Food for thought!

If voters in Terrell County were to "jump precinct lines" and "vote wrong" in the coming Demo primary, how upset would how many people be?

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If anyone wonders what we think of the action of the current Terrell County Democratic Executive Committee, here it is: we think they had no alternative if they wanted to call themselves a legal committee.

We would not uphold them if we thought it was in any way otherwise!

We happened to have been very interested in the whole mess from its inception and following the developments as the legal ramifications unfolded, and we have a great deal of respect for and praise for the way it was handled!

There were several people who learned things that they had not known before, so we can say that the experience had its benefits!

The leadership of Ed Kerr was manifested when he dropped everything about his business and went to work getting details, seeking advice, searching through records, making telephone calls, etc., to get everything into shape to try to do what was right.

And if you want to say: "The reason you're upholding him is because he's your friend," go ahead and say it! That's one of the reasons he's a friend - because I know him to be a person of integrity and honesty and high morals. I didn't say he didn't make mistakes -- I won't say that about any human!

The situation boils down to the fact that any person anywhere can file for any office and get the nomination, be elected, and serve, unless his qualifications are contested within the time limits and in a competent court.

A citizen has several alternatives: he can approve of what the candidate has done, he can voice his disapproval in proper court procedures, or he can voice his disapproval at the polls. He can, also, be completely oblivious to the possibility of any reason for having an opinion!

Getting this issue settled to some degree of stability, we can now move on to other things.

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We have heard some comments recently about the division of the county's precincts was to favor the commissioner of Precinct 1 and to harm the commissioner of Precinct 2. We discredit any truth in this statement.

Most of the actual work of initial planning of precinct lines, dividing population, etc., was admittedly done by the commissioner of Precinct 3, who was seeking and getting ideas, approval, disapproval, and comments from all of the other commissioners, all of whom were present for the final approval, and all of whom approved. ## Historical Group Hears Proaram On Area 'Digs'

The Terrell County Historical Survey Committee held its regular monthly meeting Monday of last week in the library building. Those in attendance were Mmes. W.H. Grigsby, A.H. Zuberbueler, C. C. Mitchell, E. E. Farley, Pat Harris Jr., and L.G. Hinkle; and Jerry Wenmohs, Frank Green. Guests were C.C. Mitchell, Mrs. Clyde Higgins, Mrs. W.H. Savage, and Mrs. L.H. Gilbreath.

The meeting was opened with the reading and approval of minutes from the previous meeting, and the treasurer's report which now shows a balance of \$682.42. Included in this new balance was a \$100 memorial gift, and once again, the committee wants to point out that until further funds are released by the Commissioners' Court, the only means of support the organization has are memorial gifts and residents are asked to consider the needs of the group, and to remember that their work is not for themselves but for Terrell County.

Several items of business were discussed and various committee reports were brought up to date. The main item of business was that concerning the proposed museum, and the offering of the old drug store building for sale to the county to be used for such; and that the commissioners' court had rejected the offer due to the restriction that the building would be used as a museum only.

Frank Green was introduced and gave a talk on "An Introduction of Archeological Sites in Terrell County", based on a paper which he co-authored with his father, L. M. Green, soon to be published by the El Paso Archeological Society. Various artifacts were shown by Mr. Green that he had discovered in his excavation of some rock-shelters in the county, as well as photographs of some Indian paintings.

The March meeting was set for 7:00 p.m. on the 18th.

## MARCH 6 DEADLINE FOR FILING FOR SCHOOL BOARD

March 6 is the deadline for persons to file for a post on the Terrell County Independent School District's board of trustees or for the county school board.

Persons wishing to file for the school district post must contact Don Allen, secretary of the board, and persons interested in filing for the county school board must contact County Judge R.S. Wilkinson.

With the re-alignment of precincts in the county and some of the county school board members now residing in the same precinct, there is some need for more than routine election.

## Water District To Install Plugs To Fight Fires

The board of directors of the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District #1 and manager, Don Allen, met Thursday night of last week in their regular business session. The directors are: Greene Cooke, president; Edward Kerr, secretary; Jimmy Caroline, Mark Duncan, and Weldon Cox.

The group voted to buy a drilling machine and fittings and fire plugs and fittings for the installation of fire plugs in Sanderson. Allen stated the first plug he intended to install was at the intersection of Second St. and Hackberry, the corner between the courthouse, high school, junior high, and Catholic Church.

