We will continue to be an expert on all things except elections, and we will leave the decisions that would explain why people vote the way they do up to someone who is not an expert, because we don't think that there is any rhyme or reason to the voting habits of people.  
Since we have always been interested in numbers, one of the things that interested us about the election Saturday in Terrell County was the way the numbers worked out.  
There was a total of 513 people voted in the commissioner's race in Precinct 1. The number of voters for officers in the county in other races was greatest in the office of county attorney which had 429 in precinct 1. Or 84 more people voted for the commissioner race than for the county attorney. And 507 people voted in the governor's race. The above figures are absentee votes and precinct 1 votes together.  
Another fact of the election that is for information only, and not any other reason, is that there are a few write-in votes in the various precinct Democratic chairman posts, and in the Democratic county chairman post that are not listed in the unofficial result shown in other columns. The reason we show the number of write-ins for the precinct 4 Demo chairman post is to show that there was no plurality or majority winner in that precinct. The other precinct had definite winners that are listed, according to the returns given us.

## Seal Coat Due On US 90 West

A contract for seal coat work on 268 miles of highways in the Odessa district was awarded by the Texas Highway Commission during its May meeting in Austin.  
The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer Paul H. Coleman. The contract includes work in Terrell and Pecos Counties on US 90.  
Jones Brothers Dirt and Paving Contractors, Inc. of Odessa was awarded the contract and work will take an estimated 100 working days to complete. Russell S. Neal of Odessa is the Highway Department engineer in charge.  
The project includes: In Pecos County on US 90, 10.477 miles from Brewster County line to Terrell County line; and 8.545 miles from Pecos County line east in Terrell County.

## Spotted Rains Hit East & North

Spotted rains have been falling over the entire eastern half of Terrell County, according to information received from many ranchmen in that area. While the rains have been spotted and scattered, most of that part of the county has been covered during recent days.  
There was some rain to the north of Sanderson and some damaging hail fell between Sanderson and the Pecos County line on US 285, according to reports.  
There has been little runoff in Downie Draw on US 285, but Big Canyon has run several times, as has 8-Mile on the Dryden-Sheffield road and other canyons and draws in that area besides Big Canyon.  
Up to three inches of rainfall has been reported by some ranchmen on parts of their country.  
Rains were also reported south of US 90 and east of Sanderson in parts of that country.

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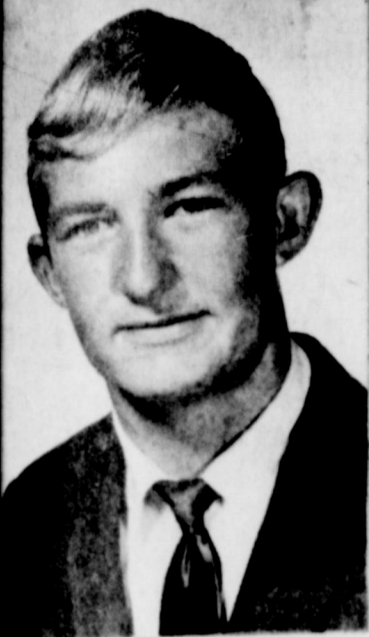
