rews on that date.

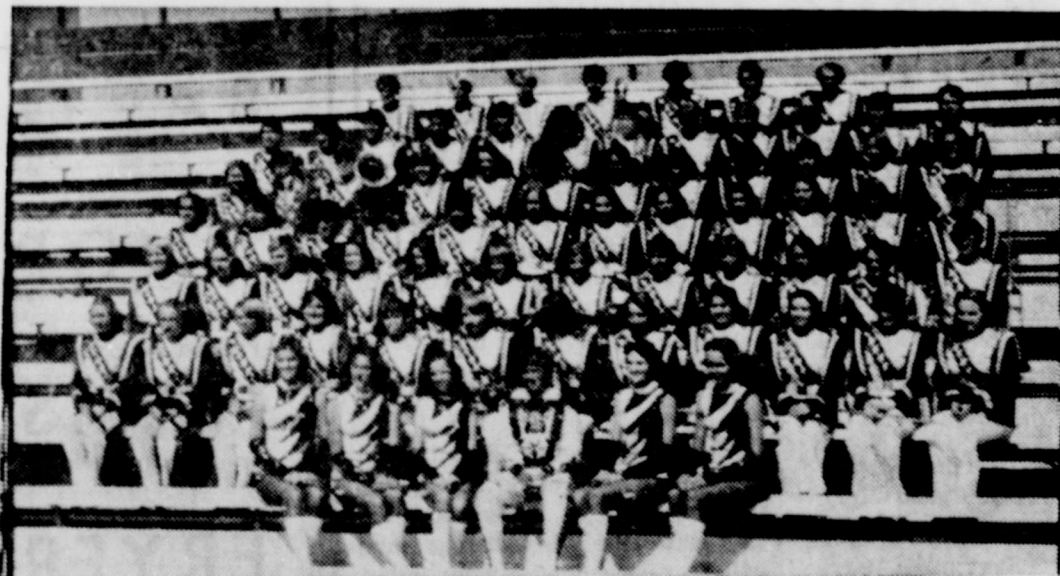

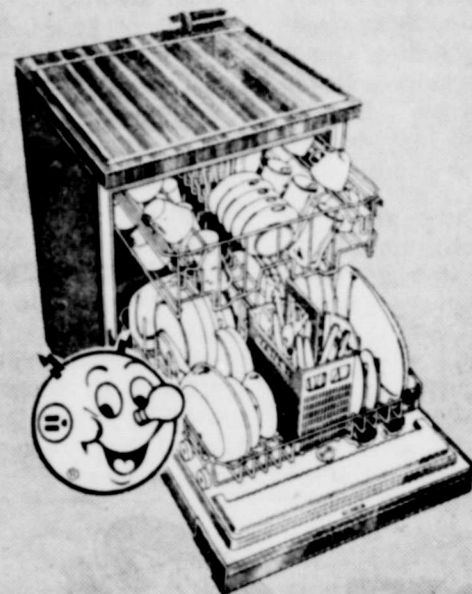

Extension Excerpts

COOKING BIG GAME

During the next few weeks, many will be participating in the sport of big game hunting. While many hunters pursue the sport mostly for the thrill of outdoor recreation, game foods properly dressed and prepared can add pleasant variety to the family menu.

Game meat differs in flavor from domestic meat, with each species having its own distinctive flavor and aroma. Flavor is more strongly marked in older and more active animals, in the more exercised muscles and in the fat of the animal. Game meat is an excellent source of high quality protein, fat, minerals, iron, copper and phosphorus and the B vitamins, thiamin, niacin and riboflavin.

Young and tender game is best cooked by dry heat such as roasting, broiling, pan-broiling and frying. Dry heat preserves flavor and insures tenderness. Basting with additional fat may be necessary if the meat is lean.

Old and less tender game is best when cooked by moist heat such as braising, stewing and simmering. Swiss steaks and pot roasts are cooked by braising. Add a small amount of liquid to the meat which is cooked in a covered container.
