Firetruck Expected to Arrive in Rankin from Tipton Over Week-End

Rankin's new fire truck will arrive in Rankin before another week rolls around. The new equipment was ordered about two years ago and the new truck in which it will be housed has been ready for about six weeks.

Volunteer Firemen Lee and Jimmy Lee left Midland terminal Sunday afternoon for Tipton, Indiana where they will take delivery of the truck. While there they are expected to spend two or three days in the operation and maintenance procedures on the new equipment. Casey is being helped by Union Texas Petroleum and Lee works for Phillips Petroleum.

Fire Chief Burl told The News: "We are fortunate in having these volunteers to go to Tipton to attend the school. We believe that their companies are recommended for their participation in giving the men the opportunity to make this trip."

Young Squad Showed Promise at Big Lake —

Red Devils Will Host Talented Ozona for Friday Afternoon Scrimmage Bout

In what was expected to be a rather one-sided affair considering their inexperience, the Rankin Red Devils—along with a sizeable contingent of their fans, went to Big Lake last Friday and raised a few eyebrows, plus scattering Owl feathers all over the place.

Using the point system, the Red Devils were outpointed by the almost Senior varsity Reagan County squad 3-1; however, it was their hitting on defense and ball handling on offense that surprised and pleased Red Devil backers and their coaching staff. The young Rankin footballers gave as good as they got in a hard played affair and the Owls were only able to move against them via the airways and one breakaway when they caught the Maroon and White overshifted in the defensive secondary.

On offense, the Devils showed a good "power up the middle" game and only bobbled the hand off one time. Their passing was on the mark in all but one or two instances and they were able to throw both long and short. In rushing the Owl passer, the Reagan squad finally began holding back almost the entire offensive line in order to

give their quarterback time to throw before being swarmed by the hard-charging and agile Red Devil frontmen.

"We still need a lot of work," Coach Turner said following the scrimmage, "however, we think we saw a lot more potential in the Big Lake scrimmage than we had expected. Given a little time, I think this group of Red Devils will be exciting for fans to watch and will win some ball games."

In the B Team scrimmage, the junior Red Devils split with the young Owls, one for one. It was an active affair with lots of yardage chalked up, according to those who watched the play.

Continuing their practice of scrimmaging tough opponents, Rankin will host the AA Ozona Lions at 6:00 p.m. Friday. The concession stands will be open and the public is invited.

The Lions are said to have one of their better teams in recent years and should be a good chance for the Red Devils to further sharpen their skills. Only the varsity will see action in this scrimmage.

Upton County Commissioners' Court met on Monday, August 25 in a Special Session with all of its members present. The minutes reflect a short session with the following actions being taken:

- Motion unanimously approved that money be provided for needed items for Olga Rios and Derise Eggleston Foster Care for Upton County.

- All bills presented were allowed.

- Motion made and carried unanimously that Upton County enter into (a) contract with Per-

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mian Basin Regional Planning Commission to contract operation for CETA Title I Program, with the stipulation that if funds are not received from the Texas Department of Community Affairs the County has no obligation to continue the contract.

- Motion made and carried unanimously that the 1976 Budget be adopted as filed with the County Clerk.

- Motion made and carried unanimously that the (tax) rate of 95-cents be set for the year 1976 with 73-cents set for the General Fund and 22-cents (for) Road and Bridge.

Court adjourned.

golf balls or nothing. You just mail out twenty copies of the letter and you are supposed to have good luck come your way on the fourth day. I haven't tried this one but on the fourth day after I printed a batch of the letters for a local party, I broke my glasses.

Still, considering that the letter asks for nothing and is only a quotation from the Bible, you get to wondering: just who got

this thing started and what's the real reason for it. I submit that it's something being done by some Federal agency—with a budget of about fifty million—in an effort to stimulate the economy. Look at it this way; the printer gets a little business—I think I've done two of these and I sure hope the people have good luck so they can pay me—and to mail them out, this takes \$2; plus some envelopes and paper and a postman to deliver them.

Following a wedding trip to New Mexico the couple will be at home in Lubbock where Mr. Price attends Texas Tech.



