



Youth Fishing Day is Sunday

The Friona Economic Development Corporation has announced that Sunday, September 8th is Youth Fishing Day. The event will be conducted by the Texas Junior Anglers, Inc. and will take place from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. at Reeve Lake just south of the Friona Community Center.

No pre-registration is required and the event is free to participants 16 year of age and under. A registration form must be completed and turned in at the event site. A waiver of responsibility must also be signed by a parent or legal guardian. Catch and release of fish is encouraged and all state, federal, and local game and fish laws apply and must be observed by all participants. You may bring your own equipment or TJA will provide all the necessary equipment for you.

The pond will be stocked with adult sized channel catfish giving participants an excellent opportunity to land the BIG one. 6 years and under, 7-11, and 12-16 age groups will be awarded trophies and prizes for 1st and 2nd longest fish. Randomly drawn prizes will also be awarded at the conclusion of the event. Prizes will consist of sporting goods and fishing equipment. Souvenir trophies will also be available and proceeds will benefit TJA and help support this FREE event.

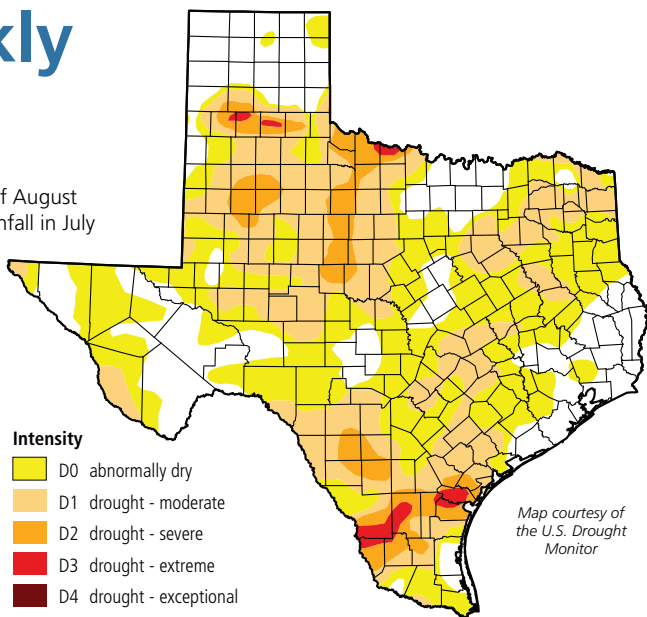

5 years ago • September 4, 2014

Workers began pouring cement on the south side of Highway 60 Tuesday. They said it should take a couple of days to finish. They will be moving to the north side of the highway about September 15. Construction began on June 25 and was hampered somewhat by the several rains the area received.

10 years ago • September 10, 2009

The Friona Chieftains entered the game with the Littlefield Wildcats Friday night as 18-point underdogs according to Harris ratings. Littlefield was undefeated in last year's regular season, losing in a playoff game to eventual state champion Muleshoe. In the opening game of the 2009 season the Wildcats crushed Tulia 56-0.

It didn't matter this night. A standing room only crowd of Chieftain fans saw an exciting home opener, as the Chieftain defense held the Wildcat attack to only 14 points and the Chieftain offense scored 20 unanswered points in the second half to stun Littlefield 20-14.

20 years ago • September 10, 1999

One of the most important railway developments since Parmer County first received railway service in the early days of this century has been going on for the past several months, and will be near completion before the 1900s are over.

Burlington-Northern-Santa Fe construction crews have been "burning the midnight oil" on the project, which is adding a second track all the way through the county.

Actually, the Parmer County portion of the project is just a fraction of the overall job, which will give the railway company a double-line track from Wellington, Kansas to Vaughn, New Mexico.

