FEDC announces Matching Member Grant Program

In an effort to improve the businesses in the city of Friona, The Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) Board of Directors are offering financial assistance to upgrade your business store-front with signage, aesthetics, publications, matching special sales, or other improvements.

Currently, this is a pilot program for Main Street businesses. The pilot program will establish benchmarks and best practices for expanding the program to all businesses in Friona in the near future.

This is the process. This is a matching grant fund up to \$1,500 depending on the amount you as a business owner spend. For every \$2.00 you spend, the FEDC will match you \$1.00 up to \$1,500.

Here are some examples:

- If you spend \$1,000, you will be given \$500 from the FEDC
- If you spend \$2,000, you will be given \$1,000 from the FEDC
- If you spend \$3,000+, you will be given \$1,500 from the FEDC

The FEDC promotes economic development within Friona and focuses on long-term growth for the city by trying to attract new businesses. Our hope for this program is to revitalize our area businesses and help attract and improve tourism.

If you would like to participate in this program, the FEDC is limiting grant awards to 10 businesses only. The deadline to submit applications is December 6, 2019. An application review committee comprised of

members from the FEDC will review applications by December 20, 2019 and award grants on December 27, 2019.

Local group enjoys Heritage of America Tour

Customers and Friends of Interbank in Friona, left Oct 4th for a trip to the north-east. The trip was named Heritage of America and we visited some of the sites where events concerning the history of our United States occurred.

The group spent two nights in the heart of New York City. One morning the group took a city tour and saw Greenwich Village, Wall Street, and China Town. We drove through the "high dollar district", and saw Saks 5th Ave, Nordstrom's, Macy's Department Store, and Trump Tower, among others. We walked in Central Park and spent time at the 911 Memorial. We also took in three Broadway Shows! We had fun walking the street of Broadway at Times Square at night, and we were amazed at the number of people there. We got tickled at how some were dressed and how others entertained us for money.

We left New York City for Philadelphia where we saw the Liberty Bell and Independence Hall, which is the location for the signing of the Declaration of Independence and the drafting of the Constitution. What a wonderful experience that was, seeing and learning of the history of our country in the 1700s. Some of the buildings are original; we felt very lucky to have the privilege of seeing these landmarks. It sounds boring to read, but we really enjoyed Independence Hall and encourage every American to visit there.

We then drove on to Gettysburg, the site of the Union victory and a turning point of the Civil War. We were most impressed to see Paul Philippoteaux's Cyclorama, painted in 1884. It is a 360 degree cylindrical painting depicting Pickett's Charge. Later, we drove through the battlegrounds where we saw many monuments depicting which battle was fought on that spot. We had an excellent guide who made

the 3 day battle in 1863 come alive for us. What a sad thing to happen to America! After lunch, we divided into groups with one group taking a walking tour of the town of Gettysburg and the other touring President Eisenhower's home and farm. (We didn't realize Eisenhower's home was near Gettysburg). Both were enjoyed very much. We then left for the Yorktown Battlefield where America's independence was finally won. So we went from the battlefields of 1863 back to the Revolutionary wars up to 1781, in one day.

The next day found us riding to Harpers Ferry, where the Potomac and Shenandoah Rivers meet. We enjoyed walking on the Appalachian Trail for a short distance and viewing the joining of these two rivers. We were disappointed that the day turned out to be cloudy and foggy so we didn't get to see the wonders of the Shenandoah National Park. Even then, it was interesting to drive in the low lying clouds through the Blue Ridge Mountains. We then visited Colonial Williamsburg where costumed re-enactors were in the streets and buildings, bringing 1770 to life. We saw how cotton and wool is spun and made into yarn, how blacksmiths hammer and bend steel and other metals, how tobacco leaves are dried, what the early settlers wore and the muskets and long rifles that they used. What we liked best about Colonial Williamsburg were the signs on the buildings. They didn't use words, but used images to depict what type of business was conducted in the buildings. We made a game out of guessing what type of business was inside by looking at the signs. It was all fun.

