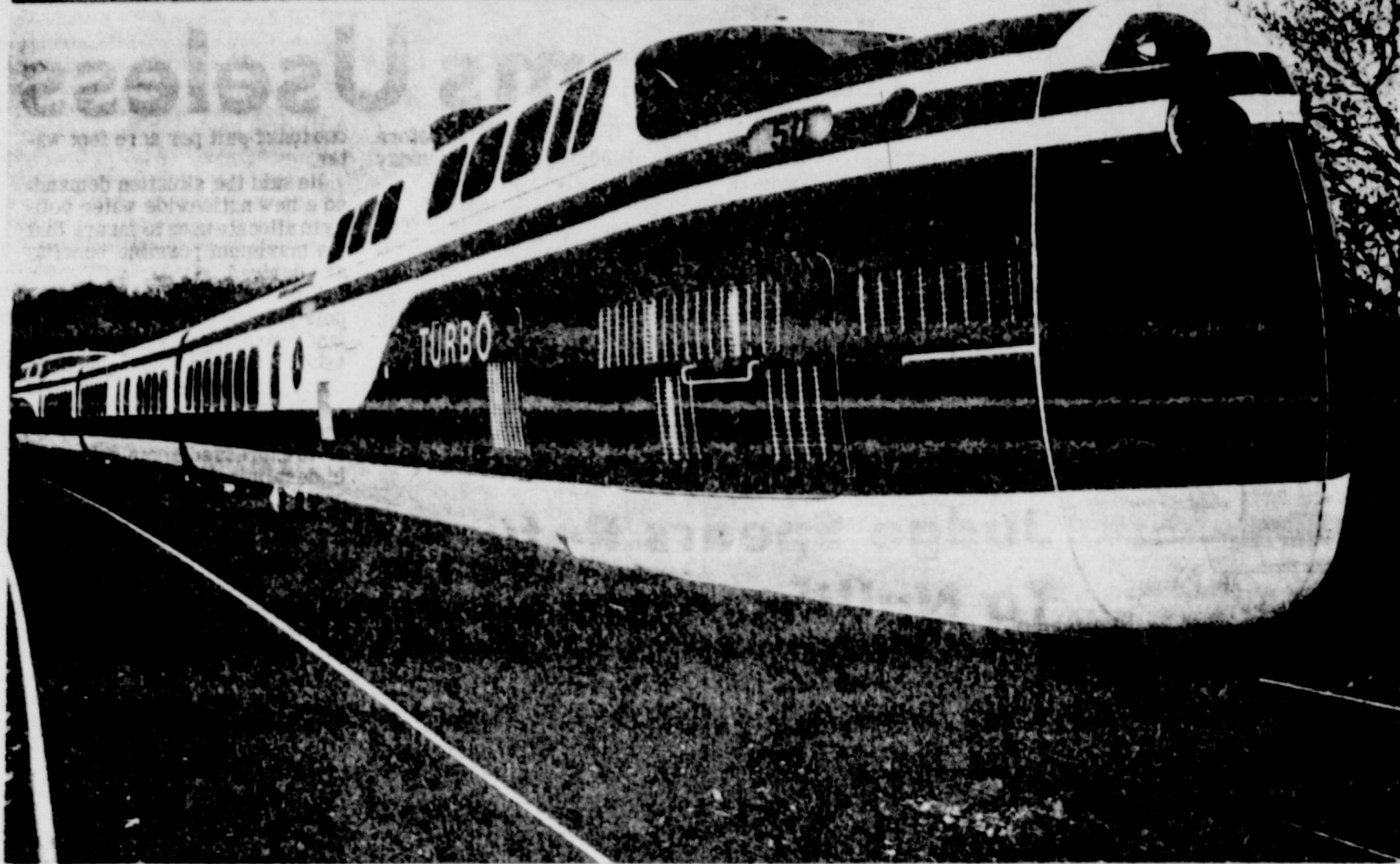
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DUE HERE SATURDAY—The United Aircraft TurboTrain, which has been in service on the Amtrak route between New York and Boston as part of the U.S. Department of Transportation's Northeast Corridor high speed ground transportation demonstration project, will visit Saturday while on a nationwide tour. Train is powered by gas turbine

engines and has a pendulous banking suspension system which enables it to round curves with passenger comfort and safety at speeds 30 to 40 per cent faster than regular trains. The train has been operated at a speed of 170 miles an hour, hits more than 100 miles an hour in operational service on some stretches of the Penn Central's track.

The National Railroad Passenger Corp. (Amtrak) is sending the revolutionary train on a nationwide tour to give the public a chance to view it.

The TurboTrain is a modern, streamlined, high-speed Intercity passenger train designed by aerospace engineers and based on the principles of flight.

Powered by aircraft-type gas turbine engines, it was designed to provide comfortable, high performance service on existing railroad trackage.

It was designed and developed by the Sikorsky Aircraft division of United Aircraft Corp.

The train's month-long public demonstration run began in Providence, R.I., last Wednesday.

En route it will stop at such major cities as New York, Washington, Miami, Atlanta, New Orleans, Houston, San Antonio, El Paso, Los Angeles, Oakland, Portland, Seattle, Milwaukee, Chicago, St. Louis, Detroit, Cincinnati and Cleveland. A number of smaller cities also are included in the itinerary.

The train is scheduled to begin the Southern Pacific segment of its long journey Friday at 9 a.m. in New Orleans, tying up for the night that evening in San Antonio.

It will leave San Antonio at 9 a.m. Saturday and arrive in Del Rio at 11:15 a.m., remaining until 11:30.

It will reach Sanderson at 2:05 p.m. and remain there until 4:35 p.m., stopping at Alpine before tying up overnight in El Paso.

