LISTEN TO LUKE

According to a news release we received through the mail last week, Bob Krueger was the only candidate for the 21st Congressional District who filed his federal financial statement with the Secretary of State by the January 31st deadline.

For people who are interested in honesty in candidates, and who are interested in the candidates restoring some kind of confidence in our government, it would seem that Mr. Krueger gained some "Brownie points" in this act.

There are those who would say: "They were probably busy tending to other more important matters than to worry about those little details". And it may be that some of "those more important details" were "getting elected", or it may be that the other candidates just didn't go to the trouble to look into the requirements and/or didn't think them important.

Personally, if at the hands of Mr. Krueger, or some other candidate, or some other person, we think that the candidates' shortcomings in these things should be pointed out so that we might know something more about them than their "personality, hair style, and charisma of their wives".

A candidate for a public office should, in our opinion, be intelligent enough and business-minded enough to keep up with little details like this.

We are not throwing "all our weight" toward Krueger, but we still think he earned some "Brownie points".

Time is drawing nigh for the deadline for filing for the office of trustee of the Terrell County Independent School District, and we have not been given any names as candidates for that office.

Dogs continue to be a problem in Sanderson and in the pastures around Sanderson. We also read that there is an associated problem in both Ozona and Sonora as they are or have held rabies clinics in both those places to get dogs vaccinated.

Do we always have to wait until there is an emergency before there is much interest?

There are 20-mile-per-hour signs near the local schools and all motorists should take notice of the black and white signs posted there and notice the needle or indicator on the speedometer. We think the signs are a good idea and would give credit to someone or some group if we knew who was responsible.

Planned Parenthood, Inc., is making plans to come to Sanderson in the near future on a once-a-month clinic. Alpha Theta Alpha Sorority has had something to do with the organization coming here and beyond the implications of their name, Planned Parenthood will try to encourage regular tests for breast cancer suspicions, "pap" tests, etc.

...Associate Justice candidate

Howard M. Lemmons filed February 4 for the Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, Eighth Supreme Judicial District for the unexpired term and will be a candidate for that office on the Democratic ticket. The Court sits in El Paso and is composed of three judges.

Lemmons is a native Texan and was reared in Ozona. He attended Southern Methodist University and graduated from the University of Texas Law School in Austin. He practiced law in Ozona before moving to Odessa in 1958.

Lemmons entered the military service in August 1942 in the infantry and was separated as a second lieutenant in 1946. He was recalled to active duty in 1950 and served in Korea for approximately a year and was a first lieutenant at the time of his separation.

Mr. Lemmons stated that if elected he would work diligently on the Court and do all that is possible to see that appellate opinions are rendered as quickly as possible. He further stated that he feels that he has a basic sense of justice and is not prejudiced or biased to any one faction.

He is a member of the American Bar Association, Texas Bar Association, and Ector County Bar Association, serving as president of that group for one term.

Commissioners Divy Up Funds

The Commissioners Court met in a called session on Tuesday morning.

Following considerable discussion, the following motions were passed by the court: to divide the receipts collected under "sanitation" on water bills according to the precinct residence of the payee; to compute the mileage of local streets and roads maintained in the county in each precinct, and figuring a cost ratio of 5-1 of maintaining locally-paved streets to unpaved country roads, divide the road and bridge fund and lateral road fund according to the number of miles of maintained roads in each precinct; and a resolution was passed that each commissioner was to keep a check on the expenditures and available funds within his own precinct, and when the operating funds in any precinct were depleted, the commissioner would be so notified and work on that phase of operation of the precinct would cease until arrangements could be made to finance further work.

The money in the "sanitation" fund would be divided equally to initiate the new system, by action of the group.

Commissioners W.W. Suduth, Austin Chriesman, and David Mitchell were at the meeting which was presided over by County Judge R.S. Wilkinson.

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Letters from Readers

"In view of the comments appearing in your paper on February 14, 1974, we ask for 'equal time' in order to set the record straight. We, therefore, will appreciate it if you will print this letter in the next edition of your fine paper.

"We filed applications to have our names placed on the ballot as candidates for county commissioner in Precincts 2 and 4 respectively. By letter of February 1, 1974, Mr. J. M. Davis, as chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of Terrell County, refused to accept our applications. Each of us felt that this action was not legal and, accordingly, we sought legal advice.