We then drove to Washington DC where we drove by the Pentagon on our way to Arlington Cemetery. We visited the tomb of the Unknown Soldiers, the Kennedy's graves and witnessed the changing of the guard. This is a place of reverence and the ceremony was very moving. In our crowd

were many veterans who were there, coming to DC, on the Freedom Flights. They were moved to tears as were the rest of us. We then visited the Smithsonian museums and were awed by the artifacts and other treasures found there. We saw the Wright 1903 Flyer, the Spirit of St. Louis and the Apollo 11 command module. We saw the flag that inspired Francis Scott Key to compose the national anthem and we saw the ball gowns worn by America's First Ladies. The next day we took a guided tour of Washington DC, where we saw the Capitol building, the White House, the Washington Monument, Lincoln and Jefferson's Monuments, the World War II Memorial, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, the Korean War Memorial and the statue of the soldiers raising the flag at Iwo Jima. We visited Mount Vernon and Monticello, the homes of Washington and Jefferson.

What history we've relearned! We've toured three U.S. President's homes. We've visited life in the old days and life today. We've witnessed (in our minds) the battles that have brought us where we are today. This truly was a Heritage of America tour. We encourage everyone to find out more of our Nation's beginnings. You learned it in school as we did, but seeing it in person brought it to life. We are so thankful to the bank for sponsoring this trip and the other 43 trips we've taken through the years. 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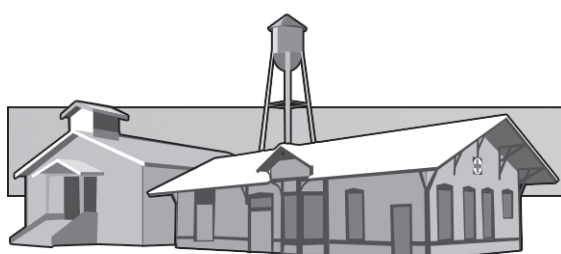

Texas Deer Hunters Welcome Cooler Weather for Opening Weekend

General gun season for Mule deer does not begin until Nov 23rd

AUSTIN - Deer hunters hoping for a change in the weather may be in luck for opening weekend of general deer season as weather forecasters predict cooler temperatures across the state. With an estimated 5.3 million deer in the statewide white-tailed deer population, Texas hunters heading to the field this fall are sure to fill their freezers with this season's bounty.

"Good fawn production this year should help maintain the overall population and provide an abundance of deer for hunters to pursue," said Alan Cain, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's white-tailed deer program leader. "We've seen a slow but steady growth in the statewide population over the last 15 years, particularly in areas such as the Hill Country, Oak Prairies and portions of the Cross Timbers. As a result of the growing population, we've expanded hunting season opportunities in the last several years, including a couple of changes to the antlerless season in 2019."

For the first time, 21 counties in south-central Texas can partake in a four-day antlerless season that runs from Nov. 28- Dec. 1.

Any antlerless deer harvested during the archery, youth-only, muzzleloader,

and the 4 doe-days during the general season is required to be reported to the department within 24 hours of harvest using either the "My Texas Hunt Harvest" mobile app (for iOS and Android) or on TPWD's My Texas Hunt Harvest web page.

Counties required to report their harvest include Austin, Bastrop, Caldwell, Colorado, Dewitt, Fayette, Gonzales, Guadalupe, Karnes, Lavaca, Lee, Waller, Washington and Wilson. Also included in the change are Goliad, Jackson, Victoria and Wharton counties north of U.S. Highway 59 and Comal, Hays and Travis counties east of IH-35.

The change in weather may be what is needed to jump start deer movement which has been slow during archery season due to unseasonably warm temperatures. As hunting conditions improve with cooler temperatures, hunters can expect an above average year in terms of antler quality, deer numbers and overall harvest.

