A program of emergency conservation measures has been approved to assist ranchmen in the restoration of fences and other structures whih were damaged by flooding where excessive rain and run-off occurred in September 1974. S.D. Harrison, chairman, said the Terrell County ASC Service has received an initial allocation of \$25,000.00 to provide up to 80% cost-shares to eligible participants.

Unlike the regular conservation programs administered by ASCS, the emergency costshares may be paid for eligible practices even though the work has already been completed.

Persons who have completed restoration work and want to make application, have until February 6, 1975, to do so.

BOARD CLAIMS SAVING-A State Insurance Board report claims the board last fiscal year "saved" Texans \$5.7 million in benefits or returned premiums.

Insurance Commissioner Don Odum cited administrative action against 36 agents and 18 companies and 1,900 field investigations by the board license division.

Planned board reorganization will save \$250,000 in annual operating costs, the report stated. There were 1,705 insurance companies licensed to sell policies in Texas at the start of the current fiscal year.

1974-SAFER?-Vehicle accidents dropped six per cent last year below 1973, and 1974 may have been the safest year on record considering the traffic death rate per 100-million miles, according to the Department of Public Safety.



Increased the insurance on the superintendent's house, the junior high school building, the band building, and the new dressing rooms;


Accepted a bid of \$1961 on the International school bus advertised in The Times for the two previous weeks;

Rep. Krueger Offers Report

Bob Krueger, Member of Congress, 21st Dist. House of Representatives Washington, D.C. 20515

In this my first report to the District since it honored me by electing me its Representative, I want to comment on two things: the state of Congress and the state of the Union.

First, the state of the Congress. Some press reports have suggested that the large number of new members means that the new Congress will be "liberal". I disagree. Most of the new members come from basically conservative districts, like ours, and I doubt that those members campaigned in favor of big new spending programs. Further, I doubt that they will vote for such programs. Certainly I do not in-

What the new Congress has done, however, is to bring reforms and procedures that altered the seniority system. Now district with new congressmen have a chance of a more equal voice, so that they can be represented as effectively as the districts of long-time senior members. This change reflects democracy: all congressional districts should be equal and their need be no apology for these reforms. They will help the 21st District and the American system.

Second, the state of the Union. The President, in his address, said that the state of the Union "is not good". I disagree. Yes, we have problems: high inflation, deepening re-

cession, uncertainty about our national direction. But improvement lies within our power. We can work to control federal spending, and I will do so. We can give short-term, immediate tax relief to those most in need, as the President suggests, but we must always recognize that money spent today must be paid tomorrow, and I have strong reservations about the massive deficits that the President is asking for and that some in Congress will be willing to provide. The only way that I know to restore government to sound financial foot ing and to control inflation is to have the government live within its income. I will work for that, and I will work to find others to join me.

I hope to use these columns to give you a first-hand report from your Representative on events in Washington and I hope you will call on me for help with any particular prob-

West Texas Cattle 100 Years Ago

from the Alpine Avalanche

The cattle industry came to the Trans-Pecos country in the late 1870s and early 1880s when the overcrowding of areas in eastern Texas forced cattlemen to drive their herds west. In 1880, the Department of the Army became interested in the cattle in West Texas, and requested the Post Surgeon at Fort Davis to furnish a report on the health of the cattle in and near the Post. The following edited excerpts were taken from the report of Post Surgeon Harvey Brown dated July 1881. "There are very few cattle

here - and all or nearly all are young, having been driven here from elsewhere. The average age of the animals slaughtered at this post is 3-2/3 years. The oldest animal slaughtered was 5 years and the youngest 2 years. Of the animals slaughtered, the average weight of the liver was 10-1.5 lbs., and the average weight of the spleen was 2-1/4 lbs. The disease the cattle are most susceptible to is a curious disease produced by eating the 'astraguilia mollissimus'. The plant, called the yerba loca or mad weed is one of the first to make its appearance in the spring. If the animals once get a taste of it, they acquire an inordinate fondness for it and will neglect all other food to obtain it. The animals will eventually lose all of their hair, and grow weaker and weaker and finally die emaciated to an extreme."

spring was extremely offensive and often unfit to drink. Surgeon Brown reported that after he had "carefully investigated this phenomenon", he came to the conclusion "that it was due to the injection of the cucurbita", a species of gourd which is very common in the area. The surgeon regretted that he was unable to obtain any pertinent information relative to annual mortality of the animals, but that the herds were too small to furnish any such data. It is not known to what ex-

tent the Army made use of Surgeon Brown's report or whether it actually had an effect on the purchase of local beef by the Army. With the steady influx of cattlemen to the area, beef became more readily available to the troops stationed at Fort Davis, and as a result competition developed among local ranchers for the government contract to supply fresh beef to the Fort. In 1889, one such contractor, in order to insure his covered position, "provided himself with a patent refrigerator in which meat could be kept fresh and sweet for any reasonable time".

By 1891, the year Fort Davis was abandoned, the cattle industry had become firmly rooted in West Texas, and the quality and quantity of beef was far superior to what it has been just a decade earlier.

Texas State Teachers Association's executive committee voted to ask the organization's legislative committee to reconsider its request for \$8,200 a year starting pay for teach-

The panel narrowly defeated a motion to direct the legislative committee to ask the legislature for a starting \$12,-000 salary base. The beginning minimum is now \$6,000.

Texas Federation of Teachers, an AFL-CIO affiliate with growing membership in major cities, has offered a legislative program calling for a \$10,000 minimum.