Another decision was to purchase a 2,000-barrel storage tank to be put at the site of other storage facilities on the west side of US285. Approval was also given for installation of a 2-inch main extension to the north end of the Whistler property, the old site of the Sanderson Rodeo Club arena.

The directors voted to hold an election April 6, 1974, for directors of the water district. The election will be held in the courthouse and judges and clerks will be named as soon as possible.

## Reg Monroe Asks For Precinct Post

Reginald Monroe is seeking the post of County Commissioner of Precinct 4 subject to action of the Democratic Primary May 4.

Monroe stated that he had been a life-long resident of Terrell County and would appreciate an opportunity to serve the people of Terrell County in that post.

He said he would do his utmost to fulfill all the duties of the office and would appreciate the support of all the voters of Precinct 4.

## Candidates' Filing Controversy Ended By Action of New Demo Committee

The controversy over the eligibility of two candidates to file for offices in the county ended Thursday morning of last week at a meeting of the Terrell County Democratic Executive Committee. The committee voted to put the names of Austin Chriesman and Reginald Monroe on the Democratic Primary ballot for the offices of County Commissioner of Precincts 2 and 4 respectively.

It was the first time the current committee had an opportunity to consider the question, according to Edward Kerr, chairman of the committee, who stated that the other committee members were Pinky Carruthers, Vic Littleton, Mrs. H.E. Ezelle, and Mrs. Manuel Parada Sr., one from each of the four precincts of the county. The committee was named as explained in last week's Times in an effort to carry out the duties of the party in seeing that an election was held to select nominees.

The controversy centered on a question of eligibility of candidates to file because of a question of residence of the candidates, and the former County Demo Chairman, J.M. Davis, was involved with the two candidates in the controversy. Davis resigned the office February 8, 1974.

Kerr was appointed chair-

man following the resignation of Davis, and the naming of three additional precinct chairmen, who in turn appointed Kerr. He stated that he had spent considerable time, effort, and trouble in getting information on what had been done, what could be done, and what should be done in settling the issue.

Following his assimilation of all the information possible, Kerr called a meeting of the county committee and presented the information to them. He stated that he understood the law to be very plain in not giving the committee the final authority to prevent any candidate having a place on the ballot if the application was duly executed and was accompanied by the appropriate filing fee. On examining the information presented to them by Kerr, the group voted to put the names of the two candidates on the ballot.

Kerr stated that it was his understanding from information given him by attorneys, that any person had the right to question the qualification of a candidate by residence within certain time limits of elections, but that the question had to be determined by a qualified court after procedures initiated by the person questioning the qualification by residence, and that if there was no contest or if the competent court ruled in favor of a candidate, then the candidate was not disqualified from seeking or holding the office on the basis of residence.

Kerr stated that he felt the committee had acted properly in their efforts to comply with the laws and he would be glad to go over the matter with any interested group or individual who questioned the action.

**Voter Numbers Most in Pct. 3**

Voting strength is heaviest in precinct 3, according to figures released by Mrs. A.J. Hahn last week. Mrs. Hahn, deputy tax assessor-collector, has been compiling polling lists of qualified voters in the county and released the figures to The Times. She said that there would be a few changes in the total figures, as there had been some residence changes of qualified voters, but she thought the changes would not be significant.

In Precinct 1, there are 430 residents and 273 qualified voters; Precinct 2, 436 residents and 198 voters; Precinct 3, 424 residents and 356 voters; Precinct 4, 415 residents and 237 voters.

Precinct 1 probably has the smallest number of voters outside the town of Sanderson, since it takes in only the southwesternmost part of the county from about 12 miles east of Sanderson and directly south to the river. Precinct 3 probably is second in lowest number of residents outside of Sanderson, with Precinct 2 as third-lowest, and Precinct 4 heaviest out-of-Sanderson population.

If the registered voter figures are subtracted from the total population figures in each precinct, then the remainder is the total of non-qualified voter - including children and unregistered residents - that are: 157, 238, 08, and 178 in each of the four precincts respectively.

## Gas Strike Looms On Mitchell Ranch

C & K Petroleum Inc., Midland, No. 1 G.K. Mitchell in 12-1-CCSDRGNG, 1/2-mile west of the one-well KM (Ellenburger gas) field of Terrell County, 22 miles southwest of Sheffield and one mile south and slightly east of the one-well Little Canyon (10,000-Strawn gas) field, indicated production in the Wolfcamp with the flowing of gas at the rate of 5.2 million cubic feet daily when drilling reached 9,206 feet.

