Voters Pass School Bond

Darrin Gilley and Jeri Lynn White elected to Board of Trustees

The voting is over and the results are in. Voters elected two School Board Trustees and decided the fate of the \$19 million school bond measure in last Saturday's election. A total of 510 persons voted in the election and of those 239 voted early.

In the Friona Independent School District Trustee Election, Cindy Moreno, Jeri Lynn White, and Darrin Gilley were vying for two at-large places on the Board. Final voting totals showed that Darrin received 389 votes, Jeri Lynn received 338 votes, and Cindy received 158 votes. Darrin and Jeri Lynn will serve full terms on the Board. Darrin served a one-year special term last year and Jeri Lynn will begin

her first term this year.

In the Special Election, voters approved the \$19 million Fisd bond measure by the vote of 246 to 202. It called for the issuance of \$19,000,000 of bonds by the Friona Independent School District for the construction, acquisition, renovation, and equipment of school buildings in the district, and the levying of the tax for payment thereof.

Election Administrator Rosa Mendez would like to thank her fellow election workers and the four student poll workers Adriana Ortiz-Carrillo, Damian Rodriguez, Angel Valencia, and Kessly Salinas for their help in conducting the election.



A Special Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Friona ISD was held at 12:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 7th to canvass the results from the May 4th election and to adopt an Order declaring the results. The Board had

met at noon in another Special Meeting in closed session to consider contracts, resignations, and reassignments. Sara Smiley and Rachel Clark were hired as new Primary School teachers.

About Snack Pak 4Kids

Snack Pak 4 Kids (SP4K) is a weekend backpack program that began eight years ago. Dyron Howell and his wife, Kelly, started the program in their kitchen serving just 10 kids at Will Rogers Elementary School in Amarillo. They discovered that Amarillo was the largest city west of Dallas without a weekend backpack program, and yet, more than 3,200 children in the Amarillo Independent School District relied only on the meals served to them at school for their weekly food. That meant hundreds of children spent their nights and weekends hungry. On Friday, September 3, 2010, the first 10 SP4K recipients received a

bag containing enough food to get them through the weekend.

Today, the program has grown to serve more than 10,000 kids in 51 school districts. Snack Paks always contain brand new, brand-name food and, thanks to generous partnerships and a steady stream of volunteers, 100% of all donations given to SP4K are used to purchase food for hungry children. The SP4K mission is: "To end weekend hunger for children by providing a backpack filled with kid-friendly snacks each Friday of the year." Their focus is always on the kids, and they believe that is a major part of our success.

We have expanded the program

to serve middle and high school students with the Snack Shak program. Snack Shak allows students to select from a menu of 35 brand new, brand-name items. High school students can access the program via their school's website without a teacher referral. This program is student-led and student-run on our high school and middle school campuses. Middle school students are referred by their teachers and staff similar to the elementary program. Our Snack Shak program has grown to include numerous high schools and middle schools across the state of Texas, benefiting over 600 students weekly.

AgTexas honors AgYouth

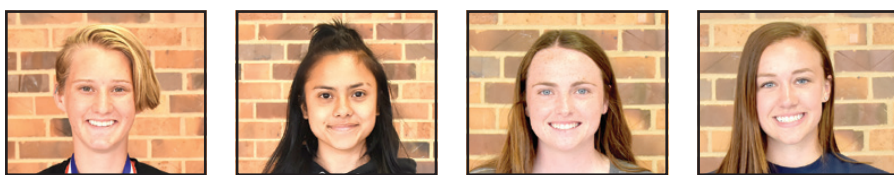

The 4x400m Relay Team of Jodie Denton, Anay Chihuahua, Emma Rector, and Bailey Pope will compete in the AAA State Track & Field Championships at 10:25 p.m. this Friday night at Mike A. Meyers Stadium in Austin. Ahahi Gonzalez and Rebecca Schlenker are also on the team as alternates.

The Squaws qualified for the state meet by finishing second with a time of 4:03.53

1975. In the seventies, the race was called the 4x440 yard relay or Mile Relay for short. That team, which consisted of Jatón Widner, Paige Osborn, Terri Patterson, and Lucinda Aguirre, ran a 4:00.2 and still hold the Friona school record.

Farm Service Agency News

Before you get too busy with field prep and planting, make sure to certify your 2018 crop production for payments through the Market Facilitation Program. The May 1 deadline has been extended to **May 17** due to weather-related harvest delays in parts of the country. Please make an appointment with your local FSA office if you haven't already. Payments will only be issued to producers who certify before the **May 17** deadline.

