It Depends on How You Look At It!

The reactions of people to the flood warning sirens - like all other things - depend on how they look at it! You don't have to go back the second time to warn people who live in the low-lying part of Sanderson.

The alert that was sounded Friday of last week proved to be a false alarm - but better safe than sorry! The understood message that came to town was that a 10-foot wall of water was at Longfellow. This means trouble any way you look at it! The alarm was sounded and people responded by getting out.

The alarm system that we have works excellently - but what we need is an "all clear" to sound in case there is no immediate danger.

It has been tested and we have been told that water travels in this country at less than 8 miles per hour. The last high-water report before Friday of last week was from Longfellow and it was about four hours before the water got to Sanderson. So there is a lot of time if we have that kind of warning. And we should take advantage of that time to ascertain the reality of the danger, and its extent!

This logic and a possible answer was passed along to us Friday night.

One of the local radio-equipped vehicles could ascertain the apparent danger and radio back to town the appraisal of the situation, so that it could be definitely stated that there was high water on its way to town. This assertion could take no more than about 20 minutes if the report was from Longfellow, and this would still give lots of time to warn everyone and possibly eliminate any false alarms.

It seems that our gratitude for the rains should also include an expression of gratitude that the amount has not exceeded the capacity of the draws and creeks any more than it has, and that the loss has been no more than it has.

Ranchers in the area are finding it impossible to get to parts of their ranches, or even get away from the house on account of the rain and mud - and this is certainly a switch!

There are parts of the county have have reported up to 20 inches of rainfall during the past week.

Some heavy damage to parts of the county have been reported and mentioned in other columns of The Times.

We have expressed our appreciation for the fact that there has not been heavier damage from the rainfall. It is wonderful that locally the rains have caused very little run-off and the ground is just a little more than wet!

The rains have been wonderful - almost any way you look at it!

TEN DAYS OF RAIN!

Since Monday of last week, 5.56 inches of rainfall has been received in Sanderson, according to Ervin Grigsby, local rainfall official.

The readings are taken every morning at 8:00 o'clock, so that the total actually in-

cludes the rainfall of Sunday, Sept. 15, after 8:00 a.m.

Grigsby gave the daily readings as follows: Monday .08, Tuesday .63, Wednesday .44, Thursday .23, Friday .53, Saturday .66, Sunday 1.59, Monday .43, and Tuesday .97.

The total rainfall for the year is 16.50 inches, according to Grigsby's figures.

Several ranches in the central part of the county are reporting in the neighborhood of 15 inches of slow-falling rain during the past week.

All parts of the country have received beneficial amounts of moisture, according to all reports available, with some damage to water-gaps in some parts of the county, and very little run-off reported by others with no damage to water-gaps.

Word from the El Paso Natural Gas Plant is that about 20 inches of rainfall has been noted there during the past week.

Several feet of water is reported in the Joe Chandler Guest Ranch headquarters building and the residents there were all evacuated to higher ground. The bridge across Independence Creek on the highway was said to have been completely covered by water on two occasions, but the bridge was not damaged.

The bus from the gas plant was not able to get to town Friday because of the high water on that road.

High water has also been reported over Big Canyon bridge on US 285 between Sanderson and Fort Stockton, and over the highway in several places, but not stopping traffic for a very long period.

Eagles Win Over Nueces Canyon 41-19 Here Friday

The Sanderson High School Eagles won over the Nueces Canyon Panthers here Friday night by 41-19. It was the first win of the season for the Eagles. The Panthers are in their maiden year of Class B football, coming up from the 8-man line-up ranks.

The Panthers drew first blood. After taking the kickoff, their third play was good for a touchdown by Alfred Walker from the 2-yard mark. Their point-after-touchdown try was not good. Their second touchdown was late in the first period on a plunge from a foot out on the playing field by Leslie Kramer, the quarterback. A place-kick by Clyde Stevens was good to give the visitors 13 points.

The Eagles scored 14 points in the first period. Their first score was by Carlos Munoz from two yards out and Kendall Billings kicked the extra point. The second score was by Marvin Davis who returned a kick 80 yards. Billings tacked on the extra point.

In the second period, the Eagles scored 20 points. Frankie Flores ran over from the 6-yard mark, Davis threw a pass to Munoz good for 6 points and a 64-yard run, and Munoz was also good for the third score of the second period on a 32-yard run. Billings

County Buys Crawler Loader

Terrell County Commissioners bought a crawler-loader at their called meeting on Monday of this week. The meeting was for the purpose of opening bids and considering the bids on the equipment.

W.W. Sudduth, Austin Chriesman, and David Mitchell were the three commissioners present, and County Judge R.S. Wilkinson.

