## Mobile Church Visits Episcopalians

A modern circuit-riding ministry has been established by Rev. Bob Burton of Van Horn, an Episcopalian priest.

Rev. Burton has a goose-neck trailer that has been designed and modified as a sanctuary for church services to accommodate 14 worshipers at a time. The trailer also serves as "some sort of living quarters" for Rev. Burton in his travels.

The trailer and Rev. Burton will be in Sanderson Tuesday, December 9, parked near the First Presbyterian Church. The purpose of the visit of the mobile sanctuary here at that time, according to Rev. Burton, is to have Holy Communion, which is open to all who wish to participate and worship in this way at this time.

The service will be at 7:00 p.m.

The traveling church is to take the gospel of Jesus to the Episcopalians and interested people of the area that is not served by a resident priest in an established congregation. Rev. Burton visits Fort Davis, Sanderson, Balmorea, Study Butte, Rio Grande Village, Presidio, and Marathon.

The mobile sanctuary makes a visit about once a month to each of the communities and worship and participation in the services is not restricted to members of that denomination, according to Rev. Burton, who extended a cordial invitation to any interested person to come by and visit with him during "a stop" or to attend any of the services.

## Oil Producer Near County Line

An oil producer was completed recently near the Terrell County line. The Yucca Butte, West multipay field, gained a third Ellenburger oil producer and 3/8-mile north-east extension to that pay with completion of Texas Oil and Gas Corp. Midland, No. 1-63 Canon, seven miles west of Sheffield, for 245.64 barrels of 35 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 60S-1.

Production was said to be through an unreported choke and perforations at 10,867-848 feet, which had been acidized with 2,250 gallons, according to a story in the San Angelo Standard-Times.

The hole was drilled to 11,018 feet with 5-1/2-inch casing at that depth it is plugged back to 10,982 feet. Location is 660 feet from the south and 12,253 feet from the west lines of 63-A2-TCFR in Pecos County.

## Extension Of Black-Top On County Road

The road between FM2400 north toward Bakersfield will be extended 3.8 miles to the southwest with blacktop, according to information received last weekend by The Times.

Estimated cost of the project will be \$60,500, according to the news release from the Texas Highway Department.

The extension will be from the Pecos County line to the southwest.

Terrell County Judge Charles Stavley left the first of the week for Austin to attend a seminar for county judges. The meetings will conclude Friday.

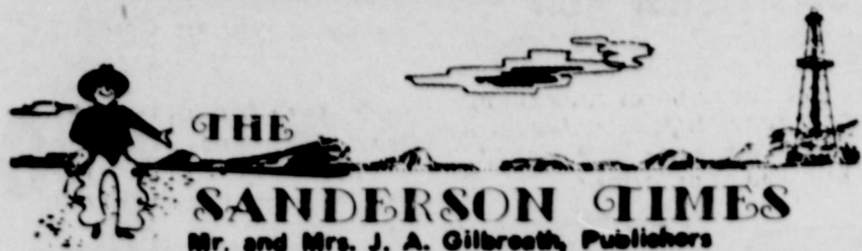
Judge Stavley stated that he was one of 125 county judges to be selected for the seminar which will take up many phases of the obligations and duties of county judges.

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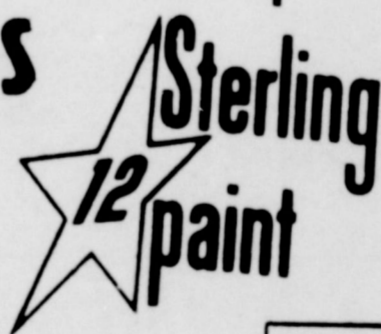

#### Report of BOB KRUEGER U.S. Representative

This week the Senate passed a natural gas bill jointly sponsored by Senator Bentsen of Texas and Senator Pearson of Kansas. The bill offers a sound approach to the nations' impending natural gas short-term prices and long-term problems. I therefore introduced an identical bill in the House of Representatives and will work in subcommittee, full committee and on the floor for its passage.

The bill recognizes the basic injustice of having two markedly different prices for the same product. Currently the price of interstate natural gas (gas transported across a state line) is regulated by the Federal Power Commission at 52¢ per thousand cubic foot. The price of intra-state gas (gas produced and consumed within the same state) is however not regulated by the federal government. Some years ago when natural gas was abundant and was essentially considered to be a byproduct of oil and to be of little value, the price was cheap everywhere and was cheaper in intrastate than in interstate markets. Today the situation has changed.

Before World War II, less than 5% of our nation's energy came from gas. Today, 30% of it does. Its use grew because it is the cleanest, most easily transportable fuel that we have.

But its very qualities naturally mean that more people will want it and just as supply will follow demand, so does price follow demand. As more people wish to buy, the price naturally rises.

