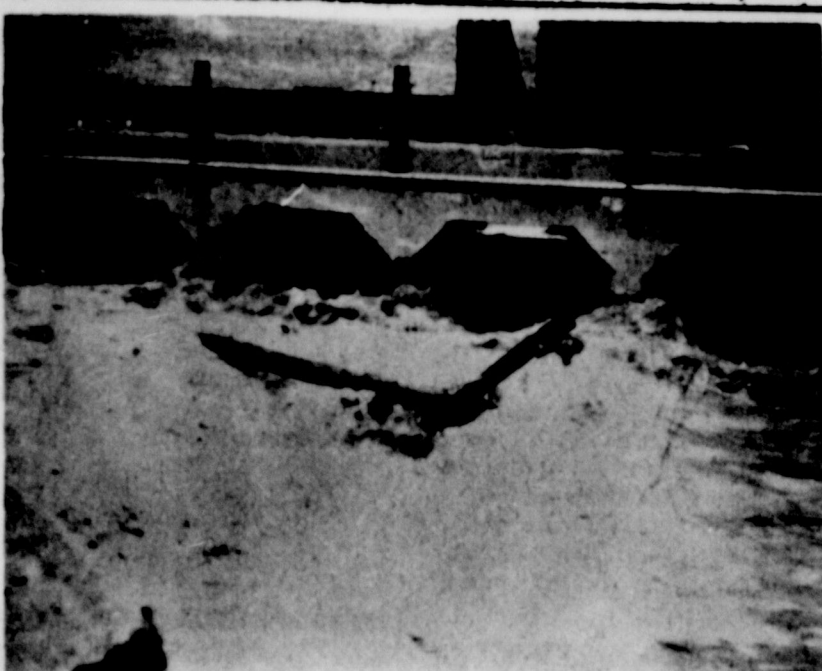
It Depends on How You Look At It!

We heard some interesting comments about the commissioners court deferring the dog control program. All of them were similar to: "Seems like if they have the authority to pass a dog control law they would have the authority to see it implemented properly!" There are laws and rules governing the capture, confining, and elimination of dogs, and those who see to the protection of dogs are about the same in number and fervor as those who protect eagles, coyotes, our ecology, etc. And any deviation from the required procedure for the capture, confinement, and elimination of dogs which is in violation of the laws should not be tolerated by - above all - the commissioners court - or any other laws!

Local residents expressed an unrest again Friday after the rains continued after daylight. Then some heard the flood alert announcement on the radio, and the unrest increased. Since we do not yet have assurance that we are going to have any flood control dams within the next 10 years, local people with some kind of authority are doing their best to see that local people do have ample warning in case of a flood. Watches are maintained throughout the water shed to know how the water is stacking up in the creek and how near a danger of flood is. It can be stated with some kind of positive assurance, that the water will be watched in the future to try to be able to warn local residents of approaching danger.

We have received some good natured and some sincere congratulations, as well as other kinds of remarks about our fishing adventures recently. We appreciate the concern and the interest expressed from everyone. Fishing is, as most fishermen will attest, a great sport! Rain Falls Over Most of County, 6 Inches Reported

Over six inches of rain was reported in some areas of Terrell County last weekend, with lesser amounts reported generally over the entire county.

Some ranches near Dryden reported the maximum amount mentioned above, running over 6-inch rain gauges.

North of Sanderson there was a deluge of rain Friday morning causing an electric utility pole to be washed out of the ground and interrupting electric service here for several hours.

Three-Mile Canyon had a heavy run-off Friday and local people were watching the run-off coming down Sanderson Canyon for the possibility of extensive flooding. There was none.

Local gauges all reported over three inches of rainfall. Ervin Grigsby, official rain gauger in Sanderson, had 2.58 inches at 8:00 a.m. Friday and .49 inches at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday, making a total of 3.07 inches total for the weekend.

Along with the turbulent weather, the arctic cold front that moved in Thursday night dropped temperatures to 52 degrees and it remained chilly and cloudy through Sunday night.

Wildcat Set On Appel Ranch

Chevron Oil Co. plans to drill No. 1 Albert Appel as a 1-1/8-mile southeast outpost to the one-well Downie (Ellenburger) field of Pecos County.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of section 9, Block R-3, GCESF Survey, 22 miles north of Sanderson. Planned depth is 24,000 feet.

