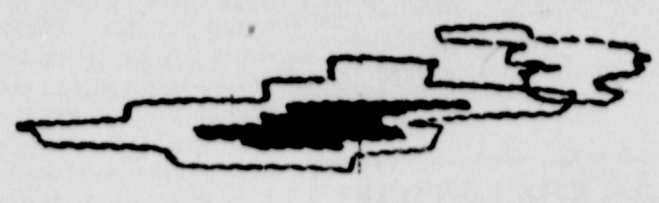

LISTEN TO LUKE

Albert:---
 The story of the sentence plea of Dennis Dee Callahan in last week's Times, we should have stated that the charge was "assault with intent to murder without malice aforethought". The story had the charge as "assault with intent to murder with malice aforethought". We are now going to try to explain or understand the choice of words, we are only noting our mistake.

With the election drawing near every day, and the interest of every voter, for one reason or another and some way or another increasing to some degree, it is too difficult to see that there is an "edginess" show-through in some instances we would hope that this all would disappear immediately we could have a "friendly election once!"

We honestly believe that every single candidate has a perfect right to be in his or her particular race. Whether the reason be for need of the generation, a desire to live, in answer to pleas of friends, for selfish motives, or any other reason you can mention, each candidate has a perfect right to be in the race.

The reasons for voting for candidates will be as varied as there are people, and that, should not be a surprise to anyone, nor should it be offensive.

We are all people and subject to years and years of prejudices, foibles, and misjudgments, but none of our faults should include getting angry at our neighbors because they are involved in any way in the interest in one or more of the racial races.

We heard that there was another sale of land in the county at a price that indicates very strongly that land is being valued too low for taxes. And we saw the listing of about 11 sections of land with a realtor in this area for \$65 per acre, which indicates to some extent a potential value.

All of these things; increased values of land, increased valuations for taxes, redistribution of the population in the county by precincts, and some other things that are happening, are not the result of trouble-makers, up-starts, newcomers, disgruntled citizenry, or any other bad names you can mention.

The increased values of land are a fact, the same as the fact that the sun came up this morning. This is being brought out more and more by the offering and acceptance of large sums of money in exchange of deeds and titles to acreage. Other counties, too, are experiencing the pains of considering or actual re-evaluation of property for taxes. And other counties have been forced to redraw precinct lines and do some other things to be in compliance with the law.

Residence Rules Quoted Readers

There has been some interest in the laws governing residence for voting etc. As a public service, The Times is quoting from Texas Election Laws 1974-75 edition:

"Art. 5.08. Rules for determining residence.

(a) As used in this Code, the word 'residence' means domicile; i.e., one's home and fixed place of habitation to which he intends to return after any temporary absence.

(b) For the purpose of voting, residence shall be determined in accordance with the common law rules as enunciated by the courts of this State and the following statutory rules; but in case of a conflict, the statutory rules shall control.

(c) A person shall not be considered to have lost his residence by leaving his home to go to another place for temporary purposes only.

(d) A person shall not be considered to have gained a residence in any place to which he has come for temporary purposes only, without the intention of making such place his home.

(e) The residence of a single person, or of a married person permanently separated from his or her spouse, is considered to be where such person usually sleeps at night, but if it be a temporary establishment, or for a transient purpose, it shall not be so considered.

(f) For a married man not permanently separated from his wife, the place where his family lives shall be considered his residence, but if it be a temporary establishment for his family, or for transient purposes, it shall not be so considered.

The Terrell County Grand Jury met Monday in a new session after having been impanelled by District Judge Roger Thurmond Jr.

One indictment was returned against Daniel Ochoa for assault and carrying a prohibited weapon on licensed premises. The alleged felony took place on September 7, 1973 at a local beer hall and Jesus Daniel was the person said to have been assaulted in the indictment. Ochoa has been released on bond.

Raul Elias Dominguez is the person named in three separate indictments charging burglary. The indictments charge Dominguez with entering certain premises and taking items belonging to other persons. Dominguez' alleged violations earned a local nickname "panty thief".

