Youth Fishing Day is Sunday

The Friona Economic Development Corporation has announced that Sunday, May 19th is Youth Fishing Day. The event will be conducted by the Texas Junior Anglers, Inc. and will take place from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. at Reeve Lake just south of the Friona Community Center. No general public fishing will be allowed on Sunday until after 4:00 p.m. Citations will be issued to violators.

No pre-registration is required and the event is **FREE** to participants 16 year of age and under. A registration form must be completed and turned in at the event site. A waiver of responsibility must also be signed by a parent or legal guardian. Catch and release of fish is encouraged and all state, federal, and local game and fish laws apply and must be observed by all participants. **You may bring your own equipment or TJA will provide all the necessary equipment for you.**

The pond will be stocked with adult sized channel catfish giving participants an excellent opportunity to land the BIG one. Age categories 6 years and under, 7-11, and 12-16 will be awarded trophies and prizes for 1st and 2nd longest fish. Randomly drawn prizes will also be awarded at the conclusion of the event. Prizes will consist of sporting goods and fishing equipment. Souvenir trophies will also be available and proceeds will benefit TJA and also help support this **FREE** event.

The City of Friona is the title sponsor for the Youth Fishing Day and other event sponsors include The Sportsmen's Club of Fort Worth, Texas Parks & Wildlife, Plfueger, Academy Sports & Outdoors, Shakespeare USA, and Moritz Chevrolet.







Congratulations to Sergeant Andrew Aguirre. He received the Meritorious Service Award. The Meritorious Award is presented to individuals or groups of the police department who have a record of significant contribution or who have outstanddemonstrated ing service in providing the citizens of Friona with the most community focused, efficient and effective police service available. On Saturday March 9, 2019, the Friona police department executed a search warrant at the 900 block of Main Street. This was led by Sergeant Aguirre. Sergeant Aguirre investigated a lead that was given to him approximately a week prior to this date. He gathered enough evidence to draw up a search warrant at the premises of said address. Once the search warrant was executed, approximately five (5) pounds of methamphetamine were found at the location. This operation yielded one of the largest amounts of methamphetamine seized by a local law enforcement agency in Parmer County. For his work on this undercover operation, Sergeant is being awarded the Meritorious Service Award. Great Job Sergeant Aguirre!!!

City Council met on May 13, 2019. Bruce Fleming, Alan Monroe and Jeff Stowers were sworn in to serve a term from 2019-2021. We welcome Bruce and Alan back to the council and appreciate their service to this

community. Also, welcome new council member Jeff Stowers and his commitment to serve on this coun-

City Council voted and approved a (5) year agreement with Atmos Energy to pay a 5% franchise fee quarterly to the City of Friona. Michael Gonzalez, Atmos Marketing Manager was present to answer any questions and address the options for council approval.

City Council voted and approved the city audit conducted by Gala Fullerton, CPA for fiscal year October 1, 2017 to September 30, 2018. Gayla provided a summary of her financial report to the council and answered questions related to audit.

City Council voted and approved an interlocal cooperation contract with Panhandle Regional Planning Commission under the interlocal cooperation act for grant application related to the TXCDBG fire, ambulance, and services truck (FAST) program. In short, PRPC will fill out the grant application to apply for a new fire truck. The grant applied for is \$500k.

Check it out!!!! Reeve's Lake has a new aerator. The aerator sprays water upward like a water fountain. It looks good! The Public Works employee's were constantly replacing the motor on the old aerator. The city upgraded to a better system.

Chief Jimenez and the police officers responded to 222 calls in April. There were 180 stops, 94 warnings, 86 citations and 17 arrests. (3-burglary of habitation, 2-exibition of acceleration, 3-warrants, 1-poss. of marijuana, 1-driving while intoxicated, 4-no drivers license, 1-public intoxication, 1-theft and 1-criminal trespass.

Friona Volunteer Fire Department responded to 4 calls in April. On April 4th, this call ended in a false alarm. On April 7th, vehicle fire. There were 4 firefighters and 1 truck that responded. Also, on April 7th, storage shed fire. There were 9 firefighters and 2 trucks that responded. On April 20th, car accident. There were 8 firefighters and 3 trucks that responded. The volunteers continue to do a great job. We are blessed and thankful that we have such great men that are dedicated serving this community.