It is also one-mile south of the firm's No. 1 Appel, which at last report was drilling below 18,411 feet on a 24,000-foot Ellenburger contract.

The Downie field opener was Coastal States Gas Producing Co. No. 1 C.R. Downie, which was completed July 24, 1973, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 53 million cubic feet of gas per day, through perforations at 21,300-22,268 feet.

Radiation Classes To Be Sept. 23-25

Use of radiation detection equipment by emergency personnel will be the subject of a 3-day Radiological Monitor School beginning September 23 in Sanderson under the sponsorship of the Division of Emergency Medical Services of the Department of Health Resources and the Terrell County Civil Defense Office.

The school will be in the county court room from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. each night. Further information may be obtained by contacting County Judge Charles Stavley, director of Terrell County Civil Defense.

It is expected that sheriff's department, ambulance drivers, and any other interested person will participate in the school.

New DA Named For This District

Appointment of Tully Shahan, 30, county attorney for Kinney County, as district attorney for the 63rd Judicial District was announced in Austin last week by Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

Shahan will take office Oct. 1, succeeding John F. Pettit of Del Rio, who will join the staff of Texas Secretary of State Mark White in Austin that date.

Shahan announced following his appointment that he will move to Del Rio and be ready to assume his duties Oct. 1 and serve until the next general election. He plans to be a candidate for district attorney at that time.

Shahan stated he plans to retain the entire staff assembled for the district attorney's offices in both Del Rio and Eagle Pass. He said he would attempt to make the transition "one of the smoothest ever."

The district includes Edwards, Kinney, Maverick, Terrell, and Val Verde Counties.

Born Jan. 31, 1945, in San Antonio, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J.T. "Happy" Shahan of Brackettville. His father is one of the best known promoters of the tourist and entertainment industries in Texas.

Young Shahan was graduated from Brackett High School in Brackettville in 1963. He received his bachelor of science degree from Texas A&M University and his doctor of jurisprudence degree from St. Mary's University in San Antonio.

He was admitted to the practice of law in September, 1972. The same year he was elected county attorney of Kinney County and assumed that office Jan. 1, 1973.

He is a member of the American Bar Association, the State Bar of Texas, and the Texas District and County Attorneys Association, of which he is a past director and presently secretary-treasurer.

Brackettville is a Class A school.

