## Red Devils Draw New Opponent and District Alignment —

# Schedules Released for Ball Clubs

A complete schedule for Rankin football teams for the coming season was released today by Head Coach and Athletic Director Dwayne Turner. It shows the Red Devils with a full ten-game schedule— including five non-conference and five conference games— the B Team with nine games scheduled, the 8th Grade with eight games, and the 7th Grade with eight.

For the Red Devils, playing in a newly aligned District 6-A due to Sanderson's dropping into Class B, there will be five at home and five on the road and the road games are "far out." They will be at Jal, Sanderson, Balmorhea, Marfa and Clint, all a substantial distance. Home games will see Eldorado, McCamey, Robert Lee, Wink and Iraan coming here.

Homecoming will be October 11 with Robert Lee, a new team in the line-up for Rankin, to test the Red Devils before the homecomers, Robert Lee and Rankin have not met on the gridiron for some ten years or more.

District games will include an opener on October 18 with Wink, to be followed by Balmorhea, Marfa, Clint and Iraan. An open date falls on September 27.

And it all starts on September 6 when the Eldorado Eagles arrive in Rankin for an 8 p.m.

A complete schedule of all the games for the Red Devils, the B Team, 8th and 7th Grade will be published in the near future.

Iraan does not field a 7th Grade team and taking their place for a pair of encounters will be Imperial. Also the B Team will host Garden City for one game, that on October 3.

