

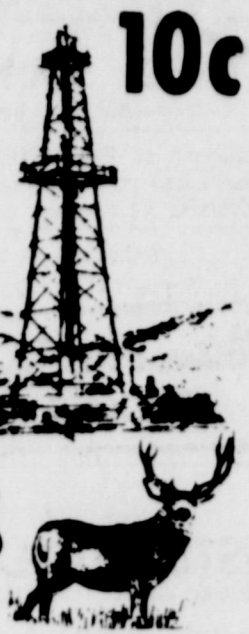

General Election To Be Tuesday

Tuesday is the day for voting in the general election. Polling hours will be from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. and will be at the court house in Sanderson, at the Dryden Methodist Church for precinct 2, at the Sid Harkins ranch for precinct 3, and at the recreation hall of the El Paso Natural Gas Co. plant for precinct 4.

On the ballot this year will be listed, in this order, the Democratic Party, Republican Party, Socialist Workers, Raza Unida Party, and a write-in column. And to the right of the parties' listings will be the 14 amendments to be voted on.

Voter qualifications have been listed in The Times and in other periodicals, plus television coverage for several months and every effort is being made to get a maximum voter turn-out and interest generated under all party flags.

Workers at the polls will assist any voter in marking his ballot according to his wishes and persons who are not sure of the method of marking a ballot are urged to consult those who are holding the election.

There is a potential voting strength of 1,000 in Terrell County this year with the eligibility of 18-year-olds to vote. Tuesday morning there were 71 absentee ballots cast in the county clerk's office.

Much interest is expected to be generated in several races for national as well as for state offices, with strong campaigning being done by several candidates for opposing offices.

None of the officers on the local level have opposition from any party, with the exception of the local sheriff's race which has a write-in candidate for the job. Dalton Hogg is the Democratic Party's nominee and Benny Ray Ross is his write-in opponent.

The Raza Unida party's candidate, Erasmo Andrade, has made several trips to this area in behalf of his campaign for state representative in opposition to the incumbent and Democratic nominee, Hilary Doran Jr. Doug Harlan has campaigned in Sanderson, as has his opponent and incumbent U.S. Representative O.C. Fisher. Harlan is the Republican candidate and Fisher is the Democratic nominee.

Joe Reyna Dies In Austin Oct. 26, Is Buried Here

Funeral services were here Saturday morning in St. James Catholic Church at 11:00 o'clock for Joe Reyna with Rev. John Pierce officiating. Burial was in Santa Rita Cemetery.

Mr. Reyna died Thursday morning in a nursing home in Austin where he had been for the past four months. He was a victim of cancer.

Born in Mexico in 1888, he came to Austin as a young man and then later came to Sanderson in 1922, working as a cement contractor until ill health forced his retirement. He was married to Juanita Flores in Eagle Pass and she died 12 years ago.

About eight months ago, Mr. Reyna went to Austin to make his home with his only son, Victor Reyna, and family and was later placed in the nursing home.

Besides the son he is survived by several nephews and nieces including Primo Reyna and Mrs. Otilio Escudero of Sanderson; also three grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Cool Showers Fall Over Area

Eagles Best Marfa 14-13 Here; To Play In Iraan Friday Night

The Sanderson Eagles' offensive and defensive teams both caught fire Friday night and they bested the Marfa Shorthorns by a 14-13 score. Marfa had the superior rating on paper prior to the game Friday night, but the Eagles, bouncing back from a 53-0 defeat at the hands of the Rankin Red Devils, proved that they were stronger than the Shorthorns at that meeting.

The Shorthorns drew first blood when Orlando Rivera ran 10 yards for a score with 5:48 left in the first period. Luis Herrera tacked on the extra point with a place kick. The drive by Marfa on their first offensive series appeared to give a big edge to the visitors in their ability to move the ball.

In the second frame the Eagles worked down to the 8-yard line and Chage Flores, quarterback, threw a pass to Floyd Watson for the touchdown with 7:46 left on the clock. The 2 points extra was a pitch-out from Flores to Jim Cash, who threw a pass to Watson who was clear in the end zone.

On the ensuing kick-off, Pete Cortez bobbled the reception, then came back with a gallop all the way for the second score for the Shorthorns. An ineligible receiver down field negated the Marfa point-after pass play which was good and would have given them the winning point.