Emergency Medical Service responded to 25 calls in April. There were 6-911 calls, 15-calls for transfer and 4 calls ended in a "no transport". Ambulance billing equaled \$32,845.52 and collected \$9,316.89.

Accounts payable for the month of April totaled \$184,637.42. The expenses and revenues compared to the cities budget are doing very well. All bills are paid and the city is in good stand-

Friona Public Library was open 20 days in April with 794 patron visits an average of 40 visits per day. There were 724 items circulated with 41 new items added to inventory. Also, there were 3117 visits on the Friona Public Library website.

Commissioners award contracts and lift burn ban

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, May 13th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas

Bid applications were considered for the banking depository contract to handle Parmer County funds. Two bids were submitted and Aim Bank of Farwell was awarded the four year contract.

Three bid applications were submitted for the janitorial contract for the Parmer County Courthouse and Law Enforcement Center. Becca's Quality Home and Commercial Cleaning Service of Farwell was awarded the one year contract.

The payment of Parmer County's share of the FM 145 Project was approved. The total due was \$126,147.00 and the court chose the option to pay \$42,049.00 per year for 3 years with no interest and no prepayment fees.

Approval was given for an inter-local agreement with the Reeves County Sheriff's Office to house their inmates at the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center. Sheriff Randy Geries reported that there was a shortage of jailers in the Pecos area of due to the oil & gas boom coupled with a tight labor market.

Commissioners discussed the need to purchase new


election equipment in the near future in order to comply with state regulations concerning voters with disabilities and other unfunded mandates. A price tag of \$100,000 per machine is very likely.

An addition to the Parmer County personnel manual regarding the videotaping of employees was approved and a request by an Parmer County employee, with supervisor approval, to be paid for unused vacation days was granted.

In other action, the commissioners voted to lift the current burn ban effective immediately. Also, the next regular session meeting was rescheduled for Tuesday, May 28th because of the Memorial Day holiday on Monday.

The Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved. Approval was given for payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Commissioners also reviewed the Treasurer's Report and approved the calculated payroll and disbursement for all county employees and elected officials.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

May 23, 2013

The Friona city council met in regular session Monday May 20. Council members Jim Atwell and Mark Osborn participated to open the meeting with Atwell presiding as mayor pro-tem. Both voted on canvassing the May 11 election results as their final official duties, then relinquished their council seats as outgoing councilmen. City manager Patricia Phipps then administered the oath of office to newly elected Mayor Rick White, returning councilman Charlie Pope, and new council members Alan Monroe and Bruce Fleming. In the first order of business councilman Greg Lewellen was elected to serve as mayor pro-tem for the 2013-2014 year. Mayor White won the special election for a one-year term assuming the office after the resignation of J.B. Douglas. He will have to seek reelection in 2014. The council passed an ordinance making the sale of synthetic drugs illegal in the city and approved a rate increase proposal from Xcel Energy. The increase was opposed by many Texas cities that formed an association to save legal fees. The company was granted a rate increase but not as much as originally asked for. A variance for a trailer home at 805 Woodland requested by Filiberto Juarez was discussed and approved. City manager Phipps went over the April accounts payable and financial statement for the benefit of the new council members. There were several questions about accounts and procedures and budget information which she explained in detail. Some major expenditures were discussed for the city-owned Prairie Acres facility's new heating and air unit. On a humorous

note, she explained that a \$7,000 expenditure on a mosquito spraying machine was a bargain off of the asking price of \$10,500 because there has been a lack of mosquitoes due of the drought. Police Chief Mooney gave a report. He is still working on a grant to provide a School Resource Officer, which would be an additional officer. The council then went into executive session and heard from Municipal Judge Deborah Campbell. They returned to open session and the meeting was adjourned at 7:37 p.m. with no further ac-

The next meeting of the city council will be Monday, June 10 at 6:30 p.m. All council meetings are open to the public.