"Despite a slow start to archery and MLDP (Managed Lands Deer Program) season, I'm hearing of some exceptional bucks being harvested including an incredible 214 gross Boone and Crockett score low-fenced buck from La Salle County," said Cain. "I've talked to a number of hunters and

landowners who have been scouting at their lease or hunting property for the upcoming general season and are reporting good antler quality as well. I think hunter excitement is high this season and hunters have lots to look forward to."

The general gun season opener kicks off on Nov. 2 and runs through Jan. 5, 2020 in north Texas and Jan. 19, 2020 in south Texas. A late youth-only season is also slated for Jan. 6-19, 2020. For additional late season deer hunting opportunities and county specific regulations, consult the 2019-2020 Outdoor Annual of hunting and fishing regulations.

Hunters are also reminded to review the TPWD chronic wasting disease regulations for information about CWD testing requirements and carcass movement restrictions for the 2019-2020 season. Also as a reminder, Texas hunters harvesting deer, elk, moose or other susceptible species in other CWD-positive states must also comply with carcass movement restrictions when bringing those harvested animals back into Texas. Additionally, the Texas Animal Health Commission has mandatory testing requirements that apply to elk, red deer, sika, moose and reindeer.

Friona Shares Stitches Of Warmth With China

Jacquelyn (High) Franklin, a former Friona resident, is a teacher and missionary in Suzhou, China. We have written about her in the past and she was a visitor in Friona during the July 4 weekend this year. Her sister Denise lives in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and is also involved in foreign missionary work.

Peggy Monroe and others of Friona have been in touch with, and have helped Jacquelyn over the years.

Peggy said Jacquelyn recently asked for a bag of marshmallows and two boxes of powdered sugar, items that are hard to get in China. Peggy bought the items here at the grocery store, which probably cost her about \$3, but she spent almost \$50 in postage to send them to China. "I sent her a note and told her I couldn't afford her sweet habit," Peggy said.

Recently Peggy and a group of her friends, that form a quilting club they call the Stitchin' Post, had an opportunity to help Jacquelyn's orphanage in China again.

A missionary in Oklahoma came into possession of a large amount of cloth. She

contacted Jacquelyn in China to see if she wanted it and Jacquelyn told her to call Peggy and her friends here to see if they would turn it into quilts for her.

Peggy knew that Friona High School FCCLA teacher Patsy Allen's classes had quilted about 80 quilts for an orphanage in Mexico. So Peggy, the Stitchin' Post ladies, and Patsy and her students collaborated to turn the provided cloth into 80 more quilts, which this week were on their way to China.

By law Chinese couples are allowed to have only one child. If the child is born in any way impaired or imperfect, they give it away or abandon it, then try again to have a normal healthy child. For many years, boy babies were not even allowed.

Mothers carrying boy children were required to have an abortion. Those too poor to pretest their baby's gender and had a boy often had to hide it, kill it, or give it away.

Now in China the law is being reconsidered since there are too many females and a shortage of males. All these conditions bring children to Jacquelyn Franklin's orphanage, mostly unwanted children with cleft palates, deformed extremities, and many other conditions they suffer.

Patsy Allen's classes that participated were Early Childhood Professions I & II, Apparel, and Parenting. The students made 27 of the 80 quilts.

They corresponded with Jacquelyn and learned about the customs and geography of Suzhou, China, and the orphanage. The area is noted for flowers and gardens so the students also chose many fabrics that had floral designs, Allen said. The project was part of the K-12 School to Community Partnership Program.



Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have fallen 1.7 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.27 per gallon, according to GasBuddy’s daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 7.9 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and 28.6 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$1.99 while the most expensive is \$3.19 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country today stands at \$1.75 while the most expensive is \$5.49 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 5.1 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.58 per gallon. The national average is down 6.3 cents per gallon from a month ago and 22.4 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

“The air is getting crisp, the leaves falling, and for the third straight week the national average price of gasoline has too,” said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. “Most states saw notable declines, while California and the Great Lakes states saw the largest dips. Solidly in the rear view are California’s previous refinery issues that caused prices to soar, but now a new problem—filling up with the cheaper gasoline as power outages have cut access to hundreds of stations across the state. GasBuddy has again activated its emergency tracker for California, and this event is unlikely to impact gas prices, so long as refineries don’t lose power. Across the rest of the country, the Great Lakes states saw prices fall far faster than wholesale prices, and a correction is likely in the region. With that exception, the nation should see a fourth straight week of decline with over three-quarters of stations passing along lower prices in the coming week.”