Sanderson's winning tally was with 2:40 remaining in the first half when Flores rode the center over the goal line from about 1 foot out. Their

try for an extra point was on a pass play which was no good.

The second half was scoreless and a defensive and offensive battle all the way for both teams with several serious threats for scoring, all of which were cancelled by either a fumble or failure to make the necessary yardage.

Sanderson led in 1st downs by 17-13, but trailed in total yardage by 142-204. Sanderson led in passing yardage by 52-36, completing 5 of 12 tries; while Marfa completed 4 of 12 passes. Sanderson intercepted 2 aeriels and Marfa none.

The Shorthorns lost 3 fumbles and the Eagles lost none. Marfa was penalized 5 times for 35 yards and Sanderson 3 times for 25 yards.

Coach Willie Myers stated that he thought the over-all effort of all of the boys was superb and that it took an all-out effort on their part to win the game.

The Eagles will go to Iraan Friday night for a district bout and have the statistical edge over the Braves, but will have the disadvantage of playing on the Iraan gridiron. There were no Eagle injuries during their game with the Shorthorns and Coach Myers is expecting to take a full-strength team to Iraan Friday night.

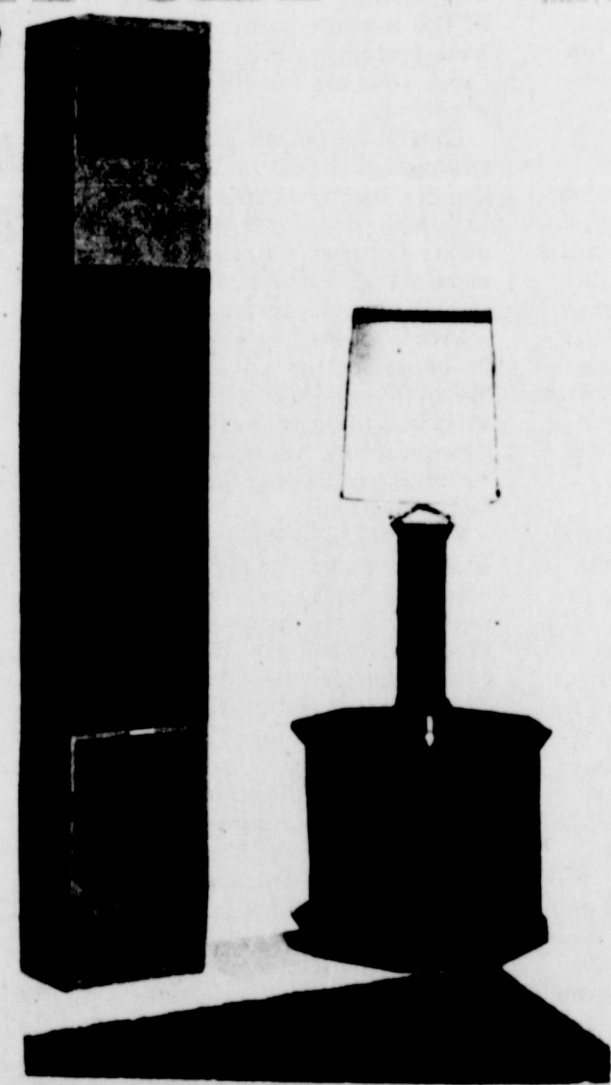

Since the last election, when only 55% of the citizens went to the polls, the electorate has been enlarged with young people over 18 years old and residency requirements have been eased for Presidential balloting.

In 1968, more than 7½ million registered voters did not vote and in 1970 that figure climbed to 16 million. Surely we can do better than that.

Consumers Want to Know

What type of vacuum cleaner do you prefer, the tank type or an upright?

Actually, the choice depends on the type of furnishings in a home. If you have many square feet of carpeting and no hard surface floor, the upright, which combines agitation and suction to remove dirt should be considered. But, if you have bare floors, plus a lot of dusting as well as carpets, the tank type with tool attachments might be the best choice. There is a combination model that features a powered nozzle similar to the upright, that also has an assortment of the above-the-floor attachments. It's a good idea to look at all three types and evaluate the features offered in view of the cleaning you have to do.

What's the best way to judge suction of a vacuum cleaner?