"On Tuesday, February 5, 1974, we conferred with an attorney of our choice in Midland. He advised us that, in his opinion, Mr. Davis had no authority to refuse to accept our applications or to refuse to certify our names as candidates to the county clerk. In our presence he called Mr. Davis to discuss the matter. The attorney called Mr. Davis's attention to the case of Parker vs. Brown, 425 SW2d 379, advised him that he did not feel he could legally refuse to accept our applications, discussed briefly the remedies that might be available to us, and asked Mr. Davis to reconsider his position. Mr. Davis stated that he would do this and would advise us by Thursday, February 7, 1974, of his decision. On Friday, February 8, 1974, not having heard from Mr. Davis, the attorney called him and was informed by Mr. Davis that he had reconsidered his position, was in agreement that he had no authority to refuse to accept the applications, and would now accept the applications. He confirmed this conversation by letter of February 8, 1974. These were the only two conversations between our attorney and Mr. Davis.

"Although our applications were accepted by Mr. Davis he did not place our names on the list furnished to the county clerk nor have they been placed, by anyone, on a list furnished to the county clerk. We believe Mr. Davis was required to place our names on such list by Article 13.12, paragraph 3, which provides in part, as follows:

"Within ten days after the first Monday in February,...

each county chairman shall file with the county clerk a list of the names of all candidates...whose applications have been timely received."

"We feel that it was as much Mr. Davis's duty to file our names on the list furnished to the county clerk, which has not been done, as it was to accept our applications, which he has done!

"Mr. Davis was at no time asked to compromise in any way. We believe, and he has now agreed, that under the law he had no authority to refuse our applications. If he felt it necessary to resign rather than follow the law, that is, of course, his right. By the same token we feel that we have a right to expect the law be followed by others as well as ourselves. It is our belief, in this regard, that we have a right to have our names placed on the ballot as candidates in the democratic primary and we believe that this should be done amicably and in accordance with the law.

"We have no desire to engage in or to add to any further controversy on this matter. We hope and trust that it can be resolved quickly and fairly and in the interest of the fine people of Terrell County.

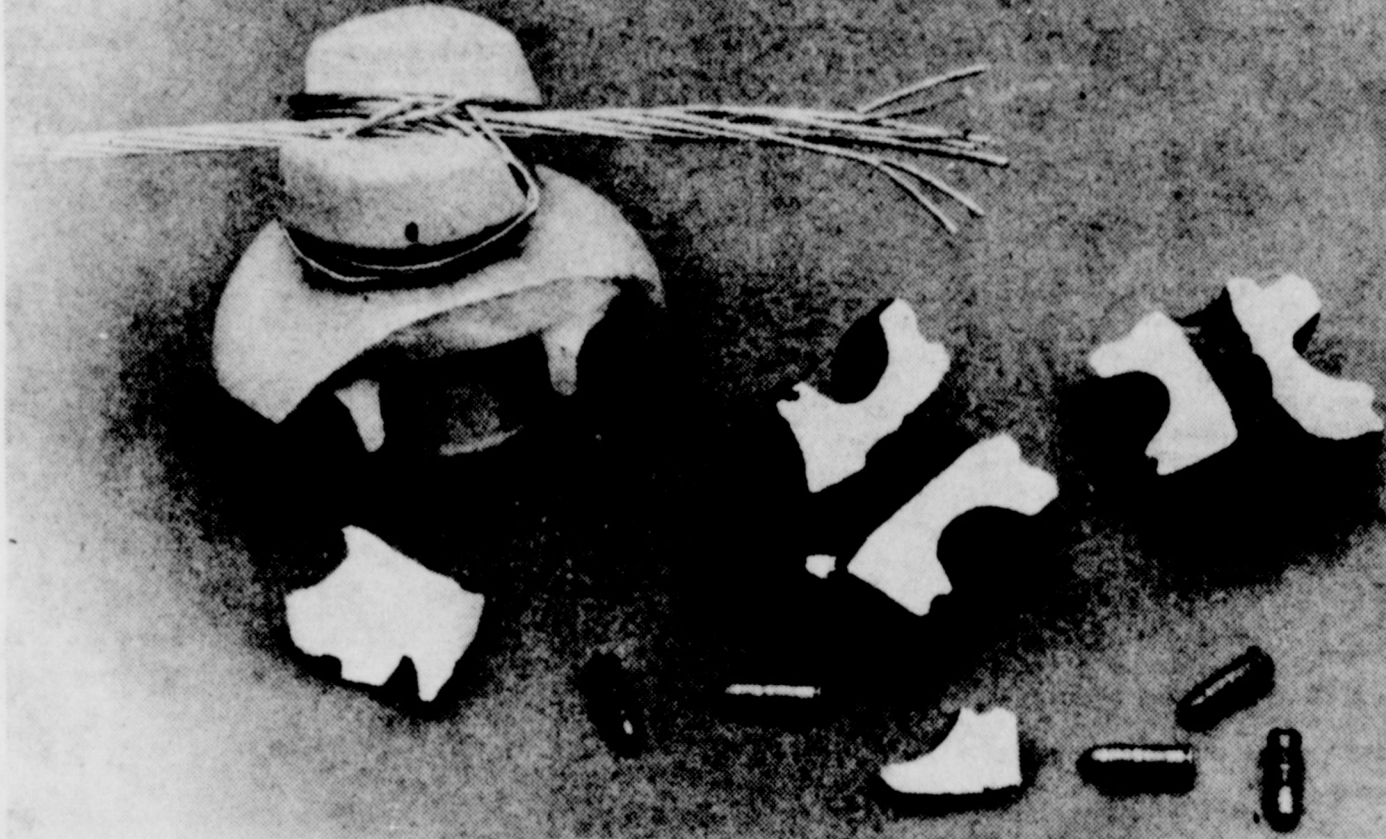
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W.M.U. Auxiliary Business Meet