This is a good time to remind everyone about changes to farm loan programs, which help borrowers purchase farms or cover operating expenses. The 2018 Farm Bill increased the amount producers can borrow through direct and guaranteed loans and provides more flexibility to farm loans.

FSA recently announced that enrollment for the new Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC) Program will begin in mid-June. Payments have already triggered for January and February for producers who purchase the appropriate level of coverage. Stay tuned for more details on DMC enrollment.

rollment.

The 2018 Farm Bill reinstates higher levels of coverage through the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program. Producers have a one-time opportunity until **May 24, 2019**, to obtain buy-up coverage for 2019 or 2020 eligible crops for which the NAP application closing date has passed. NAP buy-up coverage is available from 50 to 65 percent of expected production, in 5 percent increments, at 100 percent of the average market price.

2019 Acreage Reporting Dates

In order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements, all producers are encouraged to visit their local FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the applicable deadline.

Acreage reporting dates vary by crop and by county so please contact your local FSA office for a list of county-specific deadlines.

The following exceptions apply to

acreage reporting dates: (1) If the crop has not been planted by the applicable acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed; (2) If a producer acquires additional acreage after the applicable acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendars days after purchase or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office; (3) If a perennial forage crop is reported with the intended use of "cover only," "green manure," "left standing," or "seed," then the acreage must be reported by July 15th.

Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) policy holders should note that the acreage reporting date for NAP covered crops is the earlier of the applicable dates or 15 calendar days before grazing or harvesting of the crop begins.

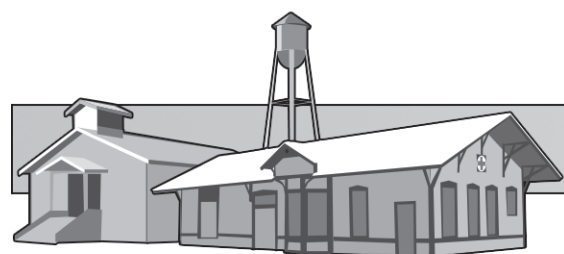

From the Friona Star Archives

May 9, 2013

If you have family or friends buried in the Friona Cemetery come join the cemetery board on Thursday May 16 at 5 p.m. for the annual clean-up day. All volunteers will be appreciated.

Each year the cemetery board makes a special effort to get the cemetery ready for Memorial Day visitors. All old and faded flowers will be picked up and destroyed. Plastic bags will be available and the city will furnish extra trash bags.

If you have flowers or other items at the cemetery that you treasure you should go get them before the clean-up day then bring them back afterwards to make sure they are not thrown away. Soft drinks, water, and snacks will be furnished in the Memorial Chapel for all workers. See you May 16 at 5 p.m.

May 11, 2001

The Friona junior high school bands and the Friona Chieftain band will be presenting their annual Spring Concert on Thursday, May 17, at 7:30 p.m. in the junior high auditorium. The bands will perform a variety of music selections in-

