- The Parmer County Cancer Coalition's annual Survivor Dinner will be held on Tuesday, November 12th at 6 pm at the 6th Street Church of Christ in Friona. Invitations will be mailed to county cancer survivors the last week of October.

As most Medicare recipients are aware, open enrollment started on October 15th and will end on December 7th. Medicare and its plans change every year, especially the prescription drug plans. Part D deals entirely with your prescription medications and although the plan you had for 2019 may have been ideal for your prescription medications, that plan may have changed for 2020. By the time you realize your current plan is no longer the most appropriate, open

enrollment is over and no changes can made on your Part D coverage.

This program is being presented by Area Agency on Aging and they have the capability to review your medications and let you make an informed decision on which Part D plan is most appropriate for your medication needs. The educational portion of the program will begin at 2:00 p.m. in the conference room at Parmer Medical Center and last approximately one hour. Immediately following the program, the benefits counselors will stay to assist anyone with questions regarding which Part D plan is most financially appropriate for their medication needs.

Please bring your medication list,

any insurance cards, including your Medicare card, and join us on Thursday, October 24th. The one hour program may have a significant impact on your prescription drug costs for the upcoming year!!!

Mayor's Minutes

I had the privilege and honor of meeting Glenn Hegar, Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts. He was the keynote speaker at the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission's annual meeting banquet on September 26, 2019 at the Hodgetown Baseball Park in downtown Amarillo. Mr. Hegar shared that there is currently \$45,000,000.00 of unclaimed money in Texas. Money that has been sent to the state that failed to get to the rightful owner. A person can go to claimittexas.com to verify if you have any money that you can claim from the State. In fact, City Manager Lee Davila and I visited this website and the City of Friona has 5 checks totaling \$3,130.02. Checks that were written to EMS and for whatever reason, did not make it to the EMS and ended up being sent to the state of Texas. City of Friona is claiming this money by following simple steps on the website. I would encourage everyone to visit the website to verify if there is money waiting for you to claim.

The Texas Demographic Center has released 2018 preliminary population estimates for all Texas cities. Friona is estimated to drop from 4,123 to 3,934, a 4.5% drop. Parmer County's population is estimated to drop from 10,269 to 9,872, a 3.8% drop. Bovina and Farwell are also estimated to have lost residents. Have you ever wondered how the population estimates are estimated or calculated? To answer this question, City Manager Lee Davila and I called the Demographic Center in Austin and found out the following: There are two forms the city fills out on an annual basis and mails to the Demographic Center, (1) Annexation report, and (2) Building Permit report. Based upon the amount of businesses annexed into the city and any new buildings inside city limits, the Demographic Center uses this information to base their estimates.

The City of Friona is looking into the possibility of leasing a new street sweeper. City Manager Lee Davila is scheduling a demonstration with the company to allow the city council members to observe the sweeper in action and answer any questions before we discuss lease options.

Chief Jimenez and the officers responded to 197 calls in September. There were 209 stops, 121 warnings, 88 citations and 9 arrests. (3-warrants and 6-no drivers license). The officers drove a total of 2,764 miles patrolling and protecting our city. The police department is receiving a new police car, but it will be delayed due to the GM strike. We are working on secondary options in case we need them.

Volunteer Fire Department responded to 7 emergency calls in September. On Sept. 3rd-tractor fire, 4 firefighters and 2 trucks responded. Sept. 7th-car accident, 4 firefighters and 2 trucks responded. Sept. 8thgrass fire, 5 firefighters and 3 trucks responded. Sept. 9th-grass fire, 9 firefighters and 5 trucks responded. Sept. 15th-gas leak, 5 firefighters and 1 truck responded. Sept. 19th-car accident, 8 firefighters and 4 trucks responded and on Sept. 26th-post fire, 9 firefighters and 4 trucks responded.

EMS responded to 24 emergency calls in September. There were nine calls for 911, five transfers and 10 calls ended in a "no transport". Total billing equaled \$16,428.17 and collections totaled \$7,001.28.

Accounts payable totaled \$226,610.65 for September. This includes a \$20,000.00 payment to DACO for a payment on a fire truck. Also, \$36,712.00 to OMEGA Electronics for the new console installed at the Friona Police Department. The city continues to be in good standing.

