Jimmy Monroe Killed in Accident



James Reginald Monroe, 19, died of injuries suffered in a one-car collision 14 miles east of Marathon on U.S. 90 Friday evening about 7:30. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Brewster County Memorial Hospital in Alpine at about 9:30 p.m.

Department of Public Safety officials in Alpine said the vehicle involved in the accident was going west on U.S. 90 and it apparently hit a wet spot on the highway and slid into an embankment.

Also injured in the accident was James Madison "Dusty" Druse, also 19 of Sanderson, who was hospitalized in Alpine with a broken arm and slight head and facial injuries. He was released Sunday morning.

The car, belonging to Druse, was demolished.

Services for Monroe were at 3:00 p.m. at the First Presbyterian Church in Sanderson conducted by Rev. David C. Marx, pastor. Burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery under the direction of the Janes Funeral Home of Ozona.

Monroe was born June 6, 1954, in Fort Stockton. He was a second-year student at Angelo State University, and was a graduate of Sanderson High School.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Reg Monroe of Sanderson; a sister, Miss Marsha Monroe, of Sanderson; his grandparents, Mrs. Pearl Northcut of Sanderson and Mr. and Mrs. Allen Sutton of San Saba.

R.R.C. Names Field

The Texas Railroad Commission, Oil & Gas Division, has announced field designation for a Terrell County well.

It is the Allison (detrital gas) field, opened April 27, with completion of Seco Production Co., Midland, No. 1 Allison, six miles south of Sheffield.

It was finalized for a calculated absolute open flow of 14-million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 24,507-1, through perforations at 9,172-206 feet.

Location is 1,890 feet from the north and 14,440 feet from the east lines of 17-B2-CCSD ERGNG.

 outspoken. Our timing may not always agree with everyone else's, and maybe even our timing may be wrong, but we feel that speaking out is one way of showing concern. There needs to be something done after that though, and this is where we usually feel most inadequate. But we have some company in that regard. If we saw some youngsters playing with rattlesnakes, it would not be our dislike for kids or snakes that would prompt us to say something about it, maybe, publicly or privately, but our regard and concern for the welfare of the kids.

All of this leads up to this: Someone should show some kind of concern about some of the youngsters riding bicycles on sidewalks downtown. We know that there is a hazard in their riding on the highway, and there are times when they ride across lanes and down the highway with utter abandon, and then upon the sidewalks the same way. There has been no accident, yet, that we know of, either to a cyclist or pedestrian, and we hope that there is not.

There is a safe way to ride a bicycle on the highway and on the sidewalk.

We like the ad on TV that says that young people have the capacity to understand if they are told, and we think this is the situation that exists with the bicycles. If they are explained the hazards to themselves by carelessly riding in the streets, and the hazards to others if they carelessly ride on the sidewalks, then they have the opportunity of exerting some maturity and mental alertness by grasping some of this knowledge.

And above all, it might show them that there are those who care!

That's the way it appears to us!

Wynne Massey, who is an exchange student in Brazil this summer, has written some very interesting letters home to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Barton Massey, and her friend, Bryanann Stavley. The recipients of the letters have offered them to The Times so that our readers may share the information with them.

Minas Gerais, Brazil
(card, dated July 3)

Dear Mom, Dad, and Randy,
I like it here very much. The weather is really not that much different. I know I shouldn't have brought cuddere. Can't spell that - anyway my red pants and sweat shirt. The plane never bothered me but now I know why they have stomach distress bags - the girl next to me threw up when we landed in Rio. I showed them Mediam's address. (Mediam is the girl who spent a month

with the Massey's early this year.) They say she lives very near. Three of them speak English pretty well. My family has 2 girls and 3 boys. Father is a dentist. There are 2 maids.

