7 Numbers Needed For Local Phone Calls

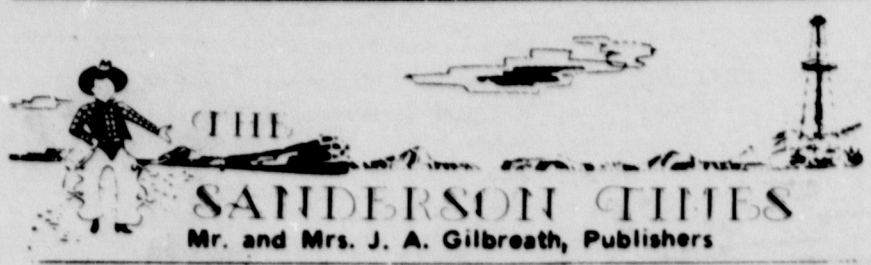
A news story from Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. printed in The Times last week relayed the erroneous information that local phone users would be required to dial five numbers as of December 22.
