Rankin Will "Close Down" for Thanksgiving Event

With exceptions, Rankin will be pretty well closed down for Thanksgiving Thursday as the big-meal family day—and ever-present tv football—is observed. Rankin Schools will close Wednesday and reopen Monday, December 1. County and city offices will also take two days; being closed from Wednesday at 5:00 p.m. until 8:00 a.m. Monday, December 1.

Roy's Restaurant has announced a one-day closing as has the Cashway Grocery — Thursday. Rankin Drug Store has indicated that they will be open Thursday and will serve the traditional Thanksgiving dinner. They now open at 7:30 a.m.

Boggs Grocery has also revealed plans to close from Nov. 27 until Dec. 1. Otherwise, offices and business places will generally take the one day before going back to business as usual on Friday—unless you happen to be employed in the oil patch and its related service firms, in which case it's business as usual.

No special community observances have been announced.

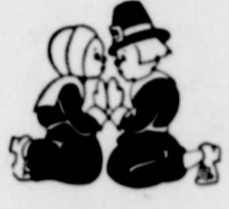

Cosell or any other person having access to the cameras of television—or the print of newspapers—or the voice of radio—or what have you— should not be allowed to put on a political program without announcing it as such. In fact, I think it's against the law to do so.

It's a very bad thing indeed

when a television network has such a low opinion of the public's mentality to think they can sneak in something as thinly veiled as the Cosell program has been in an attempt to actually brainwash the viewers. If such can be shown with no strings or regulations attached, then we may well be in trouble and the Mouth should be more correctly labeled as the Mouthpiece.

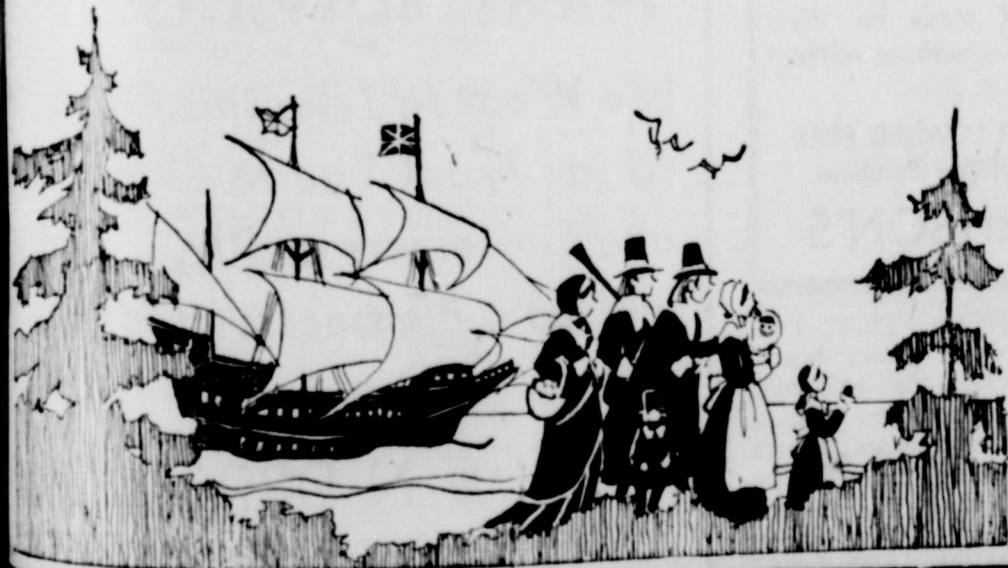

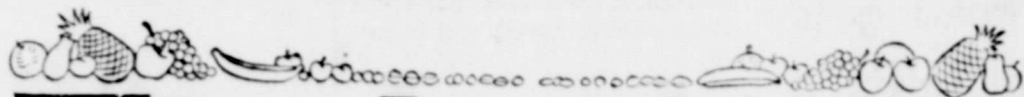