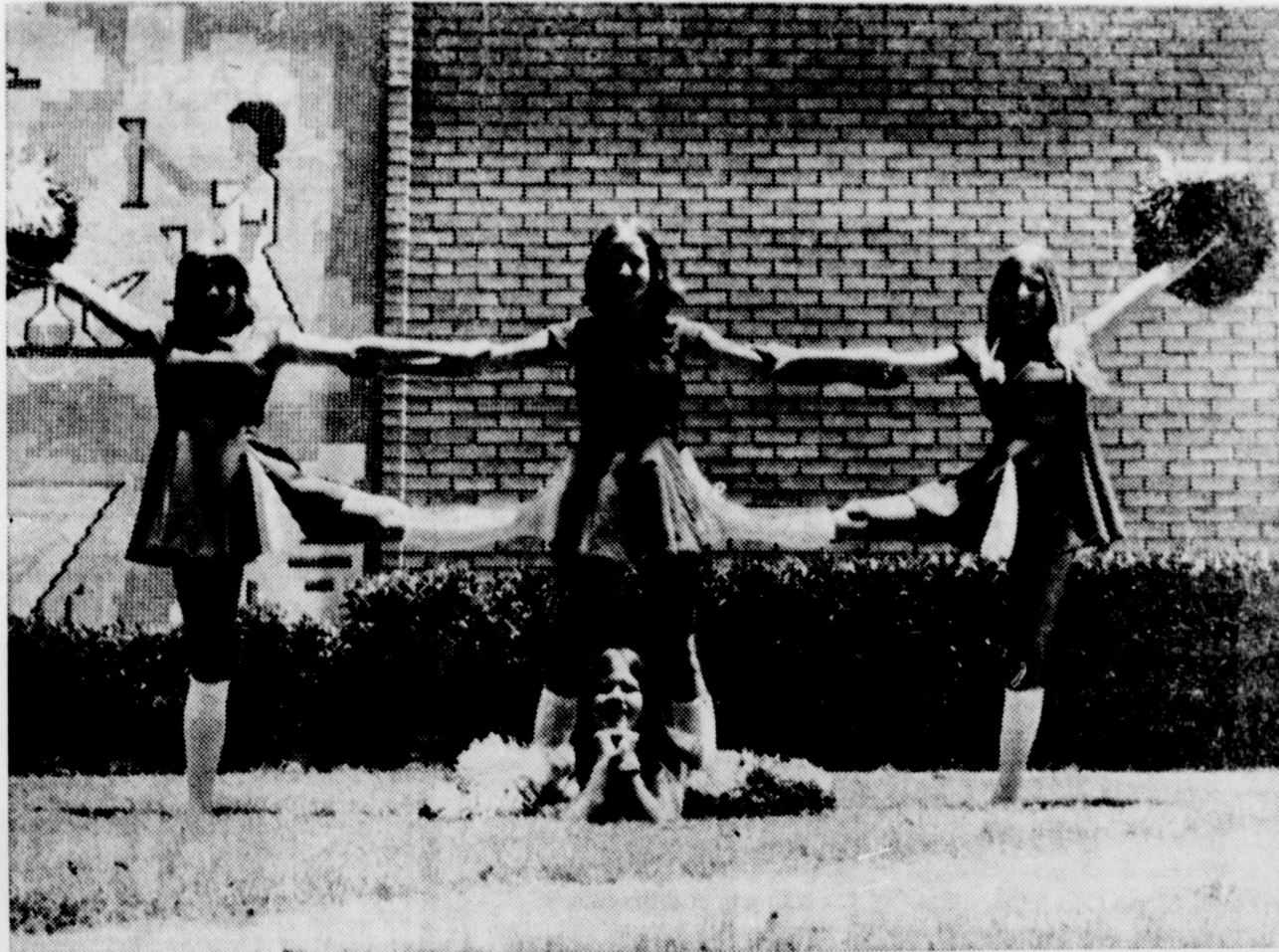

## Louise Kole Buried here on Sunday

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Sunday, July 28 in Rankin First Baptist Church for Louise Kole. A long-time resident, she had lived here for 45 years and was 78 at the time of her death. Burial was in Rankin Cemetery.

She had been in poor health for the past several years and had been in and out of the hospital on a number of occasions.

Mrs. Kole, along with her late husband, Ed, founded and operated The Highland Courts and Cafe for a number of years. Mrs. Kole converted the cafe into a residence following his death about ten years ago. The Koles had many friends and were well known over a wide area.

She was born Mary Louise Hicks Sept. 25, 1895, at Johnson City, and is survived by one son, Mack Yates, Jr., of Cherokee, three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

**ON AND ON —**  
Will they or won't they— to  
impeach or not to impeach, that  
is the question — whether there  
are more votes to be won by

throwing out the President, or  
whether it's better to keep him  
and not let Ford get his foot in  
the door toward being the next  
elected President— those are  
just a few of the weighty prob-  
lems that are facing our Cong-  
ressmen. And a lot of us don't  
appreciate all the hard work  
they are doing trying to arrive  
at the proper conclusion.

I saw a poll taken the other  
day—and I won't often quote any  
poll for I don't think they are  
a true reflection of the public's  
thinking in all instances — that  
said that something like 54 per-  
cent of the people thought Nix-  
on ought to be impeached; but  
that only 40-some percent be-  
lieved he ought to be thrown out  
of office. I don't exactly under-  
stand how he can be impeached  
and still kept in office; but then  
there's a lot of things about the  
way they do business in Wash-  
ington that confuses me.

For one thing, I don't think  
there's 54 percent of the public  
keeping up with what's going on  
in this business, and about all  
they want to see is an end to  
the mess — whichever way it  
goes. If there's any interest at  
all, it's only the one question:  
will they or won't they impeach  
the President?

And I'd say at this point that  
you can take your pick.

**THE CONVENTION —**  
Certain people in Texas have  
been harping for the past ten or  
fifteen years to get a new state  
constitution, saying that the old  
one is out of date because it was  
originally written in the mid  
1800's. Naturally, it has been  
amended many times— this, in  
itself has kept it pretty well up  
with the times. Basically, a con-  
stitution is a document that sets  
out the rights of the people who  
live under it and, as yet, those  
who would write a new one have  
not explained the difference in  
the rights of people in the mid  
1800's and those of today. To me,  
it's a lot like the truth: what

was true then is still true to-  
day.

I don't think truth and rights  
change with years.

At any rate, it now appears  
that we've wasted a lot of time  
and money trying to write a new  
constitution and are going to  
come up with nothing. As things  
now stand, any document sub-  
mitted to the voters from the  
present convention would be  
little more than a batch of pap  
and would almost certainly have  
to be turned down. It was folly  
to go to all this trouble in the  
first place.