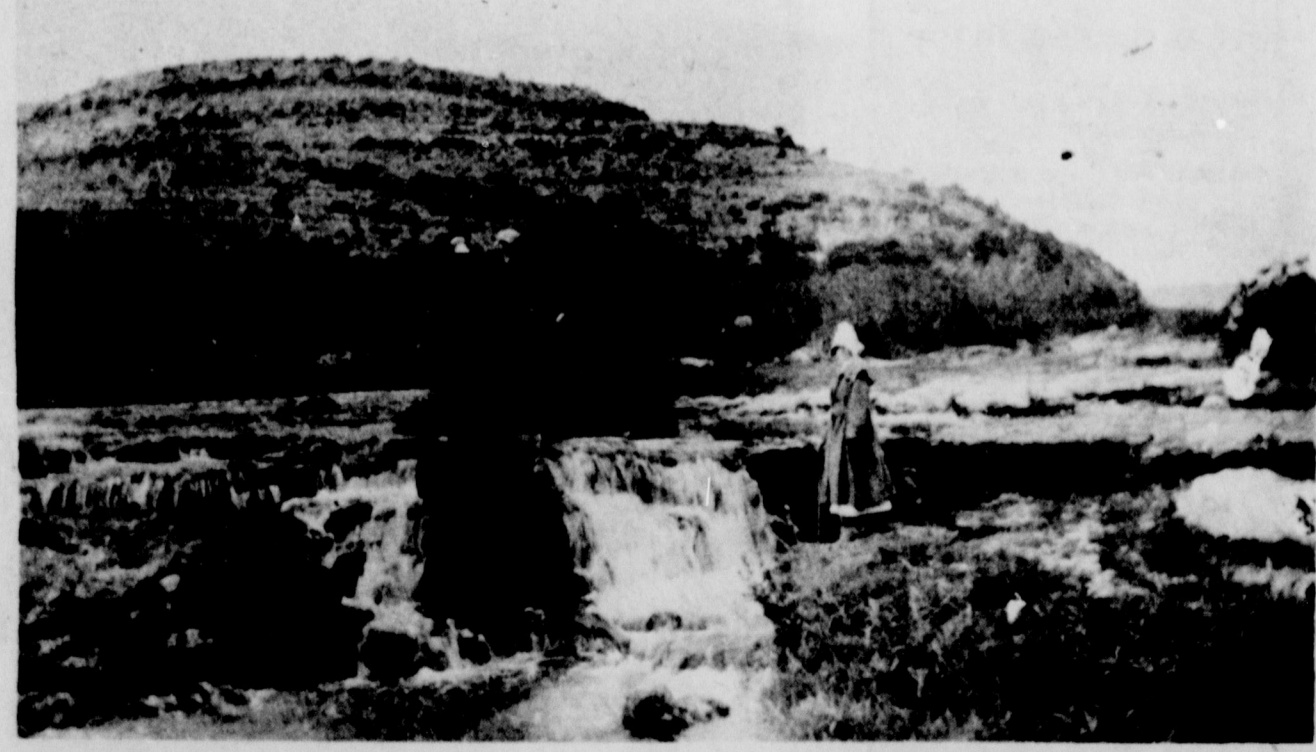
MISSIONARY TO SPEAK HERE SUNDAY NIGHT

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Letters from Readers

"A situation exists in Terrell County of which I am sure you and all your readers are aware but I would like to put it in the perspective that it surely deserves.

"In June 1954 the city of Ozona suffered a flood very similar to the one that struck Sanderson on the morning of June 11, 1965. The circumstances of the two floods is very alike as to loss of life and property damage and as to how the people of both cities dug out of the mud, rebuilt and continued on with the business of life. At this point the similarity ends. The people of Ozona took immediate steps to prevent a recurrence and did whatever it took to get it done. By 1960, only six years later, all easements were signed, surveying, construction, and all phases were completed.

"It will be nine years this coming June since our flood and, to the best of my knowledge, not one shovel of dirt has been moved to prevent it from happening again. Why? I cannot believe that there exists this much difference in the people of the two towns. The only alternative is that the trust of the people of Terrell County has been violated in a way that borders on criminal negligence. Who is responsible for getting our own program under way? Have easements been signed giving access to the sites that have been selected? If not why have not condemnation proceedings been started against those who place their personal interests ahead of community welfare? Public law clearly provides for this situation.

"I was a member of the Brewster County rescue squad that was all too successful in searching Sanderson Canyon on the afternoon of June 11, 1965, and if I live to be a thousand years old I'll never forget the horror of discovering the body of a small boy, digging it out of a driftwood pile, and carrying it to the highway and laying it like cordwood in the back of an ambulance on top of others that had already been found.

"This coming spring there will be an election in Terrell County. Many of the people responsible for the situation will be up for election and I'm sure that the voters of Terrell County will bring those responsible to account for their actions or maybe it should be inaction.

continued from front page purposes, it shall not be so considered.