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State Capital Highlights

Governor issues disaster declaration for storm-stricken counties

AUSTIN — After severe weather struck north and east Texas on Oct. 20, Gov. Greg Abbott issued a disaster declaration naming a list of counties in that region.

Among the counties named are: Cass, Collin, Dallas, Ellis, Erath, Hunt, Kaufman, Lamar, Panola, Rains, Rockwall, Rusk, Tarrant, Van Zandt and Wood.

“By issuing this declaration, Texas is providing local officials with the resources they need to quickly respond and recover from this storm,” Abbott said. In addition to providing access to state resources, the declaration waived certain regulations to make it easier for utility companies to bring in out-of-state resources to assist in restoring power.

The storm brought high winds, heavy rains and at least four tornadoes. Tornadoic action ravaged a swath 40 miles long through the Dallas area, causing widespread destruction in residential areas and businesses, forcing many closures and resulting in the loss of electrical power to tens of thousands of customers.

Damages attributed to the storm, currently estimated at more than \$2 billion, continue to be updated.

Report: The digital divide

More than two million Texas households still do not have access to high-speed internet service.

Those findings are included in the top story of the October edition of “Fiscal Notes,” a monthly publication produced by the comptroller’s office.

The story says the digital divide between urban and rural Texans “has serious implications for education, telemedicine, agriculture and small business.”

Texas Comptroller Glen Hegar commented about the story in an Oct. 23 news release, saying, “It’s a wired world today and we can’t expect our state to flourish unless we make sure as many Texans as possible have access to dependable high-speed internet for everything from educational and medical services to agricultural technology and online sales.”

Air monitoring increases

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality is enhancing its air-monitoring capabilities thanks to new equipment funded by the Texas Legislature and savings from the agency’s 2019 budget.

The Legislature granted TCEQ’s request to equip up to three new vehicles with real-time, mobile air-monitoring technology. Meanwhile, budget savings are being used to fund the installation of three new automated gas

chromatograph air monitoring stations in the Houston area and the purchase of new handheld air monitors.

Previously TCEQ’s vans were equipped with instruments only capable of collecting data while stationary and required a time-consuming process to deploy and calibrate. The newly equipped vans will provide the ability for rapid survey assessments, allowing the agency to quickly sample pollutant hot spots, map air concentrations, and identify locations for sampling over longer durations.

Update: Vaping, lung issues

The Texas Department of State Health Services has identified 147 Texas cases of severe lung disease in people who reported they had “vaped” before developing symptoms. One of the patients has died.

In its Oct. 22 weekly update on the use of e-cigarettes (“vaping”) and lung disease, the agency reported that state health officials are gathering more information about 17 other possible cases to determine whether they are consistent with the symptoms and substance use seen in cases in Texas and 48 other states.

Respiratory symptoms include difficulty breathing, shortness of breath and coughing. Some people have also experienced nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. Clinicians are urged to ask patients with these symptoms about a history of vaping, gather as much information as possible about suspected cases, and report them to DSHS.

Nationally, 1,479 cases have been reported. The DSHS and agencies in other states are working with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration to gather evidence about what the cases have in common and to determine a cause.

AGs target online sales

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Oct. 22 announced he has joined a bipartisan coalition of 47 state and territorial attorneys general in calling on Facebook, Craigslist and eBay to take action against alcohol sales on their platforms.

A letter from the coalition asks the companies to:

- Review the current content posted to their websites and to remove illegal postings for the sales and/or transfer of alcohol products; and
- Develop and deploy programming to block and prevent platform users from violating state laws.

