We were watching a movie on the BT during the weekend and the nostalgia came to us of another of the facts of a past life.

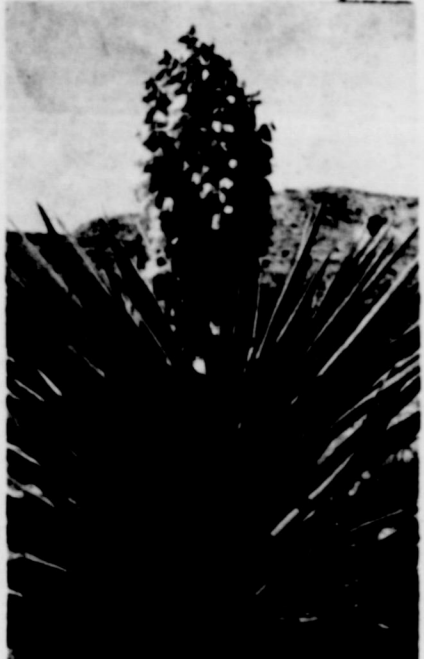
What would be wrong with someone making a movie of some of the kind like we used to see about great trotting horses, or race horses, or of other well-known sports figures?

## Sanderson Loses To Van Horn; To Go To Iraan Friday Night

The Sanderson Eagles lost the first district game of their season last Friday night to their cousins, the Eagles from Van Horn, by a score of 33-24.

The visitors hit pay dirt first early in the first frame when the quarterback, Donny Conoly, threw a pass to Gary Stuart, end, which was good for 31 yards and the score. Raul Santiago converted the extra point on a place-kick.

In the second period, Van Horn scored the second time, this time by Steve Heath, on a plunge for 2 yards and the score. Santiago again kicked the extra point.

Sanderson came right back and got on the score board for the first time when Quarterback James Druse threw a pass to Halfback Juan Saenz completing a 66-yard play good for 6 points. Druse threw to Bill Mott for the 2 extra.

Van Horn scored the third time late in the second period when Coll Bramblett, halfback, took a pitch-out and went over from the 5-yard stripe. The try for the extra point failed and the half-time score was 20-8.

Van Horn began the scoring again in the second half with a 5-yard plunge over the middle by Heath and the PAT effort failed.

Sanderson also put another 8 points on the score board in the third frame when Druse threw a pass to Kendrick Harrell, halfback, which was good for 15 yards and the score. Saenz ran the 2-extra points over.

In the final period Druse followed Center Ronnie Stewart over the goal line from 1 yard out and then threw a pass to Steve Litton, end for the 2 points extra to give Sanderson a boost to 24 points, while Van Horn had only 26.

Sanderson's fire was extinguished when a pass was intercepted deep in Sanderson territory by Van Horn who was

able to push across the goal line. Conoly got the honors from the 1-yard mark and Santiago kicked the extra point to give the visitors the edge in the 33-24 score.

Both teams seemed to be able to move the ball fairly well, Van Horn on the ground and Sanderson relying on a combination of ground and pass attack.

Some of the Sanderson players - Randy Louwien had not suited all week because of an illness, Blain Chriesman had been suffering from a throat infection, as had Roger Sanchez, and Ike Billings had been suffering from an upset stomach - and were not capable of their best game Friday night, according to Coach Willie Myers.

The Eagles will go to Iraan Friday night for another conference which will begin at 7:30 p. m. and Sanderson is not expected to have an easy time in the game with the Braves.

**ASC Nominations Open To Ranchers**

Terrell County ranchmen can now nominate a fellow ranchman for the balloting to close December 1, when one ASCS Commitman and two alternates will be elected. Nominations by petition will close on October 27.

Each petition must be limited to one name and must be signed by at least three eligible voters. The petition must include the certification that the person nominated is willing to serve if elected. For convenience, suitable blanks have been mailed to all known eligible voters and blanks are available in the county office. Any plain paper will do, however, it was stated.