30 years ago • September 9, 1989

Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have fallen 3.2 cents in the past week to an average of \$2.29 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 15.7 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and 30.7 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$1.96, while the most expensive is \$3.19 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country today stands at \$1.61, while the most expensive is \$4.99 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 1.9 cents in the last week to an average of \$2.56 per gallon. The national average is down 14.6 cents per gallon from a month ago, and stands 26.1 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"With last week's decline in the national average, the tally now stands at seven straight weeks of decline, and heading into the fall, its nearly guaranteed that gas prices will continue to fall as we switch back to cheaper winter gasoline and demand plummets, especially as Hurricane Dorian shuts down the Southeast," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "While a China/U.S. trade deal could undermine the normal seasonal decline in prices that we anticipate, its still nearly guaranteed that average gas prices in nearly every state will stand lower on Thanksgiving and Christmas versus where we stand today. With the changeover to winter gasoline just two weeks away for a bulk of the country, we believe there will be additional drops in gas prices ahead. For those concerned about pricing impacts from Hurricane Dorian, we remind motorists that not all hurricanes impact prices. In fact, few truly leave a mark with the last being Hurricane Harvey in 2017 which knocked out a third of all U.S. refining capacity. The number of refineries seeing such impacts for Dorian will likely be zero, and that makes all the difference. GasBuddy's app also continues to track where motorists can find gas in Florida, Georgia, South and North Carolina with Dorian bearing down."

AIM program: HPWD accepting applications for cost-share funding

LUBBOCK (September 4, 2019) – For the next three weeks, High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) is accepting applications for cost-share funding for the third round of its Assistance in Irrigation Management (AIM) program. The enrollment period ends Sept. 25.

HPWD recently received \$230,000 for AIM funding through the Texas Water Development Board's Agricultural Water Conservation Grants program. This is the third year that HPWD has made these

cost-share funds available to interested producers.

"AIM is a voluntary program to assist producers with the purchase price of telemetry-based irrigation monitoring systems used with either a center pivot system or subsurface drip irrigation system," said HPWD General Manager Jason Coleman.

An online application form and procedures are available at aimapp.hpwd.org. This website also includes a link to program terms & conditions – plus essential information to be included in the application.

"This year, the allocated cost-share funding is tied to the number of irrigated acres by county within the Water District. We will evaluate the number of applications received by county at the end of the three-week application period. Any remaining funds will be available on a first-come, first-served basis after that time," Coleman said.

More than 40 producers enrolled 18,400 acres of land during the first round of the AIM Program (2017). There were 154 telemetry-based systems deployed which resulted in 13,500 acre-inches of water saved.

Of this, Coleman said 6,372 acre-inches of water was saved when producers received notification of irrigation system malfunctions; 6,029 acre-inches was saved with use of irrigation scheduling software; and 1,093 acre-inches was saved by remotely turning off equipment in response to a rainfall alert.

"During the past two years, producers have shown a great amount of interest in using telemetry-based technology to improve their irrigation scheduling," Coleman said. "HPWD commends them for their efforts to conserve groundwater resources within the District."

Psalm 137—Politically Incorrect

As you read through the scriptures, you come across lots of things that are politically incorrect, and may seem abrasive to our modern sensitivities. We rejoice that David slew Goliath with a stone, but gloss over David slicing Goliath's head off with the giant's own sword, or we shy away from obliteration of people, as the Israelites occupied the promised land. Psalm 137 carries another one of these politically incorrect passages, as the Psalmist requests from the Lord, regarding Babylon, "Blessed shall be he who takes your little ones and dashes them against the rock!" Wow!!! That is definitely is not turning the other cheek. How does one make sense of this verse?

Context, context and context is so key in interpreting Bible passages! Psalm 137 is a cry out of the context of the Babylonian captivity, where God used a wicked nation to punish His idolatrous people. The Babylonian's wrath was fierce, and now in captivity, Psalm 137 captures the cry for God to punish those who punished Israel. The Israelites' cry was that the Babylon's punishment would be the same measure as theirs was when the Babylonians ruthlessly crushed them. The Israelites cried out for vengeance and justice, which God did grant, but only in His timing and in His way. In fact, God had already foretold Babylon's destruction, which came about in 539 BC, when the Persians overtook the Babylonians.

Maybe you find yourself in a situation today that has caused you great oppression or injustice, and you have a hard time even praying honestly to God. May Psalm 137 be an encouragement to leave vengeance in God's hands, and continue praying and pursuing the Lord in honesty and trust.