Coalition members also invited the companies to join them in forming a work group with stakeholders from government and industry to explore how to establish protocols for preventing illegal alcohol sales.

Commissioners welcome new County Agent

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, October 28th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

There were no public comments. The Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May and the Treasurer’s Report was also approved. The Quarterly Treasurer’s Report was also presented and approved.

Janelle Duffy was approved as the new County Agent.

Janelle has twelve years of experience. She worked for six years in Chavez County, New Mexico and the past six years in Curry County, New Mexico. She will start work next week at the Extension office in Bovina.

Commissioners discussed the DIR contract for election security. No action was taken and County Attorney Jeff Atkinson is reviewing the details of the contract.

The next Commissioner’s Court scheduled for November 11th was moved to Tuesday, November 12th in honor of Veterans Day.

In other business, Commissioners approved the Parmer County District Attorney’s Annual Forfeiture Fund Report. Twenty-five hours of continuing education hours for Justice of the Peace Pct. 1 Jo Beth

Gipson was approved. Also, the placement of a water line under County Road 21 in Precinct 1 for NewTex Feedyard was approved.

Sheriff Randy Geries reported that he was currently housing 25 inmates at the Law Enforcement Center. A special session of the Commissioner’s Court will be held on Thursday, October 31st to consider a Police Handbook Review presented by Michele Arseneau.

Nutmeg

Nutmeg, like cinnamon, is a popular spice during the fall and winter months. The use of this spice during the cooler months is no accident. The early American colonists believed that spices such as nutmeg, cinnamon, and cloves helped warm the body as well as treat colds and stomachaches.

How nutmeg became a spice for the commoner is a whole other story and one filled with war, cunning, and history that even shaped America. Much like cinnamon, nutmeg was originally a spice for the wealthy. The origin of this spice was a deeply kept secret for many years. In 1512, the Spanish finally discovered the source of the world’s nutmeg in the Banda or Spice Islands. This is small cluster of eleven islands near Eastern Indonesia. In the name of controlling the only source of nutmeg, the Dutch waged a bloody war in the early 1600’s, capturing the Banda Islands and enslaving its people. They formed the Dutch East India Company to profit from the many spices found in the islands. They controlled all these islands until 1616, when the British seized a small island called Run Island and formed the English East India Company. This launched the British Empire and set them against the Dutch for many years as they each tried to colonize more and more of the world.

The English only controlled Run Island for four years. However, in 1664, as retaliation for losing Run Island, the British sent several frigates to seize a little-known Dutch colony called New Amsterdam. England easily gained control. After years of fighting, the Dutch and English came to an agreement in 1677. The Dutch gave England New Amsterdam, and England gave up its claim on the small spice island. The English quickly changed the name from New Amsterdam, to New York. The Dutch controlled the Spice Islands until World War II. However, their strong hold on nutmeg began to waiver after the British spread nutmeg trees to Penang, Singapore, India, Sri Lanka, and the West Indies, especially Grenada. As plantations flourished in other countries, the price of nutmeg dropped and became accessible to the commoner. Indonesia and Grenada continue to be the primary producers of modern-day nutmeg.

Nutmeg gained popularity among the wealthy because of its hallucinogenic properties. Consuming nutmeg in large quantities, more than one whole teaspoon at one time, can cause wild hallucinations, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, and irregular heartbeat. In very large quantities, it can cause death. However, most recipes call

for very small amounts that are divided over several servings, so it poses no risk. It should be kept away from children.

Nutmeg comes from the seed of the fruit that is grown on the Nutmeg tree, an evergreen tree that needs fertile, well drained soil in a tropical climate to flourish. Interestingly, a nutmeg is really two spices in one: mace and nutmeg. After the fruit is picked and the outer covering is removed, the seed remains and is covered in red membranes called the aril. This membrane is the source of mace. After the seed has dried for about two months, the inner nut rattles. The shell is removed and reveals the edible nutmeg. Nutmeg is not considered a tree nut and thus, not an allergy concern.