In the last few years, the price of intrastate gas has risen higher than that of interstate gas. Those of us living in the San Antonio area are paying particularly high prices for gas because our suppliers did not have sufficient reserves to meet our needs. The higher price paid in Texas for gas has meant that we are able to have adequate supplies whereas there will be a short fall of 10-20% of natural gas in many states this winter. People will be put out of jobs in other states and as factories have to shut down because of inadequate supplies of gas, it is not hard to understand that those states which can pay only 52¢ per thousand cubic foot for gas will have less than those states like Texas which now pay about \$1.60 per thousand cubic foot for the new

gas contracts assigned for future years.

The bill which I am introducing will require other states to pay as much for gas produced onshore in the United States in the interstate markets as is paid in the intrastate market. And over a period of time, offshore gas will also be sold to those states at market prices rather than at federally regulated prices.

Some Congressmen, including my subcommittee and committee chairmen, wish to consider only the short term emergency rather than the long term problem, but it seems clear that the nation will have to have one price for this product and that price should be the same to all users and should be set competitively in the market place rather than by a government bureau. Allowing that to happen will allow the incentive for new exploration. That, in turn, will mean that our nation will have the energy it needs and can avoid the dependence on imports that we unfortunately developed in oil. With adequate supplies of gas, jobs, and industry all over the country will be protected and that will be in the interest of all of us.

## LEGAL NOTICE

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Mohair Council of America, 516 Central National Bank Building, San Angelo, Texas 76901, proposes a referendum election on February 10, 1976, under provisions of Article 55C, Vernon's Civil Statutes on the proposition of whether or not mohair producers in the following counties shall assess themselves an amount not to exceed 2½ cents per pound on all mohair sold to be collected at the first point of sale, and to elect members for a 12-person commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for advertising, promotion, market and product development, education and research programs designed to encourage production, marketing and use of Texas mohair.

Counties included in the referendum are: District 1 - Terrell, Crockett, Pecos, Brewster, Presidio and Jeff Davis. District 2 - Val Verde, Kinney. District 3 - Edwards. District 4 - Bandera, Real, Medina, Uvalde. District 5 - Mason, Llano, Gillespie, Kerr, Kendall, Comal, Blanco. District 6 - Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble. District 7 - Mills, Hamilton, San Saba, Coryell, Lampasas, Burnet, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Bell. District 8 - Irion, Sterling, Coke, Tom Green, Concho, McCulloch, Coleman, Runnels, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan. District 9 - Brown, Eastland, Comanche, Erath, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Jack, Parker, Hood.

The referendum and election will be held by physical ballot with voting place to be at each county ASCS office in the referendum area or in the county courthouse in counties that do not have ASCS office facilities. Polls will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Producers who will be away from their particular voting box location on election day may obtain an absentee ballot from county agent offices, wool and mohair warehouses or from the Mohair Council of America. Absentee ballots must be mailed in the self-addressed envelope to the central balloting place at P.O. Box 222, San Angelo, Texas 76901, before midnight three days prior to the election date.

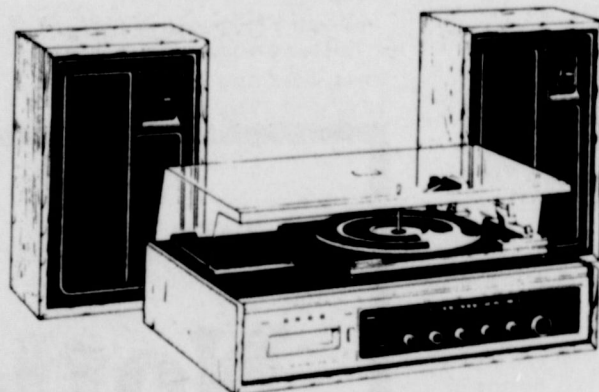
Any person within this referendum area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced mohair for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

