GARNER GAINS TWO VOTES IN NEW TALLY —

Votes Recounted in Upton Judge's Race

As required by law, the Upton County Democratic Committee met last Monday and Tuesday for a full scale re-count of the County Judge's race in the recent Run-Off elections. It is reported that the law requires a re-count of all ballots when a race is within a five percent closeness range.

After a thorough re-check of the some 1185 votes cast in the election, Mrs. Peggy Garner—who had led by a three-vote margin prior to the re-count—gained two votes. This makes the new totals 595 for Garner and 590 for her opponent in the Run-Off, Walter Campbell.

In a re-count of the nature conducted this week by the Committee, only the ballot box is opened—the stub box remains

locked. Any further action toward changing the present count would have to come in the form of an election contest—which is a law suit filed in a district court.

A check with County Clerk Buena Coffee on Wednesday of this week revealed that no such suit had been filed up until that time. Final deadline for this action would be Friday, June 14.

Curtis Copeland to "Boys State"

Curtis Copeland, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Copeland, has been selected by the Rankin High School faculty and the local Lions Club to participate in the "Boys State" program in Austin, June 12-18.

Boys State is a project of the American Legion and is a plan for training in the functional aspects of citizenship, with the purpose to teach the youth of today constructive attitudes toward the American form of government. The main objective of the Boys State—in which boys from all parts of Texas gather in Austin to observe the state

Commissioners in Monday Session

Upton County Commissioners Court met Monday, June 10th at 10 a.m. with all members present. Among the proceedings had were the following:

- Approval of reports of the various county officials.
- Amended Revenue Sharing Budget of July 1, 1974 through June 30, 1975. (A full report of this proposed budget is to be published next week.)
- Motion approved to adjust the salary of Deputy Sheriff Lujan to \$658.70 per month effective June 1, 1974.
- In a split vote, set meals for prisoners in the county jail at \$4.00 per day. Commissioners Fletcher, Adams and Workman voting Aye, Commissioner LaQuey voting No.
- Approved a motion to delete from the Revenue Sharing Budget for the year 7-1-73 thru 6-30-74, the expenditures of \$61,000 for library construction, expenditures of \$10,710.87 for Social Services for the aged and poor and the expenditure of \$1,135.50 for Public Safety; and incorporated this money into the Revenue Sharing Budget for the year 7-1-74 through 6-30-75.
- Loyd McKinney, City Secretary of McCamey and Water Superintendent Jim Pirkle of the City of McCamey, met with the Court, requesting the Court to consider seeking permission from the University of Texas to make exploratory search for water on University property.
- Meeting adjourned until 9 a.m. June 12.

Technician Skillfully Manipulates "New" Typecasting Machine



News Installs More Equipment

After a considerable amount of moaning and groaning, a lot of help from assorted passers-by and some good fortune, the News has—after a fashion—switched over to using some "new" equipment in the production of the publication and in the commercial printing department.

Purchased from the University of Texas in Austin, the main piece is what is known as

a G-4S Intertype linecasting machine. It is used to compose all reading matter and advertisements—when it and the operator can agree on procedure.

Some twenty different type faces are available with the machine and will give a new look to the News as well as the printing done here. Supposedly, and the term is used loosely, it will speed up production.

Other equipment is designed also for more efficient operation of the printing plant. Some several weeks will be needed to get it all "lined out."

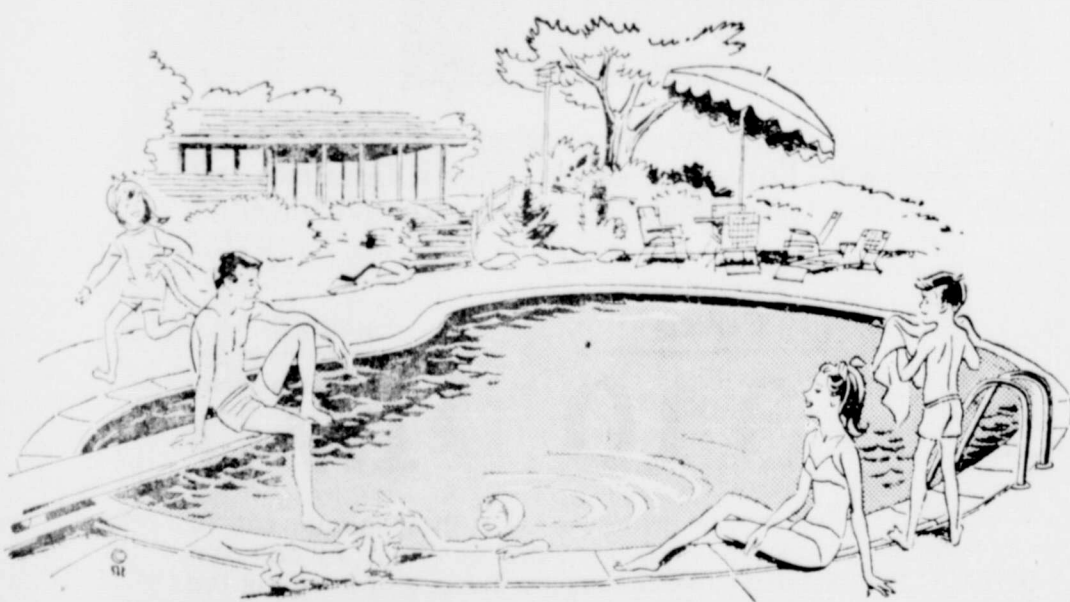
