City Dads Call Sales Tax Vote

Rankin City Council met in a regular session August 13 with those present being Mayor J. B. Pettit and Aldermen Ruben Peterson, J. D. Rose, T. R. Latham and M. O. Price. Among the proceeding had were:

- Minutes of July 9th regular meeting and July 10 special session were approved. The financial report for the month of July showed an operating loss of \$4,852.77.

- Mr. Dunn Lowery, president of First State Bank of Rankin, met with the council to discuss a proposed pledge agreement between the bank and the city for the purpose of securing the city's funds and legally naming the local bank as the city's depository bank. It was agreed that Mr. Lowery would contact the city attorney regarding the drawing up of an agreement and appointment and meet with the council again in their next regular meeting for the purpose of signing said agreement.

- Mr. Carrol Daniel met with the council to discuss the installation of the check meter which was installed in the gas system on August 10. On a recommendation by Mr. Daniel, a motion was made and carried to put in a by-pass and to prove displacement calibration meter check.

- A report on the investment of funds in the Reserve Fund and Emergency Fund revealed an 8.58% yield on the date of maturity. A motion was made, and carried, to invest \$2,422.37 from the gas meter deposit account and \$3,167 from the Water-Sewer Meter deposit account.

- Motion made and carried to delay further action or consideration involving sewer service on property owned by Elsie Turner until more improvements are made on the property by the owner.

- Without any opposition, the council passed an ordinance calling for a 1 per cent city sales tax election October 8 and appointed Mrs. H. D. Shaw e-

- Meeting adjourned at 10:20 p.m. Next regular session to be Sept. 10, at 7:30 p.m.

Services Held Wednesday in Rankin for Vicki Hill, Victim of Cancer Fight



VICKI HILL

Vicki Hill has lost her battle with cancer. Under treatment for some eighteen months, the Rankin teenager drew the attention of a number of people in the area as she refused to give up and continued her daily routines much of the time. Along the way, she participated in the award-winning Rankin Red Devil Band, earned her diploma from Rankin High School and was a member of the Candy Striper program at the Rankin Hospital.

A member of the Rankin First Baptist Church, she had an active role in church affairs, being a member of the youth choir until failing health slowed her parti-

icipation. At one time, shortly after the extent of her illness became known, a "Vicki Hill Fund" was started in Rankin and donations were received from people in Rankin as well as from other parts of the area.

She was born June 24, 1956 at Amarillo and was a foster child of Mr. and Mrs. Sim Hill of Rankin. She died last Sunday morning in Rankin Hospital.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m., Wednesday, Aug. 21 in Rankin First Baptist Church. Burial was in Rankin Cemetery. Survivors include Mr. and Mrs. Hill and one sister, Miss Sheryl Davis of Amarillo.

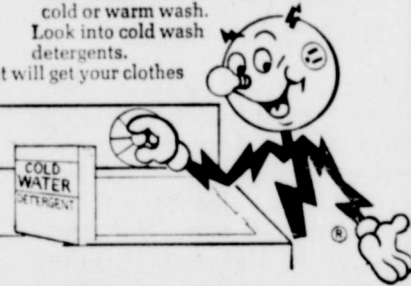

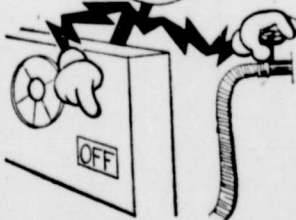
Plan Ahead
