Fairness and honesty is difficult to maintain with any consistency, but it's something that we need to do a lot of thinking about, and a little bit of action.

Selfishness usually finds no room for complete honesty and fairness, as it crowds out so many other things!

Some information has come forth that many of our advantages in food packaging are consuming an excessive amount of energy by manufacturers. ## Wildcats Slated In NE County

Texas Oil & Gas Corp. of Midland will attempt to extend Ellenburger production 1/2-mile southeast and Connell production 1-1/4-miles southeast and into Terrell County and Pennsylvanian production 1-1/4-mile east in the Yucca Butte field with the staking of the No. 1-C No Noelke, a 10,800-foot project five miles southwest of Sheffield.

Location, exception to Rule No. 37, is 1,000 feet from the north and 1,640 feet from the west lines of 4-B2-CCSDE RGNNG Survey.

The Pecos portion of the field has two Connell, two Ellenburger, and five Pennsylvanian wells, the Terrell portion has one Pennsylvanian gas well and one Pennsylvanian detrital oil, South well.

Word was received last weekend that Skelly Oil Co., Midland, will drill a 16,200-foot wildcat in Terrell County 27 miles southwest of Sheffield.

The well will be known as the No. 1-18 Culbertson.

Location in 1,697 feet from the south and east lines of section 18, Block 2, of the CCSDERGNG Survey.

## County Commisioners Talk Proposals

At the regular meeting of the commissioners' court of Terrell County Monday morning, the group agreed to pay the bills as a routine action.

They also accepted the bid of \$2,750.00 for the old loader used in precinct 2 for approximately 20 years. The only bid turned in was by the seller of the new loader to the county last month.

The commissioners approved deputizing Mrs. Bert Bell as assistant in the office of Mrs. A. J. Hahn Jr.

A resolution was approved to continue with the same system of highway financing, etc., under the revised Constitution of Texas.

The commissioners heard a review of prices of fire plugs, installing machines, etc., from Don Allen, manager of the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1. The action was prompted by a request by the Young People's Chamber of Commerce to the Commissioners Court, for fire plugs adjacent to or near the schools. Allen estimated the cost of each plug at approxi-

mately \$350.00, and the cost of the machine to tap the mains would be approximately \$2100.00. The commissioners asked Allen to see if a tapping machine could be rented for the work and also to see if the water district would share in the cost of the installation of the hydrants. A decision will be made later on the exact number and location of the hydrants.

There was considerable discussion at the meeting about the financing of the trash hauling in Sanderson and distribution of revenue from taxes and the sanitation fee and the financing of other work and efforts of the commissioners.

There was a brief mention of the alleged illegal operations being carried out by a commissioner's court in this area, a fact which has been given wide publicity in the daily newspaper from the same county.

There was also some discussion of the status of the flood prevention dams and mention was made of the possibility of condemnation proceedings to acquire some of the easements on some of the sites proposed for the dams.

**Terrell County River Front In Proposed Action**

That portion of the Rio Grande bordering Terrell County from the Pecos County line to Shafter Crossing is being considered for inclusion in the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System Under Section 2, Public Law 90-542, according to information received by The Times last weekend. In order for a river to be eligible for inclusion in the national system it must meet general criteria relative to the following characteristics: free flowing condition, accessibility, shoreline development, water quality, fish and wildlife values, scenic quality, recreation potential, geologic features, cultural and historic values.

The 58 miles of river from Reagan Canyon to Shafter Crossing is designated "wild" i.e. those rivers or sections of rivers that are free of impoundments and generally inaccessible except by trail, with watersheds or shorelines essentially primitive and water unpolluted.

Public Law 90-542, the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act, states: "It is hereby declared to be the policy of the United States that certain selected rivers of the Nation which, with their immediate environments, possess outstandingly remarkable scenic, recreational, geologic, fish, and wildlife, historic, cultural, or other similar values, shall be preserved in free-flowing condition, and that they and their immediate environments shall be protected for the benefit and enjoyment of present and future generations. The Congress declares that the established national policy of dam and other construction at appropriate sections of the rivers of the United States needs to be complemented by a policy that would preserve other selected rivers or sections thereof in their free-flowing condition to protect the water quality of such rivers and to fulfill other vital national conservation purposes."

The Rio Grande is one of 27 rivers which were designated by the act for study as potential additions to the national system. The river from the Chihuahua-Coahuila line in Mexico to the east to Shafter Crossing is all considered in either the "wild" or "scenic" classification.

It was stated that it was "highly unlikely that counties in Texas will obtain and implement zoning powers in the near future and, therefore it is doubtful that a river protection program can be developed at a local level."

The folder from the Department of Interior further states: "Current patterns of land use and development would continue with no governmental control. Land use patterns of ranching increasingly supplemented by private recreation and fish and wildlife uses would persist. It is probable that existing land ownership patterns would become more fragmented as large ranches are partitioned and sold for development purposes. Recreational use of the river will undoubtedly continue to increase and, if uncontrolled, may impair the outstanding values present."

If the segment from Reagan Canyon to Shafter Crossing is included in the plan, the 58 miles would have 5,400 acres for resource management as a minimal figure; 1720 acres of which would be the minimum suggested for fee acquisition; suggested minimum easement acquisition - 3,680 acres, and approximate cost of acquisition - \$356,000.00.
