## It All Comes Down to a One-Game Season Friday

Once the caravan reaches the area of Iraan on Friday night, the call will go out to circle the wagons and get the women and children to safety. It may not be Custer's Last Stand but there will be a lot of battle being done when the Rankin Red Devils go after the Iraan Braves with the District 6-A title riding on the line. Activities are to get underway with a 7:30 kickoff in the heart of Indian Country. For Rankin, a win would put them at the top of the mountain for four years in a row in District 6-A. A win for Iraan would

make them co-champs with the Rankin unit, each having a 4-1 district record. Should there be a tie, Rankin would win it all alone. A win for Iraan (unthinkable) would send them into the playoffs—no coin flip. In order to erase any confusion over the situation, it is said that the Red Devils plan to put on their usual show and win it all outright. Meeting undefeated foes—in district, non-district and along the playoff trails—is now old hat to Rankin teams. Almost every week they have to contend with similar circumstances and have been—for four years at least—rather methodical in their manner of dealing with opponents.

For the Braves, this has been one of their better years at the football wars and they, too, have had little or no trouble in dealing with fellow members of the District with one exception; they lost to Balmorhea, a team the Red Devils polished off with all ease despite the score showing only 7-0 in favor of the RHS'ers.

And a look at the past record between the Red Devils and the Braves does not bode well for the Indian Cause. Despite this being the oldest series for Rankin since their return to eleven-man football back in '53, Iraan has managed only 7 wins in the previous 22 games. Last year—with both Rankin and Iraan being 4-0 in district play when they met, Rankin clobbered the Iraan Tribe 33-6. Rankin has amassed 525 points in the series as compared to 286 for Iraan. In the past three years, the Braves have scored only 6 points against Rankin teams and had their last win back in 1971 by 17-6. Rankin has counted 106 points in the last three games.

None of the above—or below—will put anything on the scoreboard for either team Friday night; however, Rankin is expected to be the favorites in most pickings. Following is the record.

There things are just basic items; they could be expanded by tenfold and still not cover all that the people find wrong with government's ever increasing in bureaucratic size and red tape.

And I probably owe Gov. Dolph Briscoe an apology. Oh, not because he came out against the new constitution—that, I think, was a simple political move on his part—trying to get on the winning side. I owe him an apology because he has more political sense than I had given him credit for having. That's about twice as much as our own State Senator, Mr. Pete Snelson, deserves. Right up to the last he was pounding for passage of the new constitution. He apparently was never close enough to the voters in his district to understand that they would defeat it by some of the most lopsided margins in the state. It was either that he did not understand his "subjects", or he felt that he knew "what was best for them."

Right there is where many a politician seems to go heywire once he gets into office. He appears to feel "called" to lead his flock instead of representing or serving them. About two hundred years ago Americans decided that they had had enough of "leaders" and kicked out the British. Texas won't a state until almost sixty years later but Texans have always been among the most adamant in denouncing the concept of being headed like a flock of sheep—by any body, at any time and under any circumstance.

Even if our Senator Snelson felt that he was right, he should have known the people of his district well enough to understand their feelings and then he should have been their spokesman. If he does not understand us that well, then what the heck is he doing down there in Austin supposedly representing our

## Extension Excerpts

Pecans have a place in the well-planned diet because of their good flavor, food value and many uses in main dishes, breads, cakes, cookies, desserts, salads and candies. Nutritional studies show that pecans provide essential vitamins and minerals and are particularly good as energy food. Pecans are an excellent source of calcium, phosphorus, iron, protein, quality carbohydrates and vitamins A and B. Pecans are low in cholesterol.

One pound in-shell pecans yields about 2½ cups halves or about 2 cups chopped pecans. One pound shelled pecans yields about 4½ cups halves or about 3¾ cups chopped pecans.

Pecans may become rancid unless stored properly. Shelled pecans should be placed in covered containers and stored in a refrigerator for not longer than 6 months. Unshelled pecans stored at a temperature range of 32-38 degrees F will keep fresh for about a year. To freeze pecans freshly shelled pecans may be packaged in moisture-vapor-proof bags, freezer tin cans, freezer jars or plastic containers. Pecans can be frozen 6-10 years at 0 degrees F.

Pecans should be thawed slowly after removal from storage to prevent moisture condensation on the nuts which are colder than the new surroundings. Transfer from freezer to the refrigerator until the nut temperature rises to refrigerator temperature will usually prevent moisture condensation and resulting mildew contamination.

With the pecan season at hand

many of you will be looking for new and old recipes to prepare, using pecans. Be sure to have the recipes for entries in the Trans Pecos Pecan Show turned into the County Extension office by Friday, November 14.

