ST. PAUL, Minn., April 15 .- A tornado struck St. Cloud, Minn., at half-past four yesterday afternoon. It came from a southwesterly direction, passed through the town and went almost due north, striking Sauk Rapids, three miles away, few seconds later. The first news of the tornado was received at the general office of the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba railroad just before five o'clock. The message said that the company's freight depot had been swept away and every car in the company's yard blown over and carried several blocks. A second message was received a few minutes later saying that sixty or seventy buildings had been demolished.

St. Cloud is the county seat of Stearns County. It is west of the Mississippi, several miles back from the river, and seventy-five miles north of St. Paul. It has a population of 4,360. Sauk Rapids is three miles above, on the opposite side of the river in Benton

At St. Cloud the loss to the Northern Pacific & Manitoba railroad is \$50,000, and to dwellings \$5,000. At St. Cloud the storm seemed to have been almost local in origin, and to have gathered and spent its force within a space of less than thirty miles in length and twenty rods in width. It started less than two miles south of St. Cloud. About 3:50 p. m., a number of dark and ominous clouds gathered in the southwest, and a short distance beyond the city began to take the terrible appearance of a cyclone. vo Bales Received in the Year 1862 Becently Put on the Market. (Rock Hill (S. C.) Herald.]

After the war had ended. Mr. Williamson swapped three bales of the cotton with the late D. R. S. Blake for a mule. The remainder was retained. Afterward Mr. Williamson brought samples to Rock Mill, and Mr. D. C. Roddey, who was then in business here, offered him 38 1-3 cents per pound in gold for it, but the offer was rejected and the cotton still, retained. At that time gold was at a premium of 50 per cent. hence Mr. Roddey's offer was equivalent to 50 cents per pound in currency. Strangely enough, Mr. Williamson, in face of this extraordinary price, determined to long is a mystery that lies buried in the

grave with him. The cotton was packed before iron ties came into use and in the days when there was no roping to be had. Hickory wither were used instead, and the original bind-ings still hold the bales firmly together, and are in a good state of preservation. The lint is as good as when the crop was gathered in 1862, and classed middling. The cotton was bought by Messrs. W. L. Roddey & Co., at eight and one-fourth cents per pound. A remarkable circum. stance is that on the day that the cotton was finally sold the price was lower than it had been since it was grown.

Beyond a doubt this is the oldest cotton in the world. At any rate, it is certainly the only cotton in existence that was raised by Southern slave labor and baled in the rude manner peculiar to the hard times of the late war.

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

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
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