July 4 (letter)
Dear Mom, Dad, and Randy,
I guess everybody will be celebrating today at home. Randy, I hope you were careful with your fireworks. I have had a real good time here. Last night they took me to the top of a mountain that overlooks the city - the lights are very pretty. I only wish a picture would take. We went up there in the daytime also. The governor has a country home up there - it is very big. Belo Horizonte is the capital of Minas Gerais and Brasilia, the capital of Brazil - they spell it Brasil here. The largest bus station in South America is here - very pretty. We went to the park last night and school this morning - it's from 7:00 - 11:00. It is very different. The students seem to drift in anytime and not

really listen to the teach. They smoke, talk - do whatever they want really. She had English, geometry, algebra, and Portuguese. I talked to 3 girls who have been to the U.S., one for 6 months - also everyone there spoke a few words of English. Their English book was printed in Dallas and spoke about the Golden Fork in downtown Dallas in a sentence. We went down to a shop for a coke and pizza. The pizza is different in that the crust is more bread-like. There are many maids - the family never lifts a finger for anything. They (the maids) do it all. We got up at 6:00 and it's now 12:30. I feel sort of tired. They have a Pekinese dog - Ted but pronounced Tag. I like him - they are so ugly they are cute. My family is very nice to me. I've been writing down each day what has happened - you'll just have to read that to understand it all. I don't remember if I told you the names. Mamai is Vera; papai, Nelson; Cladia, 18; Victor and Iwan (twins) 16; Henrique, 15; Virginia, 13.

In the plane to here a girl (Francine) we call her "Nice" because she said it with that funny Pennsylvania accent -- anyway she said she was not gonna write anybody because this was her vacation and she wasn't gonna worry about anybody and have fun. I'm not going to do that though. The Baptist Church - the main one that is - is right in the center of the city. Virginia takes ballet and she gave me a picture of her in a costume. Victor has gotten a volleyball medal and Iwan, volleyball and karate. Everyone over here listens to the same kind of music I do -- the young ones my age. It is American music just as it is here - they can't understand a word of it but they like it anyway. Me -- I love it. Daddy just think you played the radio all the way to Odessa for nothing cause I can hear the same thing here. The boys buy American records and record them onto a cassette. The radio plays American music. In the stores they have picture posters of the rock singers and others like Raquel Welch, Mark Spitz. The Brazilians are very interested in the U.S. and its ways and want to learn all they can about it.

In the English class they have sentences like - "His car is always fixed by Joe." - "They are buying peaches." - "They are planning to dine at the Golden Fork." - things like that. The teacher spoke very well - he has never been to the U.S. but wants to. He and his wife just had their first child last Friday. He had a picture in class. One of the teachers reminded me of Mr. Holcombe. The kids here wanted to see things like my senior ring, charm bracelet.

I'm having lots of fun and meeting many new people. I've taken in a movie here - "The Posiden Adventure". It was in English with Portuguese written underneath....

This last weekend (7th and 8th) we went to a farm to go bird hunting. They are similar to quail - and called corderna. We got 13 in all and I tried 3 or 4 times but I guess I'm used to shooting jack rabbits because these guys move. We have a bird dog - and it's just like TV. It's very interesting to watch the dog get a whiff and stiffen into an arrow. Then he starts moving again, after everybody is behind him, he starts up again and scares the bird into flight and pow you either get it or miss. Me - I miss a lot - in fact I'm a 100% misser. It was really embarrassing cause I consider myself a pretty good shot and I couldn't even clip a wing. I'll just stick to rabbits.

Friday morning we had an interview with the newspaper and TV. I hope to get a clipping from the paper - although I won't understand a word - I can understand pictures and there were lots of those. The TV was to have a newscast Friday night of the meeting but we left for the farm around 8 o'clock so I didn't see that part. This meeting was just a small portion of us - about 15 maybe. They were going to take groups of us at a time that way they could interview better. They asked lots of questions - mainly opinions - things about Brazil, people, families, anything that we would come in contact with.

me about Brazil are the people. They really care. They are very interested in Americans and want to learn all about us and our country. I believe they would do anything to make me at home, comfortable and feel at ease. They always ask me if I'm liking the food and if I'd like something different. They will try to get it and just small things that don't sound like much but when you're over here by yourself they mean alot.

The city is very pretty and very different from Sanderson anyway. The driving is different - faster, more careless. I don't think they care about anything while driving - they all drive like a bat outta hell! When you cross the street you pray you will set foot upon the other side. The streets are very humble jumble. I plan to take pictures of a good square - the good ones are bad and the bad ones are unbelievable. That's why I'm gonna take a picture of a good one cause if I took a bad one no one would believe me.

I've been shopping and it's just like the U.S. - good prices and outrageous ones.

Here they run mainly on mass transit - buses and lots of taxis. I took my very first taxi ride here and you had to hold onto your hat - that guy just weaved in and out between cars - you would have thought we were an ambulance service or something. They don't pay attention to signs or yellow stripes or anything. Coach Myers would thank the Lord for you drivers Ed. people if he saw these grown men and women drive.