Treanor Equipment Co.'s bid of \$19,060 was the low bid and was accepted by the court. Other bids were \$20,500 by Tilson-Godsey, and \$24,000 by Plains Machinery Co.

The commissioners elected to not buy the canopy for the loader, which would have added \$915 to the price and was only a cover over the top, and not a cab.

The crawler-loader that has been used in precinct 3 for about 20 years was a trade-in consideration for the new piece of equipment.

Judge Wilkinson stated that the crawler-loader would also be used at the local trash dump.

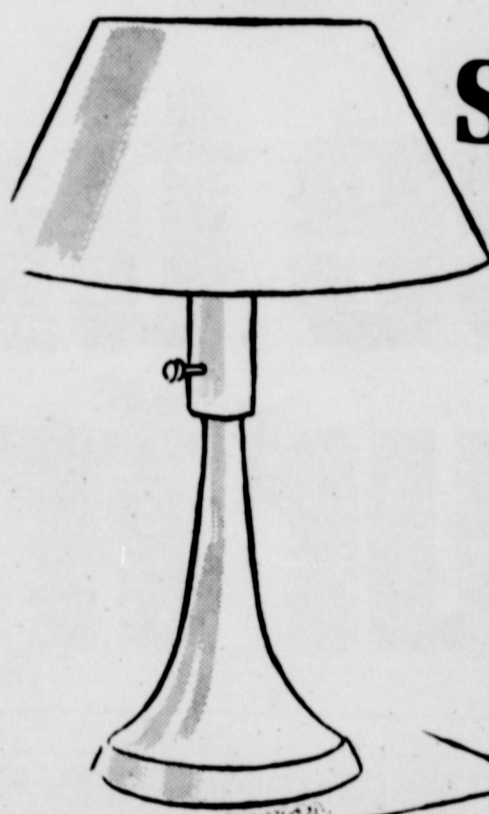
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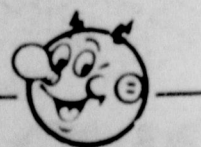

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Turner's Rotary Engine Written Popular Science

Frank Turner, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Turner of Odessa, and former residents of Odessa, recently had a new rotary auto engine written up in Popular Science magazine's August edition. Turner and his family now live in Graham. The new engine, which is said to be as efficient as a diesel and as smooth as a tank, may not even need a transmission, according to the article. Turner has built two more engines since the first one, both with improvements. According to the magazine, the number three engine is much more refined than engine number one. The engine is lighter in weight and a totally different concept than engines presently in automobiles. Turner has been granted audiences with big car makers, and some have promised to check out his engine as only they can. The future looks promising for the young inventor, according to the magazine article.

Income Changes SS Payments

People getting supplemental security income payments should promptly report changes in their other income to social security, according to Erven L. Fisher Jr., social security manager in Odessa, Texas. Supplemental security income payments have established a nationally uniform income floor for people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 and over or blind or disabled. "Increases or decreases in income may affect the amount of monthly supplemental security income payments," Fisher said. "People getting supplemental security income checks should report changes or expected changes in their wages, self-employment earnings, pension payments, and other income from any source except general increases in social security benefits." Changes can be reported by contacting any social security office. People getting supplemental security income checks should also promptly report change of address, marriage, separation, and any other cir-

cumstance that might affect their payments, according to Fisher.

The Federal supplemental security income program is run by the Social Security Administration. "But, supplemental security income payments are made from general revenues, not from social security contributions," said Fisher.

Referendum Vote By Sheepmen For Products Promotion

At a very critical period in its history, the sheep industry will decide whether or not to continue promotion of its products, lamb and wool and the industry itself, in a nationwide referendum called by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture for the period of November 4-15.

A special referendum committee has been formed under the sponsorship of the National Wool Growers Association and the National Lamb Feeders Association to inform the sheepmen throughout the country of what is at stake in the voting on promotion being conducted by the American Sheep Producers Council, headquartered in Denver, Colo. The committee is called the Sheep Producer/Lamb Feeder Referendum Committee with headquarters in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Ballots will be mailed to all sheep producers in the United States through the county or state ASCS offices before the two-week voting

period. All producers and feeders of lambs are eligible to vote if they have owned sheep or lambs six months old or older for at least 30 consecutive days during 1973.

All ballots must be returned to the local ASCS office or mailed in and postmarked no later than November 15. The promotion program can be continued through 1977 if two-thirds of the total number of producers voting or two-thirds of the total volume of production represented in the referendum approve the program.

The promotion program was originated in 1955 by sheep industry leaders to make the consumer aware of lamb and wool. Authorized under Section 708 of the National Wool Act, this self-help program has been the pattern for many other agricultural commodity programs. Now more than 1,200 agricultural commodities are promoted in the highly competitive market of food and fiber.


