Fifty Prospective Red Devils Report For Practice

With practically a third of the Rankin High School enrollment reporting for two-a-day football sessions starting last Monday, Coach Dwyane Turner and his staff were not short on quantity. As for quality, the coach indicated that a number of boys are showing promise but that it was going to take "a few weeks" for the team to jell.

The Red Devils lost heavily to graduation last year and will be more or less rebuilding as they fill the gaps left by 1975 seniors. Turner said the team would be young and light. A total of 50 boys were on hand as of Tuesday and the coach said that he knew of only one more expected to report.

The team will have the services of several new students who have transferred into the district, and at least one "veteran" who will be returning after missing last year with injuries.

Sub Reductions Offer Half Over

With the arrival of August 15 next Friday, half of the time in the annual subscription rate reductions to the Rankin News will have expired. The offer ends on August 31, and after that date, prices will revert to those that have been in force for the past year.

During August, subscribers in Upton County may get the newspaper for 50 issues for \$4.25. For those with mailing addresses outside Upton County, the rate is \$4.50 for 50 issues.

No new out-of-state subscriptions will be accepted by The News until further notice.

Also, in an effort to hold down the subscription prices and to be able to offer the annual reduction, no notices of expiration dates will be mailed to subscribers during August. Subscriptions need not be expired in order for readers to take advantage of the offer.

Immunizations to be Offered on 19th

Free immunizations for preschool children and children of all ages are to be given Tuesday, August 19 beginning at 3:00 p.m. at the Upton Center, end of West 11th Street in McCamey.

Immunizations are required for school students of all ages. Children must have their shots record in order to enroll in school.

So far, it has been only shoes and shorts and mostly running and conditioning for the footballers. Friday they will be issued pads and full uniforms and the first order of the day will be a picture taking session at 11:15 a.m. In the evening session the team may see some contact work.

On Friday, August 22, the Red Devils will go over to Big Lake for scrimmage games starting at 5:00 p.m. The Owls also have approximately 50 boys out for football and Turner said that—with that many boys—"we may have as many as three scrimmages going at once; we want to get everyone into action if we can."

The following Friday, the Ozona Lions will be in Rankin for another controlled scrimmage session. This will be the final warm-up prior to the season opener for the Red Devils when they travel to Eldorado September 5th. District play will open in Wink on October 3rd.

A full schedule of all Rankin games will be published next week.

Bid Deadline Past on Post Office Land

With the closing date for bids being August 12—last Tuesday—Rankin Postmaster Jesse Perritt said that he knew of only one bid having been submitted. All bids were on land sites only. A separate bidding will be held at a later date if a site can be worked out.

"There may have been other bids, in the mail, that had not been received by the Midland office," the Postmaster said.

Although unconfirmed, it is said that the bid submitted was on a site just across the street south of the City Hall.

County Hikes Rate Charged Rankin For Water By Twenty-Five Percent

For the first time since the county began supplying a portion of Rankin's water supply in 1953, the rates have been increased. In a unanimous vote during the regular session last Monday, the Upton County Commissioners approved a 25-percent hike on the charge made for 1000 gallons of water to the City of Rankin. The new rate will be 12½-cents, as compared to the old one of 10-cents.

Effective date of the new increase is to be January 1, 1976. It is reported that the court cited increased production costs in the county operated water field east of Rankin as the need for the increase.

According to City Secretary Pat Wrinkle, Rankin paid Upton County \$5,973 over the past year for water used from the filed. With the increase, this will go to approximately \$7500—or about \$1500 per year. The City Secretary said she did not know what steps the City Council might take toward offsetting this new cost; whether they would pass it along in the form of higher water rates or not.

It is further reported that Upton County lost approximately

\$10,000 last year in the operation of the water field.

Other matters handled by the Court in their Monday session were mostly of a routine nature, according to the minutes of the meeting. Among these was instructions to the County Clerk be ordered to mail the required papers to the County and District Road Indebtedness in Austin, instructing them to pay to Upton County the county's share of the fund. This amount was put at \$11,536.69 by the Court and is to be used in the Upton County Lateral Road Fund toward payment of fuel and maintenance repairs on county lateral roads.

Various county officials' reports were approved and a Budget Hearing was scheduled for August 25.

Historical Tidbit

of Rankin & Upton County

The first commissioner's court of Upton County, meeting in 1910, authorized spending \$675.00 for a four-room courthouse 30 by 30 feet. It soon proved inadequate and in 1913 a contract was let for a \$22,000 new stone courthouse and a jail to cost \$8,000.