(g) If a married man has his family living in one place and he does business in another, the former shall be considered his residence, but when a man has taken up his abode at any place with the intention of remaining there and making it his home, and his family refuses to reside with him, then such place shall be considered his residence.

(h) The residence of a married woman not permanently separated from her husband is considered to be the place

where her husband has his residence, but a married woman not living in a household with her husband may establish a separate voting residence from that of her husband.

Paragraphs (i) through (m) deal with: an officer or employee of the government of this State or of the United States; a person in the military service of the United States; a student in school; inmate of a public eleemosynary institution; and persons under 21 years of age, which is: The residence of a person under 21 years of age who is not married or has not been married or has not had the disabilities of minority removed through a proceeding in a court of competent jurisdiction is at the place of residence of the parent or parents or other person standing in loco parentis, having custody of the minor. The residence of a person under 21 years of age who is married or has been emancipated from the disabilities of minority by court order is determined in accordance with the rules applying to persons of full age.

And regarding eligibility of candidates, Art. 1.05. Ineligibility, quoting from the same book:

"No person shall be eligible to be a candidate for, or to be elected or appointed to, any

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public office in this state unless he is a citizen of the United States eligible to hold such office under the Constitution and laws of this state and is under none of the disabilities for voting which are stated in Article VI, Section 1 of the Constitution of Texas on the date of his appointment or of the election at which he is elected, and unless he will have resided in this state for a period of twelve months next preceding the applicable date specified below, and for any public office which is less than statewide, shall have resided for six months next preceding such date in the district, county, precinct, municipality or other political subdivision for which the office is to be filled:

(1) For a candidate whose name is printed on the ballot for a general (first) primary election, the applicable date is the last day on which any candidate for the office involved could file his application to have his name printed on the ballot for that primary election."

Other subparagraphs of the above article deal with applicable dates for independent or nonpartisan candidate, write-in candidate, party nominee, appointee.


"The foregoing requirements shall not apply to any office for which the Constitution or of this state prescribe qualifications in conflict herewith, and in case of conflict the provisions of such other laws shall control.

"Except as provided in Article 8.22 of this Code, no ineligible candidate shall ever have his name placed upon the ballot at any primary, general or special election. No ineligible candidate shall ever be voted upon nor have votes counted for him at such primary, general or special election for the purpose of nominating or electing him, but votes cast for an ineligible candidate shall be taken into account in determining whether any other candidate received the necessary vote for nomination or election. No person who advocates the overthrow by force or violence or change by unconstitutional means of the present constitutional form of government of the United States or of this State shall be eligible to have his name printed on any official ballot in any general, special or primary election in this State."

