Mostly Routine Matters Handled --

Regular Meetings Held by Court, School Board

Upton County Commissioner's Court met in regular session last Monday, March 11 with all members of the court present. After reviewing and accepting reports of various county officials, the court proceeded to award a bid to Watson Distributing Company, Inc. of San Antonio for one Ryan Aerifier. Amount of the bid was \$1,371 and is to be paid out of the county Revenue Sharing Trust Fund.

In their next matter of business the budget for 1974 was amended for the Park Fund, McCamey Park & Pool maintenance. Originally budgeted was the amount of \$2,000. This was raised to \$3,750 to cover costs for emergency expense caused by immediate need of repair to existing lines and motors in the McCamey Park & Pool.

Upton Bond Sales Surpass '73 Goal

According to Upton County Bond Chairman Dunn Lowery, December sales of Series E and H U.S. Savings Bonds in the county totaled \$1,646. Sales during 1973 amounted to \$43,229.

This put the county over their 1973 quota by 8 percent. A yearly goal of \$40,000 had been set for '73.

Upton County was one of only 79 counties in Texas that achieved their established goal.

agreement with the Texas Civil Judicial Council related to the granting of funds for the Upton County, Rankin, McCamey Police Consolidation. This was mostly a routine matter and was done to comply with requirements of the CJC.

In a related matter, the court voted to form a Consolidation Police Committee for the Upton County Law Enforcement to handle police level decisions for the merged operation. The committee is also to serve as a forum of discussion and resolution of any problems and will provide an official communication vehicle for both the City and County on law enforcement matters and other matters pertaining to the operation of the merged law enforcement offices.

Members of this committee are to be the County Judge, the County Attorney, the McCamey City Secretary, Commissioner Kenneth LaQuey and a member of the City Council to be appointed by the City Council of McCamey.

SCHOOL BOARD MEET

Rankin School Board met in regular session last Tuesday night and among actions taken was the extension of contracts for all the professional employees of the local system—with the regular state increment pay raises—and of all auxiliary personnel with an 8 percent salary increase effective on September 1, 1974.

The Board accepted with regrets the resignations of Mrs. Ed Love and Mr. Tim Heumier. Mrs. Love is retiring after 30 years of teaching, the last 15 being with the local district. Mr. Heumier is to enter graduate school at Texas.

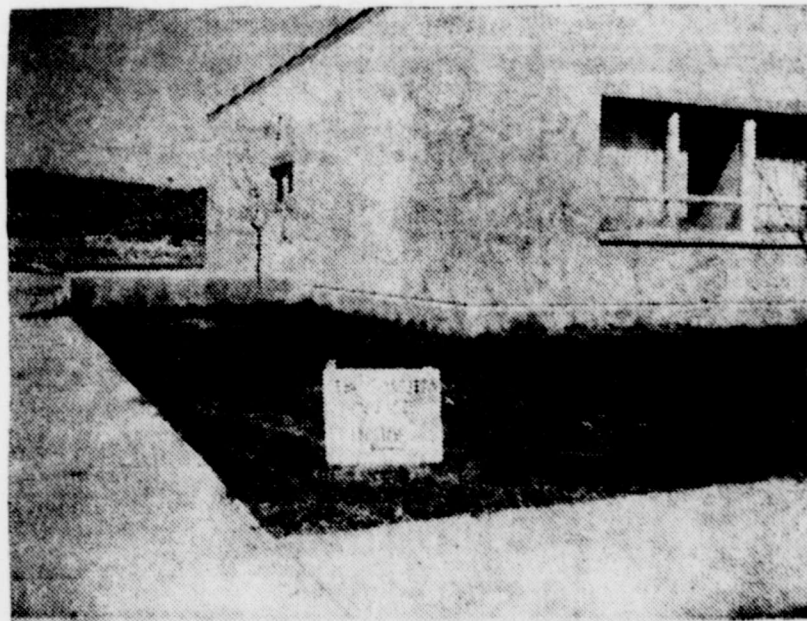

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 53c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.