May 6, 2004

A one-vehicle rollover accident Sunday morning May 2, took the life of Alonzo Salas, 20, of Bovina. Salas was driving a 1992 Chevrolet extended cab pickup about 8:30 a.m. on County Road 7 and rolled the pickup when he tried to turn onto County Road Q. The location is south and west of Bovina. Salas was ejected from the pickup and was pronounced dead at the scene by Precinct II Justice of the Peace Vi Hutto. The accident was investigated by DPS Trooper Joel Rejino. The investigation into the accident is ongoing. One report was that Salas was being pursued by some other individuals but that report could not be substantiated by press time. Sources said that Salas had lived in Bovina about 5 years and was employed by Excel in Friona.

May 21, 1994

The curfew for Friona teenagers will go into full effect on June 1, and in the meantime, a number of youngsters have been

stopped and issued a warning ticket. "We have been giving on the average about three warning tickets per night, and up to ten on weekend nights," said Assistant Police Chief Randy Geries. The curfew is for youngsters under the age of 17. It starts at 11 p.m. on "school nights," or Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursdays, and at midnight on Friday and Saturday. Anyone found in violation of the curfew can be punished by a fine of up to \$500. There will be certain exceptions allowed to the new curfew, which will include special medical emergencies made necessary by illness or injury; or if the minor is returning home or going to employment at the late hour, or attending an official school, religious or other recreational activity supervised by adults or sponsored by the City of Friona, civic organization or another similar entity.

June 6, 1976

The Friona area has been hit by extremely high winds on two or three occasions during the past couple of weeks. The worst was Sunday, May 30, when gusts destroyed an old airplane hangar at Benger Air Park, and toppled utility poles east of the city. Farm crops also were ruined or adversely affected across a wide area. Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have fallen 2.0 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.57, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 2.2 cents per gallon higher than a month ago, and stand 6.8 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.24 while the most expensive is \$3.29 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country today stands at \$1.99 while the most expensive is \$5.65 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has fallen 3.8 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.85 per gallon. The national average is up 2.1 cents per gallon from a month ago, and down 1.1 cents from a year ago.

"Relief at the pump has indeed begun across the country with a majority of states seeing average prices decline versus a week ago, giving solid evidence the worst is likely behind us," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for Gas-Buddy. "However, the potential lightning rod of a U.S./

China trade deal is perhaps the only prospect that could bring a return to higher prices. For now, just a dozen or so states saw prices rising while most moved lower, including California, but some pain may linger in Washington and Oregon where supply remains tight and prices high. We'll be watching for refinery utilization rates to rise in this week's report from the Energy Information Administration- it will be a critical data point on where and when more relief arrives. For most Americans, I think we'll slowly all join in on the falling prices and by June, the national average may stand 5-20 cents lower than today, provided there's no trade deal with the U.S. and China, whereas a trade deal could lead to a second hurrah at the pump."

Comptroller Glenn Hegar Distributes \$868 Million in Monthly Sales Tax Revenue to Local Governments

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$867.7 million in local sales tax allocations for May, 0.7 percent more than in May 2018. These allocations are based on sales made in March by businesses that report tax monthly, and sales made in January, February and March by quarterly filers.

The City of Friona will receive a payment of \$40,378.06 which is 2.49% below last year for the same period. The year-to-date total for 2019 is \$169,675.70 which is 2.92% less than last year.

Playa Field Day in Abernathy is May 21st

The next in a series of Playa Field Days open to landowners, Master Naturalists, educators, students, and the interested public will be held Tuesday, May 21 in Abernathy, Texas beginning in the Courtroom at Abernathy City Hall (811 Ave D.) at 9:30 a.m. with coffee and refreshments, and an overview of the day. The event was originally scheduled for Tuesday, May 14th but had to be rescheduled due to heavy rainfall that made travel on country roads difficult. Presentations will cover general information about playa ecosystems, best management practices, and playa restoration programs.

Activities will begin with a presentation by Amanda Emert, a graduate student at Texas Tech, on playa amphibians and her research project involving critters including toads, frogs, and salamanders. Ms. Emert will be talking about research she has just started and showing off some of the tools involved in her work.

A second presentation will follow at 10:20 a.m. by Don Kahl, TPWD Region 1 Migratory Game Bird Specialist, who will cover general information on playas and their importance as keystone ecosystems in the Southern Plains, as well as information on restoration efforts and options for playa landown-

ers through the Texas Playa Conservation Initiative.

