Cold Front Hits Area, Some Rain

The promised cold front moved into this area Friday night and dropped the temperatures several degrees and brought some more moisture to the area. Light showers and a mist fell almost constantly from daylight Saturday until dark, with the dampness and wind adding to the chill factor.

Saturday was the first real wintry day of the year. Temperatures during the night Friday and Saturday were well above freezing, but the cloudy, wet, chilly day was a true heralding of the winter weather ahead.

The moisture that fell locally was said to be general in scope over most all of the area.

Sunday dawned warm and cloudless, and there was some fog covering over parts of the county Monday and Tuesday mornings, burning off soon in the mid-morning.

There has been excessively heavy dew for the past several days.

The work was authorized by the Commissioners' Court.

Terrell Prospect Making Oil, Pecos Well Near Line

Wood & Locker, Inc., Midland, No. 1 H.C. Noelke Jr., Estate, in 49-B2-CCSD&RGNG Terrell County Atoka prospect, 10 miles southwest of Sheffield, 1 3/4 miles south-southwest of Pennsylvania detrital South oil and two miles south of Pennsylvaniaian gas production in the Yucca Butte field and four miles west-northwest of the Allison (Pennsylvaniaian detrital gas) field, but separated by an 11,667-foot failure, swabbed eight barrels of oil, no water, in a unreported time.

Recovery was through perforations at 9,370-380 feet.

Earlier, it swabbed three barrels of distillate and three barrels of oil and 11 barrels of acid water in an unreported time, recovering oil at the rate of a 1/2 barrel per hour and flaring gas during the last five hours of the test.

Testing continued.

Third Ellenburger oil producer and a 3/8 mile northeast extension to that pay was indicated in the Yucca Butte, West (Strawn gas and Ellenburger oil and gas) field of Pecos County, with the recovery of 2,882 feet of gas-cut oil, along with 1,028 feet of water blanket, on a drill-stem test. Texas Oil & Gas Corp. No. 1-63 Canon, in 63-A2-TCRR, seven miles west of Sheffield.

Tool was open an unreported time on the test taken at 10,844-951 feet. Recovery from the sample chamber was 3.75 cubic feet of gas, 650 cubic centimeters of oil and 800 cubic centimeters of drilling fluid.

Flowing pressure was 847-1,451 pounds; 60-minute initial shut-in pressure, 4,521 pounds; and 120-minute final shut-in pressure, 4,431 pounds.

The project was bottomed at 11,018 feet, logging.

Voting Places For Tuesday Told

Qualified voters in Terrell County and the state will have the opportunity to accept or reject parts or all of a new Constitution for the state on Tuesday of next week. The proposed Constitution of Texas, divided into eight propositions, are all up for consideration by the voting public.

Voting will be from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Residents of precinct 1 will vote at the courthouse, precinct 2a voters will vote at the old school storage building on the corner of Fifth St. and Pine St.; residents of 2b will vote at the United Methodist Church in Dryden; precinct 3 voters will vote at the elementary school; precinct 4a voters will vote at the house north of St. James Catholic Church-the office of Justice of Peace W.G. Shoemaker; and voters in precinct 4b will vote at the recreation hall at the El Paso Natural Gas plant.

The only information publicized dividing precincts 2a-2b and 4a-4b are that the 2a and 4a voters are residents in the town of Sanderson and 2b and 4b voters are all those voters not residing in Sanderson, but residing in precincts 2 and 4.

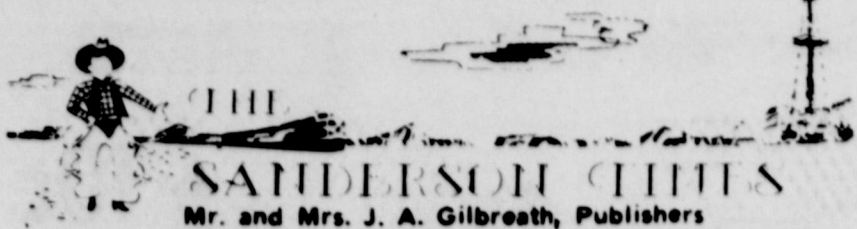

Monsanto Co. has filed an amended application for its No. 2 Bernice, previously slated stepout in the Yucca Butte West (Ellenburger) field of Pecos County. Contract depth has been amended to 11,000 feet, sufficient to test the Ellenburger. Previously scheduled depth was 9,500 feet.