The city pumped 21,337,100 gallons of water and sold 19,303,000 gallons. Billing equaled \$90,777.74 on 1448 accounts.

Friona Public Library had 522 patron visits (includes electronic visits) in September for an average of 27 visits per day and was open 19 days. There were 619 items circulated and 61 new items added to the inventory.

To all of those involved in helping on Sunday, know that we are forever grateful for your service. I cannot imagine arriving at a scene full of young teenagers that you all know and love. The Friona Volunteer Fire Department, Friona EMS, Parmer County Sheriff's Department, DPS, Friona PD, Parmer Medical Center

ER, our family and friends that were there until Andy and I were able to arrive. As I write the names of these organizations, know they are filled with individuals we love, and see everyday and with skill and precision were able to take care of our children. I don't know the identity of the woman who stopped before services arrived, but thank you.

After the accident, the amazing people in our lives have continued to support all of us.

There are not enough words to be able to express the true account of how grateful we are for all of you.

God is great and will provide what each of us needs. Your continued prayers for everyone involved are being felt, please continue to offer them up to the Lord!

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

15 Years Ago - Oct. 14, 2004

Tire Spikes And Taser Guns Used in Car Chase

A couple of New Mexico brothers having a stolen car, beer, and marijuana joyride during the wee hours last Friday, October 8, ended up spiked, tasered, and jailed in Parmer County.

The car, a Pontiac Grand Am, had been reported stolen in Portales, New Mexico. It was spotted in Curry County by New Mexico law enforcement. The vehicle fled when an attempt was made to stop it.

The chase entered Parmer County as the two turned onto Highway 60 at the state line, traveling east in the west-bound lanes. A New Mexico deputy was in pursuit as the car reached speeds over 90 mph and narrowly missed at least two westbound vehicles, including an 18-wheeler. Fortunately the incident occurred approximately from 2-4 a.m. while traffic was lightest.

Parmer County Sheriff's deputies Wayne Gruben and Andy Stormes, and Bovina police office Eddie Everhart joined the chase. When the

pursuit reached Bovina, the stolen vehicle moved over to the eastbound lanes. Deputy Stormes deployed the department's spike strips near the bridge east of Bovina and flattened the Grand Am's front and rear passenger side tires.

The suspects continued to drive eastbound eventually losing the tires and showering sparks as they drove on the tire rims, often at speeds as slow as 30 mph. Between Bovina and Friona deputies noticed the two suspects tossing out a couple of boxes of beer and one suspect hanging out the passenger side window.

Sheriff Randy Geries was called at home and waited west of town near the grain elevators for the chase. Friona Police Chief Tino Salinaz and Sgt. Joe Lopez were also called out to assist. Westbound traffic out of Friona was temporarily blocked since the fleeing vehicle had been driving on the wrong side of the highway.

When the vehicle reached Geries position west of Friona, it was showering sparks and almost disabled. Geries got his Sheriff's car in front of the Grand Am and slowed down until the stolen car finally

sideswiped a pickup parked on the shoulder and caught on fire.

The Friona Volunteer Fire Department and Friona EMS were dispatched to the scene about 3:00 a.m.

The two brothers ran into a cotton field where one was dropped with a taser gun. The officers were unable to find the second suspect who had fled in the dark through an adjacent maize field to the railroad tracks and made his way into Friona on foot while they searched the dark wet fields for him.

He knocked on the door of a residence in the 400 block of Woodland and asked for dry clothes and a ride to Portales.

The residents said they did not have a car but gave him a dry sweat-suit, then called the police department and gave them a description.

The officers searching the cotton patch were alerted. Sheriff Geries said they decided not to drive around looking for him because he could hide from them in the dark. Officers positioned themselves near the three convenience stores on the theory he would likely make his way to one of

the stores looking for a ride.

The next contact was a short while later when he knocked on a door at 7th and Grand and again asked for a ride to Portales. The lady at the house told him she needed to go get gasoline first. While the suspect stayed at the residence with the husband, instead of getting gas the lady drove to the police department and officers went to the residence and arrested him.

Geries said that when confronted the suspect reached for his back pocket and was also dropped by the deputy's taser gun. Turned out he had marijuana in his back pocket.

