 Old-home-week was in Odessa when I was there to be with SW Zee for her hysterectomy. On the way to Odessa Thursday, "Noni" Montalvo followed me for several miles before we hit IH 20 north of Imperial and then he passed me and went on toward Odessa. I walked into the hospital and there in the lobby was "Beto" Cobos, who is employed there and going to Odessa College. Later, in the lunch room off the lobby, Marge Beatty (Mrs. Grady Wilson while she lived here while Mr. Wilson was still living) walked up and spoke; she was recuperating from bronchial pneumonia there. Mr. and Mrs. Bill Cooksey and Billie Kay came by to see us for a few minutes. Rev. Lawrence Menefee, a former Methodist minister here who is an associate minister at the First United Methodist Church in Odessa, was there to visit and we saw and visited with him and later he and his wife came by for a short visit. Mrs. Beatty later came by with her son, "Butch" Wilson, who is living in Odessa. We left SW Zee Sunday night going real well. She will probably be out of the hospital—we hope—as you read this, but will have to remain in Odessa with daughter Melinda for several days for further recuperation. She sends her regards to all, and asked that we give an expression of thanks for all the nice thoughtful things that have been done for her and us up to now. She'll properly acknowledge these things as she is able to write.

The Trans-Terrell Medical Center, Inc. made application for \$54,540.00 from the National Health Service Corps and the grant application was hurriedly approved by the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission at their meeting last week in Lamesa, even though the appeal for the application was not on the agenda. The application was submitted by Terrell County Judge L.S. Wilkinson, who is also treasurer of the Medical Center. The board approved the application unanimously. Harry Reeves, PBRPC director of health planning, told the board of directors that the grant application had to be submitted by February 1 and that his office did not receive the application in time to be included on the agenda. The federal funding would be for a two-year period and would provide for a general medical practitioner, a registered nurse, and a receptionist, who would be hired locally.

We did not have a chance to check for sure about the amount of money that might be received by Terrell County in the Revenue Sharing Program, so we based our guess on what we might receive in a year on the figure of \$14,648.00 that had been received before January 1, and the reports of other counties receiving quarterly payments from this federal fund. This was another mistake - trying to guess what continued to second page

Proxy votes were possible by the use of the blanks on the notices of the meeting that were mailed recently by the directors.

Trustee Election To Be April 7

The Terrell County Independent School Board is expected to officially set its annual election for trustees for April 7.

March 7 is the filing deadline for the post and interested potential candidates may file with A.H. Zuberbueller at the office of the tax assessor-collector.

More information about the election will be forthcoming after the board officially calls for the balloting, setting the date, time and place for polling, and the election judges for the voting boxes.

Wind Damage Noted Saturday

Even old-timers agree that Saturday's wind storm was the strongest they can remember!

A heavy wind-storm blew in locally at about 2:30 p.m. Saturday and caused considerable damage and much uneasiness before the winds subsided. The strong, gusty winds lasted about three hours, then blew more steadily for four or five more hours before subsiding to a degree where there was no more real concern, according to reports.

Damage reported and seen included many trash barrels blown completely away from the premises, a large mesquite tree in front of the G.H. Carter home was blown down, the roof from the top of the water tank at the court house blown off, many houses and sheds with sheet metal roofs were damaged by loosening or blowing off some pieces of the sheet metal, local street lights damaged in some way to prevent their burning for two nights, damage to television transmission cables, some glass windows broken, etc.

There was no moisture that accompanied the winds which blew in from the west with trash, tumble weeds, and dirt making for low visibility for a while.

Shooting At Bar Draws Charge For Denny Callahan

Charges of assault with intent to murder with a deadly weapon have been lodged against Denny D. Callahan after a shooting which took place at a local beer hall Thursday night of last week, according to Terrell County Sheriff Dalton Hogg. Bond was set at \$2,500.00 against Callahan and he was released on the bond.

Augustin Maldonado was returned home Monday from a Fort Stockton hospital where he had been since he was shot in the back Thursday night. It was reported that the bullet did not hit any vital organs and remains in Maldonado's body. He is said to be recovering satisfactorily from the bullet wound.

According to Sheriff Hogg, Maldonado was operating the local beer hall on the night of the shooting and Callahan entered the business with another man. He began conversing with two people who were already in the business and an argument ensued. Maldonado asked Callahan to leave the premises and he did, but told Maldonado that he would be back. He returned shortly and was met at the door by Maldonado who asked him not to come in and when Maldonado turned his back he was shot. He was taken to Fort Stockton in an ambulance by Sheriff Hogg and he reported that Joe Callahan, Denny Callahan's brother, brought the defendant in to the sheriff's office during Hogg's absence and that the charge was drawn up by County Attorney Jack Hayre and the examining trial held before Justice of the Peace W.G. Shoemaker who set the bond.

Hogg stated that the case will be presented to the grand jury when it convenes on February 5.