It will run from El Paso to Yuma, Ariz., Sunday, Aug. 22, and arrive in Los Angeles at 2 p.m. Monday.

The second TurboTrain, also leased by the Department from United Aircraft, will remain in regular service between Boston and New York.

The special tour — covering some 12,000 of Amtrak's 20,600 mile network — is jointly sponsored by the Department of Transportation, Amtrak, and the train's manufacturer, United Aircraft Corporation.

"This trip by the TurboTrain will provide us with a unique test of the durability and ride qualities of the equipment under short, intermediate and long distance running conditions," Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe said. "It also gives us the opportunity to evaluate the ride qualities of the TurboTrain under almost all

track and roadbed conditions as they exist today on the Nation's Amtrak passenger network."

Amtrak President, Roger Lewis, said, "The trip will enable the Corporation to survey public reaction to improved passenger equipment and introduce a modern train to a great many Americans who have never ridden one."

Lewis said the general public will be invited to inspect the train at terminals and stations along the route and, wherever possible, will be invited to ride the TurboTrain between route points. In addition, the TurboTrain will augment regular Amtrak revenue trains on at least six runs — New York-Washington, Los Angeles-San Diego, Portland-Seattle, Chicago-St. Louis, Cincinnati-Chicago, and Buffalo-New York.

Visitors to the train will be asked by questionnaires for their opinion on advance reservations, food service, baggage service and fares.

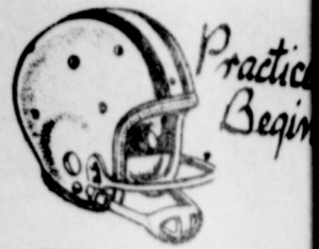
The 31-state tour is the first major joint effort by the newly-created National Railroad Passenger Corporation (AMTRAK) and the Department of Transportation following Acts of Congress

designed to revitalize intercity rail passenger service.

Under the High Speed Ground Transportation Act of 1965, the Department has been conducting demonstration projects in the Northeast Corridor of newly developed train systems. The electrically-powered Metroliners have been operating for two years between New York and Washington, D.C., while the TurboTrains have been operating between Boston and New York City.

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Girl Scouts Plan Wider Involvement

Five area women, Miss Diana Curry, field advisor of Girl Scouts of USA serving the Permian Basin, Mrs. Maria Jimenez, recent graduate of Ector High School, both of Odessa, and Mrs. Ricardo Soldana, Junior Troop Leader, Miss Freda Walker, as assistant Troop Leader, and Miss Gloria Guerrero, a Mexican-American community leader, all of Midland, will attend a "conference of girl scouting - Mexican-American style" at Prescott College, Prescott, Arizona August 24-27. Purpose of the conference is to explore the cultural and sociological background of the family of Mexican and Spanish heritage as it relates to the council's responsibility to offer a relevant Girl Scout program.

The Permian Basin Council consists of 16 West Texas counties with a thirty percent Spanish American population. Two hundred fifty delegates from 42 councils representing eight Southwestern states will convene on the campus of Prescott College to learn and share their knowledge of the Mexican-American or Spanish family, how it relates to today's society, and what Girl Scouting has to offer that will contribute to the individual's and community's betterment in each council. Keynote speaker is Dr. Ralph Guzman, associate professor in Politics and Community Studies at Merrill College, University of California.

Other resourceful people include those who understand the problems of the barrios, migrants, urban settings, students, rural bilingual-educational aspects and the biocultural family problems of Mexican Americans. Scouts from Cuas de Mexico will participate, along with representatives of community organizations and administrators of Spanish related government agencies.

The five women will be available upon their return to speak to interested clubs and organizations about the results of the conferences. Information can be obtained through the Permian Basin Girl Scout Council offices in Odessa.

New Traffic Laws Effective Aug. 27

Effective August 27, 1971, under the New Uniform Vehicle Code, no person shall drive a vehicle when it is so loaded, or when there are more than three persons in the front seat, so as to obstruct the view of the driver to the front or sides of the vehicle or as to interfere with the driver's control over the driving mechanism of the vehicle. No passenger in a vehicle shall ride in such position as to interfere with the driver's view ahead or to the sides, or to interfere with his control over the driving mechanism of the vehicle.

A notice of the new law and effective date was received by The Times last week. Another new traffic law which has the same enactment date provides: under the new Uniform Vehicle Code, no person shall open the door of a motor vehicle on the traffic side or on the side available to moving traffic until it is safe to do so, and can be done without interfering with the movement of other traffic, nor shall any person leave a door open on the side of a vehicle available to moving traffic for a period of time longer than is necessary to load or unload passengers.

These two new traffic laws, along with some other ones, were passed by the recent legislature and The Times is making an effort to advise the readers of the new laws.

Jury Wheel Now Selects Venire

Jurors in Terrell County are now being chosen by the use of a jury wheel which is in the office of County Clerk Ruel Adams. The wheel is used for the selection of petit jurors only and not for the selection of grand jurors.

The wheel provides for selection of juries entirely by lot and without recognition of professional exemptions which have prevailed in the past.

Between the first and fifteenth of August of each year a jury wheel must be constituted containing the names of all the persons in the county who have registered to vote. The juries will then be selected by drawing the names from this jury wheel.

The jury commission, an appointment of the District Judge, is used to select the grand jury members.

Previously the jury commission selected the names of prospective jurors for petit jury duty with certain professional exemptions barring the selection from the entire list of eligible jurors. At one

time only those who had paid poll taxes were used as the basis for the selection of jurors. With the abolishment of the poll tax voter registration was the basic group from which jurors were chosen, but a qualified resident could also be selected for jury duty even if his name was not listed on the roll of registered voters.

The new law also provides that all persons over 65 years of age and females who have legal custody of a child or children under the age of 10 are eligible for jury duty.