Location is 900 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of section 58, block A-2, TCRR survey, 11 miles west of Sheffield.

A 1/2-mile southeast stepout to Ellenburger production has been staked in the Yucca Butte, West multipay field of Pecos County, about 11 miles west of Sheffield. The field has two wells.

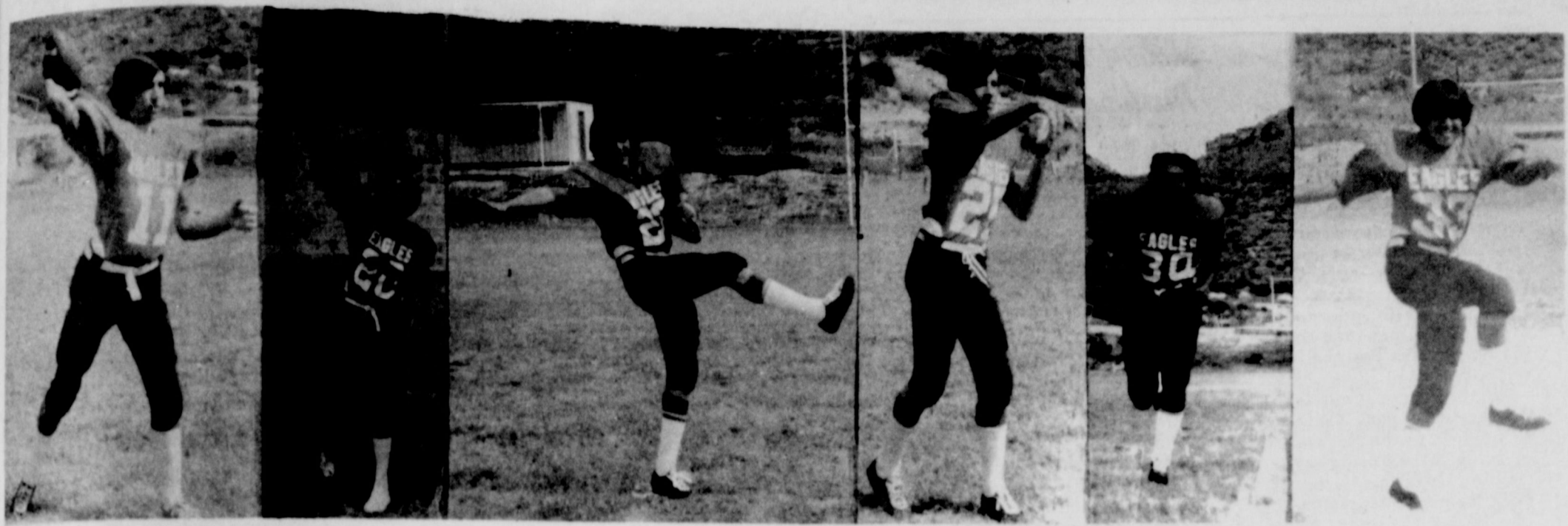

Women Eligible For SS Benefits

Many women are unaware of the benefits their social security taxes provide for them and their families. Since 1975 has been designated as International Women's Year, this is an especially good time to advise women that the benefits provided for them and their children are essentially the same as those provided for the man of the house.

This has not always been true in past years. However, Congress has recognized many women now work outside of their homes and in many cases are the major or sole source of support for their children. If a working mother becomes unable to work, she and her children now can receive monthly benefits on her work record regardless of whether or not the father is working and supporting the children, according to information received from the Odessa Social Security office.

In the past, if a mother died and left eligible children, they could not receive benefits on her account unless she had worked at least half of the time out of the last 3 years before her death or was furnishing their support. Now they can draw on her account without this requirement. There was no provision in the law to pay benefits to the surviving father with minor children in his care. However, the surviving mother with minor children in her care has always qualified for monthly benefits. Due to a recent supreme court decision, the surviving father can now receive monthly benefits on his wife's work.

Many women have the idea that there isn't any advantage to them in paying social security taxes. However, the two preceding examples should lay this idea to rest. In addition, when a working woman retires she will receive a larger retirement payment on her own work record than she would be able to receive if she was just eligible as a wife on her husband's account.