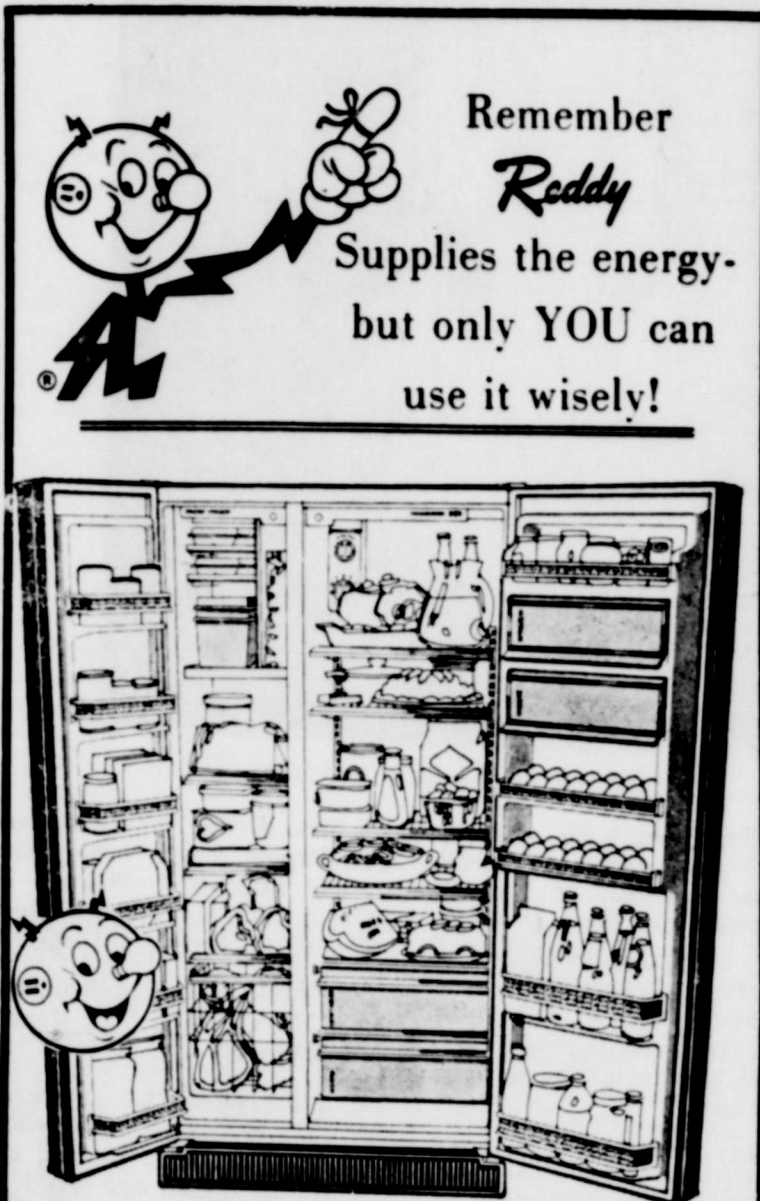

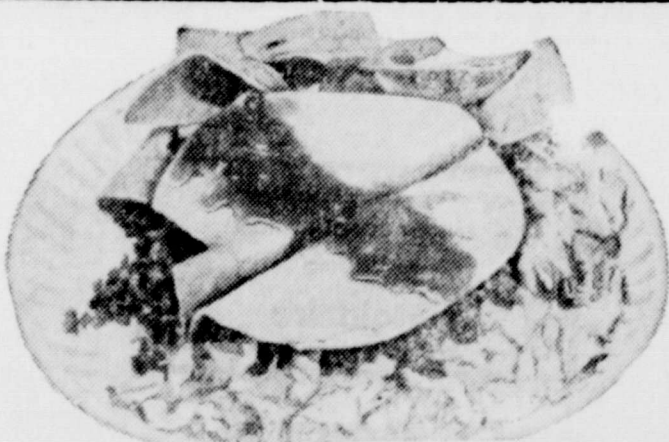

If you see members of the Red Devil coaching staff wearing a cockeyed little grin and sorta snickering to themselves this week, think nothing of it. After seeing their charges in action last Friday against the Big Lake Owls, they have something to grin about. I think just about everyone who witnessed the scrimmages—there were two going on at once—was more than a little surprised at how the Red Devils conducted themselves.

For the varsity, the much experienced Owls—they had fourteen lettermen in action with about eight of them being two-year men—put it on them three points to one from about the thirty yard line; but it wasn't exactly what the Owls did that put points on the board so much as it was what the Red Devils did not do.

When everyone for Rankin was playing his position, the Owls were stopped cold. They only moved via the long pass and one breakaway. I don't think they even punched out a first down unless they caught one or two of the much younger and less experienced Red Devils out of position.

And they gave every bit as good as they got—they stuck 'em with vigor—and, it appeared to me, were probably in better condition. This, of course, is gener-

It's going to take a team effort and they are going to have to continue to hit. But they would probably do all this anyway. Until someone proves differently, I believe the Red Devils will "Come Alive in '75." Look out opponents!

Extension Excerpts

Success with home canning is no accident. Canned foods that look as good as fresh are more than luck. Using the correct processing method is necessary for good results.

The water bath method is used for processing acid foods like fruits and tomatoes. It is a way of processing foods at a temperature of 212 degrees F. Enough heat is supplied by the boiling water to destroy the bacteria, etc which cause spoilage. A water-bath canner is a large kettle with a cover and rack to keep the jars from resting directly on the bottom.

The stem-pressure method is necessary for processing low acid foods like beans and peas. The spores of some bacteria are highly resistant to heat, which makes it necessary for them to be destroyed by high heat supplied by the steam pressure canner.

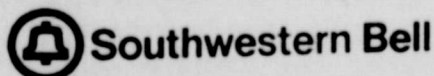