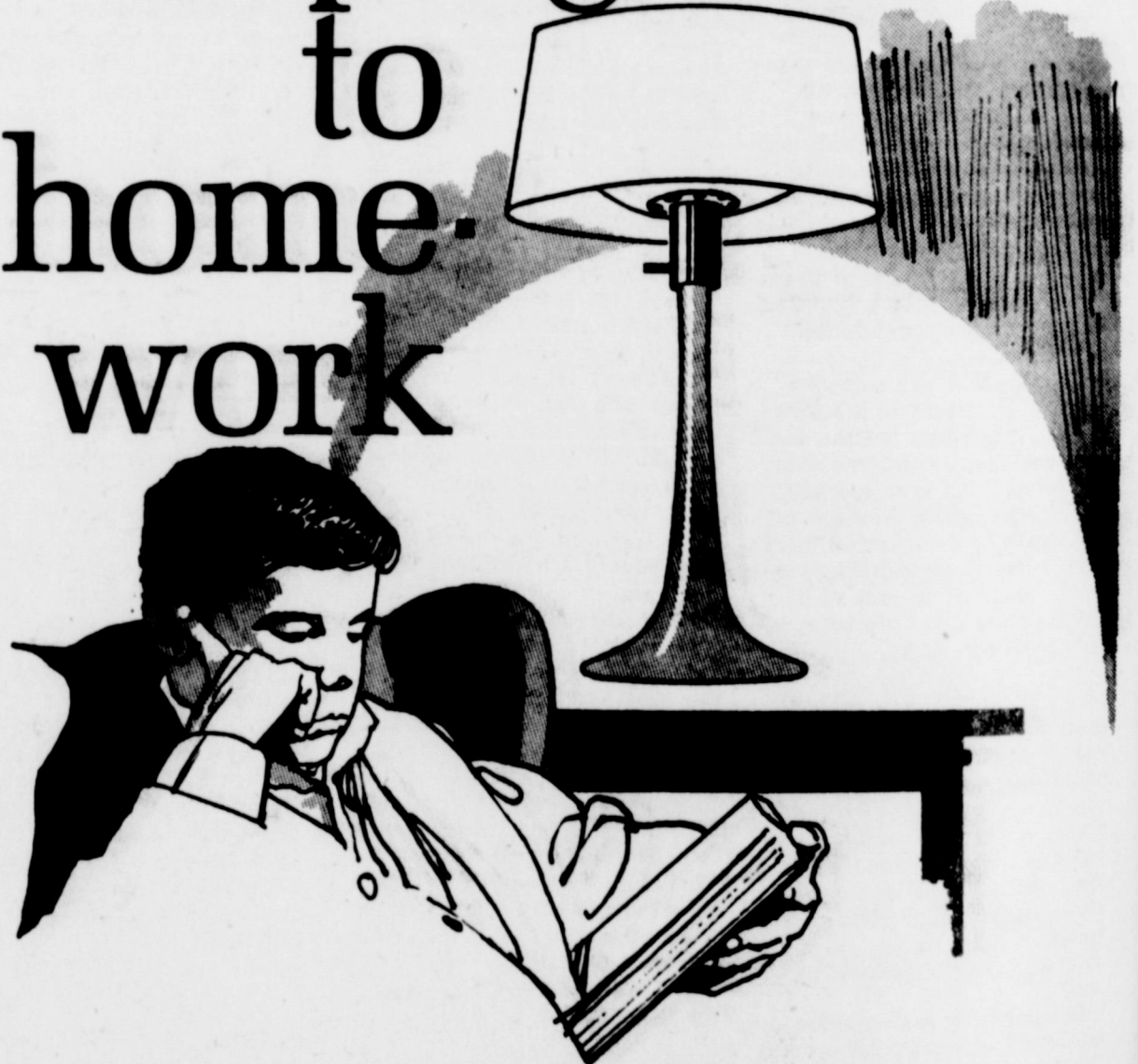

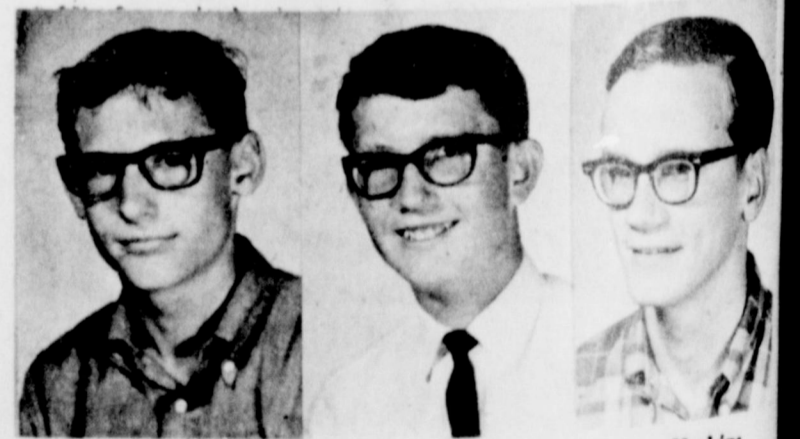

### Cong. White Asks For Applicants To Military Schools

Congressman Richard C. White has announced a deadline of October 31st for the receipt of applications from the 16th Congressional District for appointments to the Military, Naval, Air Force, and Merchant Marine Academies.

Each Congressman is entitled to five appointees in school at one time at each of the academies. Appointments are also available from senators, the president, vice-president, and superintendents of the schools, and for the sons of deceased or disabled veterans, or Medal of Honor winners.

"Enrollment at a service academy can mean an excellent education, with nearly all expenses paid, and with the assurance of a career of military leadership. The student will also gain a well-rounded education for a civilian career," White stated.

