Absentee Voting Ends May 28

Tuesday, May 28, is the last day for absentee voting in the second Democratic Primary.

The state's election laws set up the time for absentee voting as May 22-28, both days included, but the time includes two days in which the office of the county clerk is normally closed, thus limiting the time to only five days.

Voting strength in Terrell County is expected to be relatively strong because of the county-wide run-off for the office of county clerk between the incumbent Ruel Adams and Mrs. H.M. Petty; and will probably be heavy also in precinct 4 because of the run-off between W.C. Baker and Mrs. George Escobar, both write-in candidates in the first primary for the office of precinct member of the county's Democratic executive committee.

In the 70th district, state representative candidates, Mrs. Susan Gurley McBee and Stanley C. Hausman are contenders in the run-off, and in the 17th U.S. Representative race for the Democratic nomination, Robert "Bob" Krueger is running against Nelson Wolff, the post being vacated by Rep. O.C. Fisher.

The day for voting is June 1 between 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. in the same places as for the first primary.

Southern Pacific Spends Millions In Improving System

Southern Pacific expects 1974 to be another good year, despite escalating costs, President Benjamin F. Biaggini told stockholders in Wilmington, Del., and it is investing \$297 million capital improvements this year to increase capacity and improve efficiency.

About \$240 million of the 1974 capital budget is scheduled for railroad improvements alone, Biaggini reported at Southern Pacific's annual meeting. SP will buy 5,616 new freight cars and 64 diesel locomotive units for about \$150 million, and will spend another \$33 million in rebuilding 3,290 older freight cars and 83 diesel units.

The railroad also is completing this year a \$22 million, 590-mile installation of Centralized Traffic Control in West Texas, to improve both capacity and train performance on SP's southern transcontinental route. Started in Flatonia, east of San Antonio, the work has now progressed west of Del Rio.

"When complete this fall," Biaggini said, "the major lines of our rail system from Portland, Ore., to East St. Louis, Ill., a distance of 3,500 miles, will be substantially all double track or CTC."

Other major projects include extensions of the microwave radio network on SP's subsidiary, Southern Pacific Communications Company, to provide transcontinental service. First service of this specialized common carrier system

was between San Francisco and Phoenix last December.

"Now, while construction is underway on the other stretches of this system," Biaggini reported, "we are serving customers between California and Arizona and from Houston and Dallas through Tulsa and St. Louis to New York. We hope to be in coast-to-coast service by the middle of June, subject to Federal Communications Commission approvals."

Biaggini said the outlook for business on the communications network is "very good".

He told the stockholders that SP has spent more than \$1.9 billion in capital improvements in the 10 years from 1964 through 1973, with more than \$1.6 billion invested in the railroad.

"This strong commitment to modernization and innovation has helped the company to improve operating efficiency to minimize the effect of rapidly rising costs and to keep our transportation services cost competitive," he said. "I think that Southern Pacific has recorded an outstanding performance in trimming off the expensive fat of unproductive facilities."

In 1973, he said, SP moved 83 billion revenue ton miles of railroad traffic, 37 per cent more than in 1964, yet larger freight cars and heavier loadings helped handle the extra tonnage with an increase of only 10.6 per cent in loaded car miles.

"Southern Pacific has been doing very good business," Biaggini declared. "The past three years have been the best three years we've ever had, and 1974 shapes up as another good year, with strong real growth in several industrial sectors important to Southern Pacific's revenue picture."

"Rising costs will still be

with us, of course. Labor costs will be higher, but we look forward to peaceful relations with unions this year. Fuel costs have just about doubled since a year ago. We expect diesel and other fuels will cost us about \$92 million this year, compared to \$56 million in 1973."

SP's financial health and future prospects, its president added, are strengthened by its diversified non-railroad operations. Income from pipeline subsidiaries improved 88 per cent in the 10-year period 1964 through 1973, and income from real estate and natural resource activities improved by 108 per cent.

Alien Arrests Decline In Area

Chief Patrol Agent O.D. Stevens of the Marfa Border Patrol Sector stated this week that arrests of illegal aliens within the sector's jurisdiction - 77 West Texas counties and 17 counties in Oklahoma - showed a decline over March 1974; still some 2,200 arrests were recorded during April 1974. Of the total, 364 aliens were arrested shortly after making their illegal entry into the United States, and another 518 within three days after their entry; 839 were apprehended while employed. Also 24 smugglers of aliens and 96 smuggled aliens were arrested.

Border Patrol Agent Samuel M. Tidwell, the sector information officer, stated that during April 1974, the five Marfa Sector stations that form the sector's first line of defense (Alpine, Marfa, Presidio, Sanderson, and Van Horn) along the Rio Grande in the rugged Big Bend area, were responsible for apprehending 695 illegal aliens of the some 2,200 total apprehended in the Marfa Sector. Of this number, 239 illegal aliens were detected riding on freight trains attempting to get to the Fort Worth-Dallas, San Antonio, and other large metropolitan areas. The five stations were also responsible for arresting 22 of the 24 smugglers thus curtailing the activities before they were able to spread past the border area. Also Tidwell pointed out, the sector pilots flying their small observation crafts in the rugged terrain, were responsible for the detection of 185 illegal aliens.