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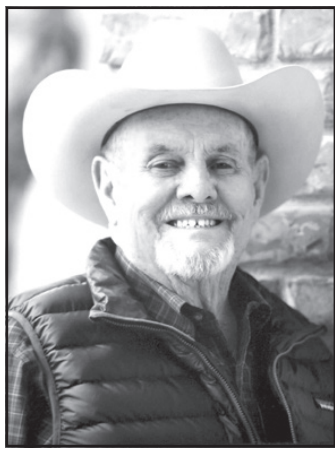

Report details progress in school safety

AUSTIN — The Texas School Safety Update, a report highlighting progress made to keep students and teachers safe at school, was released by Gov. Greg Abbott on Aug. 27.

The report gives Texans an update on efforts by the governor's office, the Legislature and state agencies toward implementing recommendations made in the School Safety Action Plan released on May 30, 2018 and the subsequent update in August 2018.

The first indication of progress listed in the report is that the state's "Mental Health First Aid" program saw a 37-percent increase in the number of public school district employees and school resource officers trained in fiscal year 2018 compared to fiscal year 2017, and more than 10,000 school personnel were trained in fiscal year 2019, which ended Aug. 31.

"Because the safety of our students in Texas classrooms today is a top priority, I made school safety an emergency item in the 86th Legislative Session — and state leaders took substantial steps to deliver on this priority," Abbott said.

"I am grateful for the bi-partisan efforts of legislators that led to significant improvements in enhancing the safety of Texas schools, expanding students' access to mental health resources, and increasing support for teachers facing classroom challenges. As we look to the possibilities that a new school year may bring, school administrators, parents, teachers and lawmakers must continue the conversation on school safety and continue to make the effort to keep our students safe in an affirming environment that strives for excellence and growth," the governor added.

Among other areas of progress listed in the report are:

1. Since August 2018, the Texas State School Safety Center (TxSSC) has held seven threat assessment workshops with 425 participants, and will host seven more workshops this August;

2. The 2020-21 state budget provides \$5 million to Texas Tech Health Sciences Center for the Telemedicine Intervention Triage and Referral Project, a model for identifying students at risk for committing school violence and intervening with those students before acts of violence occur; and

3. Senate Bill 11, which took effect June 6, provides districts with \$100 million in funding for school-based mental health centers, the

hiring of counselors and other mental health needs, and provides \$99 million in funding for the Texas Mental Health Care Consortium.

Furthermore, the passage of SB 11, along with HB 1 and SB 500, makes available some \$339 million in school safety funding for various agencies and entities, including the Health and Human Services Commission, the Texas Education Agency, Texas State University and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

AG joins in court brief

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Aug. 23 co-signed a friend-of-the-court civil rights-related brief filed with the U.S. Supreme Court.

Paxton and the attorneys general of 13 other states, and one governor, urge the high court to overturn lower court cases that the coalition says would expand provisions of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 that prohibit discrimination based on a person's sex to include sexual orientation and gender identity.

DPS calls for extra caution

As schools reopened across Texas and classrooms filled, the Texas Department of Public Safety put out a reminder that drivers need to slow down in school zones.

DPS urged drivers to be extra careful around school buses, to follow all traffic laws, and to stay alert around schools and the surrounding areas where children may be walking and playing.

DPS troopers "won't tolerate reckless driving that puts children in harm's way," said the agency's director, Steve McCraw.

If a school bus has alternating flashing red signals visible from the front or rear, drivers must stop before reaching the bus. Drivers can only proceed if the flashing lights are no longer activated; the driver signals you to proceed; or the bus has resumed driving. Approaching drivers do not have to stop for a school bus that is operating a visual signal if the roadway is separated by a physical barrier or an intervening space.

Many new laws take effect

Some 820 bills that passed during the regular session of 86th Texas Legislature that ended May 27 took effect Sept. 1.

Coconut

Over history the coconut has been used for its flesh, its milk, its shell, to make rope, or even as a flotation device. It has always been versatile. Even in modern times, the coconut has found its place in the diets of the health conscience with the use of coconut oil, coconut flour, coconut sugar as well as its use in many beauty products.