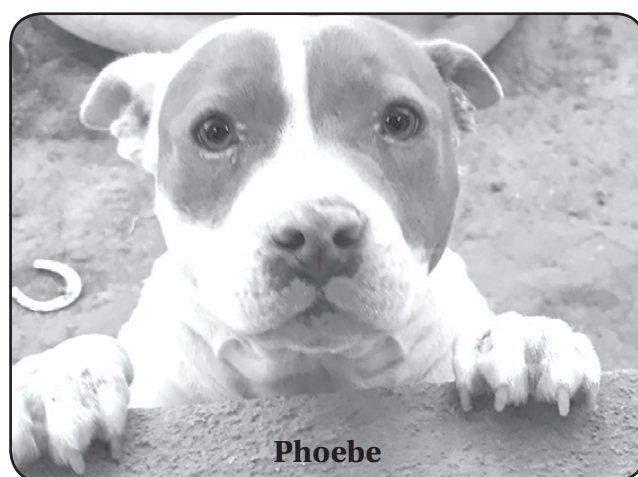

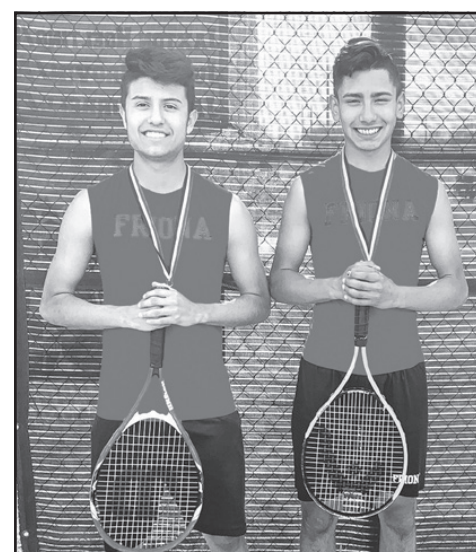

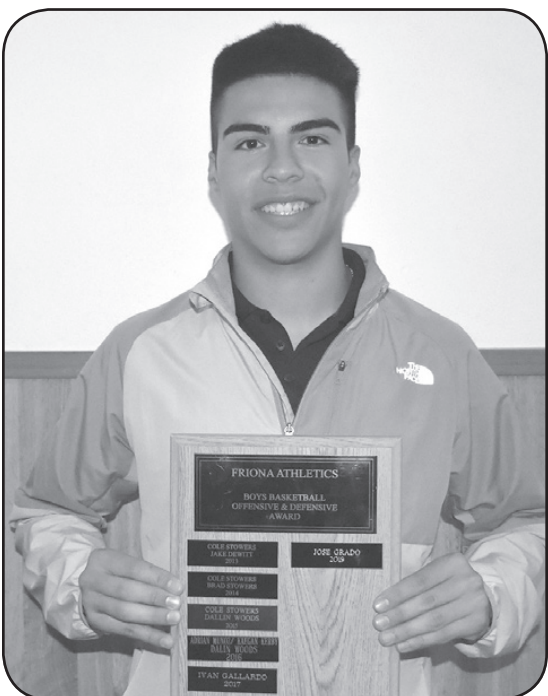

Small Town Cookin'

Broccoli

Like most children, mine are not big fans of vegetables. However, they will eat steamed broccoli. This is good since broccoli is one of the most nutritious and versatile side dishes. Broccoli is low in sodium and calories and is fat free. This vegetable is high in fiber, vitamin C, potassium, vitamin B6, and vitamin A. It also has a good amount of protein. The phytochemicals found in broccoli are responsible for the color, smell, and flavor. These chemicals are good for the immune system. Antioxidants help find and neutralize the free radicals that cause cell damage which may lead to cancer. Broccoli is a great source of antioxidants especially sulforapane. Lutein, which helps prevent macular degeneration, is found in broccoli as well. Broccoli contains additional nutrients such as magnesium, phosphorus, zinc, and iron.

Like cauliflower, broccoli is a member of the cabbage family. It is really a large edible flower. Broccoli was first found in Italy and has been eaten there since the Romans in the 6th century. The word broccoli originated from the Italian word broccolo, meaning the "flowering top of cabbage." In the mid- 18th century, broccoli was introduced in England. It was known as Italian asparagus. Thomas Jefferson was a fan of broccoli. In fact, he imported the seeds from Italy to plant at Monticello as early as 1767. However, broccoli did not become popular in the United States until the 1920s. Now Americans eat over four pounds of broccoli per person per year. California produces 90% of our nation's broccoli crop each year.

Broccoli is a very versatile vegetable. It can be eaten raw or steamed, boiled, stir fried, sautéed, microwaved, as well as used in casseroles. Sources for this article can be found at <https://www.mindbodygreen.com>, <https://www.livescience.com>, and <https://www.thespruceeats.com>

Broccoli Tips:

- Broccoli should be bright green with firm, strong stalks.
- Woody stems will turn out hard and chewy when cooked.
- Broccoli with yellowing florets is a sign that the broccoli is not fresh and will not have the desired texture.
- The more compact the florets, the fresher the broccoli.
- Be sure your broccoli is thoroughly dry after washing it. The drier it is, the better it will crisp up.
- Be sure to use enough oil when roasting broccoli.
- Be sure your oven is hot enough when you add the broccoli.
- For crisper broccoli, flip it halfway through cooking.
- Do not overcook because it will lose many of its nutrients.
- Peeling the fibrous outer layer of the stalk will make it easier to digest.
- Throwing a few chunks of bread into the water when cooking will help remove the smell.
- One pound of broccoli equals 2 cups cut up.
- One 10-ounce frozen package equals 1 ½ cups chopped.

Seriously, The Best Broccoli of Your Life

Ingredients

- 4 pounds broccoli
- 4 garlic cloves peeled and thinly sliced
- Good olive oil or for Keto - butter flavor coconut oil
- 1½ teaspoons kosher salt
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 2 teaspoons grated lemon zest
- 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
- ½ cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 425 degrees F. Cut the broccoli florets from the thick stalks, leaving

an inch or two of stalk attached to the florets, discarding the rest of the stalks. Cut the larger pieces through the base of the head with a small knife, pulling the florets apart. You should have about 8 cups of florets. Place the broccoli florets on a sheet pan large enough to hold them in a single layer. Toss the garlic on the broccoli and drizzle with 5 tablespoons olive oil. Sprinkle with the salt and pepper. Roast for 20 to 25 minutes, until crisp-tender and the tips of some of the florets are browned. Remove the broccoli from the oven and immediately toss with 1 1/2 tablespoons olive oil, the lemon zest, lemon juice, and Parmesan. Serve hot.

