Noelke Wildcat Near Sheffield

SEPTEMBER 4, 1975

Wood & Locker, Inc., Midland, will drill the No. 1 H. C. Noelke Jr. Estate, a 9,500foot wildcat in Terrell County 10 miles southwest of Sheffield, 1-3/4 miles southsouthwest of Pennsylvanian detrital, South oil production and two miles south of Pennsylvanian gas production in the Yucca Butta field, and four miles west-northwest of the Allison (Pennsylvanian detrital gas) field, but separated by an 11,667-foot failure.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of Section 49, Block B2, CCSD& RGNG Survey. Ground elevation is said to be 2,708 feet.

The failure, Fred Tumer, Midland, No. 1 H. C. Noelke, was abandoned September 22, 1952, after testing through San Andres perforations at 2,608-23 feet. It recovered oil and gas-cut on a test at 10,236-274 feet and gas on tests at 9,065-121 feet, 9,818-903 feet and 11,292-328 feet.

The following tops were picked up on ground elevation of 2,685 feet: Strawn 9,072 feet, Mississippian 9,-952 feet, Woodford 9,492 feet, Devonian 9,606 feet, Fusselman 10,240 feet, and Ellenburger 11,299 feet.