The coconut has an interesting history. It originated in India and Southeast Asia. It seems to have moved across the world in two different ways. Because the coconut can float, it caught a ride on the ocean currents and traveled to tropical islands. However, it was also transported by man over land and water trade routes. Marco Polo came across the coconut in Egypt in the 13th century and called it "the Pharaoh's nut." In the 16th century Vasco da Gama brought the coconut along the "maritime silk road." It

was here that the modern name for coconut was derived from the word cocuruto or skull because of the three dots that looked like two eyes and a mouth. Other reports claim the word came from the Spanish and Portuguese word coco which meant "monkey face." The coconuts then made their way to the Caribbean with colonialism and the slave trade. Coconuts are now found in most tropical regions across the world.

In honor of World Coconut Day on September 2, here are a few recipes that use coconut in one form or another. The first is a granola recipe from my cousin, Kelli Smith. She brought this to share at Camp New Dawn this summer, and it was a big hit with the volunteers. The chicken recipe I found online, and I thought looked worth a try. The pancakes are one I enjoy when I want to have a "healthy" pancake. Bill is not a fan of them, but I think they are pretty tasty.

Apricot Ginger Coconut "Granola"

5 dried apricots
 ¼ cup coconut oil (melted)
 2 tsp. vanilla extract
 ½ tsp. almond extract
 2 cups raw sunflower seeds
 2 cups raw pumpkin seeds
 1 cup chopped raw pecans
 1 cup sliced raw almonds
 3 cups unsweetened coconut flakes or shredded unsweetened coconut
 1 tsp. ground ginger
 1 tsp. ground allspice
 Sweetener equivalent to ¼ cup sugar - optional (I used 2 TBS Pure Organic Stevia)

Preheat oven to 275oF. In a food processor or food chopper (I just diced with knife) pulse the apricots until they are reduced to very small fragments. In a small bowl, combine the apricots and coconut oil and mix thoroughly. Add the vanilla, almond extract, stir, and set aside.

In a large bowl, combine the sunflower seeds, pumpkin seeds, pecans, almonds, coconut, ginger, allspice, and sweetener (if using). Stir in the reserved apricot mixture until

well mixed.

Spread the mixture in a large baking pan and bake for about 15 minutes, stirring halfway through, or until lightly browned. I used jelly roll pans and baked in two batches. (It makes about 10 cups) Remove and cool. Stored in an airtight container at room temperature, it will keep for about a week. May be used as cereal with milk, a snack by itself, topper on yogurt or other cereal. Could add raisins, dried cranberries, chocolate chips, or anything else you love.

Instant Pot Coconut Curry Chicken

Ingredients

1 Tbsp coconut oil
 1 medium onion, chopped
 3 Tbsp curry powder, or to taste, divided
 2 cloves garlic, chopped
 1 (14.5 ounce) can diced tomatoes, drained
 1 (8 ounce) can tomato paste
 ½ cup chicken broth
 2 Tbsp white sugar
 2 pounds chicken breast
 Salt to taste
 Ground black pepper to taste
 1 (14 ounce) can coconut milk, only use the solid portion in can to make a thicker sauce

Directions

Turn on a multi-functional pressure cooker (such as Instant Pot(R)) and select Sauté function. Add coconut oil; when hot, add onion and cook for 1 minute. Add 2 tablespoons curry powder and garlic. Mix well and cook for 2 minutes. Turn off Sauté function. Stir in diced tomatoes, tomato sauce, chicken broth, and sugar. Poke holes into each chicken breast using a fork. Sprinkle with salt, pepper, and remaining curry

powder. Add seasoned chicken to the pot. Close and lock the lid. Select high pressure according to manufacturer's instructions; set timer for 10 minutes. Allow 10 to 15 minutes for pressure to build. Release pressure using the natural-release method according to manufacturer's instructions for 10 minutes. Release remaining pressure carefully using the quick-release method according to manufacturer's instructions, about 5 minutes. Unlock

and remove the lid. Remove chicken; use 2 forks to shred the meat and return it to the pot. Turn on Sauté function; cook and stir until liquid is lightly boiling, 2 to 3 minutes. Turn pressure cooker to Keep Warm. Add coconut milk and stir well; cook for 10 minutes more to allow flavors to come together. You may want to add only the solid portion of the coconut milk or just add a partial amount depending on how thick you want the sauce.