Clocks Moved Back 1 Hour Last Sunday

Clocks across most of the nation were set back an hour on Sunday of last week, ending eight months of Daylight Saving Time. Regular time will be observed for six months unless the U.S. Congress agrees to a recommendation made by the Department of Transportation to observe only four months of regular time and eight months of Daylight Saving Time. During the past two years, the nation has been on an experimental schedule of eight months daylight, four months standard time. The legislation setting up the experiment has expired and unless Congress passes a new bill, the nation will revert to the old schedule of six months and six months. Citizens of the nation can expect to change their watches and clocks either the last Sunday in February or the last Sunday in April of 1976, pending action, or the lack of it, by the nation's legislature.

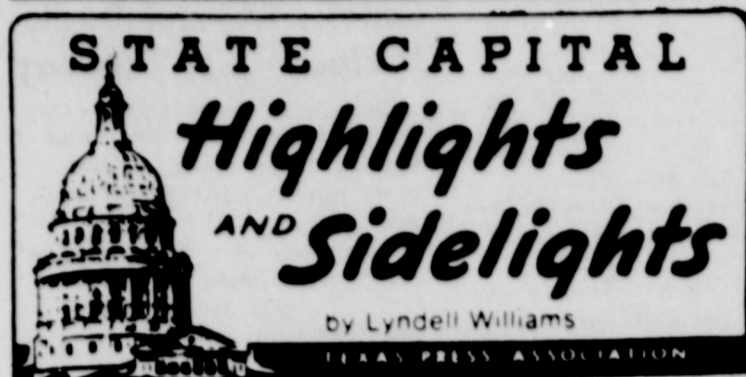

AUSTIN — Texas Supreme Court has agreed to hear a case involving extent of the Governor's veto power and a multimillion dollar higher education construction program.

The High Court November 5 will listen to arguments in the suit brought by Austin architectural firm Jessen Associates Inc. against Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock refused to approve payment of a \$2,590 fee to the architects for cost studies on a \$10 million addition to The University of Texas law school.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe this year vetoed riders to the new state appropriations bill which sought to give prior legislative authorization to millions of dollars in university construction.

Briscoe cited a 1975 law which required that such projects have approval of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

Attorneys for Jessen said court guidance is necessary to settle the issues for state officials and governing boards of all state universities.

Debate Rages On

Voter interest in the great debate over a new state constitution doesn't match that of ardent proponents and opponents.

Checks with key election officials over the state indicate a low turnout in the November 4 constitutional revision election, unless there is a dramatic pickup in citizens' concern during the last week of the blistering campaign.

Oil Allowable Set

For the 44th month, the Texas Railroad Commission set the oil allowable for November at a wide-open 100 per cent.

Production is running an average of 113,047 barrels daily less than in 1974. Imports averaged nearly 4.6 million barrels a day, during a recent four weeks' period, which amounts to an increase of 824,000 barrels from early this year.

As a waste control measure, allowable for the East Texas field was limited to 86 per cent production.

Beach Force Named

Atty. Gen. John Hill appointed a "Beach Task Force" of five assistants to work with coastal county officials to assure open, clean and safe beaches.

Hill said his office is making a detailed survey of environmental protection needs on the Texas coast.

The five assistant attorneys general will be assigned to Jefferson and Chambers counties; Gal-

veston county; Brazoria and Matagorda counties; Calhoun, Aransas, San Patricio and Nueces counties, and Willacy, Cameron, Kleberg and Kennedy counties. Attorneys from the Environmental Protection Division staff in Austin, Houston, San Antonio and McAllen will also be involved.

Session Feared

House Speaker Bill Clayton said banning school fees may cause a special legislative session.

Clayton referred to a recent attorney general's opinion that schools cannot require students to pay fees for driver education, workbooks, lab materials, band uniforms and other items unless the legislature authorizes the charges.

"This will put some of our school districts in a financial bind, and we may need a special session to help them out," the speaker said. "But I hope they can make it until 1977."

Clayton emphasized he is not "beating the drums for a special session."

Courts Speak

Only landowners who show 51 per cent of their income comes from farming or ranching are entitled to a constitutional agricultural tax exemption, the Supreme Court held.

Court of Criminal Appeals overruled a district court's order setting bail at \$75,000 for an Odessa man accused of killing his ex-wife.

