Twenty-Sixth Annual All-Kid Rodeo To Be on May 30-31

Upton County's 4-H Club has announced the dates of their 26th annual All-Kid Rodeo and Horse Show for Friday and Saturday, May 30-31. It will be held at the Dub Day 4-H Arena in Rankin.

Performances will be held at 7:30 p.m. each evening with events in ribbon roping, steer riding, calf roping, hair pulling, tire race, pole bending barrel

race, boot cramble. Entry forms are now available at the office of the County Extension Agent with entry fees being \$7.50 per event with the exception of the 8-year-olds and under who pay a \$5 entry fee for each event. Deadline for entries is noon on

Friday.

Also, in connection with the rodeo, a parade is to be held at 6:00 p.m. on Friday the 30th. A Rodeo Queen will also be selected from among the contestants. Queen contestants must not have previously won the title, must not be over 16-years-old, must ride in the parade, have a sponsor and enter a rodeo event.

Admission prices to the performances will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for high school age and under.

They've Not Always Been Red Devils

The Rankin Red Devils . . . sure, plenty of people have heard of them—all over Texas—and they also boast fans out-of-state. But the Rankin Oilers, you say . . . hum, yes . . . was that a semi-pro baseball team that once played here?

Well, there might have been such a baseball team at one time in Rankin but the Rankin Oilers listed on the basketball jersey pictured above were the original Red Devils—and they, too, were pretty well known in their day with basketball for both boys and girls being big.

The jersey pictured above, has a No. 5 on the back and was believed to have been retired in about 1929 when the name of the high school team was changed to the Red Devils. At the time of the change-over, the school gave the old Oiler jerseys to the players who had worn them.

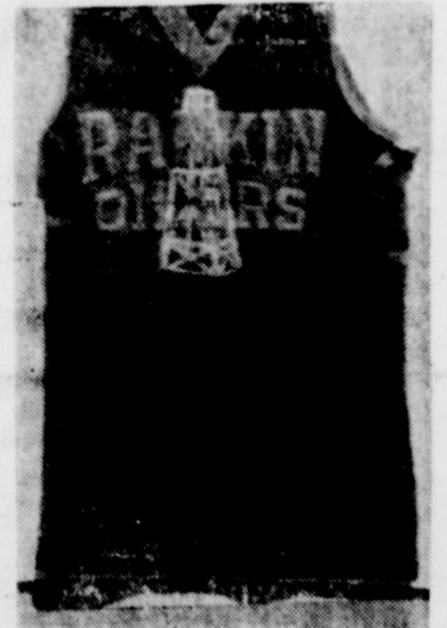

Sheep Comes Out Second Best



Although not distinct in the
above picture, a grown sheep
that has had its bottom jaw
bitten off by dogs is not exactly
a pretty sight. The one shown
above—with head and mid-sec-
tion covered with blood—is one
that survived a night of dog at-
tacks on an area ranch last
Wednesday.

Several other grown sheep did
not survive, and this one was
later destroyed since it was felt
that it would never be able to
recover. Sheep ranchers through-
out West Texas, and those in
particular who live near towns,

have a constant problem with
dogs mauling and killing their
flocks.

The owner of this particular
sheep reported killing two dogs
that he caught in his sheep. It
appears that the dogs attack the
sheep more as a type of sport
than for any food value since the
sheep are generally left dead or
lamed and never eaten by the
killers. Estimated value of the
sheep — considering it's worth,
that of its wool—plus the fact
that a lamb was left without a
mother—was put at about \$50.