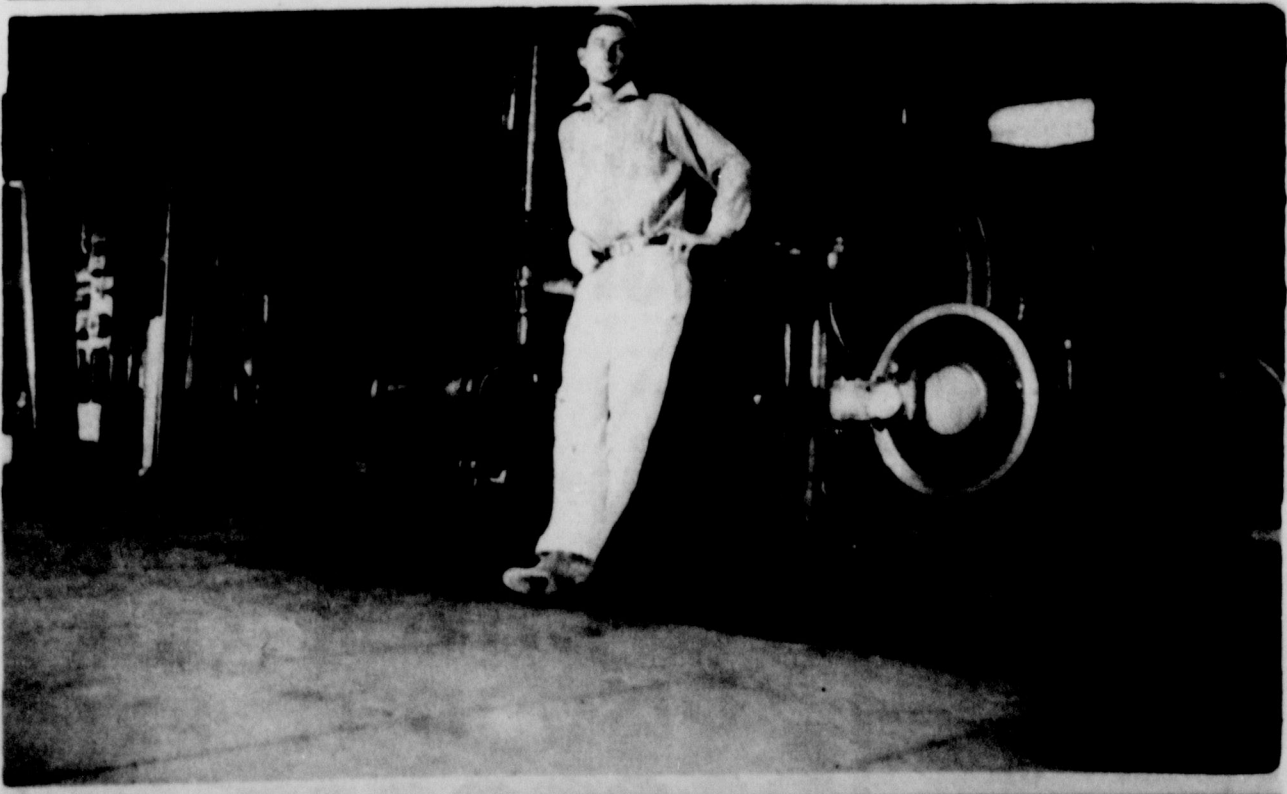

Terrell Prospect Tests Oil Flow

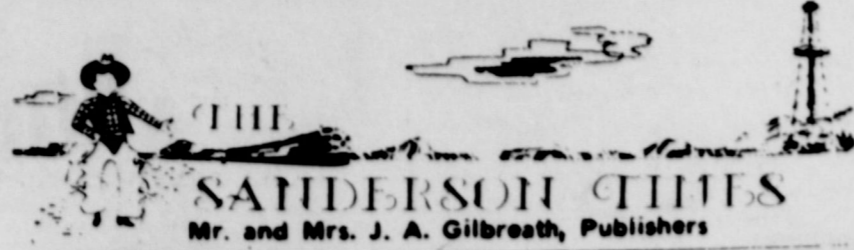
Mobil Oil Corp. No. 1 State-Mitchell, in section 30, Block 1, CCSDERPGNG, prospective Wolfcamp oil opener, one mile west of the Wolfcamp gas production in the KM (Wolfcamp and Ellenburger gas) field of Terrell County, 28 miles north-east of Sanderson, flowed 23 barrels of oil and 14 barrels of load water in 19 hours.

Flow was through an unreported choke and perforations at 6,270-296 feet. Operator was preparing to install a wellhead.

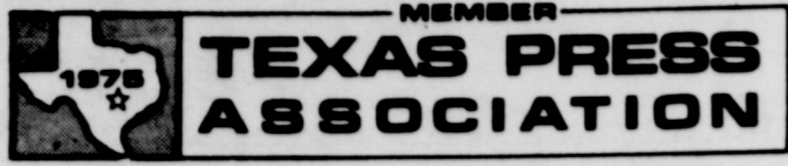

James Kerr, 47, Dies In Houston

James R. Kerr, 47, Fort Stockton attorney, died in Methodist Hospital in Houston Friday night after a two weeks' illness. After his illness had been diagnosed as encephalitis, he was flown from the Fort Stockton hospital to Houston and remained in a coma most of the time. The members of his immediate family were at his bedside there. Funeral mass was in St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Fort Stockton Tuesday at 2:00 p. m. Rosary mass was said on Monday night at 7:00 p. m. Burial was in Fort Stockton. Mr. Kerr, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joe Kerr Sr., was born in El Paso on September 27, 1927. He was reared and educated in Sanderson and was a Korean War veteran. He was married to Totsie

Adams of Fort Stockton October 2, 1954, and they had made their home there for the past several years following a short residence in Sanderson. Mr. Kerr was a member of the State Bar of Texas, past rector of the State Bar, American Bar Association, past president of the Trans-Pecos Bar, past president of the Fort Stockton Historical Society, rector of the Pecos County State Bank, Sigma Chi, graduate of the University of Texas and St. Mary's University School of Law, and was a member of the Fort Stockton Rotary Club and of the Catholic Church. Survivors include his wife; four daughters, Katherine Kerr a student at the University of Texas, Camille Kerr, Vicki Kerr, and Karen Kerr, all of Fort Stockton; three brothers, Joe Kerr Jr. of Del Rio, Campbell Kerr of Carrizo Springs, and Edward Kerr of Sanderson; a sister, Mrs. George Moberly of Midland.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS (S. J. R. NO. 11) SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1975

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:

Provide that the powers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly attached to either of the others.