"Playas are a source of focused recharge to the Ogallala aquifer. Recharge rates in playa basins are 10 to 100 times higher than other areas. Benefits go beyond recharge," says Kahl. "Water that reaches the aquifer through playas is cleaner than water that enters through other channels such as upland soils. As rainfall and runoff travel toward grassland playas, surrounding grasses trap sediments that can carry contaminants, and keep them from reaching the playa. Then, as the water moves through the playa's clay floor, a second 'cleaning' process beneath the playa removes nitrates and other dissolved contaminants. The result is high quality water reaching the aguifer that can be used by those who live on the land, their children and future generations."

Playas are shallow, rainfed wetlands throughout the Great Plains. When containing surface water, playas provide crucial habitat for many wildlife that depend on water to survive. When dry, playas also support several other Great Plains wildlife species because they are often the only natural lands in a region dominated by agricultural production. Playas also recharge water to the

underlying aquifer, filter nutrients and chemicals from the surrounding watershed, and add recreational value to the region.

One of the more important realizations about the value of playas in the past few decades is that they are true "recharge" wetlands. Playas recharge the Ogallala aquifer and in the Southern High Plains, appear to be the only significant sites for aquifer recharge. There are only two natural ways water can leave a Great Plains playa—infiltration (recharge) and evaporation.

At 11 a.m., the group will depart for a guided Field Trip to visit a nearby playa restored through the Texas Playa Conservation Initiative where Kahl will illustrate how the program works and field questions.

At 12:30 p.m. the tour will return to City Hall in Abernathy for a sandwich lunch. Jim Steiert, outdoor writer and Master Naturalist from Hereford will present brief summary remarks after lunch until 1:30pm. Copies of Steiert's award winning book, Playas: Jewels of the Plains (Texas Tech University Press, 1995) will be available for purchase at the event for \$40.

The workshop is sponsored by Ogallala Commons and its partners, the High Plains Water District, the Dixon Water Foundation, and Texas Parks & Wildlife Department. Those attending are asked to wear clothing, footwear, and a hat suitable for the field tours. There

is no charge for the event, though a \$10 donation for lunch is appreciated.

About Amanda Emert

I grew up getting to hear the trilling call of toads seeking mates because there was a playa behind the house and barditches held water, so amphibians were all over the place in the summer. The calling of frogs and toads is still music to me," she said.

Ms. Emert received her Bachelor of Science degree in Natural Resources Management from Texas Tech and is currently working on her Masters degree in wildlife aquatics and wildlands. She has worked at an environmental consulting firm on groundwater and soil remediation in our office, and my study of amphibians was more limited to Texas Tech University. "Working with aspects of water quality and the fate and transport of contaminants were a big influence on my decision to study emerging contaminants and their effects on wetland ecosystems," she says.

Amanda has launched into a Masters research project on playa amphibians over a widespread area of the Panhandle/ South Plains, and is also working as an intern with Ogallala Commons. "The overall health of amphibians is indicative of the health of the environment, and an important aspect of my study is that ecosystems are important to us. When frogs, toads, and salamanders and other amphibians start



disappearing, that's an indicator for us. It's possible that amphibian disappearance could be a water quality issue," explained Ms. Emert.

Playas are crucial habitat for amphibians and microinvertebrates in the Southern Plains, and have been disappearing in recent years with resultant impact on amphibians. Ms. Emert will be talking about research she has just started and showing off some of the tools involved in her work.

Local Students Complete TCFA Feedyard Technician Program

Six students from Friona High School completed the Cattle Care & Handling portion of the Feedyard Technician Certification Program May 8 at Randall County Extension Office in Canyon. The goal of the program is to give students a basic understanding of the knowledge and skills necessary to work in the fed beef industry.

Students were tested on cattle care skills, pharmaceutical knowledge and proper administering and implanting techniques and accuracy. Students also took a written exam and were individually interviewed by feedyard industry leaders on the topics they covered in training.

Friona students who graduated from the program are Bobbie Mendoza, Jesus Guerrero, Maddie Sharrock, Marcus Juarez, Moses Chavez and Zeus Zamudio.