Sheriff Geries said the incident was the first time his department had occasion to use both the tire spikes and the taser guns. "We have had tire spikes in all our cars for a couple of years and we have trained with them but this is the first time we have had to use them. I'm glad to know they work very well," he said.

The spike strips are made of triangle shaped spikes so that no matter how you toss it on the road the spikes will be upright. "The strips are on a tether so they can be thrown on the road then pulled off so that only the bad guy's car is spiked," Geries said.

The tasers are guns that fire tiny electrodes attached to electrical wires that pierce the skin and jolt the suspect with about 6,000 volts of electricity. They are designed to disable a suspect and are not lethal. "This is the first time we've used the tasers in action. They worked especially good in this situation," Geries said.

The two brothers, both Mexican nationals and from Portales, were Eddie Martinez, 21, and Esteban Martinez, 23. Eddie Martinez was charged with evading arrest with a vehicle and possession of marijuana.

Esteban Martinez was charged with evading arrest with a vehicle and DWI. Their cases are pending before the grand jury.

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
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
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


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Laura Field wins Week 7



Coffee Part III

Entering the Twentieth Century, coffee continued to grow in popularity. Advancements made brewing a cup of coffee at home possible. In 1900 R. W. Hills invented vacuum packing and Hills Brothers began to sell roasted coffee beans in tins. That same year, a Japanese American chemist, Satori Kato, invented instant coffee. Melittle Bentz created a coffee filter using her son's blotting paper, filed for a patent, and opened her own company in 1908. The love of coffee in America took a new turn in 1920 with the prohibition of alcohol. Coffee sales soared. Due to this love of coffee, it was rationed during WWII to prevent hoarding. Maxwell House instant coffee was placed in ration kits. By the late 1950's, coffee houses made a return to America by way of the Beatniks who hung out drinking espresso and discussing philosophical and political topics. These coffee houses led to the political and cultural challenges to the American lifestyle in the 1960's. Although advancements to home brewing had been made over the years, the best improvement came in 1972 when Mr. Coffee introduced the first automatic drip home coffee

For my final coffee story, move to 1966. Alfred Peet opened Peet's Coffee in Berkeley, California. He is known as the "grandfather" of the specialty coffee industry. With Alfred's approval, his friends, Jerry Baldwin, Zev Siegl, and Gordon Bowker used Alfred's roasting method and opened the first Starbucks in Seattle. At the time, Starbucks only sold roasted coffee beans.

In 1982, Howard Schultz was hired by the Starbucks company. He quickly tried to convince the owners that selling the actual coffee drinks would be a great boom to the company. They did not agree, and Schultz left Starbucks in 1987. He started his own coffee chain, Il Giornale. Eventually Schultz bought out the Starbucks company and soon made history by putting a coffee house on virtually every corner in America. The most recent addition to our coffee obsession was the invention of the Keurig coffee maker and single serve k-cups.

With the continued success of coffee sales at coffee shops and making coffee in our own homes, it is easy to believe that coffee is the world's most popular beverage. In fact, coffee is second only to oil as the most traded commodity.

State Capital Highlights

Comptroller releases 2020-2021 estimate of state revenue

AUSTIN — State budget writers likely will have more funds to meet the needs of Texas in the near term, based on information released Oct. 10 by the comptroller's office.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said revenue available for general spending in 2020-21 is expected to total about \$121.76 billion, up 9.6 percent from the 2018-19 biennium. This revenue would support the \$118.86 billion in general-purpose spending called for by the 86th Texas Legislature and would result in a final balance available for certification of \$2.89 billion.

Before each regular legislative session, the comptroller issues a biennial revenue estimate that forecasts how much money will be available for spending in the state's next two-year budget cycle. After the session, the comptroller releases the certification revenue estimate providing the detailed basis by which the comptroller certified the budget. The certification estimate revises the biennial revenue estimate to reflect legislative activity and current economic information and takes into account final revenue numbers for the recently ended fiscal year.

"In fiscal 2019, the Texas economy continued to grow at rates among the highest in the nation," Hegar said. "We are projecting continued expansion of the Texas economy in this biennium. The most likely scenario is one of steady expansion at a pace below that of the 2018-19 biennium. Risks to the estimate, however, include ongoing uncertainty about trade and national economic policy, slowing global economic growth and volatility in energy prices resulting from instability and potential conflict in the Middle East."