The Supreme Court upheld a damage award to a Houston man who had money taken from his account by a bank to cover a loss from a forger's having signed his name on the back of a check.

The High Court affirmed a \$205,095 medical malpractice award to a Jasper man. In another malpractice suit, the Court upheld lower court rulings which rejected a charity patient's suit against three Houston doctors.

An Austin widow's suit claiming her husband's fatal heart attack was the result of shock from losing his city job was rejected by the Supreme Court, deny-

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ing the workman's compensation benefits.

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Report of BOB KRUEGER U.S. Representative

Last weekend I had the opportunity to visit with constituents across the district and talk with them about their concerns. One of the repeated concerns expressed was "What can be done to protect our older citizens in this time of high prices and unemployment?"

There are two activities in the District that are addressing these problems particularly well. One is in San Antonio where the Foster Grandparents Program got its start. This program uses federal funds to pay the minimum hourly wage to retired or unemployed older citizens who work with young people who do not have much

opportunity for contact with adults. Many children come from families where only one parent lives at home. These children have a particular need for guidance and examples from adults. Through the Foster Grandparents Program they do have that chance. Some Foster Grandparents visit children who are sick in hospitals, others engage in recreational programs with them, still others help with hobbies or their work at school. In many cases, what they do is less important than the fact that they are doing something together and that the children can assess their own growth by the examples of their elders. The town of Kerrville also has a center for the elderly of which that town is very proud. "Dietert Claim" provides numerous services for the elderly.

Dietert Claim is an organization of older citizens who work together to assist one another and to provide services for themselves and for the community. On a plot of land given by the Dietert family is a recreation center for older citizens from Kerrville and the surrounding area. These citizens find assistance there for their needs in transportation, a meals-on-wheels program, and recreation. While I visited with their members, their choir was singing patriotic songs of which they have done a recording. The group was begun out of local stimulus and of substantial local and state participation and planning. The federal role is minor and the sense of shared commitment and of self-direction which the members of the group enjoy has prevented the program from becoming impersonal and distant in the way that many federal programs can.

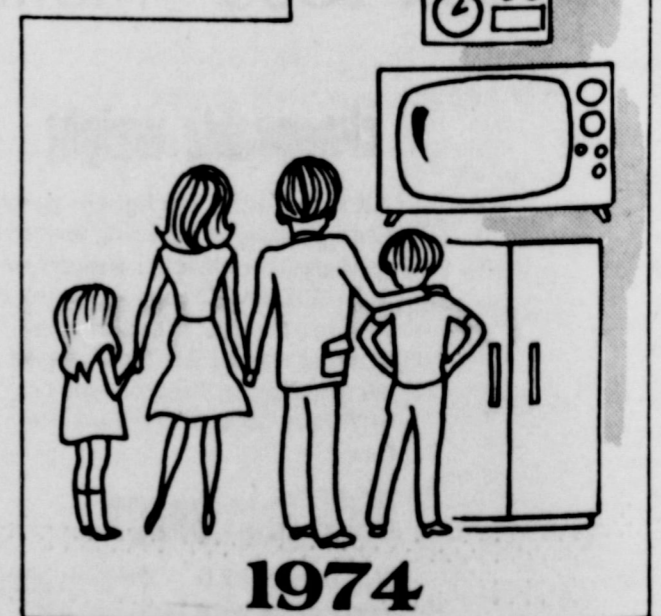
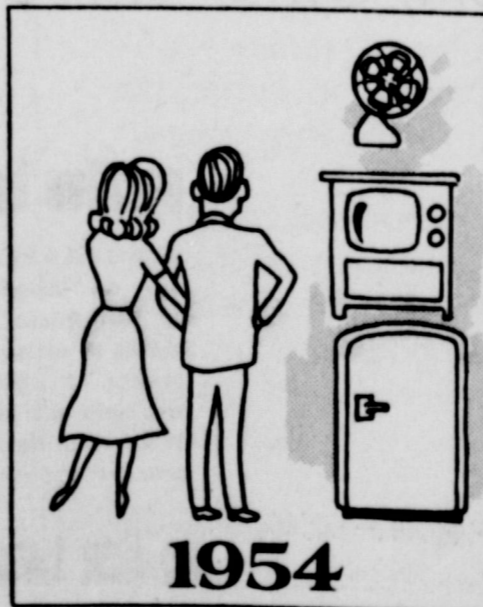