The program is a collaboration between Texas Cattle Feeders Association, WTAMU and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Servic-

Students in the program are identified by their Agricultural Science Teacher, feedyard managers or have expressed interest to be accepted into the program. They should be enrolled in at least one high school agricultural class each semester, participate in extracurricular activities such as FFA and have a supervised agricultural experience project.

Asparagus

I don't know why, but asparagus is one of the foods I don't remember eating as a child. However, as an adult, asparagus has been a great addition to our family menu. Bill and the kids will even enjoy a stalk or two.

Unlike cauliflower and broccoli, asparagus is a spring vegetable. The prime growing season for asparagus is from February to June with April being to most active month of growth. It is a perennial crop and grows back each year. It takes two to three years to establish asparagus, but then it will grow for up to ten years. It is a member of the lily family and closely related to onions, garlic, tulips and daffodils.

Asparagus is one of the oldest recorded vegetables. It was thought to have originated along the coastal areas of the eastern Mediterranean and in Asia Minor. It was a delicacy to the ancient Greeks and Romans. It is believed that Julius Caesar ate asparagus with melted butter.

China produces the most asparagus in the world. The U.S. is ranked fifth in the world for asparagus production with most of the vegetable grown in California, Washington, and Michigan. In fact, Oceana County, Michigan holds the National Asparagus Festival in June each year.

Interestingly, asparagus comes in three colors: green, white, and purple. White asparagus is grown with dirt covering the plant which keeps the spears from producing chlorophyll

to create the green color. White asparagus is delicately flavored. It is recommended to peel the stalk's outer layers before cooking. Purple asparagus is a genetic variety of the vegetable. It turns back to green when it is cooked.

Asparagus is full of nutrients and is low in calories. It has moderate levels of fiber and is a good source of antioxidants. It is rich in folates and B-complex vitamins as well as vitamin C, A, E, and K. Copper and iron are also found in asparagus.

Asparagus Tips:

- Buy asparagus as fresh as possible. It should be firm, straight, and smooth with a rich green color.
- To prepare asparagus, break off the woody ends by snapping where it feels like the stalk wants to break.
- Use a vegetable peeler to remove the outer layers of the stalk on thick pieces of asparagus.
- Cut up asparagus in smaller pieces to enjoy in stir fry or salad. Smaller pieces also hide the stringy texture of the stalks.
- Don't overcook.
- Play with flavors while steaming, boiling, or roasting your asparagus.

Easy Microwave Asparagus

Asparagus, however much you want to fix $\frac{1}{2}$ - 1 cup water Juice from $\frac{1}{2}$ - 1 lemon salt butter

Prepare the asparagus by breaking or cutting off the ends of the stalk. If the stalks are thick and barky, peel them to remove the first tough

layer. Place the asparagus in a microwave safe dish with sides. Add the desired amount of water, butter, salt, and juice depending on how much asparagus you are preparing. The water should come up about half-way over the asparagus. Cover with plastic wrap. Microwave for $3\frac{1}{2} - 4\frac{1}{2}$ minutes or until the asparagus is fork tender. Do not overcook. Remove from water and serve hot on a platter.

Honey Lemon Asparagus

Ingredients

- 2 pounds fresh asparagus, trimmed 1/4 cup honey
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon sea salt 1 teaspoon balsamic vinegar
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

Directions

In a large saucepan, bring 8 cups water to a boil. Add asparagus in batches; cook, uncovered, 1-2 minutes or just until crisp-tender. Drain and pat dry. Meanwhile, in a small saucepan, combine the remaining ingredients. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, 2 minutes or until slightly thickened. Transfer asparagus to a large bowl; drizzle with glaze and toss gently to coat. If desired, sprinkle with additional sea salt.

** You could prepare this in the microwave and then add the prepared sauce.**

Bacon Wrapped Asparagus

1 1/2 pounds asparagus spears, trimmed 4 to 5 inches long tips Extra-virgin olive oil, for drizzling A few grinds black pepper


4 slices thin sliced bacon or pancetta Chopped chives or scallions, optional garnish Directions

Lightly coat asparagus spears in extra-virgin olive oil. Season the asparagus with black pepper. Take a quick count of the spear tips. Divide the total number by four. Gather that number of spears and use a slice of bacon to wrap the bundle and secure the spears together. Repeat with remaining ingredients.