Hegar, who closely monitors the economy and state revenue, said he would keep the public informed of significant events as they arise.

Hegar distributes revenue

Comptroller Hegar on Oct. 9 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$773.1 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of October.

The amount to be distributed is 5.1 percent more than the amount reported in October 2018. Allocations are based on sales made in August by businesses that report tax monthly.

When compared with the other 49 states, Texas boasts the highest average wages after adjusting for cost of living.

This is according to TexIndex, a tool on the Texas comptroller's website that lets users see how Texas and its diverse regions fit into the national picture.

The comptroller has a 50-state scorecard which now includes regional data in TexIndex, allowing a more detailed look at the state. Data range from information on the state's under-18 population and degreed professionals to home values and the state tax burden.

Syphilis testing mandated

The Texas Department of State Health Services recently announced Texas public health officials are reminding health care professionals about a new law increasing syphilis testing during pregnancy.

Texas law now mandates three syphilis tests: at the first prenatal exam, during the third trimester and at delivery. The new requirement took effect Sept. 1 and comes as the state has seen a sharp increase in the number of syphilis infections passed from mother to child.

Congenital syphilis cases reported to the Texas Department of State Health Services more than doubled last year amid an ongoing increase in syphilis among women of child-bearing age and an enhanced public health effort to detect and track cases. There were 367 cases of congenital syphilis in Texas in 2018, up from 164 in 2017.

"Congenital syphilis can have devastating effects on a child, but it is preventable when treatment begins in time," said Dr. John Hellerstedt, DSHS commissioner. "Testing in accordance with the new law will provide the best opportunity to treat the infection so the infant doesn't suffer permanent consequences."

Update: Vaping, lung issues

The Department of State Health Services on Oct. 8 reported Texas has identified 95 cases of severe lung disease in people who report "vaping" before developing symptoms. One of the patients died.

The agency said state health officials continue to gather information about 28 other possible cases to determine whether they are consistent with the symptoms and substance use seen in cases in Texas and 48 other states. Information about vaping and e-cigarettes is available online at dshs.texas.gov/vaping/.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Spray and line with parchment a 9-by-9-inch baking pan; spray the parchment as well. For the crumb topping: In a medium bowl, mix the flour, brown sugar, cinnamon, instant coffee powder and salt. Add the melted butter and mix until crumbs form that you can clump together in your hand. Set aside. For the cake: In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, baking pow-

der, baking soda, cinnamon, salt and cardamom. In a smaller bowl, whisk together the coffee and sour cream until smooth. In the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, beat the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Add the eggs, one at a time, mixing until each is well combined. Then add the vanilla extract and beat until the mixture is light and fluffy. Starting and ending with the

dry ingredients, alternate adding the flour mixture and the coffee mixture to the stand mixer; mix each addition well, scraping the bowl with each addition. Pour the batter into the prepared baking pan and top with crumb topping, spreading it evenly. Bake for 45 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean. Remove the cake from the oven and allow to cool for 20 to 30 minutes before cutting and serving.

Getting to Class Wasn't Easy Two Air Force deployments delayed professor's duties

For Mike McFarland, getting the job as a professor in the department of communications at West Texas A&M University was the easy part. Having the chance to actually perform it, well, that was another matter.

McFarland was hired to teach at his alma mater in the fall semester of 2017. But he never showed up, having last been seen in Nebraska. He finally returned to Canyon to teach in the 2018 spring semester, and then took off for Atlanta, New Jersey, San Antonio, Germany and Africa only to return for this fall semester.

What's going on? The Air Force, that's what's going on.

"It was an interesting situation," said Dr. Trudy Hanson, department chair of the department of communications. "Even our HR department didn't quite know how to handle it."

McFarland, 59, had been teaching computer programming, web page design, video game design and audio production at Hopkinton High School in suburban Boston when there was an opportunity for the Brownfield native to return to his roots in 2017 with the opening at WT.

He got the position, but there was the little oh-bythe-way. McFarland, who served in the Air Force, various Air National Guards and Air Force and Navy Reserves for nearly 30 years, was in the Massachusetts Air National Guard until December 2019. There was always the chance his 253 Cyber Space Installation Group would be activat-

ed, but really, what were the odds?