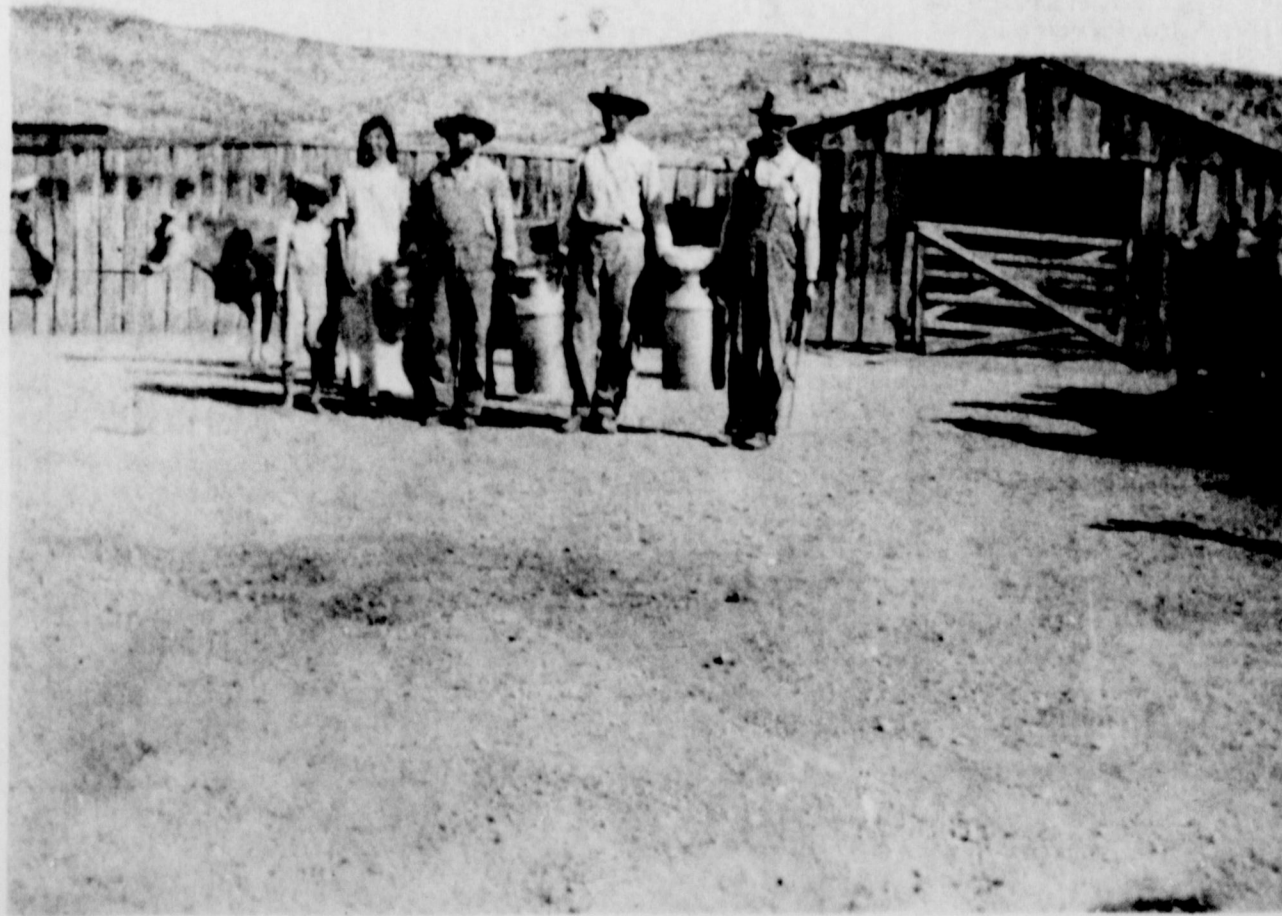

the government is going to do. The amount above is for one-half of 1972 and there was another check received since then, bringing the amount to about \$38,500.00 as the total for 1972. Of course, the total amount received could be near the figure stated, but we doubt it will be. Probably the amount received for 1973 will be much closer to the amount for 1972 - logical thinking!

We stand where we stood before - if everybody else will quit accepting these federal doles, we will agree that we should, too. But if we are among the few that refuse to accept them, then we are cutting off our noses to spite our faces - and what's worse, we are cutting off a source of revenue for the town, county, or area, that is not saving anyone a penny in taxes.

There is a report that more progress is being made in the securing of easements for the construction of flood prevention dams on the Sanderson Canyon watershed. The status of some of the easements is such that they cannot be revealed as complete as yet, but they are in the process of being reviewed for approval. And Jerry Wenmohs, local Soil Conservation Service employee, states that the sponsors are working diligently now in the procurement of the easements and he is also writing some letters and making contacts in an effort to obtain work permits for the beginning of construction when there is approval of easements at some of the dam sites.

Time Again For GS Cookie Sales

The 1973 Girl Scout Cookie Sale has taken on a new look. The sale will begin on January 23 when girls in grades 3-12 will be knocking on doors throughout the community.

The Girl Scouts in our community will be busy taking orders for their yummy cookies. Five varieties are being offered again this year - mint, butterflavored shorties, assorted sandwich, peanut butter and chocolate chip. Each box sells for \$1.00.

When a Girl Scout knocks on your door, you can order the variety and number of boxes of cookies you want. Between March 16 and 23 your cookies will be delivered to your door.

Troops receive a 10¢ commission on each box sold for their troop treasury. The remaining proceeds remain in the Permian Basin Council to improve, maintain and develop council-owned properties and camps. The cookie sale also pays for equipment at the camps, plus providing camperships for girls who need financial assistance. There is no other source of income for these purposes - cookies alone can do it.

The cookie sale is a little different this year, but you'll still be buying the same delicious cookies you've bought in years past. "Please say 'yes' when a Girl Scout knocks on your door," stated Mrs. Phillip Eggleston, Neighborhood Chairman of Girl Scouts.

Alien Sign-Up Due Before Jan. 31

Annual alien address program is again underway, according to J.B. Bannahan, district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service at El Paso.

"Federal law requires all non-citizens in the United States -- with a few special exceptions -- to report their addresses during the month of January each year," Bannahan said.

"This is true even though the alien's address may be unchanged since his last report," he said. "Failure to comply with this requirement could result in serious consequences."

Forms on which to make the reports are available at all offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and post offices.