Broccoli Rice Casserole

- ½ c. chopped celery
- ½ c. onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, chopped
- 2 Tbsp butter
- 1 pkg. frozen chopped broccoli or 1 ½ cups fresh broccoli
- 1 cup raw rice (I use 5-minute rice.)
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 small jar Cheese-Whiz
- Paprika, to sprinkle on the top

Cook onions, celery, and garlic in the butter until tender. Cook broccoli as directed on package and drain. If I use fresh broccoli, I cook it in a microwave with 2 teaspoons of water for around 3 ½ minutes or until tender. Prepare rice as instructed on the box. Then mix all the ingredients together. Mix lightly together, letting cheese and undiluted soups blending with hot rice. Pour into buttered oblong glass casserole dish. Sprinkle with paprika before baking. Bake at 350°F for 20 minutes or until the edges are bubbling.

State Capital Highlights

Property tax reform bill goes to conference committee

AUSTIN — The Texas House of Representatives on May 1 passed Senate Bill 2, legislation proposing to bring property tax relief to homeowners, but the lower house slowed the bill's momentum by tacking on 25 floor amendments.

If finally passed in the coming days, the legislation would lower the rollback rate for most local taxing authorities from 8 percent to 3.5 percent and 2 percent for school districts. The bill also allows local option elections on proposals to exceed rollback rates.

SB 2, like House Bill 1, the state budget bill, is now in the hands of a conference committee of five House members and five Senate members tasked with producing a final, agreed-to version. Meanwhile, all eyes are on the calendar and the clock as constitutional deadlines set in and the May 27 end of the session grows near.

Gov. Greg Abbott lauded the progress made on the property tax reform bill. "For too long, Texans have watched their property taxes skyrocket while being reduced to tenants of their own property. That is not the Texas way," Abbott said.

"In the final days of the legislative session, I am confident this historic legislation, combined with additional reforms working their way through the system, will reach my desk where I will sign them into law. I look forward to working with Lt. Gov. Patrick, Speaker Bonnen and the entire Legislature to deliver lasting property tax relief to every Texan."

Parties settle voting suit

Parties in the lawsuit *LJ-LAC v. Texas Secretary of State David Whitley* and consolidated cases agreed to a settlement over Whitley's Jan. 25 letter to county voter registrars.

In an announcement released April 26, Whitley wrote, "Today's agreement accomplishes our office's goal of maintaining an accurate list of qualified registered voters while eliminating the impact of any list maintenance activity on naturalized U.S. citizens. I will continue to work with all stakeholders in the election community to ensure this process is conducted in a manner that holds my office accountable and protects the voting rights of eligible Texans."

In his role as the state's chief elections officer, Whitley wrote the letter directing registrars to identify and remove from voter rolls non-U.S. citizens registered to vote in Texas. That letter sparked the lawsuit.

Plaintiffs agreed to dismiss their claims and the Secretary of State's office agreed to issue a new advisory notifying Texas counties on a revised process for identifying and removing non-U.S. citizens from the state's voter rolls.

The Secretary of State's office, in following the new process, will send to county voter registrars only the matching records of individuals who registered to vote before identifying themselves as non-U.S. citizens to the Texas Department of Public Safety when applying for a driver license or personal identification card.

House OKs marijuana bill

HB 63, legislation lessening

penalties for possession of an ounce or less of marijuana, won House approval on April 30, on a vote of 103-42.

If passed, the penalty for minor possession of marijuana would be a misdemeanor citation, like a traffic ticket. Authored by House Speaker Pro-tempore Joe Moody, D-El Paso, the bill drew support from both political parties.

Before a final vote was called in the House, Moody said in the course of a longer statement, "Members, 22 states and the District of Columbia have passed bills like this and the sky hasn't fallen there. Whatever you think about Colorado-style legalization, this isn't it."

HB 63 was received in the Senate for consideration on April 30, but Lt. Gov. Patrick, who presides over the upper chamber, indicated in a social media post that he would not allow the bill to progress any further.

Revenue total increases

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on May 2 announced state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.8 billion in April, an amount 3 percent more than the amount reported in April 2018.

"State sales tax revenue continued to grow, but at a modest pace compared to recent months," Hegar said in an agency news release. "Increased sales tax collections were mostly from the construction and services sectors, while collections from retail trade saw a moderate decline," he added.

Furthermore, Hegar said, total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in April 2019 was up 6.2 percent compared to the same period a year ago.