To grill, place bundles on hot grill and cover. Cook 10 to 12 minutes until bacon is crisp and asparagus bundles are tender. For oven preparation, place bundles on slotted broiler pan. Bake 12 minutes.

State Capital Highlights

Lawmakers remain on threshold of passing major legislation

AUSTIN — Texas lawmakers have yet to cast final votes on the marquee issues of the 86th regular session of the Legislature: the state budget, school finance reform and property tax relief.

Conference committees named by House Speaker Dennis Bonnen and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who presides over the Senate, must complete their work on the state budget and the other top issues hastily in order to meet deadlines and deliver the finished products to their respective chambers. While little time remains for the bodies to address other issues, many measures can make it through both houses if Bonnen and Patrick want.

The largely ceremonial last day of the session will be Monday, May 27 — Memorial Day.

Meanwhile, here is a random sampling of bills passed by the House and Senate that have either been signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott or are on his desk, waiting for him to take action on them:

—HB 302 by Rep. Dennis Paul, R-Houston, and sponsored by Sen. Bryan Hughes, R-Mineola: Amends law relating to the carrying, storage or possession of a firearm or firearm ammunition by certain persons on certain residential or commercial property.

—HB 547 by Rep. Terry Canales, D-Edinburg, and sponsored by Sen. Charles Perry, R-Lubbock: Amends law by allowing Texans to use as proof of a hunting or fishing license a digital image of the license on their phone.

—HB 793 by Rep. Phil King, R-Weatherford, and sponsored by Sen. Brandon Creighton, R-Conroe: Amends the law relating to certain government contracts with companies that boycott Israel.

—HB 1785 by Reps. Giovanni Capriglione, R-Southlake and Sarah Davis, R-Houston, and sponsored by Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston: Amends the law relating to the information required to be disclosed in a registration form for lobbyists.

—SB 450 by Sen. Beverly Powell, D-Burleson, and sponsored by Rep. Will Metcalf, R-Conroe: Amends the law by changing from Feb. 1 to April 1 the annual deadline by which the board of directors of a Type A or Type B economic development corporation is required to submit a certain

annual report to the comptroller of public accounts.

—SB 726 by Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, and sponsored by Rep. Stan Lambert, R-Abilene: Amends the law by raising the cap on the aggregate of community development investments to 15 percent of a state bank's unimpaired capital and surplus.

—SB 999 by Sen. Donna Campbell, R-New Braunfels, and sponsored by Rep. John Zerwas, R-Richmond: Amends to the law to require the Department of State Health Services to create a state plan for education on and treatment of Alzheimer's disease and related disorders.

Focus: hurricane dangers

Gov. Abbott on May 7 issued a proclamation to raise awareness about the dangers of hurricanes and the precautions Texans can take as hurricane season approaches.

Abbott proclaimed the week of May 5 to May 11 as Hurricane Preparedness Week, and in doing so called Texans to take steps to protect families, communities, neighborhoods and local economies.

Abbott suggested Texans visit https://gov.texas.gov/hurricane to learn more about the steps they can take now to prepare for hurricane season, such as:

—Put together an emergency supply kit;

—Create a communication plan with your family; and

—Know where to go.

Bush: Think about pets, too

In observance of National Animal Disaster Preparedness Day on May 11, Texas Land Commissioner George P. Bush urged Texans to plan for the whole family, including pets, when preparing for severe weather.

"Hurricane Harvey devastated communities and left thousands of pets in need of rescue," Bush said. "When severe weather is in the forecast, make sure your pets are prepared by creating an emergency kit." A kit would include such items as:

- —Adoption information paeers;
- —Medicine; and
- —Pictures of you and your pet together.

"Remember, many temporary evacuation shelters don't allow pets, so make sure you have a plan in place for your whole family," Bush added.

Comptroller sends revenue

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on May 8 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$867.7 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of May.

The amount is 0.7 percent more than the monthly distribution for May 2018.

Sales tax allocations are based on sales made in March by businesses that report tax monthly, and sales made in January, February and March by quarterly filers.