Cinnamon Coconut Paleo Pancakes

Ingredients
 2 large eggs
 3 tablespoons full fat coconut milk
 ½ mashed ripe banana about 2 tablespoons
 ½ teaspoon apple cider vinegar
 ½ teaspoon vanilla extract
 1½ tablespoons of Bob's Red Mill organic coconut flour
 ½ teaspoon cinnamon
 ¼ teaspoon baking soda
 1 small pinch of salt
 ghee or coconut oil for frying

Instructions

Whisk the eggs, coconut milk, mashed banana, apple cider vinegar, and vanilla extract in a large bowl until well combined. Then, in a separate bowl, mix together the coconut flour,

cinnamon, baking soda, and salt. Whisk together the dry and wet ingredients just before cooking. Heat a tablespoon of ghee over medium heat in a small cast iron skillet and add a tablespoon of batter to the pan.

As soon as bubbles formed on the surface (about 1½ minutes), flip the flapjack over and let it cook for another 30 seconds or so on the other side. Repeat until done with the batter and enjoy!

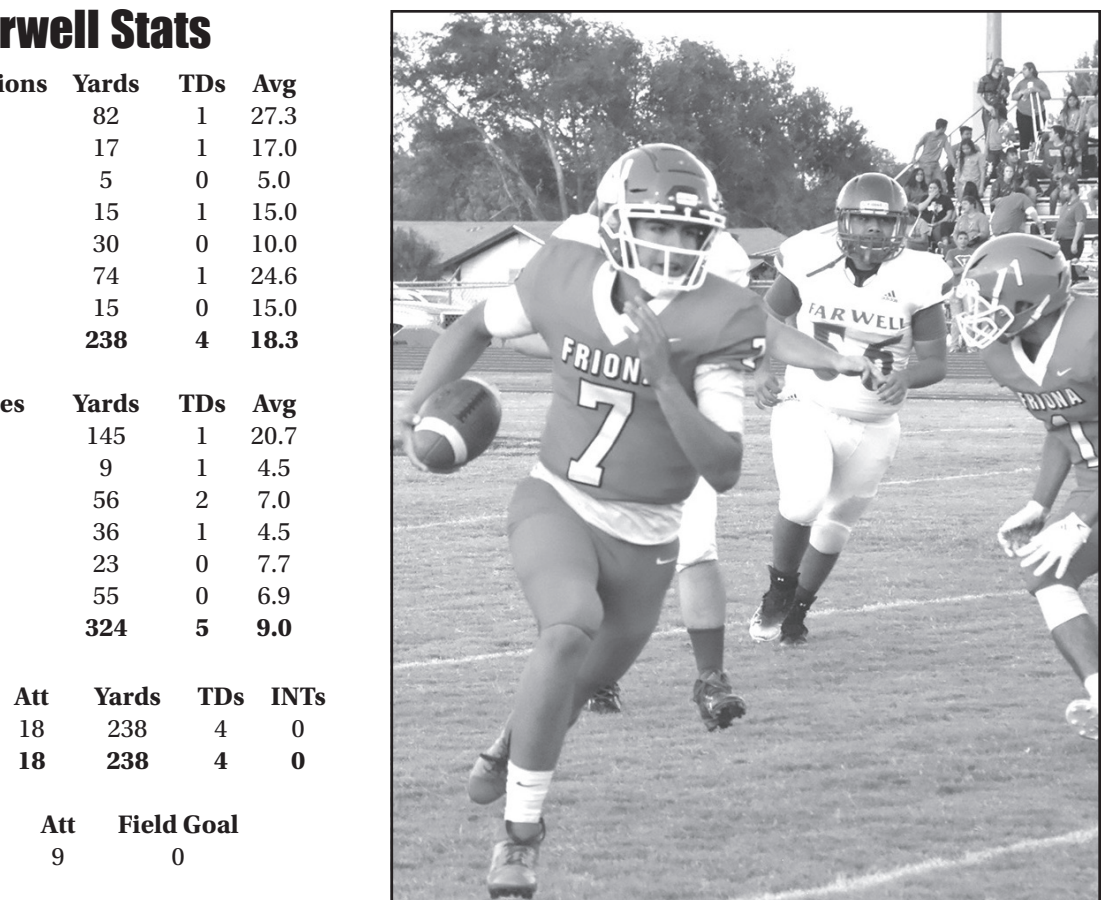
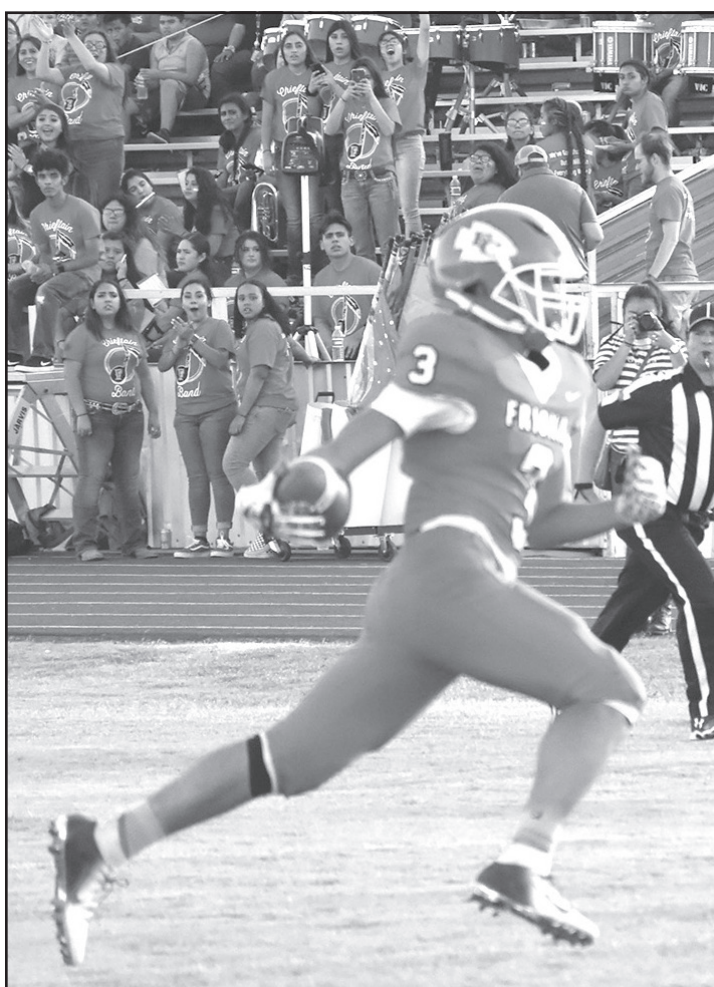

