Last weekend we received the release of the story about the TS&GRA District 1 directors and members sponsoring the predator-control meeting here Saturday this week. We think the program and having the meeting here both are excellent ideas and we voice our appreciation to those who are responsible for each.

Everything that happens to bring visitors here is a help to the community and is another means of our expressing our friendliness.

The same thanks is due to those who sponsored the roping here last Saturday that was responsible for bringing many visitors here also.

But back to our original idea: We thought that there had been enough furor against the killing of eagles to cause all of the ranchers over the nation to do some thinking - but we found that such is not the case.

We took a little jaunt Saturday on business and on the highway north of Fort Stockton we saw several fresh coyote carcasses hanging on the fence on the right-of-way for all passers-by to see: both the haters of coyotes and those who would go on record and take a national stump for their protection.

Certainly, we can understand the pride involved in a ranchman who kills a coyote and/or a cougar, bobcat, lynxcat, etc. And we have held in the past, and still hold that the rancher is justified in taking this means of protecting his livestock.

And as a newspaper man, we were proud to print the pictures that we printed in the past showing the various kills of predators. It makes for interest in a ranching country to publish such pictures.

But some of the pictures were sought by this newspaper, and some of the ranchers who had predators came to us to offer the chance for a picture. We probably are cutting off all future chances for pictures of predators, but it would be to the best interest of the ranchmen if such pictures were not published in the future.

And, as we stated at least once before, it would be better if the ranchmen did not advertise their kills by hanging them on a fence on a highway right-of-way, in our opinion.

Maybe it just depends on how you look at it!

But those who are looking for some kind of an animal to protect could find food for public sympathy in seeing the carcass of a coyote hanging headdown on a fence.

We heard the other day that it had been determined that predators had preference over sheep in protective legislation because the predators were here first!

Funny, ism't it? The Indians were not given the same consideration!

Mrs. Martinez is also survived by 15 grandchildren, 33 great-grandchildren, and a sister, Mrs. Jovita Villarreal, of Musquiz, Coahuila, Mexico, who is here with the family.

Predator Control Is Being Studied

Because of the increase in sheep and goat losses due to predators, new methods of control must be found if the sheep and goat industry is to survive. Herbert Brown, chairman of Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association District 1, announces a special area-wide meeting of sheep and goat producers in West Texas to discuss this problem.

The meeting will be Saturday, February 5, at the St. James Parish Hall in Sanderson. The program will begin at 11:00, followed by a lunch hosted by area TS&GRA members and directors. Special guest speakers will be Bill Sims, TS&GRA executive secretary, and Sutton Allison of Fort Stockton, TS&GRA president. They will discuss the forthcoming referendum for predator control and all matters of importance on the legislative level. Directors for the 1972-73 term will be elected at the close of the meeting.

Williams of Sanderson.

All sheep and goat producers in Brewster, Culberson, El Paso, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Pecos, Presidio, Reeves, and Terrell Counties are urged to attend this very important meeting.

FEBRUARY 3, 1972 License Plates Now Available

Texas motorists may buy a registration plate for their vehicles without going to the place where they are sold and without having to stand in line, as is necessary in some places. This may be escaped by mailing the 3-part renewal form, the registration fee, and \$1 to their county tax officer prior to March 1.

The plates may be purchased any time between now and April 1 without penalty or extra cost if a person goes to the sheriff's office with the 3-part renewal form and the registration fee. There is usually no waiting by personal appearance at the local office.

Special numbers will be reserved by Mrs. A.J. Hahn, local deputy tax assessor-collector by enclosing an extra \$1 for that privilege. The license plates will be sent when the number desired comes up in consecutive sales and cannot be delivered or sent until the number comes up.

The early purchase of registration plates will be appreciated by Mrs. Hahn.


ROPING NETS \$488.25 FOR WEST TEXAS BOYS' RANCH

A very interesting talk, by Dr. Marian Lowrance of Sul Ross State University, on rock art of West Texas was given to the Folk Lore Society recently. Dr. Lowrance told of her studies of the art left by early Americans. It prompted me to to this note on a subject that everyone seems interested in but few people know too much about, Indian Rock Art.

It has been said that petroglyphs and pictographs are nothing but doodlings by some idle primitive artist. And many may well be just that. But rock art has been classified into four main categories: ceremonial, menomic (using pictures as a written language) records of important events, and doodling and copying of designs. Rock paintings (picto graphs) vary greatly in design and colors, while scratches or peckings (petroglyphs) lack color. And some early artists used a combination of the two.

The great majority of paintings were done in red, ranging from a bright vermillion to a dull brown-red. Some are in black and rerely in white. Some elaborate paintings were made in blue, green, and yellow. Red was usually made from iron oxide, hematite. Yellow was obtained from another iron oxide, limonite. White was made from chalky deposits, such a sypsum and kaolin, and the greens and blues from copper ores. Black was derived from either man-

What is most interesting about rock art is that various sections of the country have their own art designs and styles. Great Basin art, as an example, is known for its abundance of abstract designs. The far north has many naturalists paintings, and the Great Plains has a considerable amount of paintings done in various colors. The Southwest seems to have a great variety of all styles. Rock art of the Big Bend Country is varied but is not as complex as that found in central and eastern Texas. A variety of figures, from humans, horses, cattle, deer, and even mastodons, circles, triangles, crosses, abstract lines, and anything else imaginable, have been found.

Studies of rock art can offer some very exciting and original information about early man's culture, distribution, and relations with other Indians. That is the purpose of Dr. Lowranc'e research. She is recording as much of the remaining rock art as possible. It is likely that only a small portion of the original paintings still exist. If ranchers and other land owners, that know of unreported rock art, would contact Dr. Lowrance, it would be greatly appreciat-

Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to March 13, 1972, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.
