\$5,000 Goal Made In Park-Pool Need

The goal of \$5,000.00 to complete a \$20,000.00 asking to match state funds to begin the Terrell County Bicentennial Park-Pool has been reached, according to County Judge Charles Stavley. He expressed extreme gratitude for the help and cooperation that he had received from both workers and donors toward the project.

Judge Stavley stated that he felt the project was one that was sorely needed for the recreation and benefit of the young people, particularly, of the county, and he felt that they would demonstrate maturity in their efforts to get the project started and working satisfactorily for all concerned. The project puts before the people of the county their sole source of entertainment of a public nature, other than television reception, which is generally considered a private entertainment. The park and pool could be a source of much pleasure for young and old alike in the facilities that are planned there.

Application has been made for a grant of \$20,000 matching funds from the Texas Parks and Recreation Department and upon approval of the grant the money can be used to obtain the land for the park and pool and have some funds for the clearing of the land and preparing its use for further development. The county, o sides the \$15,000.00 toward the matching-funds asking, has authorized or set aside approximately \$23,000.00 in revenue sharing funds toward development of the park's facilities.

It has been previously pointed out that since the grant was available, that revenue sharing funds could not be used to match an amount granted by a state agency, since the revenue sharing fund was also a grant to the county. But revenue sharing funds can be used in other areas of the park's de-

velopment and improvement.
The \$5,000.00 mentioned in
the story above was raised by
public contributions in a can-

vass of all houses in Sanderson by workers, through a big bake sale, and contributions from clubs and organizations and individuals.

Court Action On Monday Is Lengthy

The Terrell County Commissioners Court had almost an all-day session Monday and disposed of all matters on the agenda except one, which they kept under consideration - the granting of the use of the Dryden air strip for training Baptist missionaries. The missionaries would be at the air strip primarily for training as pilots but during their stay here, other training would also be given the group during the time they were not being given pilot training, according to an explanation given by the representative of the group that was here to answer questions. The group would, according to the representative, build some buildings, maintain them and the air strip in exchange for the privilege of its use, their use not restricting the use of the strip to that group only for take offs and landings.

Other business conducted by the commissioners included: Read minutes of previous meeting;

Authorized the payment of bill presented;

Voted to proceed with the condemnation proceedings of the land required for floodwater retardant structure #7 and related works for Sanderson Canyon Watershed, access road and all other land needed for this site and to make and enter all necessary and proper orders thereon, and employ and provide for compensation for lawyers, and to authorize and empower them to proceed to acquire the land rights need ed for site #7 including the institution and prosecution to the completion of condemnation proceedings and any other matters reasonably related thereto;

Signed an option contract on the Bicentennial Park-Pool land;

Approved having radiators in the courthouse worked on before winter;

Approved hiring a dump ground supervisor for 40 hours a week. The commissioners, in compliance with state laws, will keep the dump ground open for 40 hours a week and the supervisor will designate areas where trash and refuse will be dumped and collect a fee for dumping of trash or garbage other than by county vehicles;

Approved the oil tax roll; Approved the bid submitted by Dudley Motors for a new dump truck for Precinct #2 and payment for the truck out of Tax Revenue funds. Only one bid was submitted.

Approved the purchase of a sprayer from Ector County; Authorized County Judge Charles Stavley to seek the best return investment of funds in the "Highway" coffers and re-invest those funds;

Approved advertising for bids on television service for the eastern part of the county; Approved repairs on repose

Approved the recommendations of Ray Siegmund, District Agent, in the hiring of a county agent for Terrell County and were introduced to Ellis Helmers of Girvin. A resume of the qualifications of Mr. Helmers was given by Sieg-mund and following a brief interview by the commissioners, Helmers was hired as county agent effective October 21, 1975, with a county-financed salary of \$3,600.00 a year. He will receive other remuneration from the state. Other information about Mr. Helmers is in another story in The





Amendment No. 2 Resume Is Given

The Number 2 proposition in the election on November 4 concerning a proposed new constitution for Texas covers the state judiciary.

The revision continues the present system of county courts and county judges, provides for the election of district judges, district clerks, and district attorneys and protects the individual rights to a trial by jury and appeal by the accused.

New provisions, however, establish a unified judiciary system including the supreme court, the court of appeals, district courts, and circuit courts and gives the state supreme court administrative authority over the entire system. In the unified system, the criminal court of criminal appeals would be merged with the supreme court.

It also provides that intermediate appeal courts would have jurisdiction in both civil and criminal cases where as in the past the jurisdiction was divided.

Through the revision, the state also is given a limited right of appeal in criminal cases involving the state constitution.

If the provision is approved, the legislature, for the first time, would be able to determine the number of judges

Those in favor of the proposition say the revision would coordinate, unify, streamline, and modernize the state's judicial system. They contend that the result would be an elimination of long court delays, a reduction in work loads and a subsequent decrease in taxes.

Opponents contend that by giving the supreme court total administrative authority over the system, the chief justice could become a virtual dictator, able to switch justices from place to place and therefore thwarting the will of the people by re-assigning duly-elected judges.

Proposition Number 2, concerning the revision of the judicial system can be accepted or rejected by the voters on November 4.



AUSTIN — Insurance made news again, as the State Insurance Board hiked rates for homeowners coverage effective February

Board staffers a week earlier recommended an average 17 per cent increase statewide in auto insurance premiums.

The Board-approved homeowners' rates will increase at an average of 8.3 per cent, fire insurance rates on homes 7.9 per cent for single-year policies and 14 per cent on three-year policies.

Rates were far less than those requested by the insurance industry.

Homeowners policy rates and extended coverage (storms, hail, riots, accidents, etc), vary by ter ritories.

Homeowners' rates for average residences would increase as follows:

Seacoast, 7.6 per cent.
Central, 7.6 per cent.

- North-Northwest, 12 per cent.

Rate on a \$35,000 brick veneer home in Galveston will go up from \$940 to \$1,021 for a three-year homeowners policy. The same type home in Houston would see a rate increase from \$814 to \$886, in Austin from \$654 to \$714 and in Lubbock from \$1,137 to \$1,283

Amount of the annual increase on the same home would be \$17 in Galveston, \$24 in Houston, \$20 in Austin and \$49 in Lubbock.

Lands Leased

Oil and gas exploration firms bid cash bonus payments of more than \$3.4 million on 91,000 acres of state land at a recent lease sale.

Most bidding activity was concentrated on state submerged tracts located in Texas bays. More than \$2.1 million of the total was put up for leases on 55,383 acres in the bay tracts.

Inexco Oil Company bid more than \$600,000 for 13 tracts, Monsanto \$377,609 for 11 tracts, Houston Oil and Minerals Corp. \$338,381 for 11 tracts and Exxon, \$200,004 for 12 tracts.

Highest single bonus bid of \$117,936 was made by Kilroy Company of Texas for a Gulf of Mexico tract in Jefferson County.

Courts Speak

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed a murder conviction in a Rio Grande Valley case because of improper arguments by a prosecutor but didn't rule on a challenge of constitutionality of the death penalty law.

The State Supreme Court refused to interfere with a lower court order transferring a Houston utility rate controversy outside the company's service area.

Third Court of Civil Appeals told The University of Texas it owes a construction company \$850,000 in a breach of contract suit.