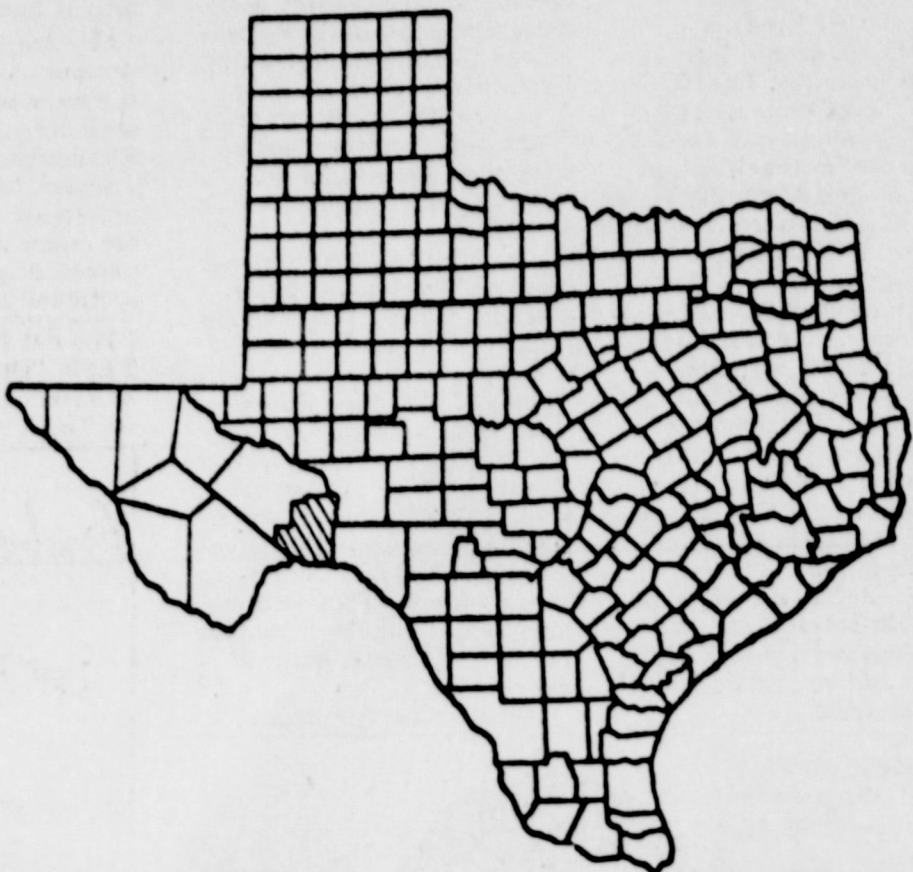

Tax Rate Limitations

Limited Tax Bonds Texas Constitution (Art. VIII, Sec. 9) imposes limit of \$0.80 per \$100 assessed valuation for all purposes of General Fund, Permanent Improvement Fund, Road & Bridge Fund and Jury Fund, including debt service of bonds or warrants issued against such funds. Attorney General of Texas will not approve limited tax bonds in an amount which produces debt service requirements exceeding that which can be paid from 40% of the foregoing 80% maximum tax rate.

Road Maintenance Imposed by statute (Art. 6790 et seq VACS), 15% per \$100 assessed valuation no part of which may be used for debt service.

ECONOMIC BACKGROUND

Terrell County: Southwest Texas county bordering Mexico, with an economy based on ranching and mineral production.

Agriculture: 1970 cash receipts from agriculture, \$3.3 million, with \$3.0 million contributed by livestock and livestock products. 7,000 head of cattle on ranches in 1972. 121,000 sheep, 6th in state, and 25,000 Angora goats produced 1,005,000 pounds of wool and 243,000 pounds of mohair respectively in 1972. Hay was also produced.

Manufacturing and Commerce: Ranch-supply and mineral-related activities dominate the county's commercial operations. 1972 estimated county retail sales, \$6.1 million. One county bank held 12-31-72 deposits of \$3,372,284.

Natural Resources: 1970 value of all minerals produced, \$4.9 million; 1972 crude oil production, 2.4 million barrels; 1972 natural gas marketed, 37.0 billion cubic feet. Deer hunting activities provide additional county income.

Any data on population, value added by manufacturing or production of agricultural products or minerals are from US Census or other official sources and in all instances represent latest data published.

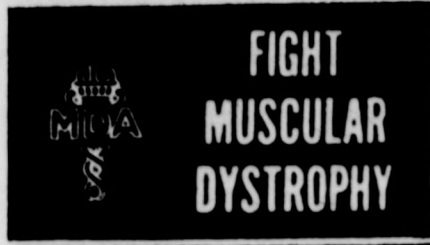

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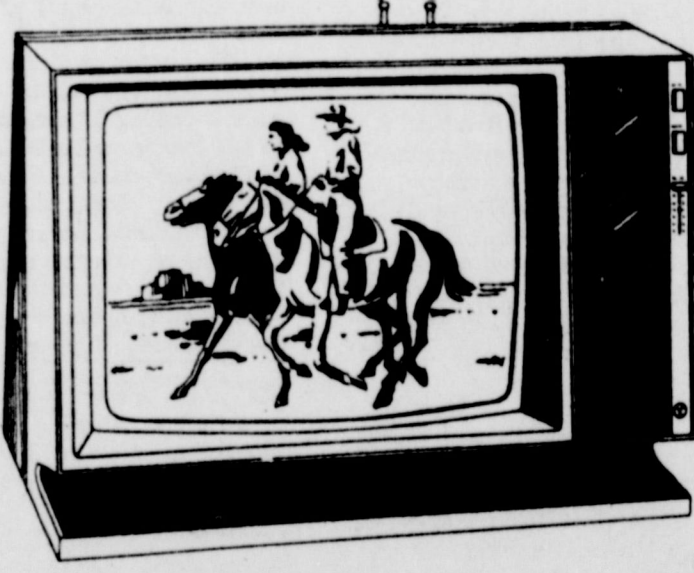
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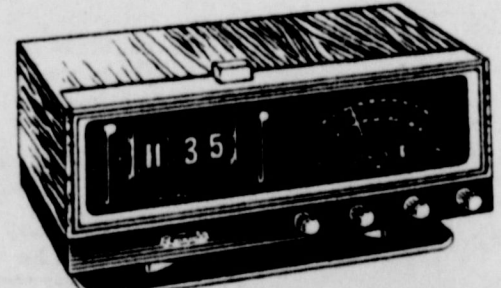
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