The best material for testing a cleaner's efficiency is a granular material like sand or salt. After the cleaner is run over it, check below the rug pile to see if it has been picked up, not pushed down. Picking up thread, fine powder, or a heavy object is

not a meaningful test for a cleaner.

Do you think disposable bags for vacuum cleaners are worth the cost?

Check the size of the bag and cost of replacing bags before you buy. The larger the capacity the less frequently you'll have to change it. The disposable bag, inside the cloth bag offers a second layer of protection for the motor from dust.

What makes a vacuum cleaner hard to push on some carpets?

Perhaps the nozzle needs

adjusting. It should ride just above the carpet pile. Too low an adjustment will make the cleaner hard to push and cause accelerated wear on the rug. Too high an adjustment will make it roll easier but may not give the rug a deep cleaning.

Do you know the difference between a boneless eye steak, a London broil, a market roast, or market pot roast? Actually, there isn't a difference. All are one particular cut of beef chuck, but the names differ in different parts of the country.

That's not all the confusion, however: There are 14 other cuts of beef chuck known by 59 different names, with a grand total of some 610 names for cuts of meat.

So, to clear up some of the confusion the National Live Stock & Meat Board formed an ad hoc committee to study the problem and eliminate some of the names. Mainly the fanciful names are used in retail stores for cuts the butcher has taken from the primal cuts made at the slaughterhouse.

Names of the primal (or primary) cuts are your clue to tenderness. When you buy beef by the primary cut rather than a fanciful name, you may get a better buy. For example, a piece of chuck generally costs less than the fancy London broil, but it should be just as flavorful when properly cooked.

Primary cuts of beef are called chuck, rib, loin, tenderloin, sirloin, round, top, shank, brisket, plate, flank. Pork cuts are shoulder, loin, leg, side (belly). Lamb cuts include shoulder, rib, loin, leg, sirloin, breast, shank. Veal cuts are shoulder, rib, loin, leg, sirloin, breast, and shank. Regardless of fancy cut or name, the meat remains the same.

If the meat board adopts the committee's recommendation, it will urge the voluntary use of standardized names on all meat labels. However, standardization is not expected to reduce the vast array of names by even half the number. All it will do, hopefully, is get rid of such names as "chuckwagon steak" and others which tell the consumer nothing.

The beverage *coffee* comes from the Italian 'caffè' which derives from the Turkish word 'kahve' that, in turn,

comes from the Arabic 'quahwah.'

And the third word *taboo* is from the Tonga Islands of the Southwest Pacific. In Tongan, 'tabu' is something "charged with a dangerous supernatural power and forbidden to profane use."

In this time of political oratory and financial problems tax reform has become a major topic of discussion. No doubt changes should be made in our tax system, but we need to make calm, objective appraisals of the revisions being suggested.

Too often people take one small part of our complicated tax laws and either blow it up out of proportion to the actual data or distort it entirely. So it's wise to check facts carefully.

For example, some politicians are charging that tax laws and regulations since 1969 have favored the rich, that our whole tax system is unfair, and that wealthy people just don't pay taxes. Much of this talk grew out of a report that 100 high-income people did not pay any federal income tax in 1970.

Here are the real facts from the U.S. Treasury Department. Its statistics show that in 1970 there were 15,300 persons with adjusted gross incomes over \$200,000. All but 106 of them did indeed pay individual federal income taxes averaging out to \$177,000 each, or a total of \$2.7 billion. This, according to the Treasury, is an effective rate of 44.1 per cent of their adjusted gross income.

As for the 100 who did not pay an income tax, this is accounted for by deductions for foreign, state and local taxes they did pay, charitable contributions they made, interest payments, etc.

Over the last three years there has been a substantial reduction in the federal income tax burden of low- and middle-income groups—ranging from a decrease of 82 per cent for those earning \$3000 or less, 27.4 percent for those in the \$5,000 to \$7,000 bracket, to 13 percent for those making \$10,000 to \$15,000. But the tax burden of those in the \$100,000-and-over class has increased by 7.4 percent.

Consumers Want to Know

I've always believed that the freezer compartment in a refrigerator was for short term storage. What has changed this?

There are some models of refrigerators that have only one door. An inner door separates the freezer from the refrigerator compartments. It is difficult to maintain low temperature in such models. The use and care books advise short-term storage which is two or three months.

What happens to operating costs when the freezer temperature is increased?