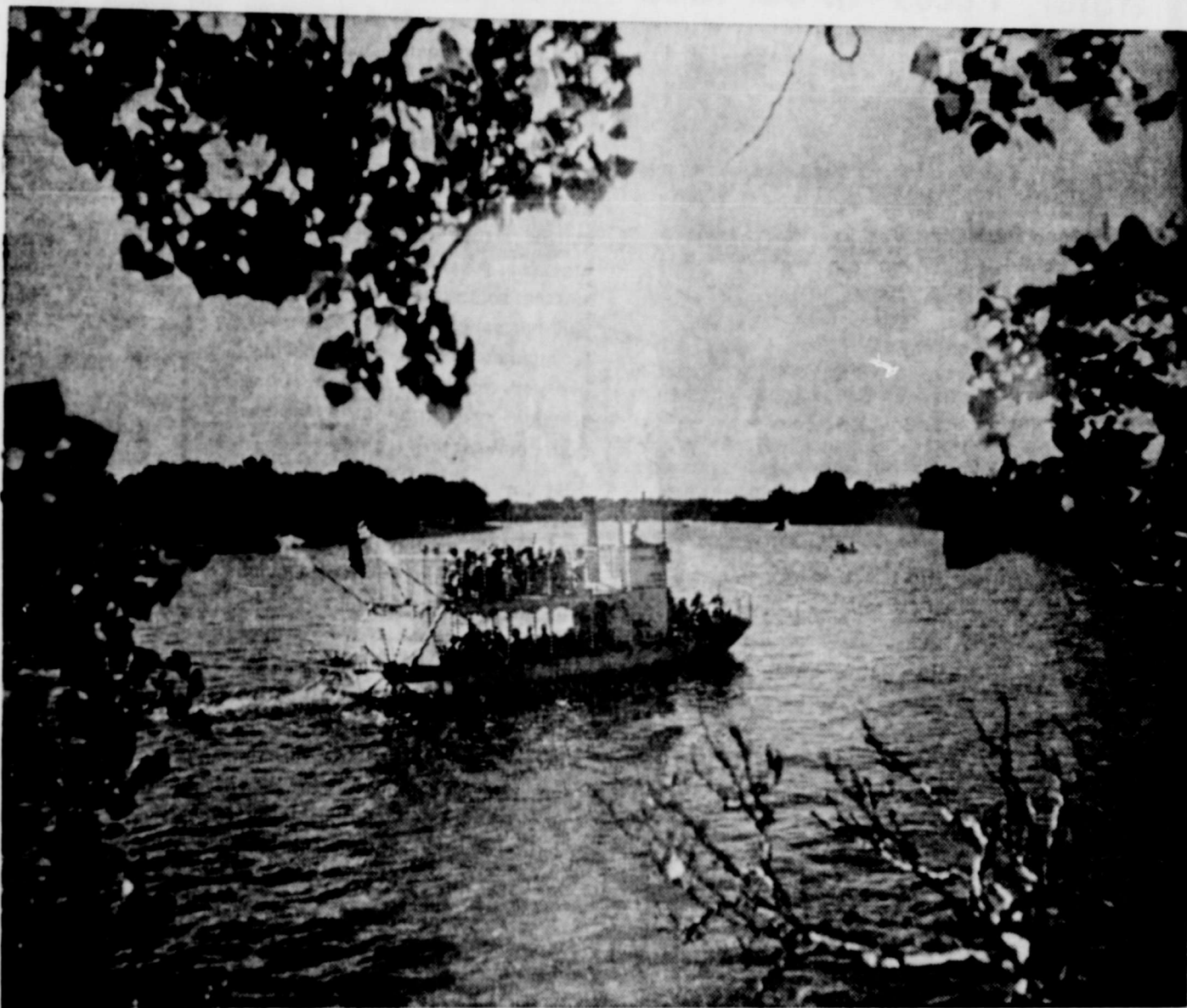

Now all this doesn't have any
great deal to do with the Pecos
River, directly; but it does point
out that some people, in this
instance those in Carlsbad, can
take a not-so-big river and make
a nice attraction for themselves

Well, almost nothing. I've
read where the State of Texas
has taken the State of New Mex-
ico to court, charging that the
New Mexicans are taking more
water out of the Pecos River
than they are supposed to take
out.

It's doubtful that anything will
ever come of this and even if it
did and the Pecos flowed twice

as much water, it wouldn't do
much good. You see, in Texas,
landowners who happen to have
property through which a river
flows, can charge their fellow
Texans for "fishing rights" in
that river—even though it does
not "belong" to the landowner.
Out in New Mexico, that sort of
thing doesn't go—the rivers and
streams belong to the people of
the state—and that's not a bad
arrangement in my opinion.

Still, given the full flow of the
Pecos, it's doubtful that Texans,
considering their past track re-
cord, would bother to do any-
thing with the river other than
ignore it.

I've seen lots of Red Devil teams outscored. I've seen them and their fans discouraged. I

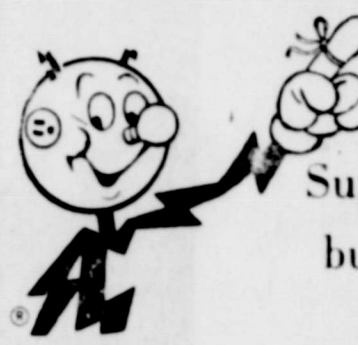

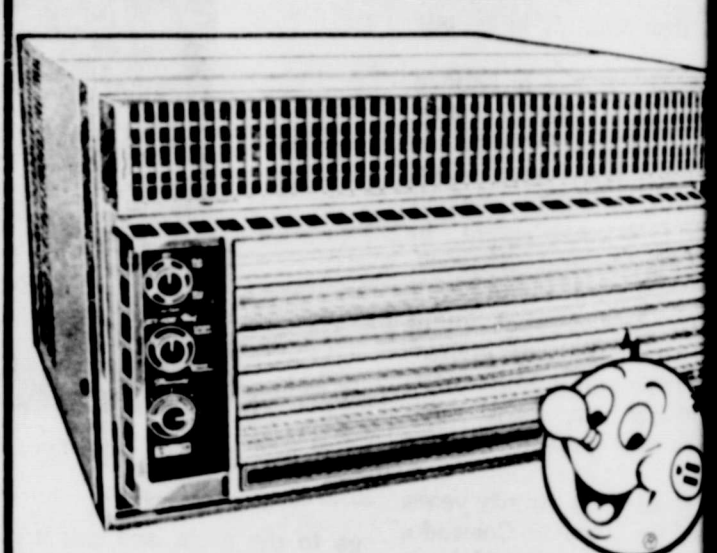
until we can start the night roll-out and a good will be had by all.