I'm at school with Claudia right now and due to the fact that I can't understand a word, I'm writing a letter.

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Predator Hearings Slated Over Area

Fred Agnich, Dallas state representative and chairman of a House wildlife affairs subcommittee, announced that his group will begin a series of West Texas and Central Texas hearings on predatory animal losses, the first to be August 20 in Fort Stockton.

Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' announced 14,000 responses to 33,000 predator loss questionnaires distributed among livestock producers. Losses reported totaled 66,000 sheep and goats and 6,000 calves, which executive secretary Bill Sims translated into a potential loss of 10-million pounds of red meat from consumers' dinner tables.

The Association's predatory animal committee asked Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White to register the M-44 (Coyote Getter) for use in predator control, as another item of business conducted at the meeting of the TSEGRA in San Antonio July 17.

Among those attending the meeting were Messrs. and Mrs. Monty Harkins and Sid Harkins; Charles Stegall, and Herbert Brown.

Consumers Need to Know

Whether or not there should be a new Consumer Protection Agency is a highly debated issue these days.

"Unfortunately support or opposition to the CPA is all too frequently been translated into labels of 'pro' or 'anti' consumer, and it has served only to obscure the real issues," says E. Douglas Kenna, president of the National Association of Manufacturers.

In testimony before the Senate, Mr. Kenna said the NAM supports adequate consumer protection, but opposes creation of an independent Consumer Protection Agency which would be above other agencies and departments of the federal government.

Strengthening of existing federal agencies to act on behalf of consumers would be a more balanced, problem-solving approach, according to Mr. Kenna. But the CPA would be essentially an exercise in inefficient government. It could not honestly serve the best interests of the consumer as a citizen. It could only represent some consumers at the expense of others.

One consumer might wish to pay a higher price for increased quality while another would prefer to accept lesser quality in return for a lower price. A middle standard might satisfy no one, and be particularly hard on the poor.

Another important point stressed by Mr. Kenna was that a function of the CPA would be to seek "the prevention of unfair or deceptive trade practices." This is similar to the mandate of the Federal Trade Commission. Two agencies with parallel functions would be wasteful and disruptive. He pointed out also that there are some 36 other federal agencies which have more than 1,300 functions protecting consumers.

The NAM supports expanding the Federal Trade Commission's jurisdiction to cover local problems, and believes it should be granted preliminary injunctive power.

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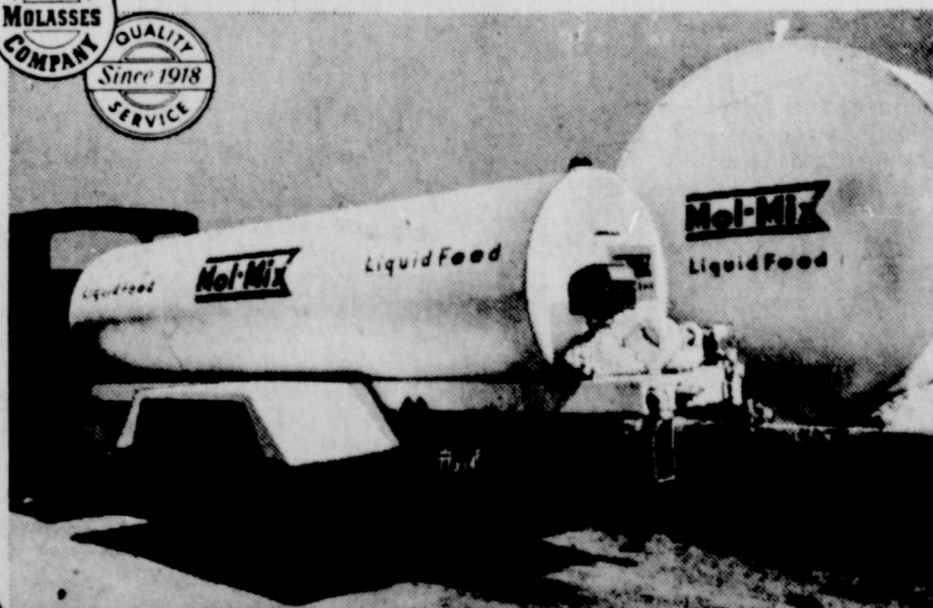