One might hope that, with this

dismal failure, the idea of draw-  
ing up a new constitution would  
be dropped—or, if we must con-  
tinue, to appoint or elect a con-  
vention NOT composed of poli-  
ticians.

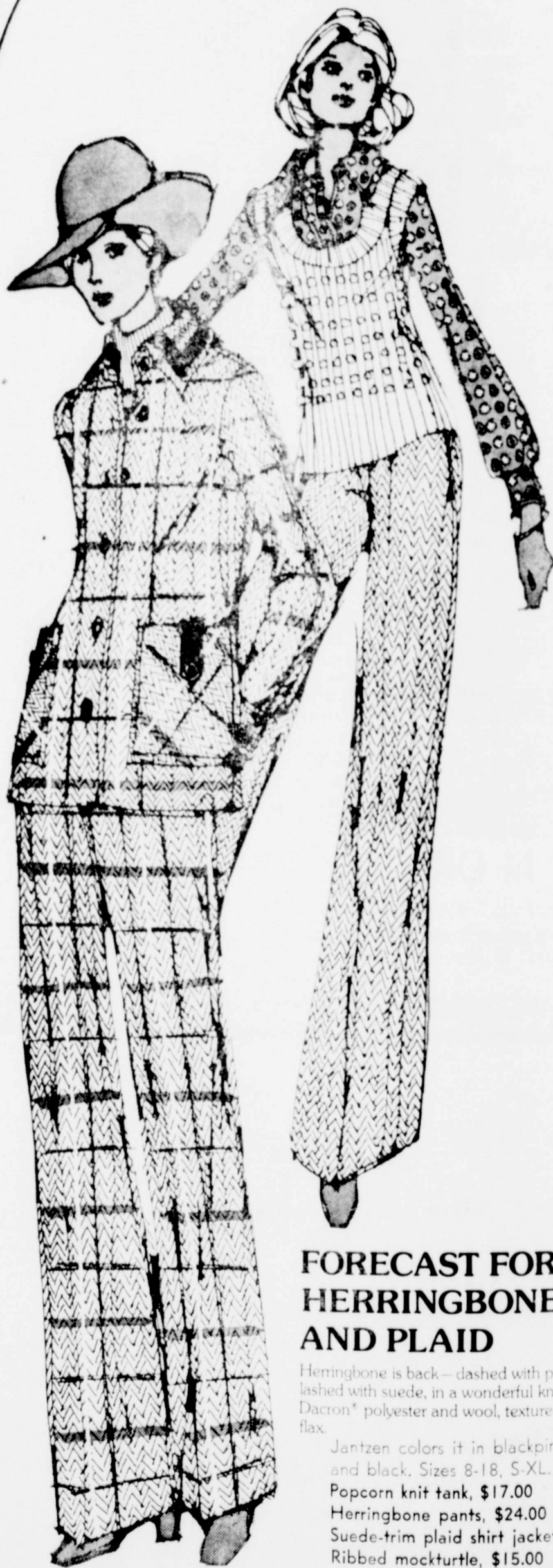

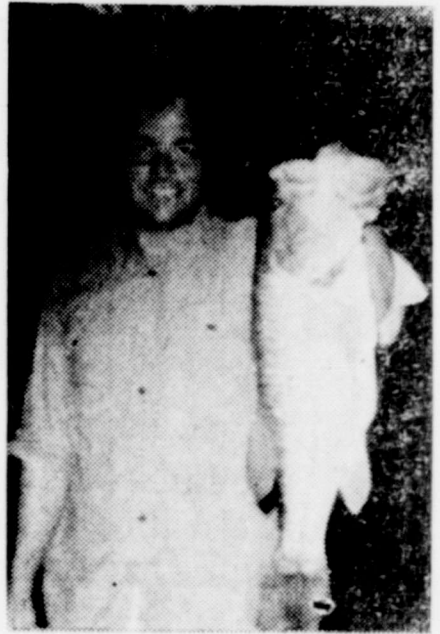