Article III, The Legislature, is amended to:

Continue the present structure of the legislature consisting of a senate with 31 members and a house of representatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are continued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are continued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commission is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. The article provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and 90 days in even-numbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of three-fifths of the membership of each house. The legislature may meet in organizational sessions prior to the convening of the legislature in regular sessions.

Article IV, The Executive, is amended to:

Continue the present status of the governor and all other statewide officers, and include the commissioner of agriculture as an executive department officer. The governor is limited to two consecutive terms. The governor is authorized to designate chairmen of state boards, and to remove gubernatorial appointees to state agencies for cause unless the removal is vetoed by the senate. The article mandates the legislature to provide a new governor-elect an appropriation so the governor-elect may organize an office prior to inauguration, and permits the legislature to grant powers of fiscal control to the governor. All governmental agencies, with several exceptions, have a life of not more than ten years unless extended by the legislature, and, at the regular session held in

odd-numbered years, the governor shall submit to the legislature a report on the organization and efficiency of the executive branch.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the SEPARATION OF POWERS, LEGISLATIVE, AND EXECUTIVE PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective January 1, 1976, except Article III, Section 5, which becomes effective January 1, 1981.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the judiciary provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article V, The Judiciary is amended to:

Establish a unified judicial system consisting of the supreme court, court of appeals, district courts, and circuit courts. Existing county courts and county judges are continued until otherwise provided by law. All judges (except municipal judges), district attorneys and district clerks must be elected by the people. The supreme court and the court of criminal appeals are merged into a single court of last resort, and this supreme court is authorized to provide for efficient administration of the judicial system and to balance case loads. Individual rights for a trial by jury and appeal by the accused are continued. The state is granted the right to appeal in criminal cases in limited circumstances, and the legislature is permitted to establish methods of appeal to the courts from decisions of state agencies.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the JUDICIARY PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the voting and election provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VI, Voter Qualifications and Elections, is amended to:

Provide for registration and qualifications for voting including voter residency requirements to be established by law. A citizen of the United States who is at least 18 years of age and who meets the registration and residence requirements provided by law is a qualified voter unless the person has been convicted of a felony and for that felony is incarcerated, on parole, or on probation, or unless

the person is mentally incompetent as determined by a court. Voting by the people in all elections must be by secret ballot, and the legislature shall provide by law for residence, registration, and absentee voting requirements, for the administration of elections, and for the protection of the electoral process. The general election for state and county officers is to be held in even-numbered years on a date prescribed by law.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the VOTING AND ELECTION PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the education provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VII, Education, is amended to:

Provide that the Permanent and Available School Funds and the county public school funds are continued for the support of the free public schools. The State Board of Education is retained and the Permanent and Available University Funds are continued for the benefit of The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. A new Higher Education Fund for Texas is established for the benefit of colleges and universities outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. The state ad valorem tax of ten cents on \$100 valuation is continued as the source of revenue for the Fund. The ten cent higher education tax may be changed by law within the ten cent maximum. The legislature may allocate by law a portion of the Higher Education Fund to certain state vocational and technical institutes. The article provides that the public education system must furnish each individual an equal educational opportunity, but a school district may provide local enrichment of educational programs exceeding the level provided by the state consistent with general law. Authority to issue Permanent University Bonds is continued but the bonds may not exceed 30% of the Permanent University Fund.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the EDUCATION PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976, except Article VII, Section 9, which becomes effective January 1, 1979.

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the finance

provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VIII, Finance, is amended to:

Provide that state taxes may be levied and collected only by general law and to prohibit any state ad valorem tax on real property or tangible personal property except the ten cent tax provided for in Article VII and a tax of two cents on the \$100 assessed valuation to provide funds for the State Building Fund. Provides that all real property and tangible personal property must be taxed equally and uniformly in proportion to market value. Existing exemptions from ad valorem taxation are continued. The present dedication of motor fuel taxes for highway purposes and the Available School Fund is retained. The "pay-as-you-go" principle for the operation of state government is retained. The legislature shall establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of open-space land devoted to farm or ranch purposes and may establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of forest land devoted to timber production. The \$3000 exemption from state ad valorem taxation for residential homesteads is continued and the legislature by law may increase this amount. A separate \$3000 exemption from ad valorem taxation by political subdivisions is provided for the residential homestead of persons at least 65 years of age and the political subdivision may increase this amount. The legislature by law may exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property owned by veterans' organizations, non-profit water corporations, and persons in need because of age or disability, and economic circumstance. The legislature may also exempt property to preserve historical, cultural or natural history resources. Taxpayers are provided a new method of correcting inequitable tax assessments by paying ad valorem taxes under protest and suing for a refund in a district court. State debt may be authorized by law only if approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified voters of the state voting on the question. Public funds and public credit may be used only for public purposes and no public funds or public credit may be used to influence the election of a public officer. The article prohibits a retail sales tax on agricultural machinery or parts, fertilizer, feeds or seeds, prescription drugs or medicine, or food, except food sold by restaurants for immediate consumption. An assessment voted by marine food or agricultural producers on their product sales is not a tax if provision is made for the individual producer to receive a refund of the assessment when the producer does not desire to be assessed.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the FINANCE PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective on September 1, 1976, except Article VIII, Section 2, Subsections (b) and (c), which becomes effective January 1, 1978, and Article VIII, Section 6, Subsection(c), which becomes effective January 1, 1979.

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article IX, Local Government, is amended to:

Provide that the counties of the state are those that exist on the date of adoption of the local government article and that county boundaries may be changed if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. Counties may be merged or county seats relocated if approved by two-thirds of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. The present elected constitutional county offices are retained and four year terms of office are provided. The voters of a county may create additional offices, eliminate offices, or combine the duties and functions of offices. The voters may also grant ordinance making power to the governing body of the county. Cities and towns having more than 1,500 inhabitants may become home-rule cities. Tax limitations are established for operating purposes for cities and counties and the legislature is required to fix debt limits for cities, towns, counties, and school and community junior college districts.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the LOCAL GOVERNMENT PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective on September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the general provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article X, General Provisions, is amended to:

Provide the basic requirements relating to public officeholders such as the official oath and residency requirements. The provision defining the separate and community property of spouses is retained, and the protection of a homestead from forced sale is continued. The legislature is required to protect certain personal property from forced sale. Current wages for personal service are not

subject to garnishment. A private corporation may not be chartered except under general law, and no bank may engage in business at more than one place in this state. The legislature must provide for the regulation of bank holding companies. The present system of local-option elections for the prohibition or sale of alcoholic beverages is continued. The legislature is required to prohibit lotteries and gift enterprises but may permit certain bingo games and raffles. The presently existing provisions for retirement benefits of teachers and other public employees are modified to allow the state to contribute more than 10%. A policy that the quality of the environment of the State of Texas is to be protected is established, and the legislature is required to implement and enforce this policy. No state funds may be used to remove surface water from the river basin of origin if the surface water is necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable water requirements of the basin for the ensuing 50 years, unless the removal of water is sufficiently replaced to the point of removal from outside the state or is on a temporary, interim basis. The seaward beaches of the Gulf of Mexico and coastal submerged lands belonging to the state are held by the state in perpetual trust for the people, and subject to reasonable limitations prescribed by law, the public has the free and unrestricted right of use and benefit of the beaches. The provision is continued that, except as otherwise provided by law, a rate of interest in excess of ten percent a year is usurious, and that if a contract does not specify a rate of interest, the rate under the contract may not exceed six percent a year. Discrimination against handicapped persons is prohibited, and a goal of the state is established to provide every resident access to adequate, comprehensive health care.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the GENERAL PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the mode of amending provisions of the Texas Constitution. The proposed article will be the last article of the constitution. If only Proposition No. 8 is adopted, the article will replace Article XVII of the present constitution. If other propositions are adopted, the article will be appropriately renumbered to remain the last article of the constitution. If all propositions

The question of whether to call a constitutional convention must be submitted to the people every 30 years.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

The constitutional amendment revising the MODE OF AMENDING PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN—A big state land trade has been proposed to obtain a scenic new park on 30-mile-long Matagorda Island.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong suggested the swap of 18,000 acres of state-owned land near Fort Bliss in El Paso County for the federally-owned share of the island.

A joint House-Senate committee unanimously decided the state should own the island which lies south of Port Lavaca.

The U. S. Air Force has decided it will not continue use of Matagorda as a bombing range, but the U. S. Interior Department wants it as additional refuge for the whooping crane.

