

Beginning February 2, 1976, a new Federal Trade Commisssion ruling states that a mail-order company must notify the consumer within 30 days after receiving an order if there will be a delay and the merchandise will not be shipped within the stated time.

And if the delivery can't be met, consumers can cancel their order and receive a refund, if