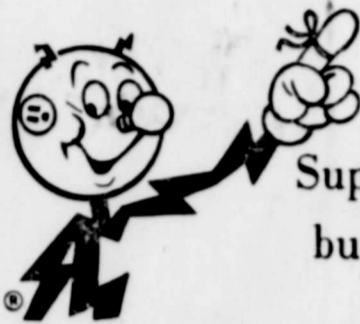

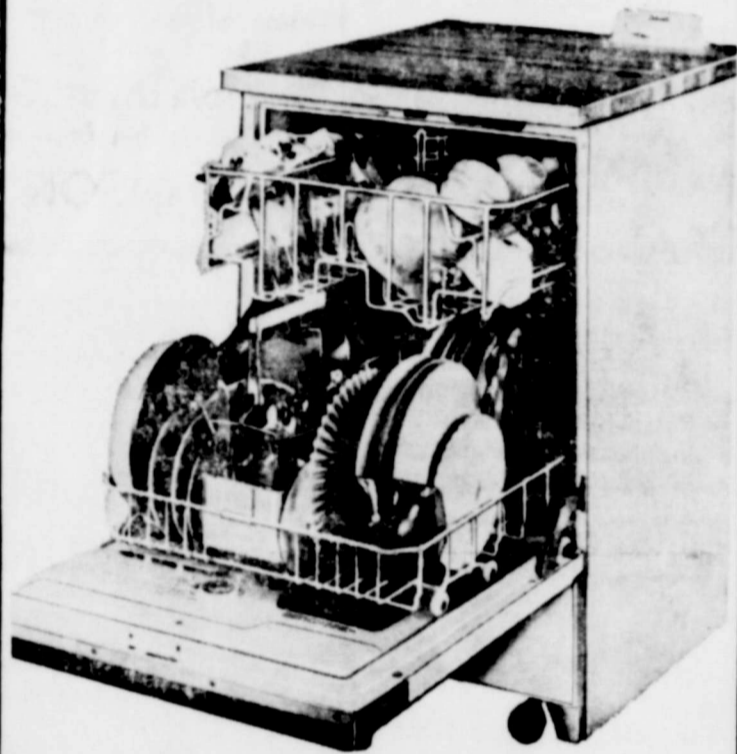



Dear Potential Supervisor,

I would like to express my thanks in having the opportunity to work with you and the enrollee whom you will supervise.

Should you have the misfortune to accept a person who has no desire to learn, nor motivation, nor willingness to even try, you are under no obligation. The individual will be terminated from our program and another applicant chosen if you request another.

A successful worksite is one in which both the supervisor and

the enrollee benefit. The supervisor receives labor with no monetary output and the worker receives new knowledge and new skills through productive guidance from his supervisor.

Ever Won Three —

Devil Golfers To Try For Comeback In Class A Finals

Rankin Red Devil golf team to Austin this week in an effort to establish a new record of three championships in a row. The team will find themselves in the position of the underdog; a bit new to them in the department — dating back three years now. Having won the state championship in 1972 and 1974, they appear to be well on the way to establishing themselves as the team to beat in a shoot-out. On the first day of Regional play, in the afternoon of April 27-28, the RHS had a hot 308 with Gary Wilkerson and Russell Wimberley, 75, Clarke Turner, 80, and Tom Wimberley, an 80. David Wilkerson had put them five shots behind the field, Memphis at the second.

As all know who have seen the game, the putting yips of the Red Devils and they had

a fat 335 for their second-day 18 holes. Varnadore went up to a 77, R. Wimberley had a 79, Turner carded an 88, and T. Wimberley had 91. Wilkerson helped his mark with an 85. Meanwhile, Memphis, not exactly getting by trouble-free themselves, moved to a 319 for their second effort. But it was good enough—they won by 11 shots to be the leaders going into the state finals this week.

Dispair, however, is not a common thing for a Red Devil team of any sort and the golfers, a bit grim-faced, perhaps, returned to the practice links and are once again ready to go all out for the win. As one of them said: "I just don't believe a thing like that can happen twice." He was referring to an entire team going cold on a given day—not necessarily unusual for an individual; but, yes, probably something that doesn't happen too often to a team capable of shooting a 308 in a regional meet.

Anytime you start into the playoffs, the competition gets tough, but the boys have a real good attitude and experience enough to know how to come back. They want to win and if they don't, I don't think there will be any need for excuses—they will give it their best and that's what we all want."