Atherosclerosis: Where Does it Begin?

Atherosclerosis, commonly called "hardening of the arteries," is a major cause of heart attack and stroke. It's progressive. It can begin early in life.

Although usually irreversible, there is evidence that the disease can be slowed by eating foods low in saturated fats and cholesterol, and by controlling high blood pressure.

Dr. Richard S. Ross, president of the American Heart Association, explains how it develops:

"Over the years, cholesterol, saturated fats, and other debris carried in the bloodstream collect along the walls of the blood vessels. The arteries become thick and lose their ability to expand and contract. As this build-up on the walls becomes heavier, the artery channels narrow and sometimes close altogether, making it easy for a clot to form. When the flow of blood and oxygen needed to keep the heart and brain functioning properly is blocked, a heart attack or stroke can result."

Although atherosclerosis has long been considered a "disease of aging," Dr. Ross cites these facts:

- Doctors performing autopsies on children killed in accidents, or who died from other causes, found streaks of fat in arteries as early as age three.

- Autopsies on soldiers killed during the Korean War showed hardening of the arteries in some men in their early 20's and 30's.

He notes that these findings are evidence that atherosclerosis — and the heart attack, stroke and other cardiovascular killers to which it contributes — are diseases that can begin early in life.

A diet high in fat and cholesterol leads to a high blood cholesterol level and to an accumulation of deposits within the blood vessels. Dr. Ross says studies confirm that high blood cholesterol is associated with the increased risk of heart attack and stroke. Eating foods low in fat and cholesterol can lower the level of cholesterol in the blood and reduce the risk of these two killers. Cholesterol levels can also be lowered by treatment with drugs when necessary.

Another factor contributing to the two major killers — heart attack and stroke — is high blood pressure (hypertension). This, too, may begin earlier than doctors once believed.

"When atherosclerosis and high blood pressure are com-

bined," Dr. Ross warns, "the risk is even greater, since the presence of both often results in cerebral hemorrhage, a form of stroke."

The Director of the Cardiovascular Division of the Department of Medicine at Johns Hopkins Hospital Baltimore, points out that high blood pressure, once thought to be present only in adults, is now showing up in small children and teenagers.

"Pediatricians," he says, "take blood pressure readings as part of routine examinations. And some Heart Associations throughout the U.S. have undertaken screening programs which include high school students."

Screening members of the community for high blood pressure, high cholesterol and other potential causes of heart disease, Dr. Ross says, is just one of many services provided by the American Heart Association, now conducting its 1974 Heart Fund campaign.