Armstrong said Matagorda offers among the best sports fishing and hunting in the country, and it is within easy auto range of Houston, San Antonio and Corpus Christi citizens.

Matagorda's beach is growing rather than expanding, the committee was told.

Federal holdings on the island total nearly 19,000 acres. The state owns 16,369 acres and private interests 15,570 acres.

Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Pearce Johnson questioned wisdom of the trade, however.

Rates Set

The State Insurance Board has set medical malpractice rates in the state's assigned risk pool 40 per cent lower than the industry asked for. Doctors insured through the risk-sharing pool will pay 18 to 20 per cent more than the highest rates charged by companies writing insurance voluntarily.

New rates for the Texas Medical Liability Insurance Underwriting Association (JUA) will cover physicians, surgeons, hospitals, podiatrists and nurse anesthetists who cannot obtain profession insurance on the open market.

The Board asked JUA to re-submit its rate filings, terming those first submitted excessive.

Base premiums for \$100,000/\$300,000 limits for non-surgical physicians in Harris County were set at \$1,800 and at \$1,200 for the same class of physicians in the rest of the state.

Rates were adopted for more than 30 classes of physicians and surgeons including doctors normally classified as "high risks."

Neurosurgeons and orthopedic surgeons will pay highest premiums—\$14,000 in Harris County and \$9,600 in the rest of the state. Harris County plastic

surgeons will pay \$10,800, those in other areas \$7,200.

Hospital rates are \$420 per bed plus \$42 for ever 100 out-patient visits.

Constitution Aired

Secretary of State Mark White announced a program to encourage voter registration for the November 4 constitutional revision election.

White also said an all-out effort will be launched to encourage voters to study the proposed document.

Proponents and opponents of revision will outline their views at a conference sponsored by Texas Press Association, Texas Daily Newspaper Association and Texas Association of Broadcasters here Sept. 19.

Public Welfare to assist in licensing responsibilities, Atty. Gen. John Hill held. In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

- Texas Student Publications at The University of Texas is no longer a legal entity and cannot hire an attorney without regents' approval.

- Temporary and part-time state employees accrue sick leave, but leave for the part-timers is acquired on a proportionate basis.

- The Employees Retirement System of Texas may grant credit for service as a county attorney to a qualified member of the System.

- The Teacher Retirement System can purchase insurance for liability under the Texas Tort Claims Act. Insurance for the System's building, contents and papers may also be purchased, but workmen's compensation coverage may not be.

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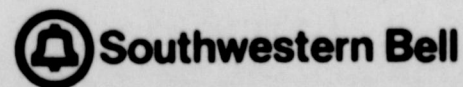

New Voters Need To Register Prior To October 3

Secretary of State Mark White reminded Texans that the deadline for filing new voter registrations for the upcoming Constitutional election is October 3, 1975.

In a statement issued from his Capitol office, White said: "As the state's chief election official, I sincerely urge you to participate in the electoral process. Your vote is your voice in government and it is your right and privilege to cast your vote."

"Bilingual instructions and forms are provided with each voter guide now being mailed to all postal patrons in Texas. When you receive the proposed charger, read the inside back cover carefully. If you have voted in Texas in the primary or general election of 1972, or any time since then, you do not need to re-register before October 3," White said.

Many county tax assessor-collectors are receiving dual registrations due to this provision in the law. White added many citizens have applied prior to receiving the Constitution's material and are re-registering unnecessarily. They will receive voting certificates by mail in the near future, he said.

If ultra light tackle is used no weight is necessary. In trolling, the distance of the weight from the lure can be from 18" to 36". This gives a slightly deeper running action. However, the lure sometimes produces better without the split shot, depending on desired depth. Vary retrieve or trolling speed until proper swimming action is observed (a rapid minnow-like swimming action). This method is equally effective for day or night fishing.

DEEP WATER JIGGED OR SLOW TROLLED METHOD

Extremely effective for Walleyes and Bass in deep water. Use various size sinkers to obtain proper depth. To jig, let weight fully rest on bottom, pick up all slack in line and jig lure 15" to 18" by snapping rod tip. Let weight settle back to bottom and repeat. The floating lure will stay off bottom at all times. It is extremely important to attach the lure to the lightest possible monofilament that conditions allow.

Note: Attaching Rapala Lures to Line

We suggest you tie directly to a monofilament line. For trolling, using a jam or loop knot. For casting, use a lock snap or loop knot. Leaders are not recommended.