Nutmeg can be used in both savory and sweet dishes. It has a strong flavor so a little goes a long way. It can be purchased in whole or ground forms. Ground nutmeg should be stored in an airtight container away from light, heat, and moisture. It will last for about six months. Whole nutmeg, on the other hand, will last indefinitely, but should also be stored away from heat and moisture.

- 3 tablespoons olive oil, divided
- 6 large chicken thighs with skin and bones (preferably organic; about 2 1/4 pounds total)
- 1 tablespoon coarse kosher salt
- 2 teaspoons dried thyme
- 1 1/2 teaspoons freshly ground black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly grated or ground nutmeg
- 2 pounds unpeeled medium Yukon Gold potatoes, scrubbed, cut into 2-inch-long, 1/2-inch-thick spears
- 2 pounds medium carrots, peeled, cut into 2-inch-long, 1/2-inch-thick spears
- 3 tablespoons chopped fresh chives

Preparation

Preheat oven to 450°F. Coat large rimmed baking sheet with 1 tablespoon oil. Place chicken on baking sheet. Turn to coat with oil and set skin side up. Mix salt, thyme, 1½ teaspoons pepper, and nutmeg in small bowl. Sprinkle half of mixture over chicken. Roast until chicken starts to brown and some fat has rendered, about 30 minutes. Meanwhile, combine potatoes, carrots, 2 tablespoons oil, and remaining salt and thyme mixture in large bowl. Transfer thighs to medium bowl; set aside. Transfer potato-carrot mixture to same baking sheet; turn to coat with drippings. Roast until vegetables soften, 30 minutes. Place thighs on vegetables; pour accumulated juices from chicken over. Return sheet to oven. Roast until chicken is cooked and vegetables brown, 15 minutes longer. Place chicken on platter; top with chives.

Pumpkin Banana Bread

Ingredients

- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 1/2 teaspoons nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon ginger
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice
- 1 1/2 cups mashed pumpkin puree (canned or homemade; not pumpkin pie filling)
- 1 1/2 cups ripe mashed bananas
- 1 1/2 cups vanilla yogurt
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 4 large eggs
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup brown sugar (packed)
- Optional: 1 cup (about 6 ounces) chopped walnuts

Steps to Make It

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease and flour 2 9-inch loaf pans. Whisk together flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger, salt, and allspice until combined. Set aside. In a large bowl, beat pumpkin, bananas, yogurt, oil, eggs, sugar, and brown sugar until smooth. Add the flour mixture, half at a time and beat on medium until combined. Fold in walnuts. Divide batter between the 2 prepared loaf pans. Bake for about 55 minutes, until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Let pumpkin banana bread loaves cool for 15 minutes in the pan on a rack or trivet, then remove from the pans and let cool completely to room temperature before slicing to serve. Optional Glaze: Whisk 2 to 3 Tablespoons of heavy cream or milk into 1 cup powdered sugar to a drizzling consistency. Spoon into a zip-top bag, squeeze out the air and seal. Snip off one small corner of the bag and use as a pastry bag to drizzle the cooled pumpkin banana bread with the glaze.

People began to change their minds about this animal and brought 41 from Canada (and Montana) and released them into Yellowstone.

Friona Youth Sports Celebrates First Year

“Saturday wrapped up the first year for the Friona Youth Sports Program. Even though we didn’t get to complete a full double elimination tournament to wrap up the 5 week flag football season, the football kids enjoyed the final games in the single elimination tournament. Volleyball also wrapped up its 5 week season in which each team played two games every week! Thanks to donations from Cargill, Lowe’s, Hi-Pro Feeds, Dairy Max, Republic Services and Vazquez Builders, the staff at FYS was able to serve the participants and the families free hamburgers to wrap up the seasons.

