We hope that this is one of the ways which will enable our schools and our teachers to motivate more students to their full potential of learning to the greatest advantage of the students.

Another thing that could be very meaningful to the American people would be their committing in the things that once made this nation great: a dedication of their allegiance to God and to the proposition that all men are created equal and demonstrating both by action!

The Watergate mess has proven some other things: the news media is not the villain that it has been painted by the present administration -- it is primarily responsible for bringing out the mess that the nation was in; and the other is that the people who have been shouting for years that politics and religion don't mix, have made a point to some degree!

...plaque marks new library's purpose

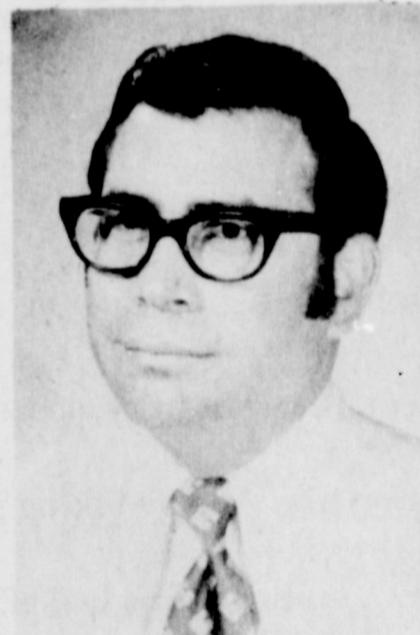

Special Education Co-Op Formed For Aiding Students In Area's Schools

Sanderson and eight other schools in the Big Bend area of Texas have formed a special cooperative to offer a more balanced and individualized educational service to their students, according to a news release given the Alpine Avalanche last week. The cooperative is known as the 588 Education Co-op and includes Sanderson, Alpine, Van Horn, Valentine, Marfa, Presidio, Marathon, Balmorhea, and Toya students.

By banding together as a single unit, it was possible to use the combined attendance of all the schools as a single attendance area and thereby apply for a Plan "A" Special Education organization. The new Plan "A" provides services of counselors, diagnosticians, speech therapists, LLD resource teachers, homebound services and many varieties of services to parents and students, not possible in a small enrollment school.

Plan "A", as adopted by the State Board of Education, is to provide a multitude of services to students and still allow them to function and progress in the regular mainstream with their fellow classmates. Past Special Education programs in small districts were limited to self-contained classrooms where small groups of students who were classed as mentally retarded or physically handicapped were segregated from other students.

"Current and more up-to-date thinking and research reveals that many students have other education handicapping conditions," according to the Alpine school superintendent. "These may be, but are not limited to, speech deficiency, hypertension or emotionally disturbed, hyperkinetic or overactive, language difficulty, vision handicaps, loss of hearing, orthopedic problems, minimal brain damage, auditorial deficiency, and others.

"Research of recent years has proven that most students with these problems can function in a regular classroom in most areas, if a resource teacher is available to help in that area of handicapping conditions.

"The 588 Co-op is designed to provide these services to students of the Big Bend. The 588 name was adopted when it was found it will be Texas' largest co-op and that it will require traveling 588 miles to go from the main office located in Alpine to each co-op school," the superintendent at Alpine said.