The lower the temperature the higher will be the operating costs. Reducing door opening, organizing food packages so they can be located quickly and keeping the freezer as full as possible helps to moderate cost of operation.

What's the best way to get rid of an old refrigerator?

The Association of Home Appliance Manufacturers has prepared a leaflet that offers some suggestions for preventing accidents with discarded appliances. It comes with the use and care books of new refrigerators. It is important to remove doors on refrigerators and freezers before discarding them. If a refrigerator is still in good condition, it might be used in a vacation home, or in the recreation room or basement for additional storage. Occasionally, a church or a social agency would appreciate a gift of a well cared for appliance.

What's the best way to identify real leather from synthetic leathers?

Read the label to find out what you're buying. Garments that look like leather but are not should be labeled "imitation leather," "not leather," or "synthetic leather made of _____ (whatever material is used). Real leather need not be identified.

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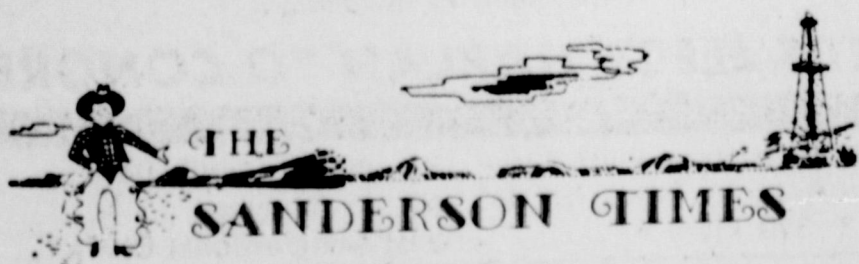
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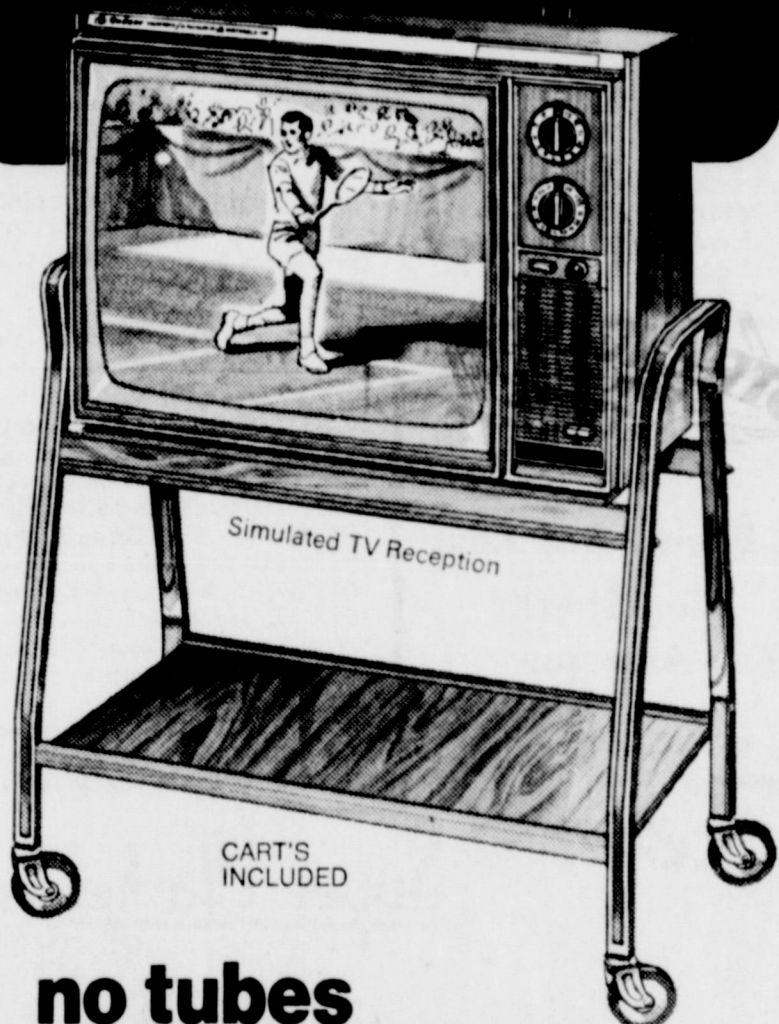
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