Xcel Energy customers will receive refunds this month

Xcel Energy's Texas customers will see a credit on their electric bills this month that reflect a one-time \$16 million fuel cost refund announced in June.

The refund, which has been approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas, is related to several months of lower costs for natural gas used to fuel area power plants - savings that are expected to continue with the addition of the new Hale Wind Project near Plainview, which started commercial operations at the end of June.

All of Xcel Energy's various customer classes will receive funds. Depending on billing cycles, the refunds could be prorated over a two-month period. Residential customers us-

ing 1,000 kilowatt-hours a month would receive a total credit of \$14.53, higher than the refund Texas customers received in January that amounted to \$11.76 on a typical residential bill.

In addition to the one-time refund, Xcel Energy reduced the fuel cost factor on customer bills on July 1, lowering a typical residential bill by about 5 percent. The change was made to better reflect current and anticipated costs for natural gas, which is the fuel source for about half of the region's electricity supply.

The fuel cost factor, which accounts for about 20 percent of a typical residential bill, collects revenue to pay the cost of coal and natural gas that fuel generators at area power plants, and also

recovers the cost of electricity imported from outside the region. Xcel Energy does not profit from fuel costs since they are passed through to customers dollar for dollar. If actual fuel costs exceed the pre-set factor, Xcel Energy can surcharge customer bills to make up the difference. Earlier in the year, the set factor was collecting too much revenue as natural gas prices dropped, resulting in the current refund.

A proposal to increase base rates, which account for the remainder of a customer's bill, is still being reviewed by the cities Xcel Energy serves in Texas, as well as by the Public Utility Commission of Texas. Any changes in base rates, if approved, would not occur until mid-2020.