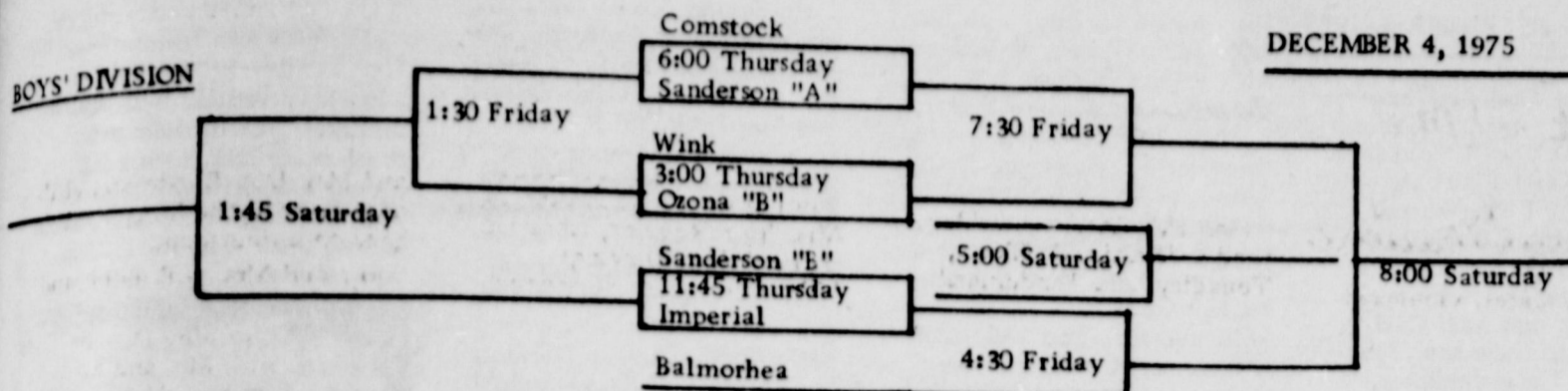

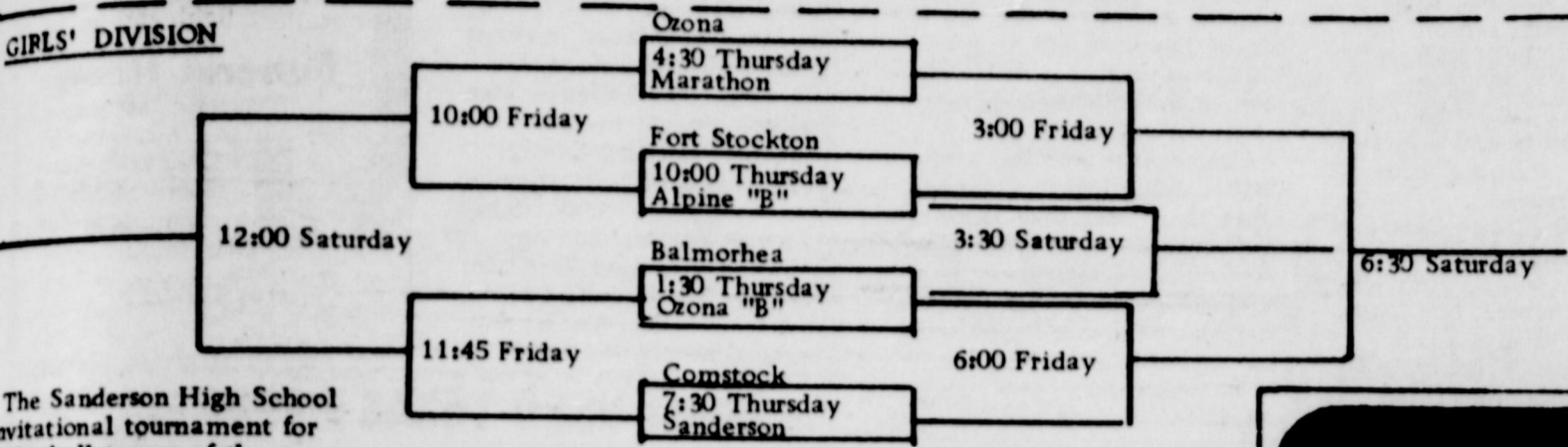

**Recipe for Poverty And For Relief**

What is it like to live in the poorest half of the population in the poorest half of the world?

Start with a typical American family. Take away the car, the house, and all the electrical appliances; no TV, no radio, no iron, no washing machine or refrigerator. No electricity. No running water or sinks, or showers, or toilets.

Substitute a one-room hut made of mud or straw or a few boards, with a dirt floor. Add children, sick and hungry. One of four won't live to the age of five. On an average day, most of them will have diarrhea. No schools, no one in the family can read.

Take away breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Substitute two bowls of rice - or corn meal, or sweet potato. Add a little gruel made of chickpea, or else some fish sauce, once a day. One chicken split six ways on Sunday. Maybe.

Mix this well-fed family group with a sun baked field. Work them like oxen from dawn to dusk, to see if the next crop comes up before they die. At harvest-time, see the landlord and the moneylender show up from town to get their share.

Watch the powderkeg sitting in the sun.

CROP pioneered the "food for wages" work project where beans, wheat, and other dietary staples are paid to workers in lieu of wages.

CROP pioneered the "self-help" program of trading tools for labor. They also teach the best methods and ways to use tools to the greatest advantage.

Self-help is the watchword for the CROP program.

The project has been working helping people for about 30 years and is now in more than 30 countries of the world.

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
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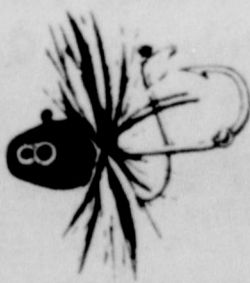
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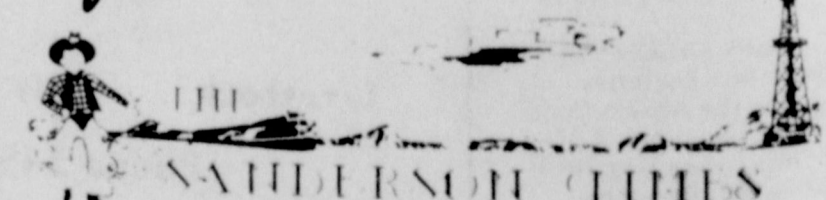