Operator killed the well and was fishing at that depth in the last report. Contract depth is 10,500 feet.

The KM discovery, Amoco Production No. 1 Keith Mitchell, was finished November 27, 1967, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 53.6 million cubic feet of gas per day from open hole at 17,410-18,644 feet. It flowed gas at the rate of 2.7 million cubic feet daily when drilling reached 9,365 feet.

The Little Canyon opener, Mobil Oil Corp. No. 1 G.K. Mitchell, was finished September 22, 1966, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.54 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ration of 31,000-1 through perforations at 10,106-11,670 feet.

## Crippled Numbers Higher in Texas

According to Charles G. Riggins, who is the Easter Seal Representative for Terrell County, 20,570 handicapped Texans received Easter Seal treatments during 1973.

"Despite medical scientific advances, the ranks of the crippled are growing. This is because of population growth, increased number of accidents, and medical treatment which saves victims of crippling diseases who might not have lived in previous years," Riggins stated.

The largest group served includes those with major deformities of bones and joints, severe speech defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy, and multiple sclerosis and stroke, according to Riggins.

The Easter Seal Campaign which provides funds for continuation of these services, begins March 1, and continues through April 14, Easter Sunday.

## Higher Postal Rates To Begin March 1

At midnight March 1, the 8-cent rate for first-class letters is no longer effective. The first-class stamp on March 2, and all first-class mailings after that date will be 10¢ per ounce.

Post cards go up from 6¢ to 8¢.

Airmail letters go up from 11¢ to 13¢, and postcards from 9¢ to 11¢.

This will be the third major increase in postal rates in slightly more than five years. In that period, the cost of mailing an ordinary letter has doubled - from 5¢ to 10¢ per ounce.

The March meeting will be Wednesday, March 6, at 7:30 p.m. in the V.F.W. Hall.

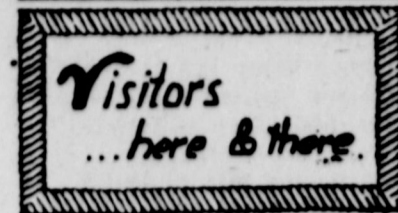
## BRAD HARRISON IN MARDI GRAS PARADE

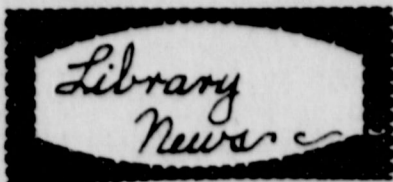

## CHILDREN AND HEART DISEASE: 'KID' STUFF YOU CAN'T KID ABOUT

Do young people buy life insurance? Seldom. Do they think about becoming victims of high blood pressure or hardening of the arteries, heart attack or stroke? Hardly. In short: do young people think about death? No. It's too far off. Too remote.

But heart and blood vessel diseases aren't remote from young people. Scientific studies indicate that many heart diseases begin early in life.

Consider two major underlying causes of heart attack and stroke: high blood pressure (hypertension) and hardening of the arteries (atherosclerosis).

High blood pressure was once thought to be an "adult disease." But this usually symptomless condition has been detected in children and teenagers. Pediatricians now take blood pressure readings as a routine part of periodic check-ups. Heart Associations have expanded screening programs to include high school students.

Atherosclerosis—even more than high blood pressure—was long considered an "old folks" disease. It's not. Its effects do increase with aging because it is a progressively worsening process and is usually irreversible. But it's not a disease of the aged only.

The exact causes of high blood pressure are still not known. There are theories that it could be genetic. So if you, or other members of your family have high blood pressure, it could show up in your children. High salt diets are also suspect. Stress may also have a role. Keep your family environment as stress-free as possible.

It is known that a major contributor to atherosclerosis is a diet rich in animal fat and cholesterol. Eating low-fat and low-cholesterol foods can help prevent atherosclerosis, or at least retard its progress. Cigaret smoking is directly related to this major killer. Set an example by not smoking, or at least smoke less.

These messages and facts guide the Heart Association's public education and community programs. All of this costs money—which only comes from the dollars you contribute to the annual Heart Fund drive. So give yourself and your children a gift of longer, healthier life. Practice good heart-health and give generously when your Heart Fund volunteer calls.
