RHS Sends Regional Qualifiers Into Action

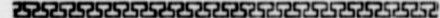

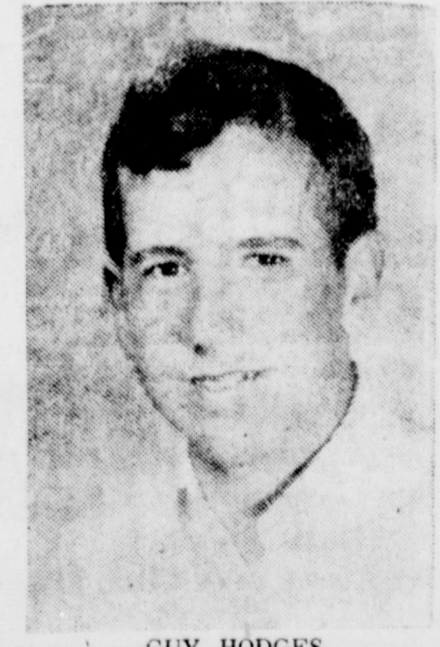

School Board Holds Regular Meeting

Rankin School Board met in its regular April session last Tuesday night. They canvassed the return of the April 6 Trustee election and administered the oath of office to Dr. James D. Gossett and Lloyd Helms as the duly elected members.

In reorganizing the Board for the 1974-75 school term, the Board was made up along the same lines as last year with Dr. Gossett as president, Helmes as Vice-President, Ray Barrett, Jr. as Secretary, and Joe Loftin as Assistant Secretary. Other Board members are C. E. Taylor, Jim Neal and Clarence Winn.

In other matters, the Board:

● Approved a salary scale for all professional personnel at \$1300 above the state schedule.

● Approved student transfers to RISD for the 1974-75 school year with a total of 72 students; one from Crockett County, thirty from Midland County, and forty-two from Reagan County.

● Heard report on the Driver Education program in progress—forty students enrolled—and approved a \$1 an hour increase for instructors of the Driver Ed.

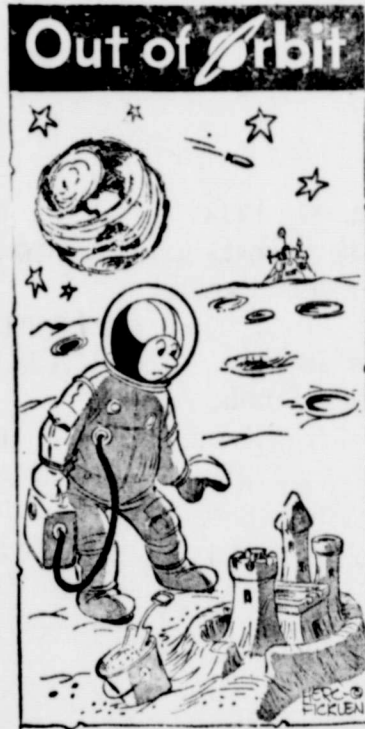

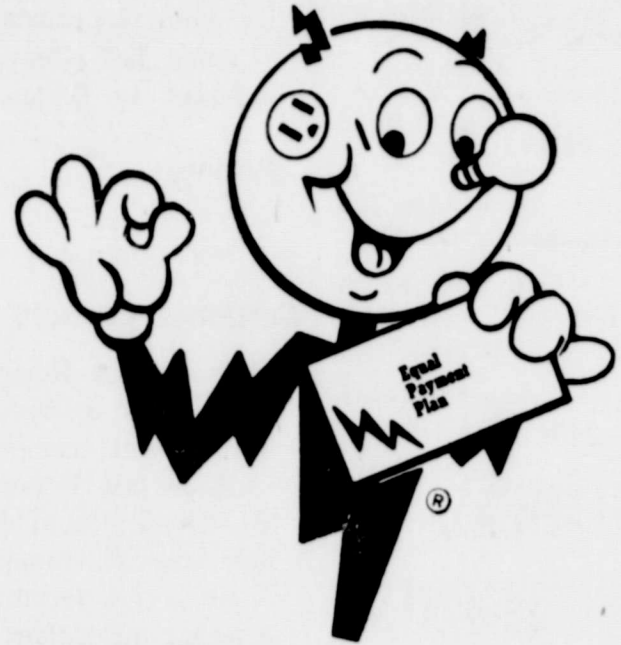

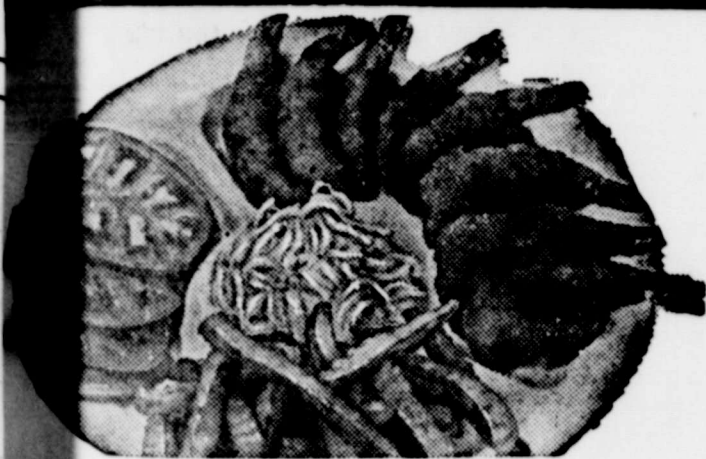

Judge Moore Making Campaign Swing in Hill Country Area

Judge Allen Moore, moving his campaign for the 21st District congressional nomination through the Hill Country, today applauded Governor Dolph Briscoe's statement that too many high school and college graduates are completing their education without the knowledge or skill to make them employable.

"I have been saying the same thing from one end of the 21st Congressional District to the other," Moore said.

"We have a tremendous need for vocational and technical training. We have young people getting out of high school and college who often find their only re-

course is on the raw labor market."

The taxpayer, Moore said, is disturbed and has a right to be disturbed.

"Taxes are rising, money is buying less, he is having to borrow to send his children to college, and, quite likely, he doesn't feel his children are getting the quality of education they should be getting," Moore commented.

Moore, a former county auditor who has served as county judge of Upton County for nearly 12 years, said "a return to a sound fiscal policy is absolutely necessary."

"I believe the people of the 21st District are looking for the kind of congressional representation that will work to restore fiscal soundness to the American system," Moore said.

Moore spoke in Eldorado Wednesday, April 17 and will speak in San Angelo on Friday, April 19. He has a speaking engagement in San Antonio the following week.