Here is a recipe you might like to try this Thanksgiving.

### PECAN DRESSING

1 cup butter or margarine, melted  
2 T. minced onions  
1 cup pecans, chopped  
¼ t. pepper  
4 cups bread crumbs  
1 cup celery, diced  
½ t. salt  
½ cup water or milk

Mix all ingredients. Stuff cavity of turkey or hen and bake as directed for poultry. Or place dressing in a 2 qt. casserole dish and bake 45 minutes to 1 hour at 325 degrees F.

the first one ever to go undefeated. I should have known better and I certainly should not have forgotten something of this nature that happened only three years ago; but I did.

The matter is corrected elsewhere in this issue. And it also explains one point about the current Red Devil team that has drawn comment on numerous occasions from fans and opponents alike: namely, where did the 1975 Red Devils come up with all that much defense? All that is necessary is to go back and check a few records.

When the present Juniors on the Red Devil team were members of an undefeated 8th Grade team, they played eight games and allowed only 22 points. Of the eight games, 5 were shut-outs and they never allowed more than one touchdown for any one game. They played two AA teams and two A teams — all two games each.

The main reason for the defense on the present Red Devil team is because, along with the experience of the Seniors on the team, plus the help of a Sophomore or two, the 1975 Red Devils know a little something about the game of defense. They have been there.

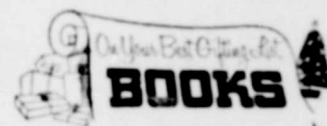

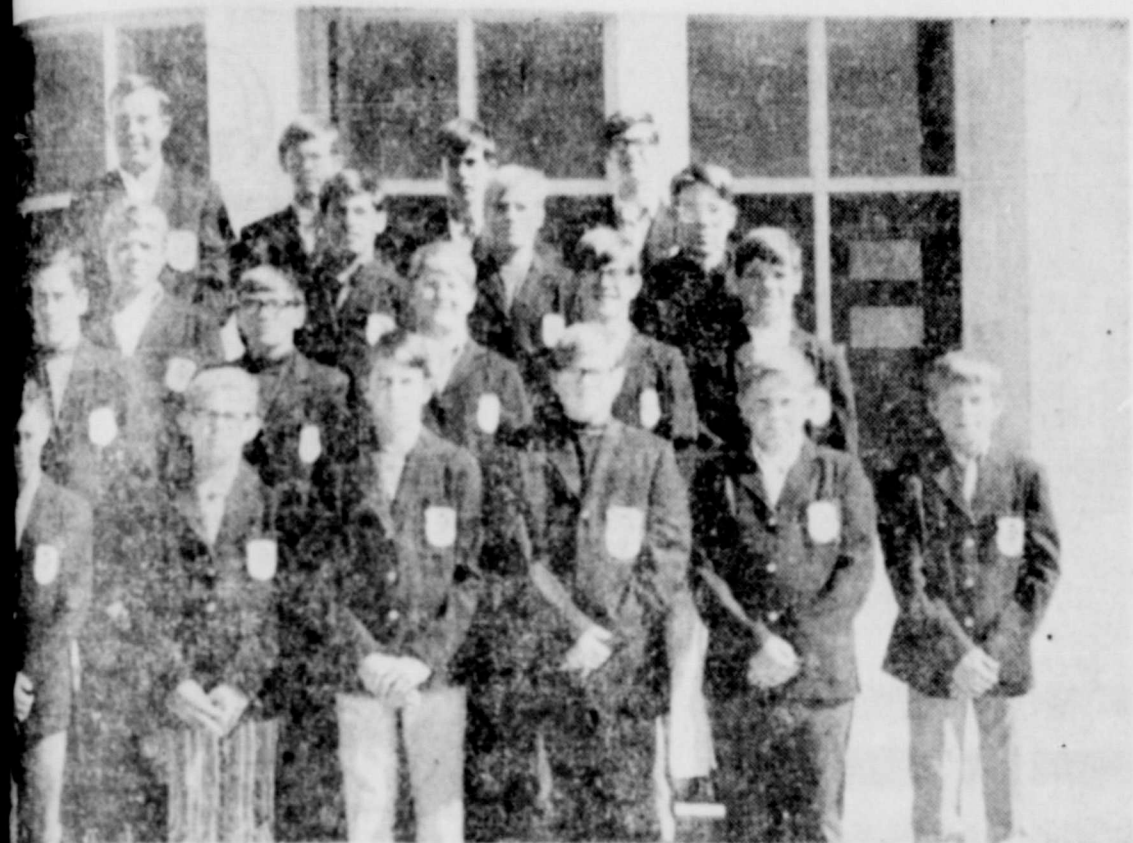