FYS started in November 2018. The vision was to bring sports to the youth in grades PK - 6th who would otherwise not be able to participate in out of town leagues. The first basketball season for grades K-6 boys and girls launched in February of 2019. There were a total of 170 basketball participants. All participants had to go through an evaluation to be placed on a team. Each Saturday, teams would practice before games then head on to play.

In June 2019, FYS ran a 4 week soccer league with 105 girl and boy participants. The co-ed league allowed kids to stay activate for most of the summer.

Finally in September of 2019, FYS opened up registration for girls volleyball PK-6 and boys football. 65 girls participated while 127 football boys participated from Friona, Lazbuddie, and Bovina.

All of this would have never been possible without the donations from our business sponsors and the EDC.

We would like to thank all of the volunteers, parents, and kids who helped and participated. Also, we would like to thank EG Photography for taking care of all of the team and individual pictures for all 4 sports.

This program has not only allowed kids to stay active throughout the year, but has also provided side jobs for high school and college kids

as referees.

The board at FYS knows that after the first year of implementing the sports, there will be many more to come. We hope that this will fill the gap our kids

are missing as they get into competitive play starting in the 7th grade. We will soon begin our 2020 donation campaign. If you or your business would like to help support FYS with monetary

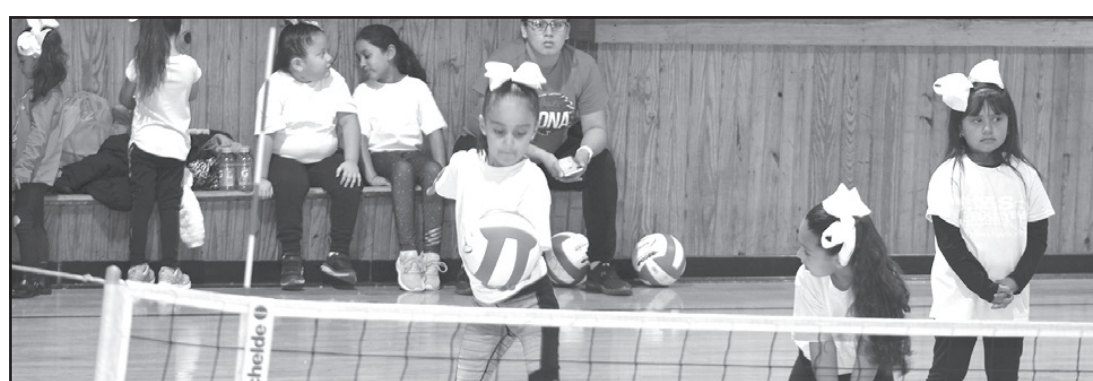

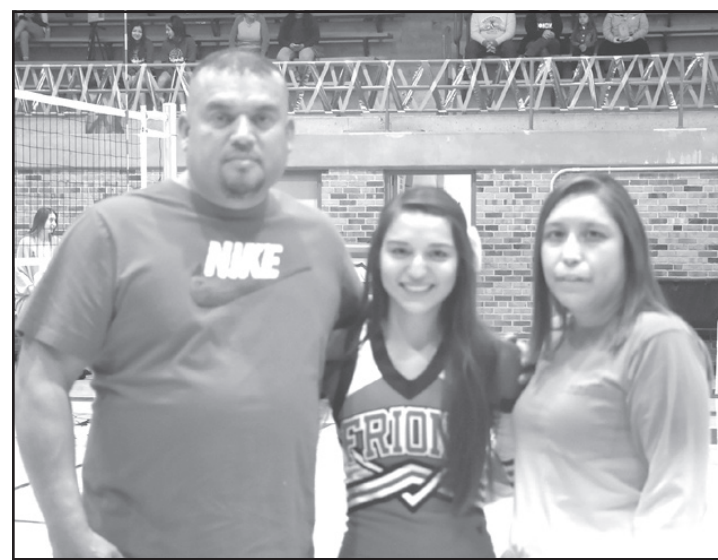
