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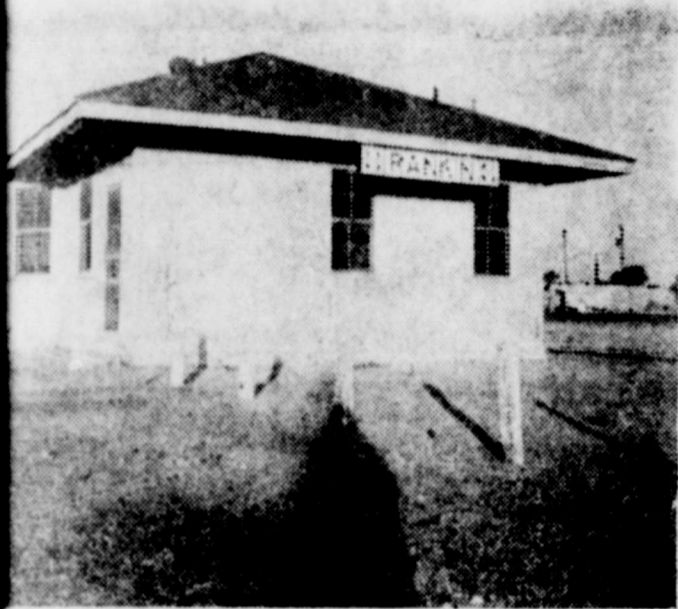

Voters to Mark Ballots on Saturday

Voters in the City of Rankin, the Rankin Independent School District and the Rankin County Hospital District will go to the polls Saturday and select a Mayor and two Aldermen at the City,

School Leads Count in Absentee Voting

If absentee voting is any indication, the biggie in Saturday's election will be at the school polling place with the city and hospital drawing only limited activity.

Absentee voting closed on Tuesday in the absentee balloting portion of the elections with the city reporting five cast—which is a rather high count considering the fact that there are no contested races—Rankin Schools had tallied forty-nine votes and Rankin Hospital had one.

Polls are to open at all three polling places at 8 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m. For the City, all votes will be cast in the conference room at City Hall with Mrs. Ross Wheeler as election judge. School ballots will be cast in the main lobby at the high school with Mrs. Sam Holmes as judge. Hospital balloting will be done in the conference room at the hospital with E. B. Bloodworth as judge.

Only in the school race will there likely be any disappointed candidates when the final votes are tallied, there being six in the race—with two seats open. For the city and hospital, all candidates are incumbents seeking reelection and, although write-ins in any of the races are legal—and possible—there has been no indication noted of any concerted effort in this direction.

In the city election, only qualified voters residing within the city limits of Rankin may cast a ballot. For the schools, a voter must reside within the boundaries of the district and also meet all the legal requirements. The same holds true for the hospital, which has the same boundaries as does the school district.

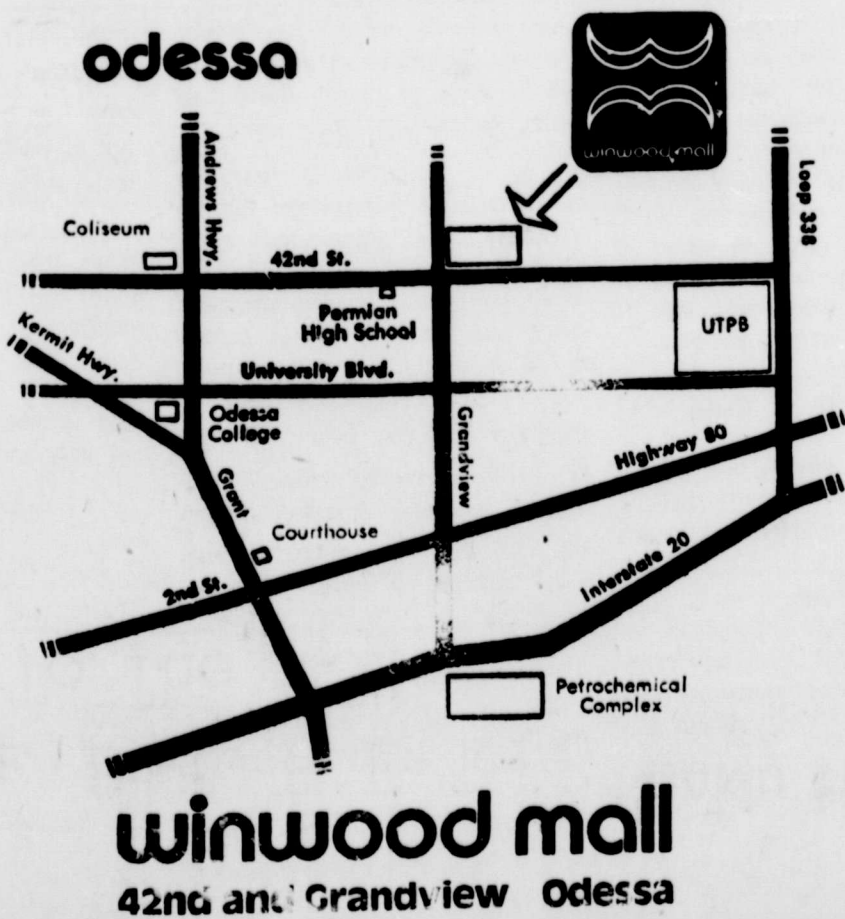

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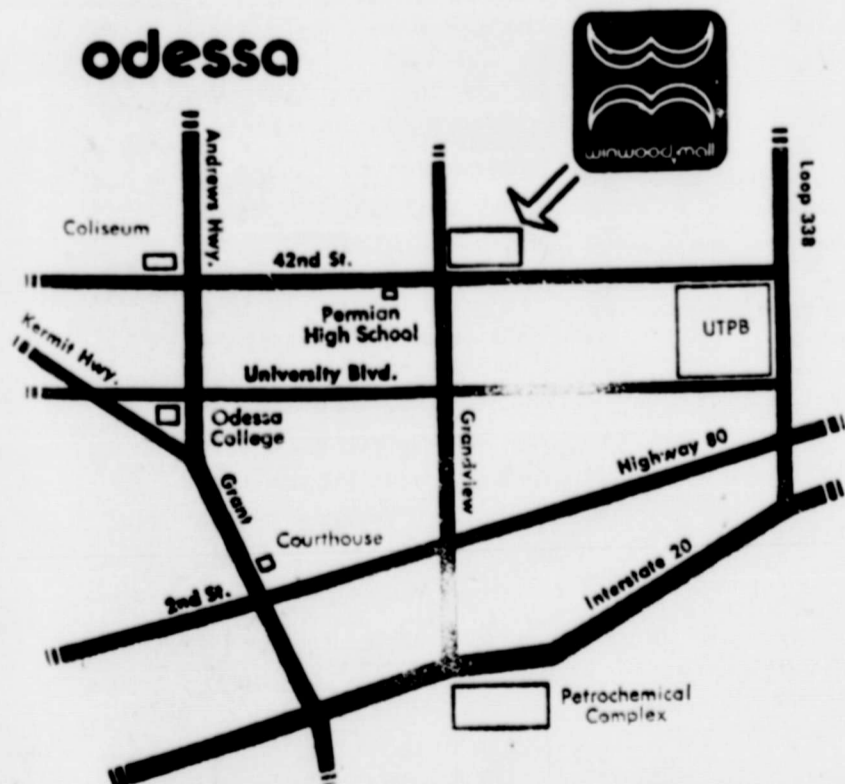