Pretty good as it turned out. Just as McFarland was about to launch his new career at WT, Uncle Sam tapped him on the shoulder. His group was activated, and he was off to Offutt Air Force Base in the fall of 2017. Goodbye classroom, hello Strategic Air Command.

"Some units, there's a higher probability that you may be deployed, and we're one of those units that's expected to always be ready to go somewhere," McFarland said. "So you always have to be prepared. It just depends on what's going on in the world."

The 253 Cyber Space Installation Group determines communication requirements and makes installations at U.S. Air Force sites all over the world. It's more of a management group with eight squadrons underneath

At Offutt, McFarland was part of a group installing communication infrastructure in new Strategic Command buildings. He was on the cable team, pulling miles and miles of cable and manually installing it.

"We were affectionately referred to as the 'Cable Dogs," McFarland said.

Deployed once again

Meanwhile, back at WT, Hanson had to refer to Plan B, even though there was no Plan B. She added to the workload of instructor Randy Ray, who shared some of the audio and video technology expertise that McFarland was to teach. A graduate assistant was also used.

"We kind of piecemealed things together for three months," Hanson said.

McFarland's communication installation duties complete, he finally joined the WT communications faculty in January 2018 to settle in as an instructor. That semester went fine, and as summer approached, McFarland was driving to Massachusetts.

"And it was - 'Guess what' deployed We're getting again," he said.

McFarland sent an email to Hanson, laying it out matterof-factly that he was going to be gone again. It wasn't what he had in mind, but he had no choice.

Employment law says an employee can't lose his job because of military service, but they do not draw a salary. Beginning in the fall 2018, Hanson used that savings to hire a part-time instructor.

This deployment was more involved. The 253 Cyber Space Installation Group was sent to pre-deployment training at Warner Robbins Air Force Base in Georgia, Fort Dix and McGuire Air Force



Base in New Jersey, and Lackland Air Force Base in San

They were eventually based out of Ramstein Air Force Base in Frankfort, Germany, but the work was in the African country of Niger and two new air bases, 202 and 201. Their primary mission was to oversee a number of squadrons in 'com-planning,' determining communications requirement for the entire African continent, and Tactical to Enduring (TTE), which is transitioning from temporary communications to long-

"There was a lot of manual labor," McFarland said.

Grateful the job remained

Niger is on the edge of the Sahara Desert. It was hot and flat and the wind blew sand. In that regard, it wasn't a whole lot different than Brownfield or much of West Texas.

"The sand storms aren't as bad as Iraq and Afghanistan," he said, "but the weird thing is they still have these rain systems. So it will flood and everything will turn green.

"And here come the locusts. It's like a Biblical thing as they eat all the vegetation. After the locusts come in, here comes the birds like an Alfred Hitchcock movie. They eat up all the locusts. It's a really weird cycle of events."

Hanson said McFarland was still considered a faculty member and colleague, even though she didn't know how many emails and weekly updates on department and University news he received.

"Granted, there are laws in place that protect civilian jobs, but I didn't sign anything that says, 'Sorry, I have to do this first," McFarland said. "If WT would have said

that we have to give this position to someone else, I would have understood.

"The next opportunity I would have reapplied. I'm not one of those people to use the law to his advantage when it's unfair. My philosophy was I put a hardship on the University. They hired me, made plans for me to be here at a certain time doing certain things, and all of a sudden, I'm not able to do that.

"If they would have told me we'll just have to do this at a different time, I get that. But thankfully, it all worked out where I could come back."

McFarland, who had a WT flag flying in Africa, was discharged from active duty this past summer. His seat was warm and waiting for him in the communications department this semester where McFarland has jumped in teaching two courses in mass communications and a sports broadcasting practicum.

It's full higher ed circle for McFarland, who received a degree in Radio/TV from WT in the early 1980s.

"He's a great colleague and really wants to recruit students to the field," Hanson said. "He has an energetic way of teaching and approaching people. He has wholeheartedly jumped into academia."

McFarland is retiring from the Air National Guard in December, and, so - possibly, maybe - that part of his life is

"Unless something catastrophic like war with Syria, this is it," he said. "It doesn't quite seem real. After 30 years, it becomes part of your life. It's just something you do - it's ingrained in you. So when it's over, I don't know if it's going to feel weird, but it's going to be different."