To be nominated, a candidate must be:

- A citizen of the U.S.
- At least 17 and not over 22 on the date of the appointment.
- A resident of the appointing Congressman's District.
- A high school graduate at the time of admission.
- Of good moral character.
- Unmarried.
- Scholastically and physically qualified.

### Draft Call Set For Rest of 1971

A draft call of 588 men for the remainder of 1971 was announced this week for the State of Texas by Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the state director.

Glantz said none will be ordered for induction in October, 363 in November, and 195 in December, all from the extended or first priority groups.

Glantz said he had been advised by the Director, Dr. Curtis Tarr, that the RSN cut-off for 1971 would be number 125 for men in the first priority group. Tarr advised that all men in a class available for service who have been found qualified mentally, physically, and morally with 1971 RSNs of 125 or below can expect to receive an induction order. If men in the first priority group with RSNs up to 125 are not ordered for induction in 1971, they will be placed in the extended priority group and will be inducted in the first three months of 1972 ahead of men in the 1972 year group (born 1952).

Orders for induction for this call are being mailed by local boards throughout the state, with 30 days notice being required in all cases. Orders for pre-induction physical examinations are also being mailed to registrants in the extended priority group, to men in the first priority group with RSNs through 125 of the 1971 year group, and to men in the 1972 year group with 1972 RSNs through 050. Approximately 6,400 men will be ordered for pre-induction physical examinations in October and November.

### Medicare Costs Upped for 1972

Beginning in January, an older person who goes to the hospital under Medicare will be responsible for the first \$68 of his hospital bill - now running about \$800 for the average stay by a Medicare beneficiary.

The present hospital deductible is \$60 and will remain in effect for all Medicare hospital admissions during the remainder of this year.

In announcing the 1972 deductible, Secretary of Health Education, and Welfare, Elliott L. Richardson, explained that since hospital costs in calendar year 1970 rose substantially, he is compelled under the law to set a new deductible to become effective next January. The law provides a specific formula for computing the amount of any adjustment in the deductible, he said, and also requires that notice of the upcoming deductible amount be promulgated on or before October 1.

Under the formula in the law, the new hospital deductible is based on the ratio between hospital costs in the previous year (1970) and costs in 1966, the first year of Medicare operation. That ratio is then multiplied by \$40 and the result rounded to the nearest \$4. The result is an increase from \$60 to \$68.

Secretary Richardson said that when the hospital deductible amount changes next year, the law requires that comparable changes be made in the dollar amounts a Medicare beneficiary pays toward a hospital stay of more than 60 days, or a post-hospital extended care stay of more than 20 days.

When a Medicare beneficiary has a hospital stay of more than 60 days, he will pay \$17 a day for the 61st through the 90th day, up from the present \$15 per day. If he has a post-hospital stay of over 20 days in

### Work Started On Telephone Project

Initial construction work has begun at the first of six sites for a new Southwestern Bell microwave system between Alpine and Midland.

General contractor is a Denton firm and construction of the six small buildings associated with the towers is scheduled to be completed by mid-December. The towers will be erected and equipment installed after buildings are completed.

To be operative in mid-1972, the microwave system will provide additional long distance facilities for the Sanderson-Alpine-Marfa-Fort Stockton areas.

Total cost of the project, including land, equipment, buildings, and other expenses, will be about \$2.4 million.

The tower at Fort Stockton will be 100 feet high, one at Imperial will be 125 feet high, and those northeast of Alpine and one southwest of Midland will be 275 feet high.

### MORE REGULATIONS

The Office of Emergency Preparedness announced this week that merchants must have a list of ceiling prices available for public inspection on or before November 1, 1971. The list, from which the seller is required to provide information, must be available at the place of sale.

George Lincoln, Director of the Office of Emergency Preparedness, ruled that the ceiling price list may be a single master list for the entire establishment, or alternatively, separate lists of ceiling prices for each section or department of the establishment. Until the ceiling price information is available, sellers must provide this information in accord with new procedures outlined by the Office of Emergency Preparedness.

The new procedure, to be promulgated in the Federal

### Register, requires that:

(A) There shall be posted on each floor of the seller's establishment at least one sign, (minimum of 30 inches by 40 inches) as specified below, announcing availability of ceiling price information:  
**CEILING PRICE INFORMATION**

Information regarding the lawful ceiling price for any item sold by this store may be obtained by filling in a ceiling price information request form available at (specify location) and by handing it to (fill in). You will receive a speedy answer by mail.

(B) There shall be made available in at least one location on each selling floor, "Ceiling Price Information Request Forms," as specified by the OEO, giving the name of the person requesting the information on a specific item, and the name and location of the store being questioned.

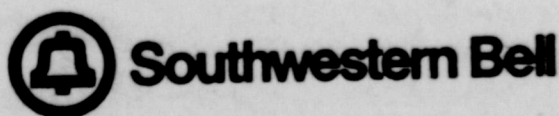