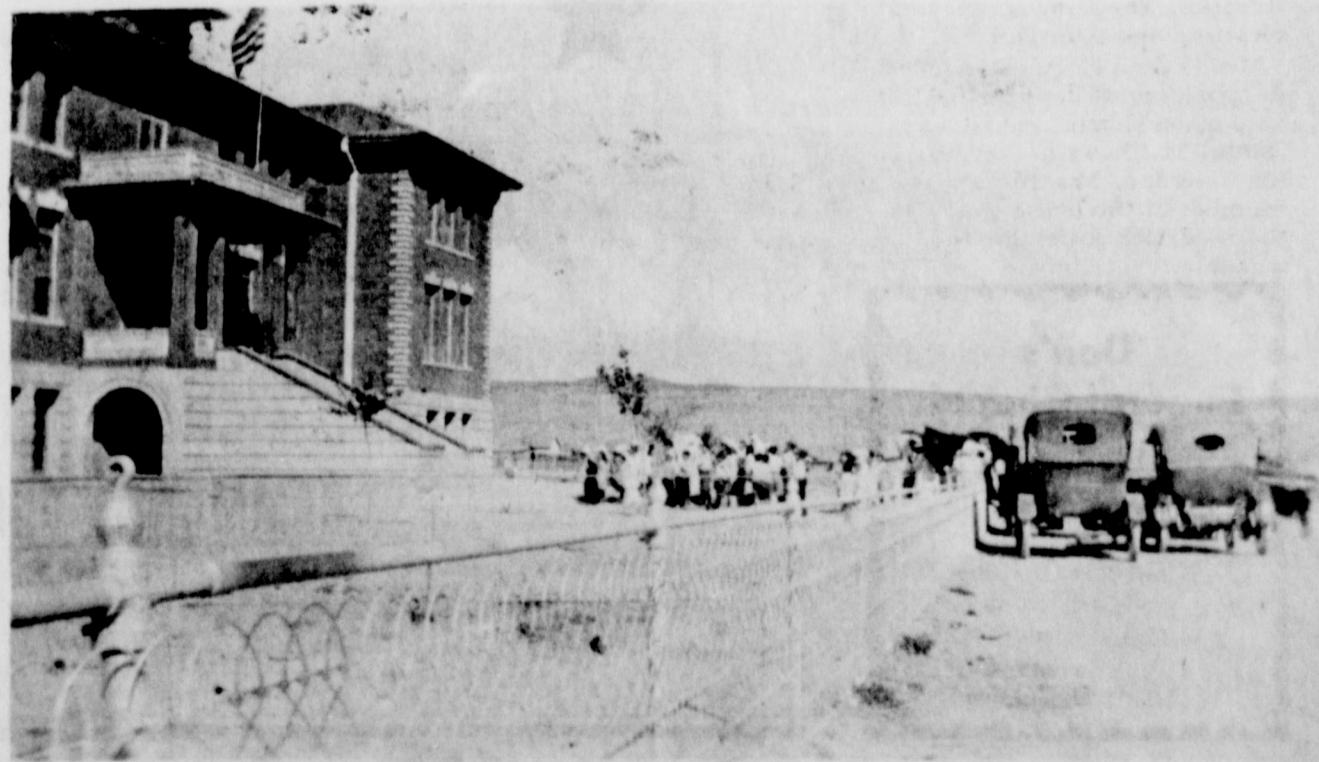
Hector Arce, former teacher, principal, and most recently director of a NYC Manpower Development Program for a 17-county area of West Texas, has been selected by member school superintendents as director. His office will be located in Alpine and will house at least one bookkeeper-clerk, one counselor, and one diagnostician. The co-op will employ 1 director, 2 counselors, 2 diagnosticians, 13 aides, and 27 teachers for services to 4,500 students and over 225 regular teachers.

Comprehensive testing is being done this summer to help identify students with handicapping conditions in order for special instructional services to be offered to students when school begins in late August. Continual testing will be done during the year to further identify possible needs, to evaluate the program in progress and to identify students who no longer need the special service.

"Sul Ross State University has cooperated by providing university level courses this summer for prospective teachers. Enrollment in the courses exceeded expectations, showing a healthy professional growth attitude of teachers who will be involved one way or another with the students," the superintendent continued.

The co-op is a 100% funded program of the State of Texas, supervised by the Texas Education Agency. The Alpine schools will serve as fiscal agent and a board of directors will be the governing body. The board now consists of the superintendent of each member school, serving with consent of his board of trustees.

The board will meet in regular session once a month, and on call as needed. The regular meeting for June was held last June 21 at the Kokernot Field Apartment, where the temporary office of the 588 co-op is being located. It is anticipated the permanent office will be established in the main building of Centennial School in Alpine.
